The Human Rights Commission was created in 2022 to advise the Royal Oak City Commission and city manager with efforts to bring greater equity and inclusion of diverse groups within the City of Royal Oak. The board was seated in early 2023, and over the past year has continued to create the foundation that we will move forward on.

Much of the last year has been about where to get started and understanding what services and programs already exist. They met with the Police Chief, Mike Moore and talked about what the police accreditation process means and how it helps shape our police practices. They spent some time with the 44th District Court and Operation Drive and acknowledged programs in the library that do work to recognize and bring awareness to equity issues.

This year the HRC started attending events, like Family Pride, and Juneteenth to start learning more from the community, and raise awareness of the committee. During these events the commission asked people to draw them pictures some of which are shown in this report and make friendship bracelets.

Earlier this year, the group spent some time doing strategic planning so that they can identify priorities among the varied needs of the work. Using a consensus process the group created three goals that they will be working on over the next few years. The things that the commission would like to pursue over the next year are indicated under the larger goal.

1. Build relationships that reflect the community.
 - a. Attending community events and programs to raise awareness of the Human Rights Commission and meet people where they are.
2. Raising awareness built on equity.
3. Create, measure and evaluate healthy and accessible human-centered systems.
 - a. Conducting a survey within the community to better understand the experiences of community members, visitors, and business owners and employees, and their ideas for improving equity in our community.

One of the main focuses of the HRC over the next few months will be working on a survey to learn from residents, visitors, businesses and their employees about their experiences in Royal Oak. We would like to use this data to learn and develop the strategies to recommend in the future.
