## Friends of Fungi Report - 2018 by Mary Fredricks

The Royal Oak Nature Society's mycology (mushroom) club, Friends of Fungi, met for four indoor programs in 2018 and sponsored seven walks in our two woods, Tenhave and Cummingston. The programs covered a range of topics: poisonous mushrooms, mushrooms without gills (puffballs, polypores, crusts, and many others), psychoactive mushrooms, and slime molds, which are not fungi but can be mistaken for them.

The walk season began in April in Tenhave Woods and continued once a month in alternating woods through October. The season started slowly due to dry, hot weather and didn't produce an abundance of fungi except for about two weeks in October. In spite of that, there was something interesting to see every month. One of the most exciting finds was made during an Eagle Scout project in November after the walks had ended. The winter mushroom (aka velvet stalk) was growing in multiple clusters on a standing dead tree that had lost most of its top branches. It fruits in cold weather, and even freezing doesn't set it back. See adjacent photo.

Please remember that it is illegal to remove any natural material from our woods. As you walk along the trails, stop and enjoy what is there, but leave it there for the next person to enjoy.

I hope you will join us in 2019 for the programs and walks and learn more about the amazing world of fungi. You will find information about upcoming events and locations on the Royal Oak Nature Society website.

## Cummingston Park– 2018 by Mary Fredricks

Every year good things happen in Cummingston Woods to make it healthier, safer, and more enjoyable. 2018 was no exception. Thanks to the hard work of many volunteers, the trails were kept clear, trash was picked up, and drainage ditches were cleaned. Non-native invasive plants were removed from the wooded areas and the meadow restoration area. Several special projects also happened. With the help of over 100 medical students from Oakland University, crushed stone was added to several trails to make walking easier during our wet springs. That same day, the north end of Eagle Scout Trail was re-routed to higher ground for the same reason. Last fall, benches were added to the Leafdale entrance by Anthony Turner, Eagle Scout candidate, and his team.

Other trails were also given special attention in 2018, but of a different kind. They received names. The new north-south trail on the east side of the woods has been named Turkey Tail Trail after a fungus found on this trail and in many other parts of the woods. It's a small shelf fungus with pores rather than gills under its cap. It grows on dead logs in clusters and can be recognized by its fuzzy appearance and bands of varied color (see photo above-right). It is one of our important wood rotters and is used in the paper industry to remove lignin from paper pulp.

The trails that were added to the west side of the park have also been given names. The main trail is called



Screech Owl Trail. Screech owls raise young in Cummingston and thrill people who attend the late winter owl hoot when they put in an appearance. The short trail that leads off of the south end of Screech Owl Trail and then rejoins it is called Owlet Spur because it is an offshoot of the longer trail. (See map below.)

Also new in 2018, a footpath now runs along the ridge that marks the northern edge of the meadow. It allows a nice overview of both the meadow to the south and the lower, wooded area to the north. It is a rugged trail and shouldn't be attempted by anyone unsure of their footing.

I hope to see you in the woods soon.



## SPEAKER PROGRAMS

Our monthly general meeting/speaker programs (*October to April*) is held at the **Royal Oak Middle School which is located at 709 N. Washington**. We meet in the **auditorium or the “Gathering Place”**, both of which can be reached via the school's southeast entrance. At our monthly **Wednesday** meetings, we present speaker programs that are usually slide shows focusing on various natural history topics. If you watch nature programs on PBS or the Discovery Channel, this is better because you can meet with the speakers afterwards and ask questions. **The general meeting begins around 7:30 pm, with the speaker program to follow.**

"What Can We Do to Save the Bees" speaker program is being held on **March 6<sup>th</sup>**. We have lost 75% of our insect Bio Mass over the last 50 years. Some of the questions we should ask are: Should I plant a tree? What is the status of all our native pollinators? Are honey bees part of the answer? Rich Wieske is co-owner of Green Toe Gardens. Green Toe Gardens tends hives throughout Detroit, pollinating our local farms and gardens. They also maintain the observation hives at Belle Isle, Edsel and Eleanor Ford bee yards and bee hives at Cross Winds Marsh. Rich is a bee advocate and mentor on what's happening to our bees. Join Rich Wieske as he tells us what we can do about saving them.

If you've ever wanted to learn more about honey bees this evening is the place to bee.

"The Philippines – Islands of Endemics" speaker program is being held on **April 10<sup>th</sup>**. The Philippines are a birders paradise. This country is made up of isolated islands in the Pacific Ocean near Asia, providing a perfect spot for isolated bird species to evolve. Boasting 7107 islands, the Philippines can also boast of having 657 species, of which 214 are endemic. Join Don Burlett, president of Oakland Audubon, as he leads our visit seven of these islands in a quest to see many of the islands birds. We'll also enjoy the landscape, history and culture of these islands.

**CUMMINGSTON PARK:** Park is just east of Meijer. Park and meet at Leafdale & Torquay

**TENHAVE WOODS:** Park is just east of Royal Oak High School. Park in Marais/Lexington lot and meet at the Lexington entrance (300 feet east of parking lot). For the Owl Hoots & Full Moon walks, park and meet at the Marais/Lexington lot.

**ARBORETUM:** Park and meet on the north side of the Royal Oak Senior/Community Center (3500 Marais)

Come and learn about the interesting aquatic wildlife of Dragonfly Pond.



