The 2022/23 season ends August 31, 2023. Check to see if you owe membership dues for the 2022/23 season. If you receive a hard copy of the newsletter, check the address label to see if you need to renew. If you receive an electronic copy of the newsletter, check the email subject line to see if you need to renew.

There are four membership levels. General Membership is free and with it, you get Nature Society schedule updates e-mailed to you at least once a month. Royal Oak Arboretum Gardening Accomplishments for 2022

Twenty twenty-two has been a very good year for the Arboretum. Our quest to get hard surface trails throughout the Arboretum has been successful. Julie Lyons Bricker from the city has been working on getting grants for this for over four years. The city received a grant from Oakland County and the commission agreed to meet the matching funds; included in this is \$5,000 from the Nature Society. We are waiting for the city engineering department to develop the design, but they are swamped with earlier projects that need completing first. Hopefully, the project can begin next year.

From the Nature Society's side, we, have had a group of four or five men working at the Arboretum on Tuesday mornings from early May till early November. This year it has been Kevin Norris, Ken Caldwell,

John Fedyk and me doing the heavy work of digging out buckthorn, honeysuckle and other invasive woody plants. The group has helped lead volunteer work groups on a project moving mulch to smother English Ivy and Myrtle in the mushroom garden. Below is a photo that includes two women volunteers from Retail Bloom helping to spread mulch in the mushroom garden.

All of this work in the arboretum has been going on for the past five years in an effort to get the area ready for the addition of the hard surface trails, which will allow us to offer nature programs for the physically challenged.

As stated in our 2022 Fall newsletter, we have been working on getting the area ready for our conifer collection

to be planted next spring. We have Balsam Fir, Black Spruce, Jack Pine, Red Pine and Tamarack waiting in our nursery.

We are developing a new trail running through the forest of mature Burr Oaks where we need to plant woodland wildflowers. We did start this with several flats of Wild Ginger this year. It is our goal to have every tree species native to Michigan either in our nature parks or planted in the Arboretum. We spent three years looking for Cork Elm a tree unavailable from nurseries. In 2021, we found Cork Elm trees and we gathered seeds and planted them in our nursery. They did well and we moved four to the Arboretum this summer.

Much of the Arboretum is not actively gardened, as you might do in your backyard. When a natural plant community is thriving, it is only occasionally that something that does not belong is found and control is needed. But the memorial garden, butterfly garden and rain garden are different and continued weeding and planting occurs. Vanessa Schultz is our Chief Ecoscaper in charge of this continuing work. We hope to develop a work crew for her in this never-ending gardening job.

New Board Members

The Nature Society has just recently voted in three new board members. They are Alyssa Beavers as an at-large director plus Jeremiah Sandler and Jack Novak from Tree First as co-stewards of Tenhave Woods and the Royal Oak Arboretum. We welcome their addition to the board.

We appreciate that they have volunteered their help to strengthen our three parks and the Nature Society. There are still two positions that need to be filled. They include Fundraiser director and Education director. If you think that you might be interested in either of them, please contact us.

Outside Group Volunteering

Outside groups have been an important part of the stewardship of Tenhave Cummingston and the Royal Oak Arboretum. Recently, an Eagle Scout project took place in August of this year (page 4) along with other outside group workdays this past April and May.

On April 20th, 15 Honor Society students from Oakland School Technical Campus volunteered their time to clean up Cummingston by removing trash along south fence and trails.

On a Cummingston Park workday on May 28th, seven students from International Academy of Bloomfield Hills Biology Club cleaned out the Cummingston drainage ditch that runs parallel to Leafdale Trail. It frequently gets clogged up and needs to be cleaned out every once and awhile.

ROYAL OAK NATURE SOCIETY FRIENDS OF FUNGI

Friends of Fungi (FOF) is a group that promotes the understanding of, and an appreciation for, fungi in general and especially those fungi found in Tenhave, Cummingston, and the Arboretum. Mary Fredricks, mycologist for the Nature Society, heads this group. At the present time, no in-person meetings are being held. However, the FOF sponsors fungi walks from April through October on the fourth Saturday of each month at 10 am. There is no cost, but preregistration is currently required. NATURE WALKS

Normally, there is at least one naturalist lead walk per month with additional ones added during the spring wildflower and fall color seasons. An emphasis is put on understanding the different forest types found in our parks. Further information is given on individual plant and animal species, geology and human history of the area. Wearing boots is recommended in the winter and spring months. Using insect repellent and dressing appropriately is advised from late spring to the end of summer.

CUMMINGSTON PARK: Park is just east of Meijers. Park and meet at Leafdale & Torquay

TENHAVE WOODS: Park is just east of the High School. Park in Marais/Lexington lot and meet at the Lexington entrance (300 feet east of parking lot). For the Owl Hoot walks, park and meet at the Marais/Lexington lot.

ROYAL OAK ARBORETUM: Park and meet on the north side of the Senior/Community Center (3500 Marais).

"Mammals of Tenhave" walk is being held at **Tenhav Woods** on Sunday, **December 11th**, beginning at **2:00 pm**.

"Owl Hoot" is being held at **Cummingston Park** on Friday, **December 16th** beginning at **7:30 pm**.

"Winter Wildflowers" walk is being held at **Cummingston Park** on Sunday, **January 15th**, beginning at **2:00 pm**.

"Owl Hoot" is being held at **Tenhav Woods** on Tuesday, **January 17th**, beginning at **7:30 pm**.

"Owl Hoot" is being held at **Cummingston Park** on Thursday, **February 16th**, beginning at **7:30 pm**.

"Winter Wildflowers" walk is being held at **Tenhav Woods** on Saturday, **February 18th**, beginning at **2:00 pm**.

Eagle Scout Project

A Tenhave Woods Eagle Scout project took place on Saturday, August 27th. It was a perfect day to work with temperatures in the mid 70's and clear skies. The leader was Eagle Scout candidate Aiden Callahan from Troop #1610. Beginning around 9 am, Aiden had a crew of around 25 troop members and adults working for him. Beginning from the south end of the Sandbar Trail, they were able to line part of the trail before running out of logs. They then began the removal of invasive plants between the pond and the west fence (see adjacent photo) which included buckthorn, honeysuckle, multi-flora rose while trying to save high bush cranberry, nanny berry & gray dogwood that also resided in the area. They also replaced the log that has been at the edge of the pond since the pond reconstruction in 2005 with a new one. The log is used to kneel on so one can get up real close to the pond to see what is underneath the water. By 2 pm, they were finishing up their last job attaching tags on trees, mainly in the arboretum.

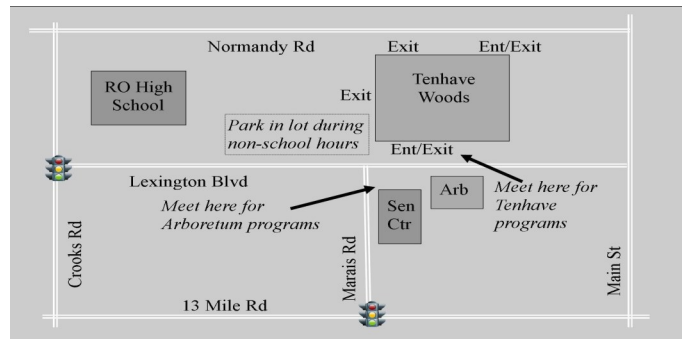
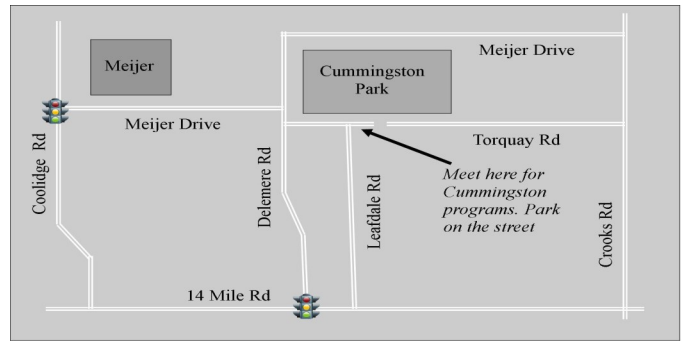
