Membership for the 2025/26 season begins now and ends at the end of August, 2026. Please check to see if you owe membership dues for the 2025/26 season or not. 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Fred A. Erb Arboretum Grant- Over 100 Trees Planted

The Fred and Barbara Erb Foundation approached the City of Royal Oak in 2022 asking if 100 trees could be planted in memory of Fred Erb who would have been 100 years old in 2023. The Arboretum being developed by the Royal Oak Nature Society was a perfect match and Royal Oak received a \$250,000 grant. In 2023 we managed to find and plant 21 trees and in 2024 we planted 44 more. These trees were listed in our Winter 2024/2025 newsletter. This spring and summer we finally achieved this goal plus a few extra. In total, we have purchased and planted 107 trees using this grant money. Below is a list of the 42 trees planted this year and a photo of one of these 107 trees being planted & caged. The cages are necessary to keep the deer from chewing on the new trees.

Fred A. Erb Arboretum Boundaries


The Park surrounding the Royal Oak Senior Community Center was known as the Royal Oak Arboretum. With a generous grant from the Fred and Barbara Erb Foundation, the Royal Oak Arboretum became the Fred A. Erb Arboretum.

Royal Oak Arboretum's northern boundary ended at Lexington Boulevard. The Fred A. Erb Arboretum has grown beyond that border.

Quickstad Park is north of Lexington Boulevard and continues up to Normandy Road. Quickstad contains Tenhave Woods. The area in Quickstad Park north of Lexington and up to the south fence of Tenhave Woods is now part of the Fred A. Erb Arboretum.

With the assistance of the additional land, our goal to having a collection of all 88 of Michigan's native trees jumped with the addition of 17 species purchased through the grant.

To your right is a map showing the boundaries of the Fred A. Erb Arboretum. The area marked Gardening Area is where we have actively planted native trees, shrubs and wildflowers and this will continue to be done in this area. The others areas have many native tree planted but remain having a lawn around them.

Our speaker programs are usually Power Point presentations focusing on various natural history topics. If you watch nature programs on PBS or the Discovery Channel, this is better because you can meet with the speakers afterwards and ask questions. Our current speaker programs are being held at the **Royal Oak Historical Museum** (1411 W. Webster, just west of Crooks), and begin at **7:00 pm**. Presently, there are no Nature Society speaker programs scheduled. As they become scheduled, a notice will be put on our website.

President's Report by Bob Muller

This has been a great year for the Royal Oak Nature Society. The hard surface trails we have been trying to get for a decade at the arboretum are in and now there are many more people walking through it.

We have accomplished the planting of 100 trees in honor of Fred A. Erb. The Fred A. Erb Arboretum is very different from our nature parks. It is a botanical garden and therefore takes constant gardening. Our dedicated Tuesday morning Arb crew continues to try and keep up with what is needed in the Arb.

The new shed the Erb Grant provided is fantastic. It's large enough that on a day that it rained we were able to build deer tree cages inside it.

We have started volunteer Saturdays that meet once a month. Up to dozen volunteers show up and in a couple of hours, we accomplish things that would take the Tuesday crew more than a month to do.

With the planting of the 100 trees, we learned the deer can destroy them very quickly if we do not get cages

around them. We now have enough materials in stock so that we can build cages and install them faster than the deer can damage the trees.

One of things we have been thinking about is the addition of a Chimney Swift Tower, a structure a Chimney Swift uses for nesting, which would be a good Eagle Scout Project.

We did not manage to get the deer out of Tenhave Woods last winter so we will be working hard to accomplish that this winter.

The Nature Society agreed to allow the Royal Oak High School Cross Country team to have their course go through Tenhave Woods. We felt that allowing this would be another way for another group of people to feel an "ownership" of the park. More of the public valuing Tenhave Woods adds to its protection. This October the Michigan High School Athletic Association Cross Country Regional Championship, will be held running through Tenhave Woods.

ROYAL OAK NATURE SOCIETY FRIENDS OF FUNGI

Royal Oak Nature Society Friends of Fungi is a group that promotes the understanding of, and an appreciation for fungi in general and those fungi found in Tenhave, Cummingston, and other local urban woods. This group is open to anyone who wants to learn more about fungi which also includes mushrooms. Meetings are scheduled for the winter. There is usually a specific topic that is being talked about at each of these meetings. Mary Fredricks heads this group. Check out the Nature Society's website for more information. In addition, the Friends of Fungi sponsors fungi walks from April through October on the fourth Saturday of each month at 10 am. Everyone is welcome. There is no cost for our walks and programs and registration is not required.

A Friends of Fungi program, "**Ascomycota Fungi of Michigan**," will be held on Thursday, **November 13th**, beginning at **7:00 pm** at the **Royal Oak Historical Museum**. Join Lorenzo Piccolo and hear him talk about ascomycetes, especially those found in Michigan. Ascomycetes are fungi that produce their spores in ascii. An ascus is a capsule shaped like a sac, club, or balloon. Morels are ascomycetes. He is planning to have samples of various fungi on display. Everyone is invited. There is no cost and registration is not required.

NATURE WALKS/PROGRAMS ARE FREE AND OPEN TO EVERYONE REGISTRATION IS NOT REQUIRED

Normally, there is at least one naturalist lead walk per month with additional ones added during the spring wildflower and fall color seasons. An emphasis is put on understanding the different forest types found in our parks. Further information is given on individual plant and animal species, geology and human history of the area. Wearing boots is recommended in the winter and spring months. Using insect repellent and dressing appropriately is advised from late spring to the end of summer. Park locations:

CUMMINGSTON PARK: Cummingston Park is just east of the Royal Oak Meijer store. Park and meet at Leafdale & Torquay.

TENHAVE WOODS: Tenhave Woods is just east of Royal Oak High School. Park in the Marais/Lexington lot or at the Senior/Community Center. Meet at the Lexington entrance (300 feet east of Marais).

FRED A. ERB ARBORETUM: Park and meet on the north side of the Senior/Community Center (3500 Marais) lot.

“Tenhave Forest Walk” is being held on Saturday, **September 20th** beginning at **2:00 pm**. Tenhave is a combination of a beech-maple, oak & swamp forests whereas Cummingston is mostly a mature oak forest.

“Mushroom Walks” take place on Saturdays and begin at **10:00 am**. They will be held at:

Tenhave Woods on September 27th
Cummingston Park on October 25th

Mary Fredricks, a member and botanist/mycologist of the Royal Oak Nature Society, will lead the walks. Anyone with an interest in learning more about mushrooms and other fungi of the urban woods is welcome

“Fall Color Walks” take place on Sundays beginning at **2:00 pm**. They will be held at:

Cummingston Park on October 5th
Tenhave Woods on October 12th
Cummingston Park on October 19th
Tenhave Woods on October 26th

This is the most beautiful time of the year to take a look at our two nature parks, Cummingston Park and Tenhave Woods.





