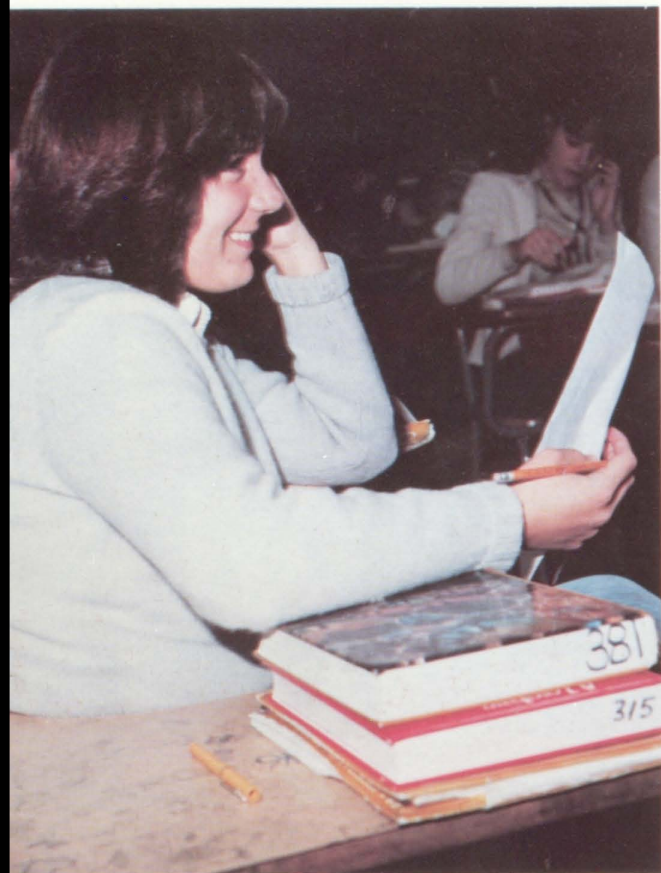


25th ANNIVERSARY

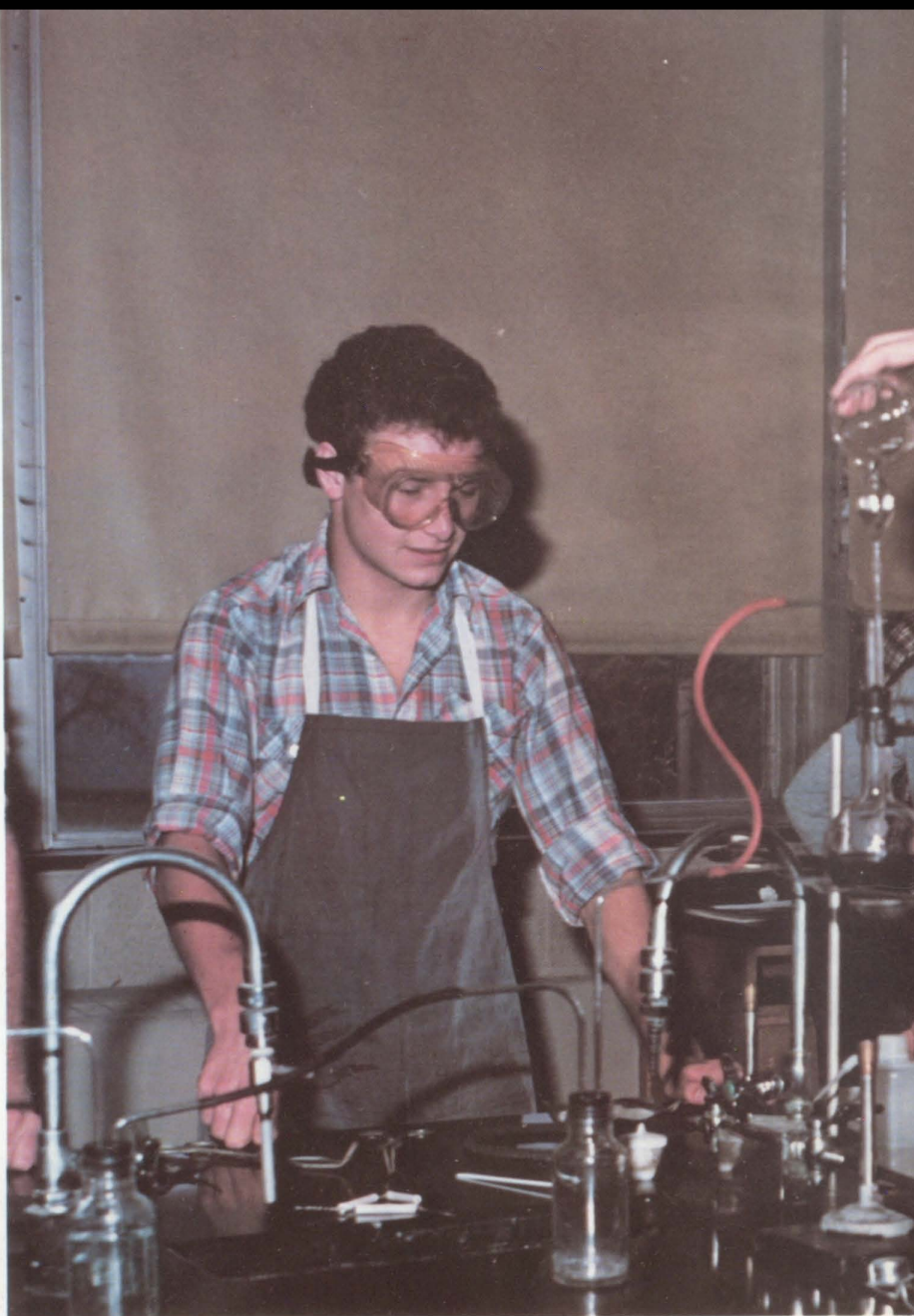


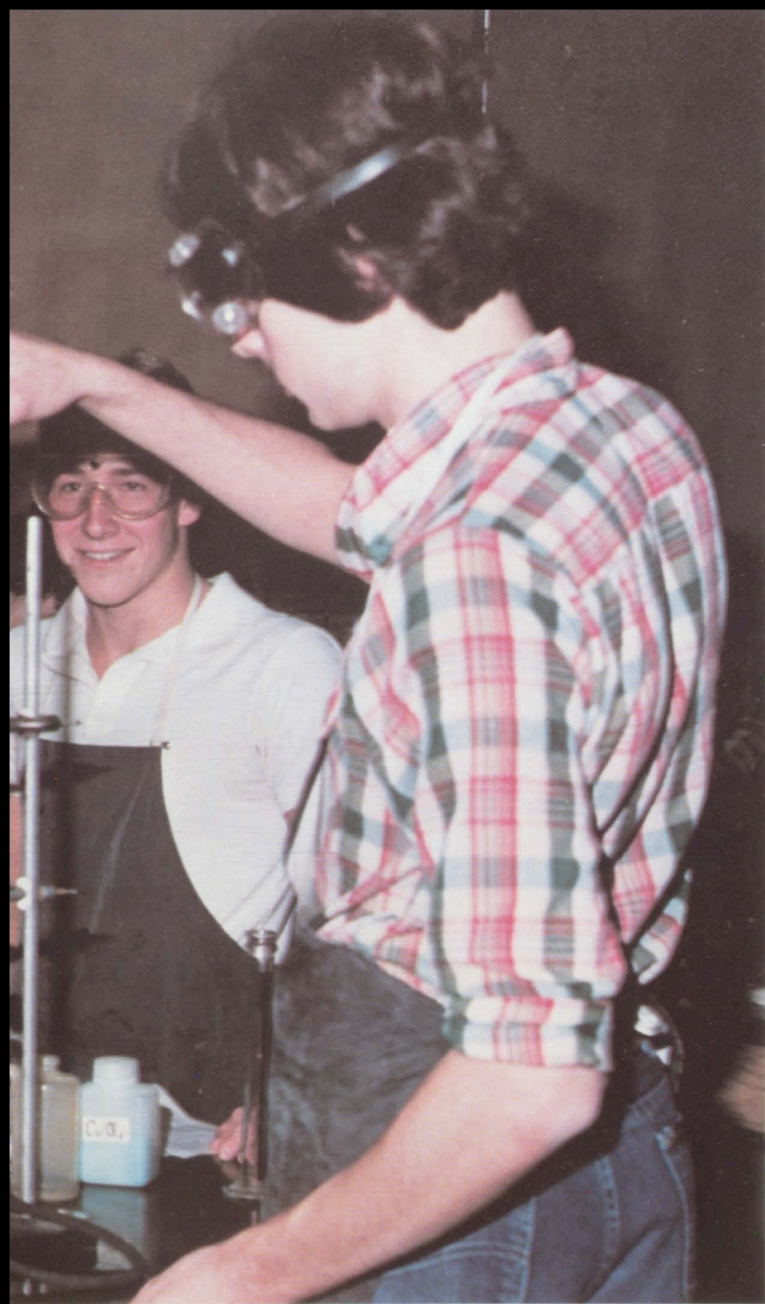
ACADEMICS

The students and teachers who participate in these activities and sponsor them, should be commended for their fine work, and we should be happy that they've brought us memories we will never forget.

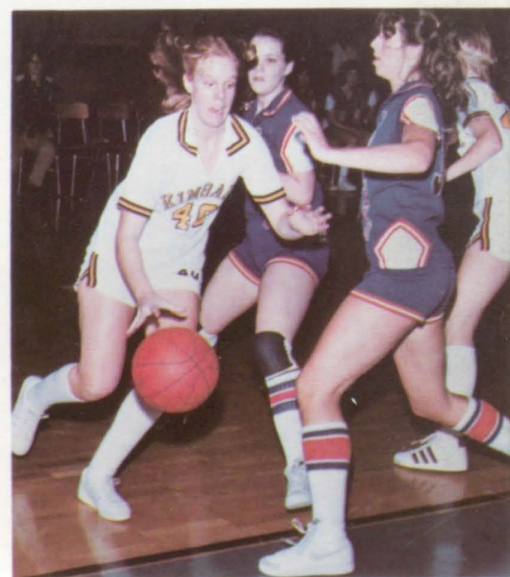
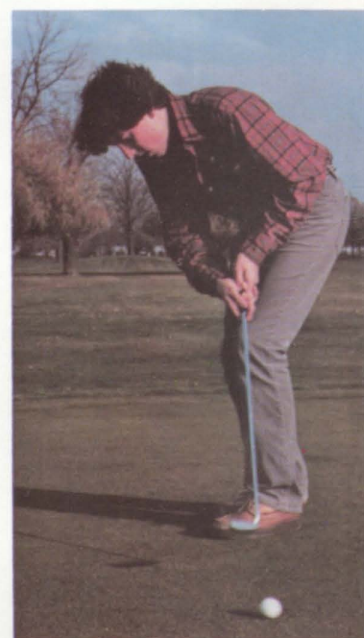


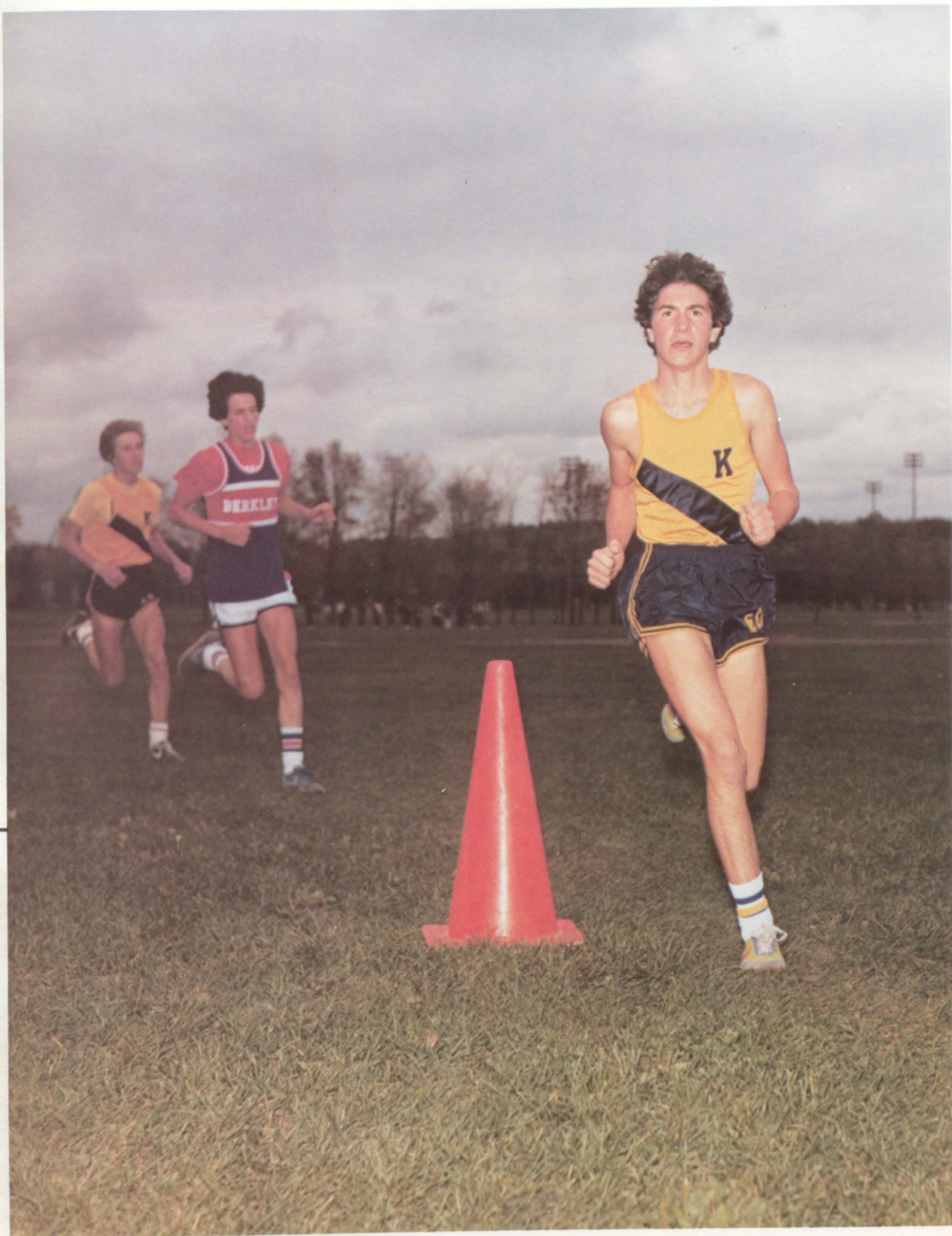

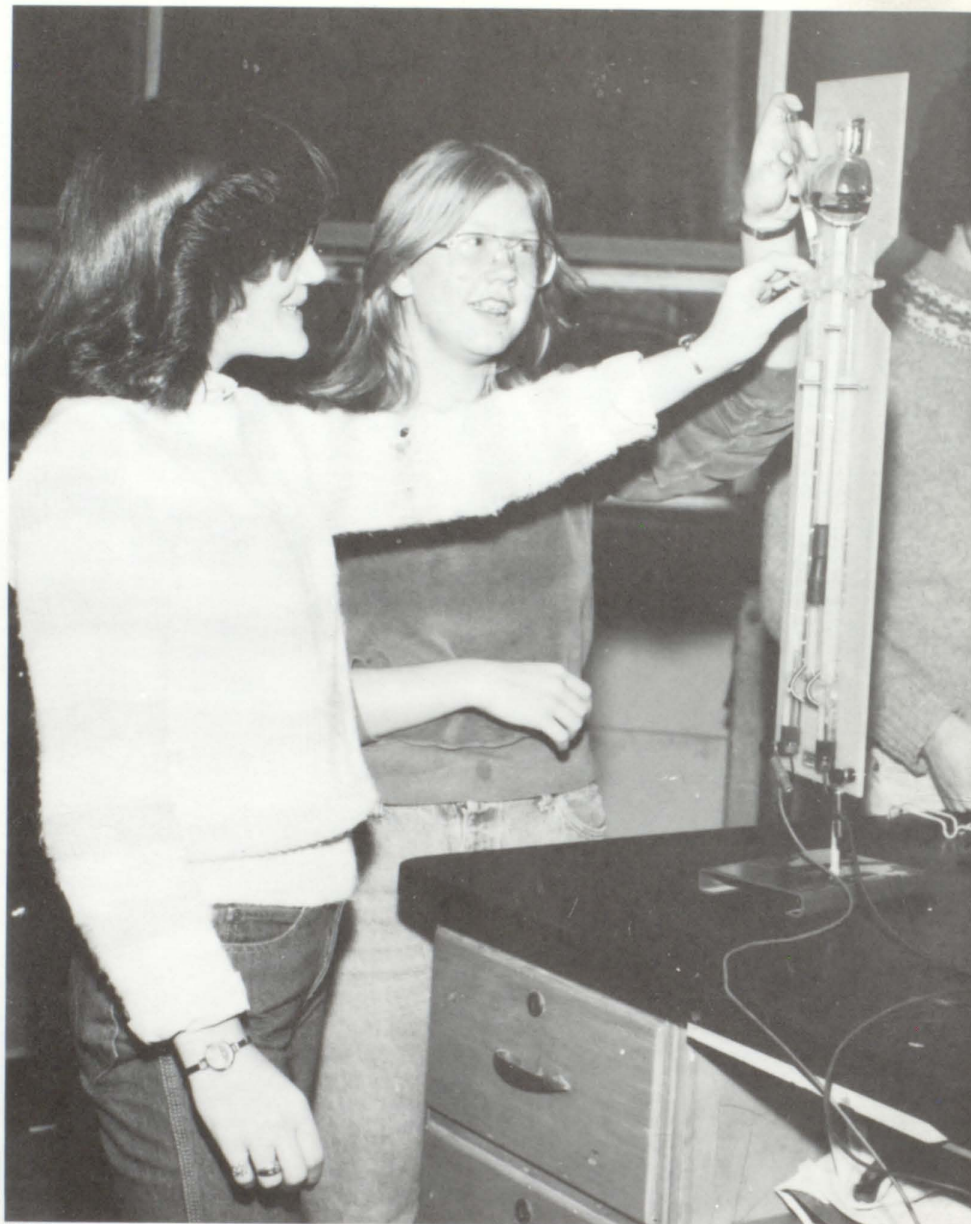

Two machines have been added to the business department this year. The first is the IBM display writer. This is one of the most modern pieces of word processing equipment on the market today. It consists of a computerized keyboard, electronics unit, video screen and a separate printer. Word processing equipment eliminates the need for re-typing whole documents because of changes and revisions. Material is typed and stored in the machine. Then the material types at a rate of 200 words per minute. The second machine is the Apple II Computer. This will be integrated into the Clerical Office Machine Lab to provide students with computer literacy and an awareness of available jobs in the computer field. The computer will be used to generate and produce reports in the following areas: accounting, billing, inventory and payroll.

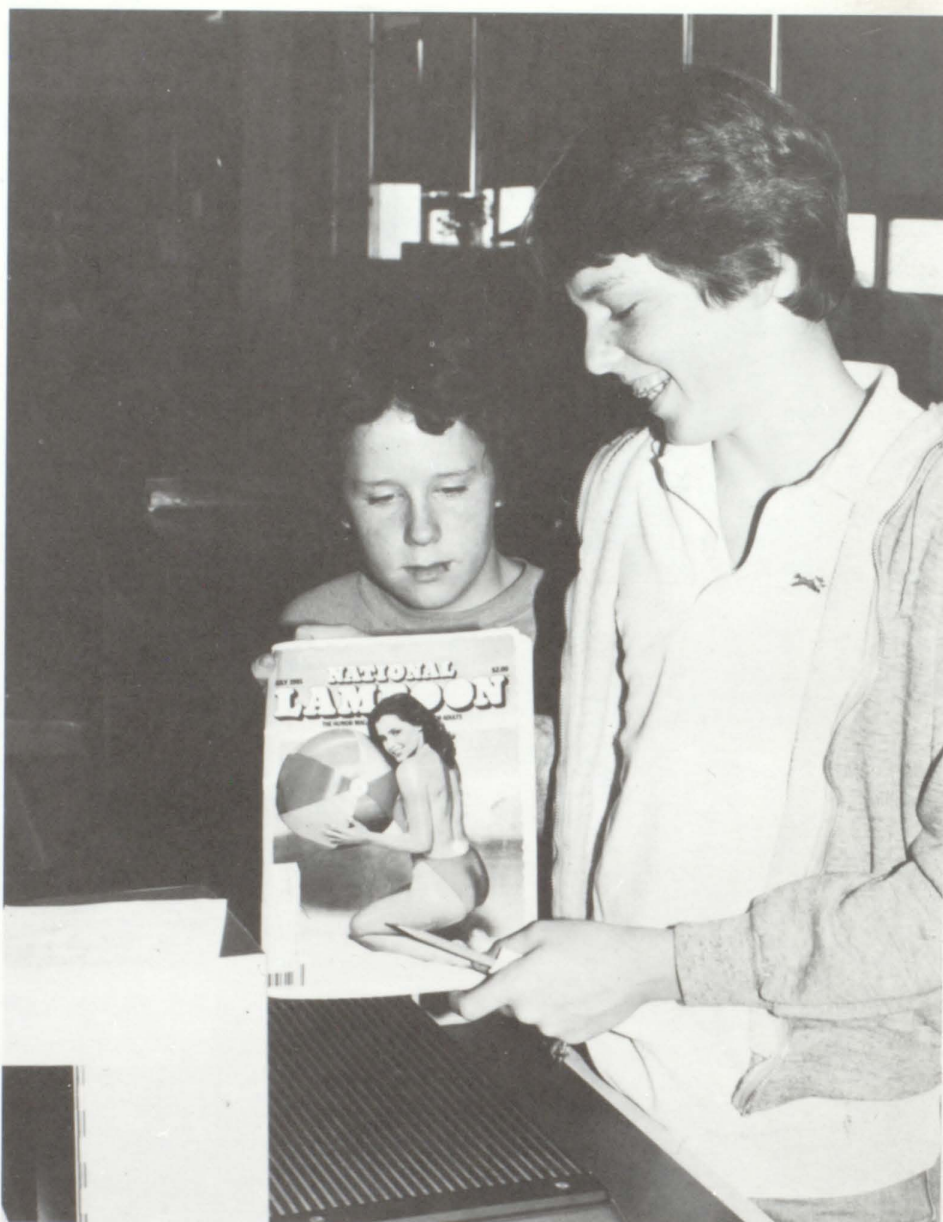

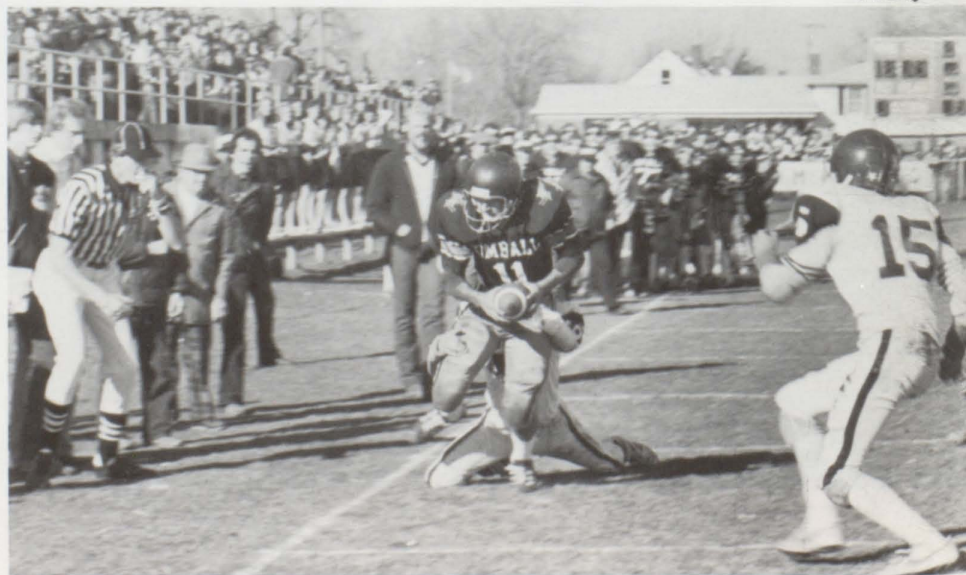

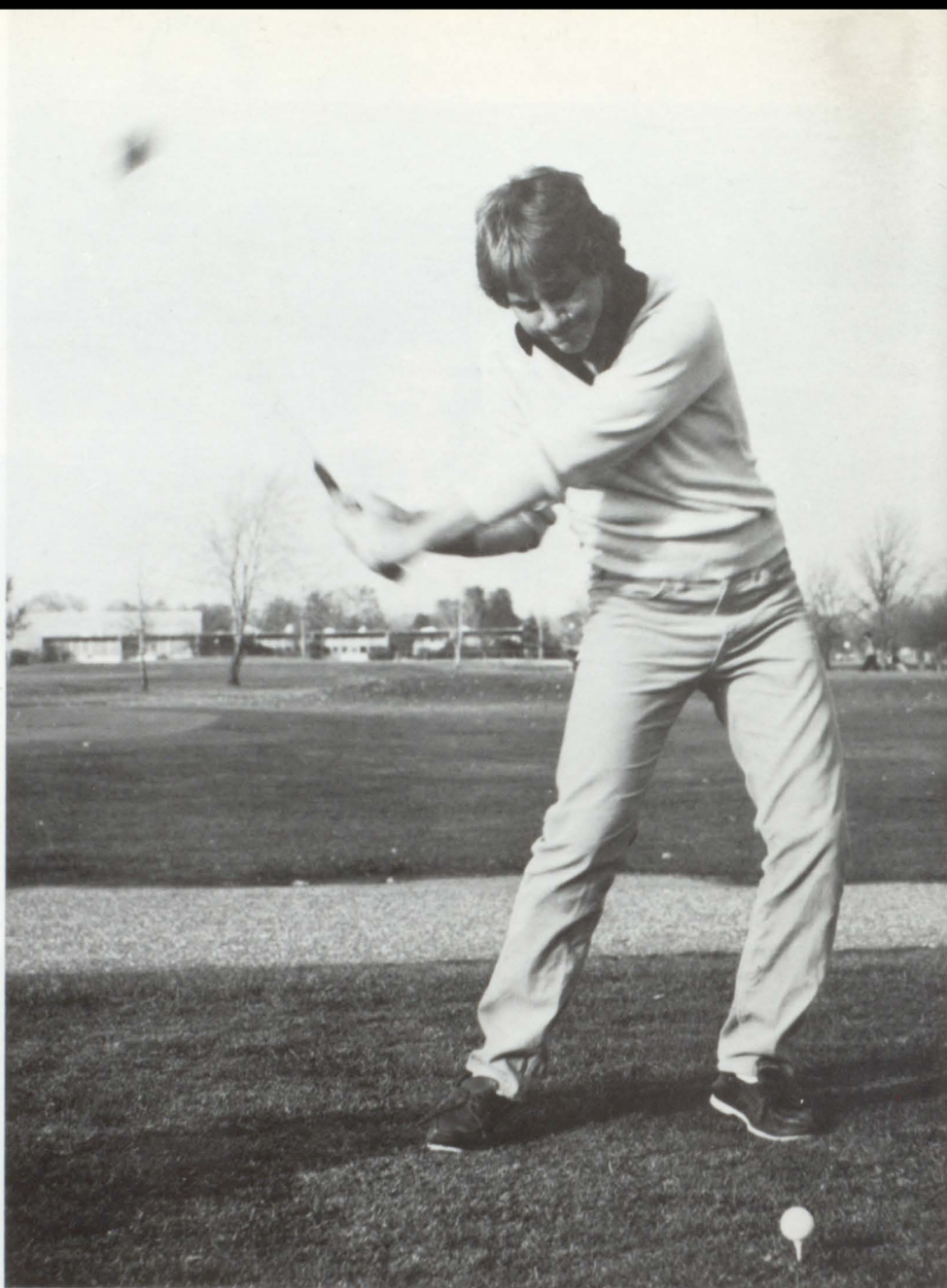

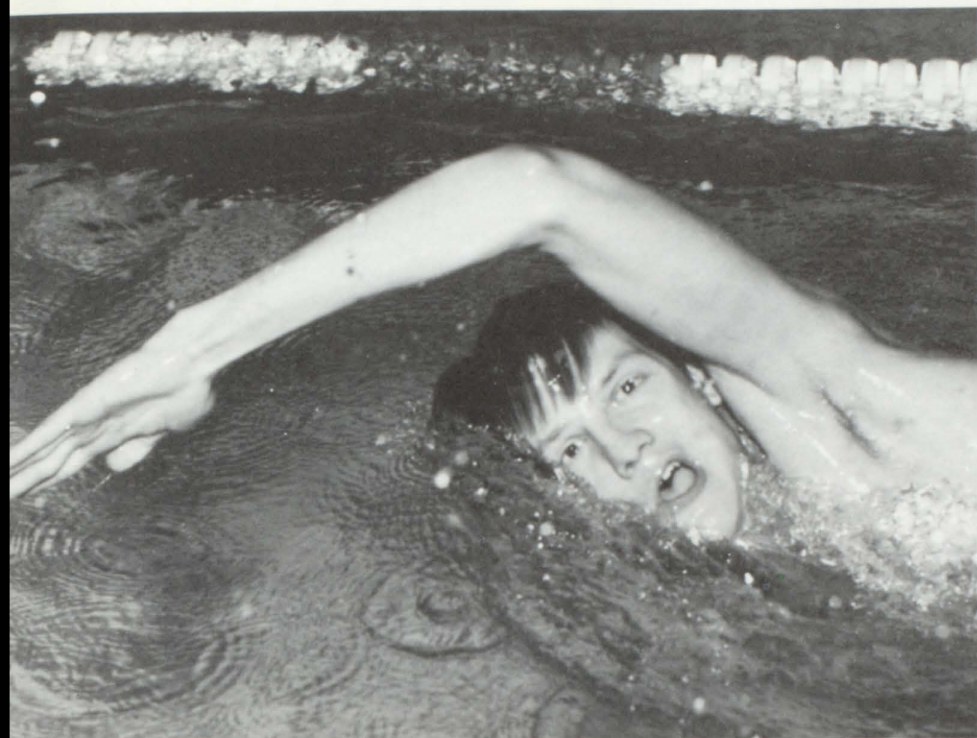
