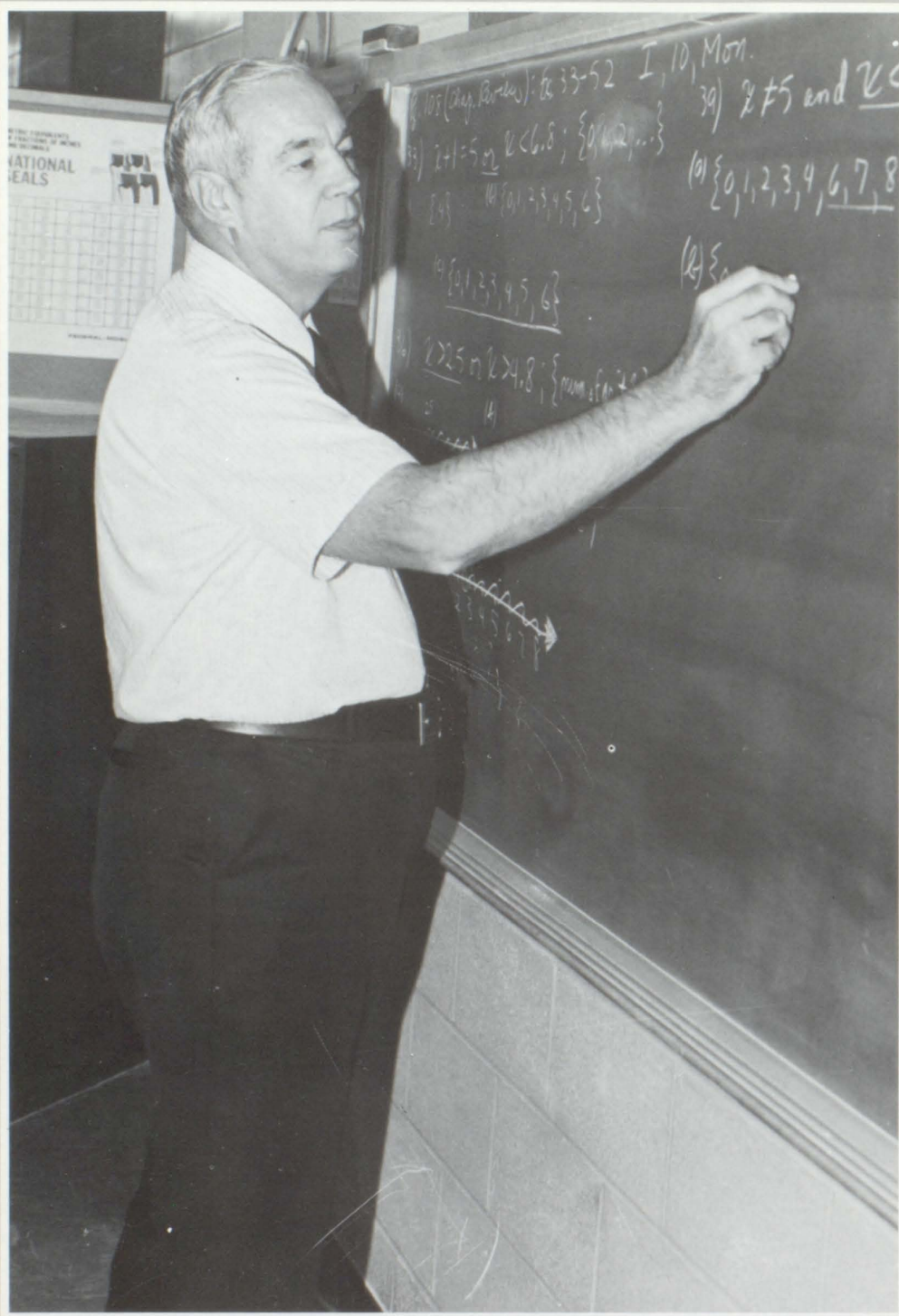

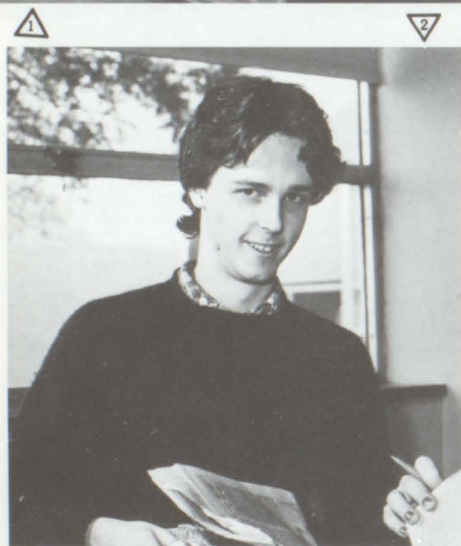

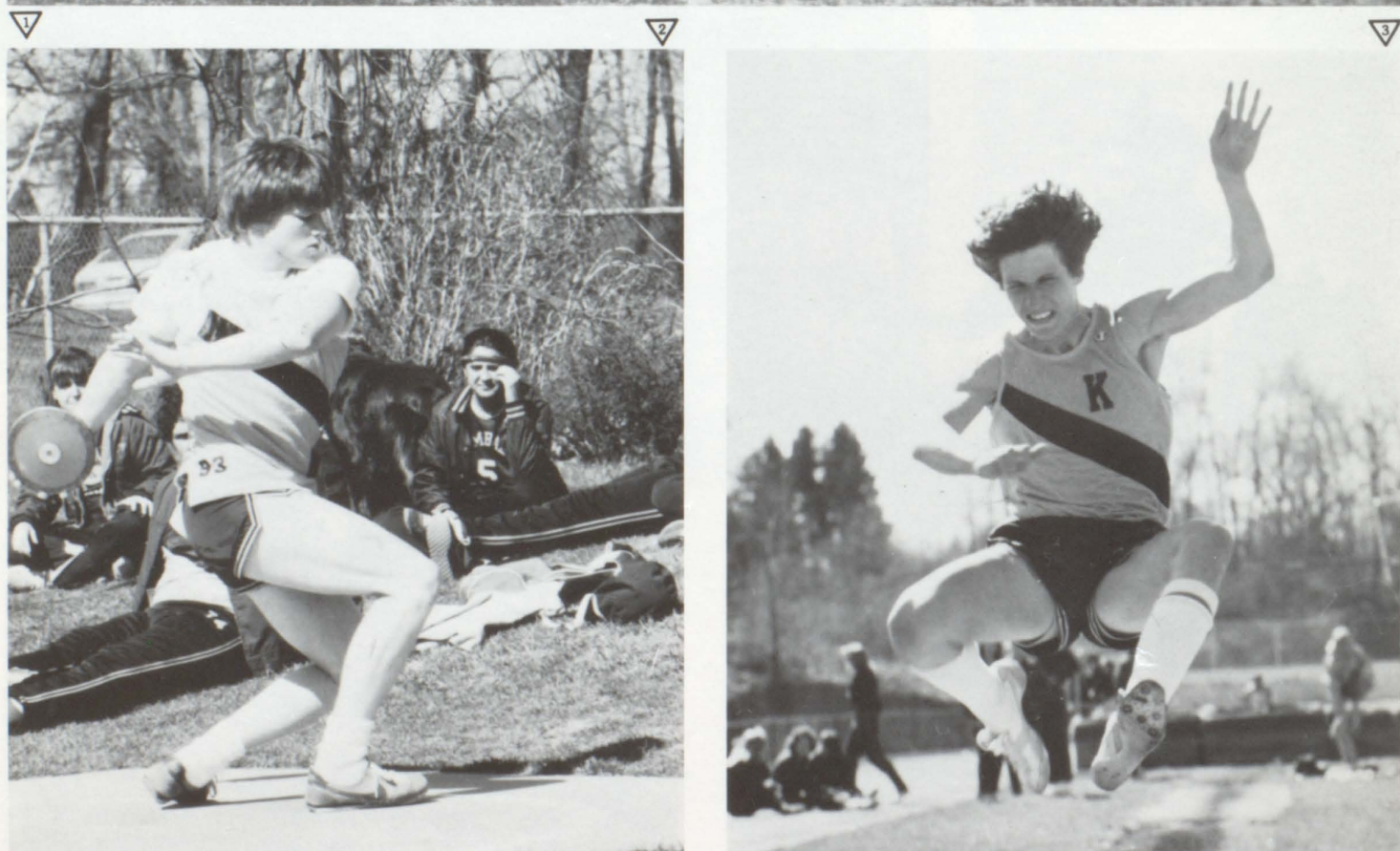

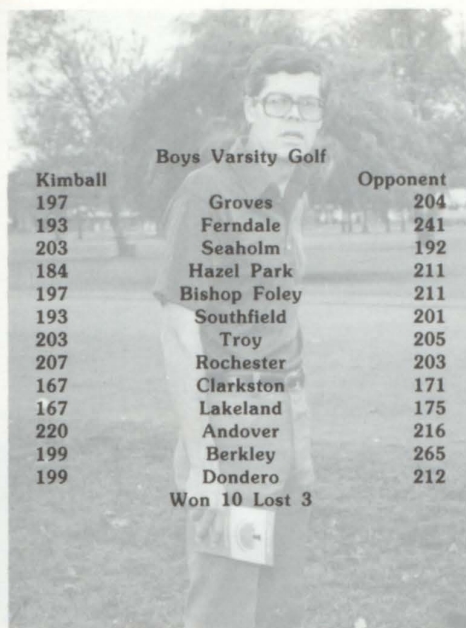


# Golf

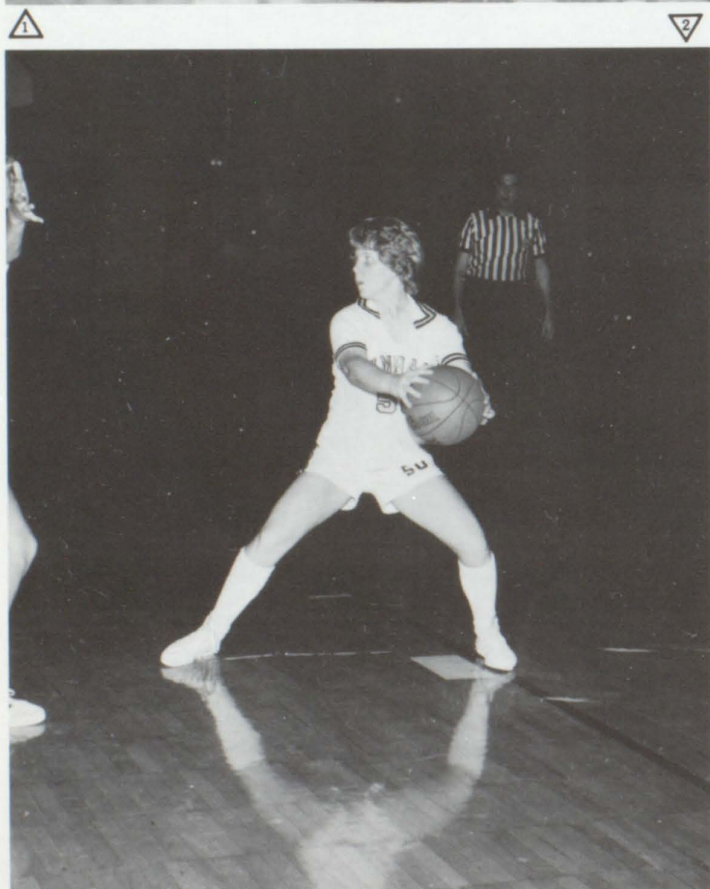
