





Steve Gregory flashes a smile, after looking up from his Algebra book, with his lunch still in his mouth.


MATH . . . MATH



Just a few of our Mathematics classes are: Algebra with Mr. Zulch, Geometry with Mr. Briercheck, Senior Math with Mr. Pedrick, General Math, Extended Algebra with Mr. Clark, Basic Math, and Advanced Algebra with Mr. Foster or many other fine Mathematics teachers. Kimball High School requires that each student take at least one year of Math, but many students go on to take two or more years of Math to prepare themselves for college. 
OFFICE HELPERS

Physical Education





ARTS . . . ARTS

Industrial Arts



They not only give the students a break from their normal schoolwork, but they allow for them to use their skills in various ways. There are a variety of classes to choose from. For example, Mechanical Drawing, Architectural Drawing, Wood Shop, Metal Shop, Auto Mechanics, and many, many more. These different classes give the students an opportunity to work with many different tools and machines. Some students may even continue after school to go into a perspective job field. The experience gained during class time is invaluable to them. 
STUDENT ASSISTANTS




FORENSICS

SPIRIT WEEK




EXCHANGE STUDENTS





CANDIDLY CLICKED
