



Greg Hill (1) has tentatively selected "Am I Blue" as the title for his drawing.







Bob Proen (3) chomps away on White Castles as Amy Pounds cheers him on.



Industrial Arts









A variety of courses provide many practical experiences which may be used in future job opportunities. These classes can teach students everything from how to repair a car, to producing a mechanical drawing. This variety of experiences allows each student to explore his/her own abilities to the fullest. Difficult assignments teach real world problems and encourage the student to discover the appropriate solutions. Divided into three main areas, Business, Office and Trade and Industry, co-op is designed to fill any student's needs. 







LANGUAGE ARTS

Mathematics is the science of numbers and their operations and interrelations. This field of study encompasses a broad range of number use from simple arithmetic to abstract formulas. 

Other sections introduce students to abstract theories of algebra. Geometry classes deal with measurements, relationships of points, lines, angles, and surface. Additional courses are offered which teach more complex algebraic equations, trigonometry and even calculus. 










Homecoming Dreams Become Reality For Nahhat, Leeper

Junior Jam-a-ram-a Team Feels 'Impact' of Seniors







Greco's Varsity Debate Team Finishes Eleventh in State









Underclassmen
