The Industrial Arts classes are very valuable to the students who take them. They not only give the students a break from their normal schoolwork, but they allow them to use different skills.







Some classes provided are typing, shorthand, computer programming, and accounting. 



Here is a look at Mr. Stephan's day-to-day, busy schedule. You can usually see him with teachers, students, his assistant principals, or maybe alone.

This picture should remind most teachers of those memorable Tuesdays in the cafeteria.

Mr. Stephan has been involved with schools and teaching for the past 34 years. All of these years have been spent in Royal Oak, except for 3½ years he spent in the service.

Beginning his career at Mary Lyon Junior High, he taught only briefly before coming to Kimball in February of 1956.

When asked what his most memorable experience was, he replied: "The most memorable, and most difficult era, was during the years 1968-1972. Memories of this time are very fond and pleasant because of the students and the community. Kimball enjoyed an exceptional reputation both academically and athletically, and we were very large, the largest outside of Detroit in enrollment. There were 3400 students enrolled here then, as opposed to only 1500 now."


Mr. Stephan was then asked: "If you were to give the graduating class one piece of advice, what would it be?"

There was no hesitation preceding his answer.

"I would tell them to establish goals, and to develop and maintain stable relationships with others, family, friends, and colleagues. Also, I would advise them to develop a plan to achieve those things that will be rewarding and offer happiness."


With the time running short, and the interview drawing to a close, I asked him my final question, "How would you like the exiting class of 1987 to remember you?"

"I would like to be remembered as a person who cared about the best for everyone who has attended and will attend Royal Oak Kimball socially and academically. And (pause) as someone who has done all he can do to insure quality in the school environment."























Overall, the debate team's achievements were met. Winning three state-wide tournaments, and placing second in two others.



















Their highest score was against Andover where they scored 126.8. Their dedication and ability helped them to have an excellent season.














The 1987 Kimball Boys' Tennis team had a good year, winning seven out of twelve matches. They placed fifth in the S.M.A., with a score of three and four.



In the years to come, the Seniors of 1987 will look back and remember those who were chosen for these qualities.




