
The Honorable Mayor Fournier and Members of the City Commission:

Goals 2022

The Commission for the Arts worked on five primary goals in 2022.



Become a more sustainable committee: The committee felt like there was work to be done to create some procedures for different programs. This would ensure the long-term viability of programs as members change.

The Commission for the Arts has become more sustainable by reducing the number of printed materials necessary for the meetings. Transitioning to digital handouts before the meeting and displaying those same handouts on TVs in the conference room during the sessions has allowed the Commission for the Arts to become more sustainable. We have also transitioned most of our promotion to a digital platform.



Build a collaborative, community-based art program: The pandemic has been challenging for all of us and has isolated many. This goal is to create arts-based programs that bring people together, either in person or virtually, to help build community.

The Commission for the Arts is still working toward engaging more effectively. The Art Explored program is a great way for artists to have a chance to display their work in the city. There is a great desire among the board members to further engage the local youth by allowing them to express themselves artistically.



Identify local artists: A renewed effort to better reach out to local artists and support them in the future, showcase their art in our programs, and develop a new partnership opportunity.

This goal will be a never-ending routine; we will continue to make meaningful connections with local artists and establish collaborative relationships. The Commission for the Arts aims to promote and encourage arts and culture; this will continue as we explore new endeavors and possibilities within the means we have possible.



Develop an art requirement for future public buildings: The commission would like to explore policies that require public art in future public buildings and spaces.

This is an ongoing project that staff members are actively working on and will continue to make progress on moving forward. This goal will be a carryover to the list of 2023 goals.



Improve communication and outreach to Royal Oak residents: The community survey found that many respondents needed to learn more about Commission for the Arts programs. The commission would like to explore opportunities to improve communication and outreach to various audiences.

The Commission for the Arts has ramped up its digital communication efforts in 2022 and will continue this trend in 2023. As new programs are created, and milestones are met, the Commission for the Arts will continue to inform the residents of Royal Oak through the most effective means.



Art Expored

The **Art Explored** program allows community members to submit original artwork. Once submitted, the Commission for the Arts undergoes a selection process to decide which pieces will be publicly displayed in Royal Oak. This unique program allows the city to highlight artistic talent from everyday individuals. This year marks the first time each submission was bought from the artist rather than licensed. It will enable the city to immediately add them to its expanding permanent collection.



Permanent Collection

Royal Oak's **permanent art collection** is no different than any collection that grows over time. In 2022 the city added six pieces to its permanent collection, all previously part of the Art Explored program. With this growing collection, comes required maintenance to ensure these assets last lifetimes. The Commission for the Arts recognizes this need. It has made it a priority in 2023 to budget for maintenance needs and acquire a maintenance assessment to document each piece's specific timeline moving forward.



Murals

Share the Warmth combines textile arts with offering a helping hand to our unhoused and low-income neighbors. Volunteers knit hats, mittens, gloves, scarves, and other cold-weather necessities throughout the year. The Commission for the Arts puts them on display at the library. Items are available for anyone who needs them outside the building. The articles are displayed along the 11 Mile Road entrance. As the park is finalized, additional items may be displayed. In the past, about 170 items have been taken throughout the winter.


Pet Supplies Plus

This location of Pet Supplies Plus is located on Woodward and is in the heart of the Dream Cruise. An artist reached out to the owner of the store weeks before the Dream Cruise looking to put a creative mural on the side of the building.

Collaboration Giving Back

Hamer Finch Wilkins Park

Earlier this year, the City of Royal Oak worked alongside the decedents of Henry and Elizabeth Hamer to rename a park after this historical Royal Oak resident. Henry and Elizabeth Hamer escaped slavery and eventually made their home in Royal Oak. Henry once worked for the Starr family but eventually was able to start a farm after purchasing more than 6 acres of land. The newly named Hamer Finch Wilkins Park sits on a portion of the original 6 acres; the city plans to relandscape the park with a garden for reflection and signage denoting the historical significance. The Commission for the Arts has denoted money for the renderings and a down payment for a bronze bust to be made of Henry and Elizabeth Hamer that will be placed in the renovated park.

To ensure the integrity of all assets that the city controls, the Commission for the Arts will need a plan to understand further the maintenance needs and cost of the work they oversee.

Expansion of art outside of the DDA

While Royal Oak is known across Metro Detroit for its vibrant downtown, more locally, we are known for our amazing parks and neighborhoods. The downtown area often overshadows other beautiful parts of the city. The Commission for the Arts recognizes this and would like to explore opportunities to bring art into these neighborhoods.



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
