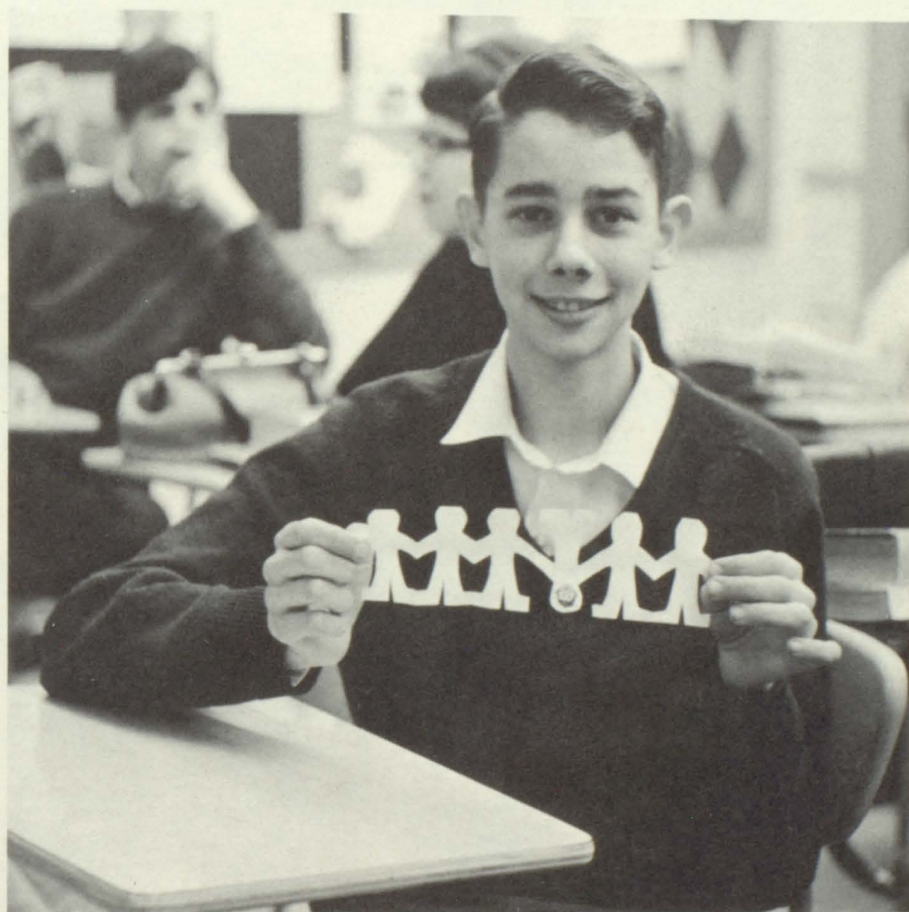
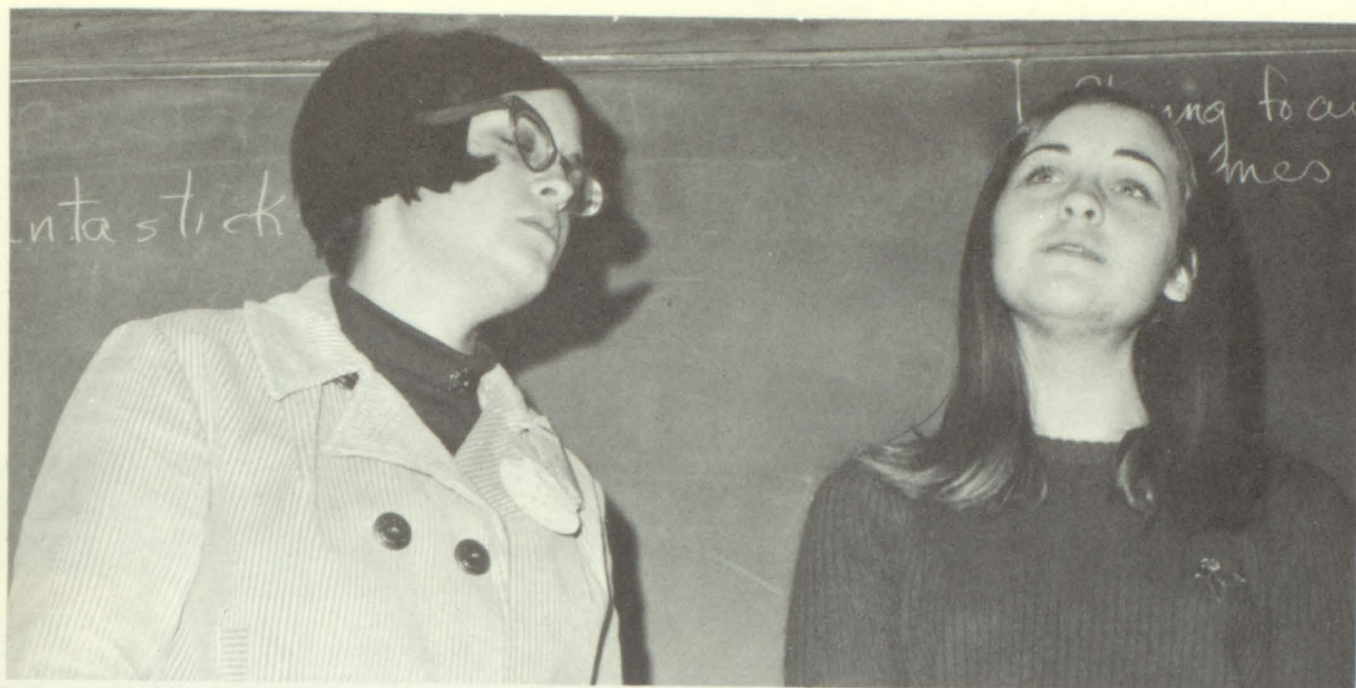

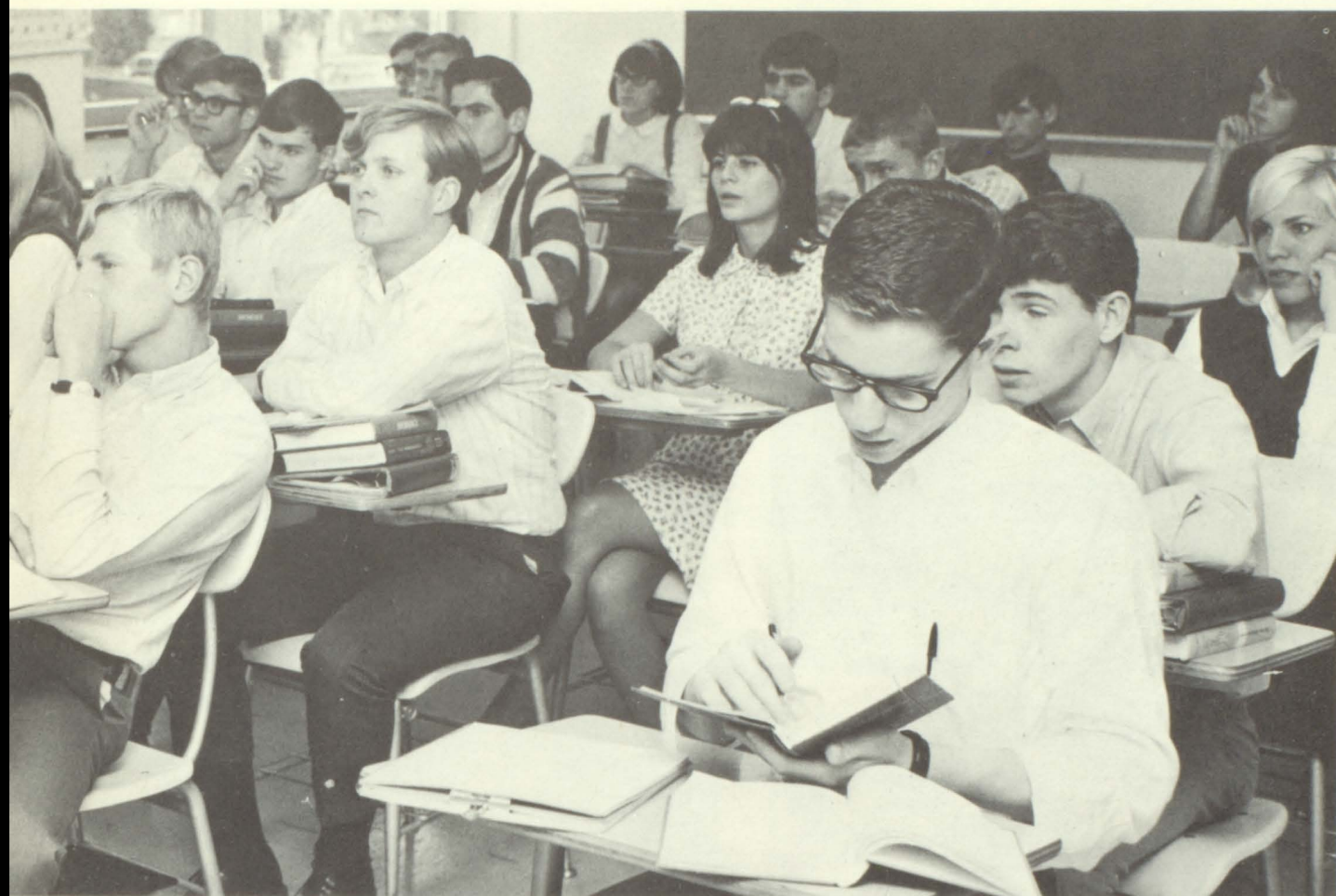

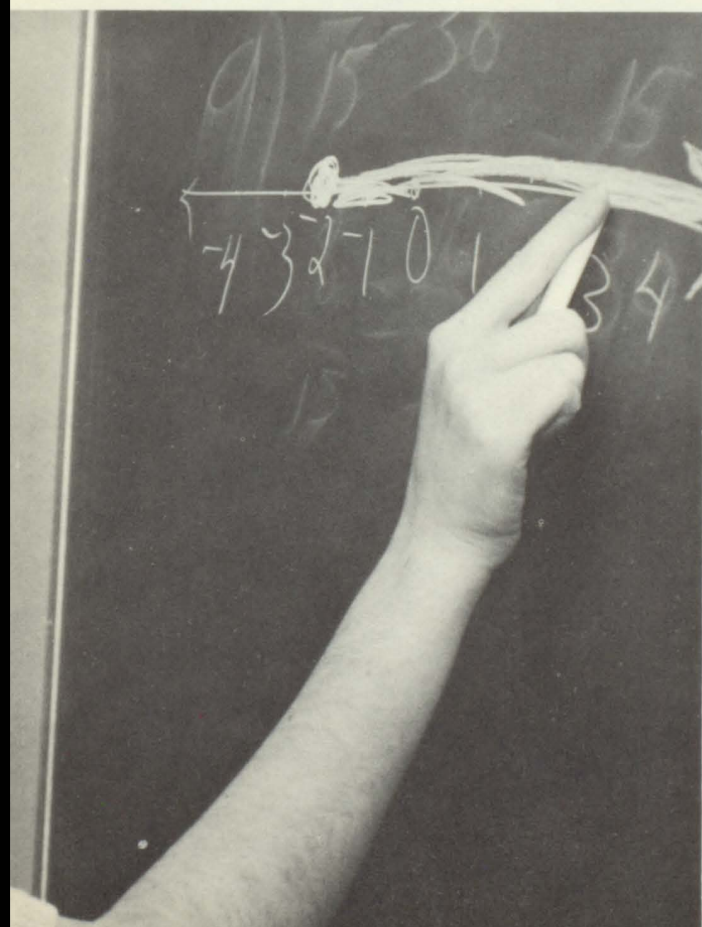
Students Learn More With MSG Program

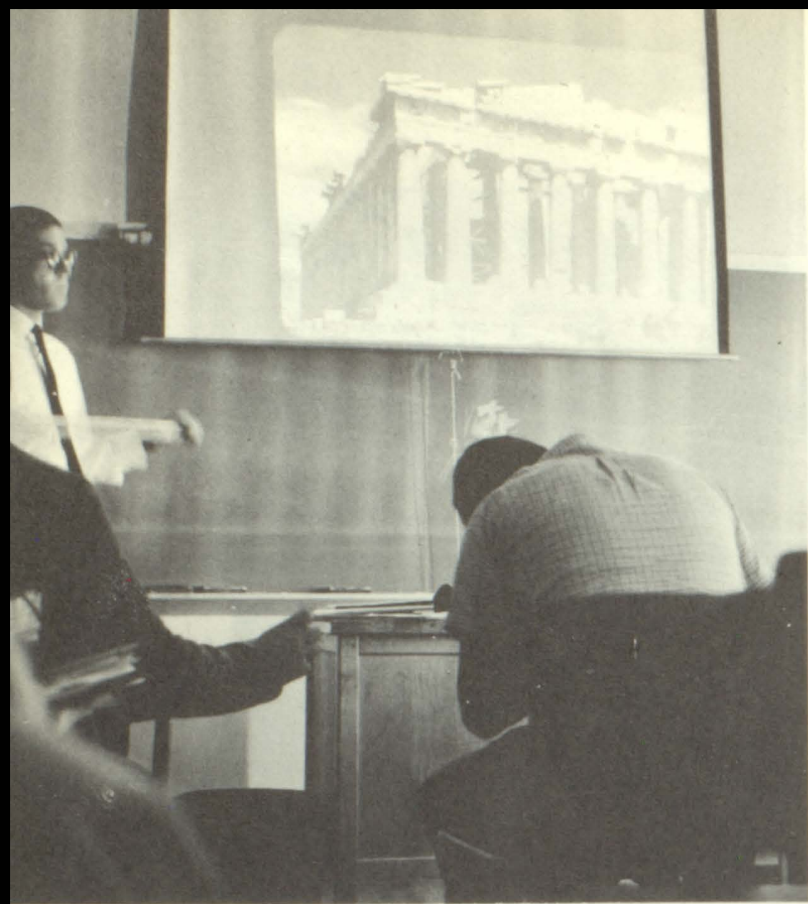
It's the same math, with the use of slide rules, graph paper, and textbooks, that was taught two hundred years ago. Unlike the math our parents took, the approach is improved and introduced to a new class of Freshmen every year.

The School Mathematics Study Group, or as it is often called, S.M.S.G., is the more recent of the new developments. It was first introduced in 1964. Proving its worth, it has continued to become a four year program which stresses a varied and stimulating course.

Algebra is divided into two years with a year of Geometry between. The more advanced students go on to Senior Math, where the study is more challenging.

With such a successful and modern approach to math, no one should wonder why new teachers appear, old teachers stay, and students learn considerably more.

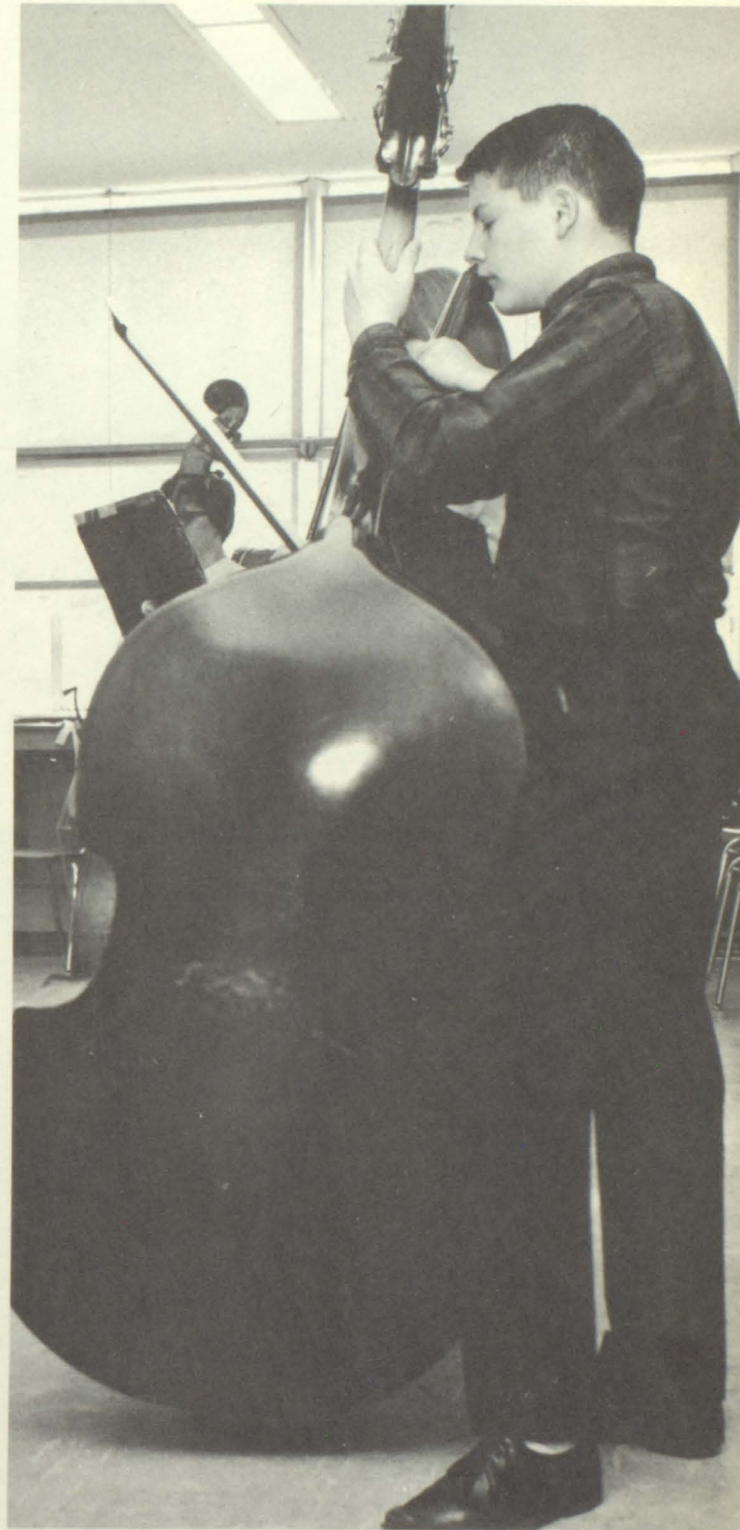


Fine Arts Brings Out Creativity in Students

Lab Experiments Break Monotony And Aid Student Understanding

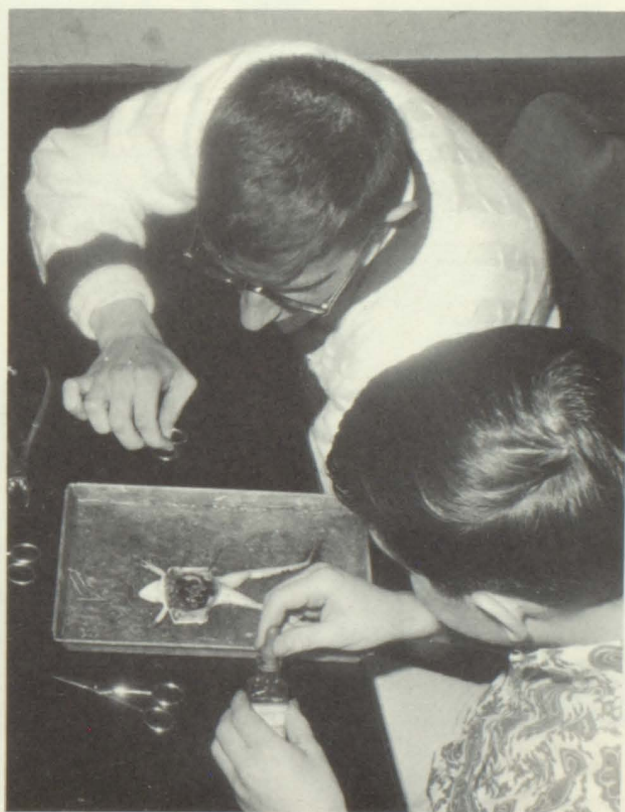
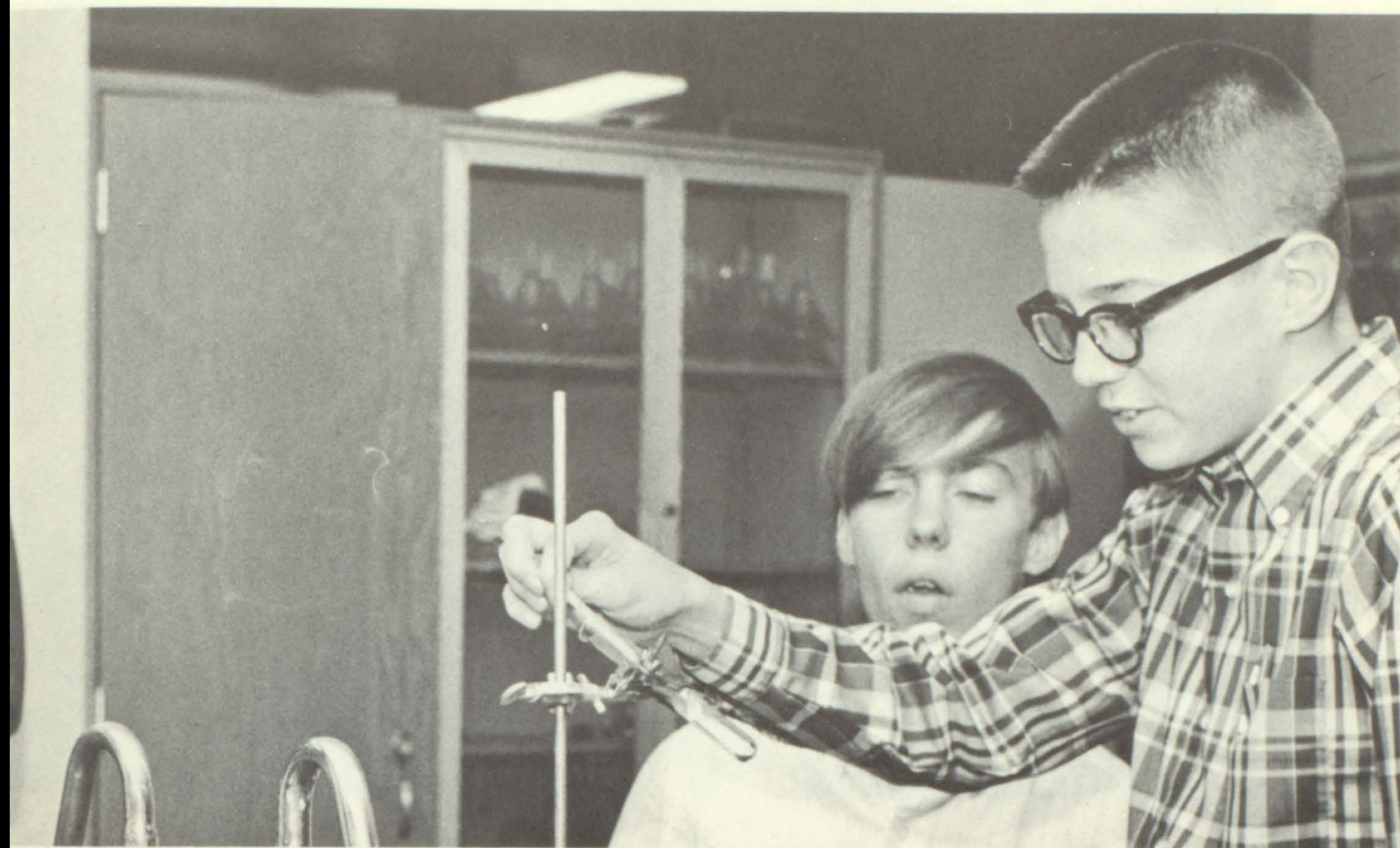
Wiggling worms, pungent odors, and hard work can describe any of the four science courses at Dondero. The available classes are biology, chemistry, physics, and general science.

Biology is the study of all living things, while Chemistry involves the elements, and tests the skill of the student through experiments. In Physics the relationship between mass and energy is studied. All three courses prepare the student for college. Also, for the non college-bound student who still wants a basic knowledge of these subjects, General Science is offered.

Students taking any of the courses participate in laboratory experiments which fulfill two purposes. They break the monotony of the day, and they give the student a chance to experience what the teacher is lecturing about. When there is actual contact with an experiment, the student has a greater understanding of the subject.

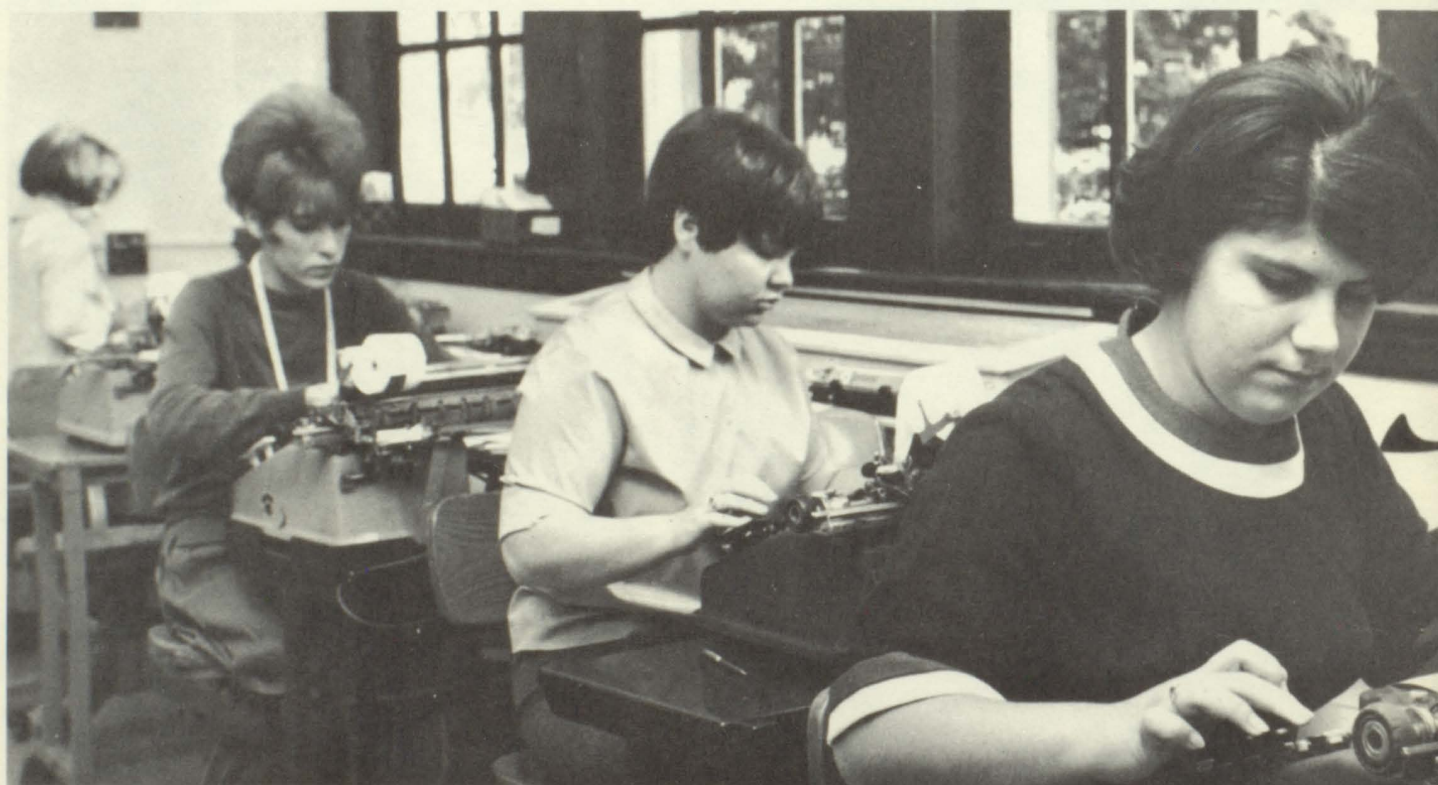

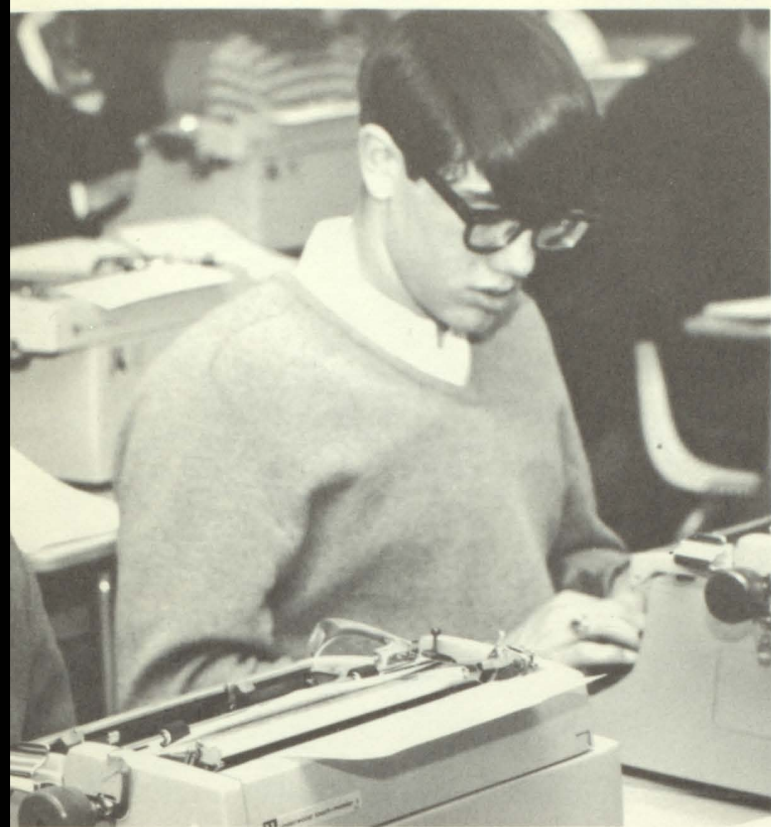
Securing the Future

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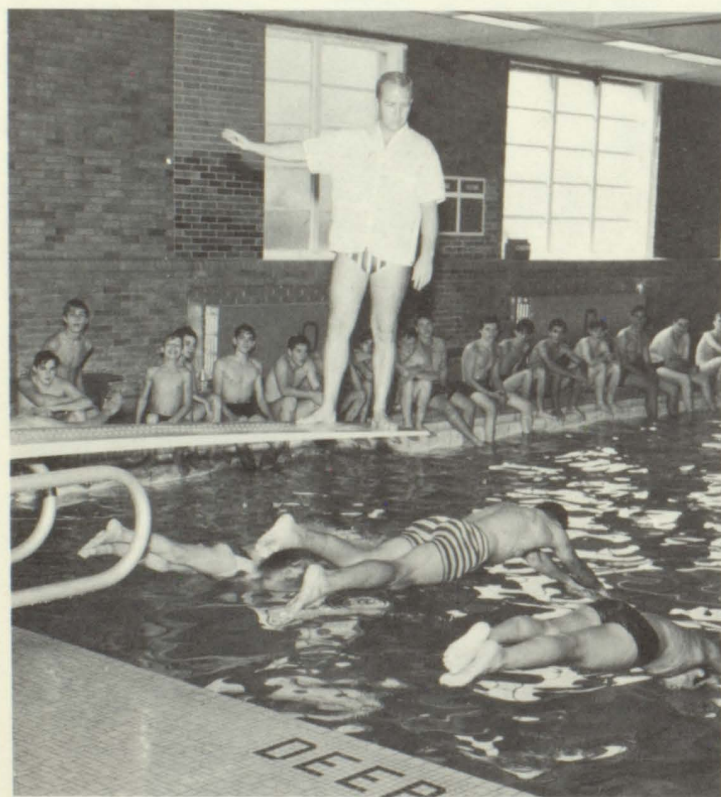

Phys. Ed. Program Offers a Variety of Sports



The Dondero physical education program tries to develop not only the body, but the mind as well. In classes, students learn the importance of physical fitness and the use of good sportsmanship.

Activities such as dancing, swimming, and tennis are organized into units of six weeks. The purpose is to allow the student to receive a variety of sports, hoping he will find one that particularly interests him.

The importance of body cleanliness is stressed in a health course for Freshmen. Here, the proper care and fitness of the body is interrelated. Fundamentals of Rhythm is one of the units in the second year of physical education. With the skills the student has been exposed to in modern and folk dancing, the class has more meaning. The variation of this subject not only shows the student what he can learn, but what he can also enjoy.

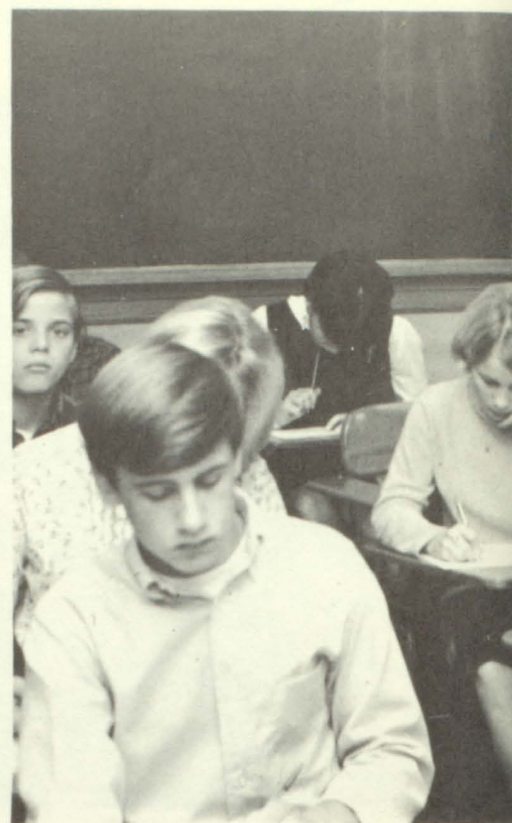
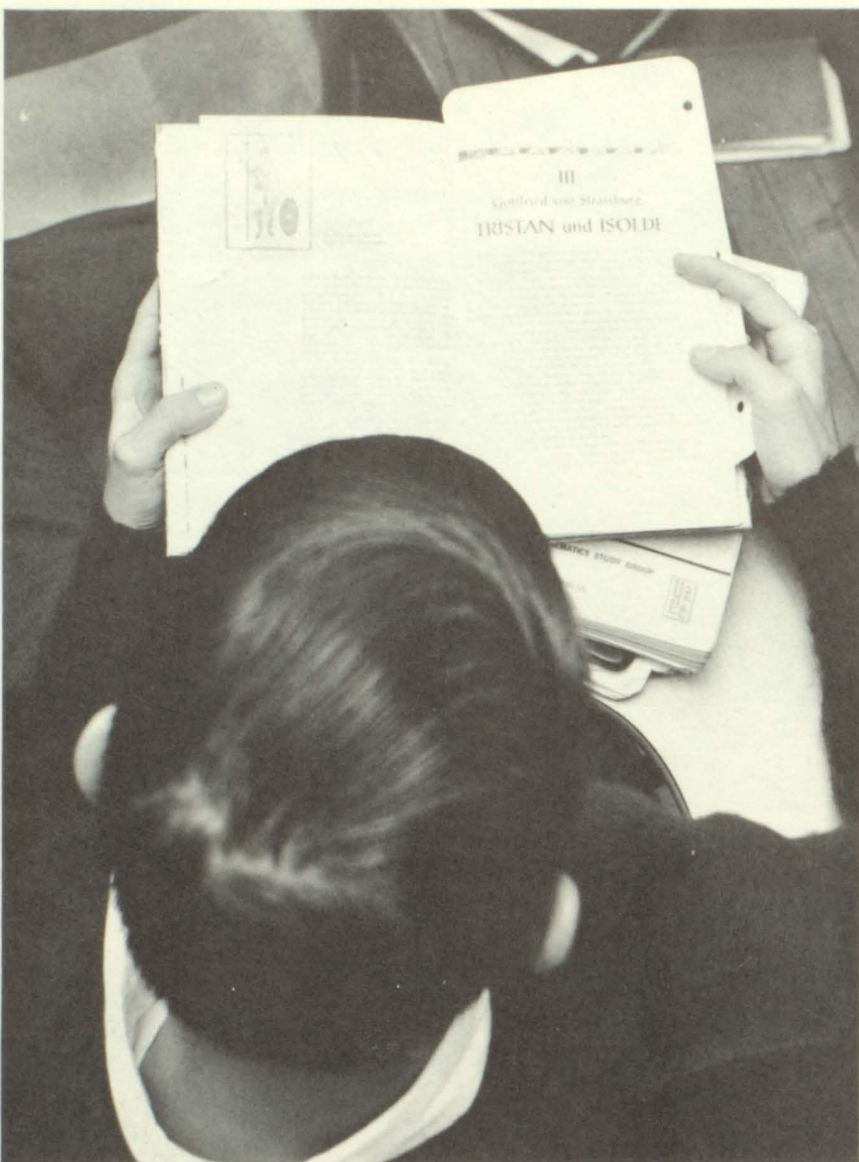

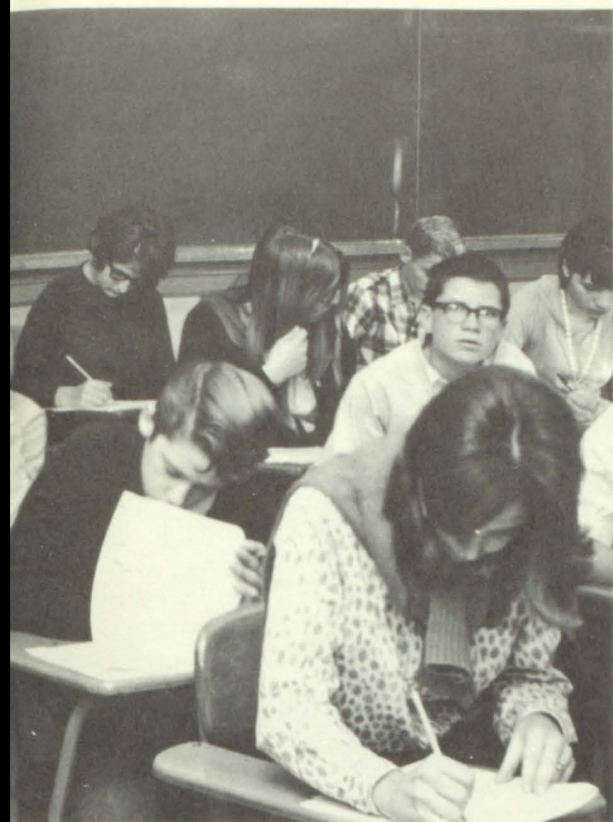
Language, Key to the World

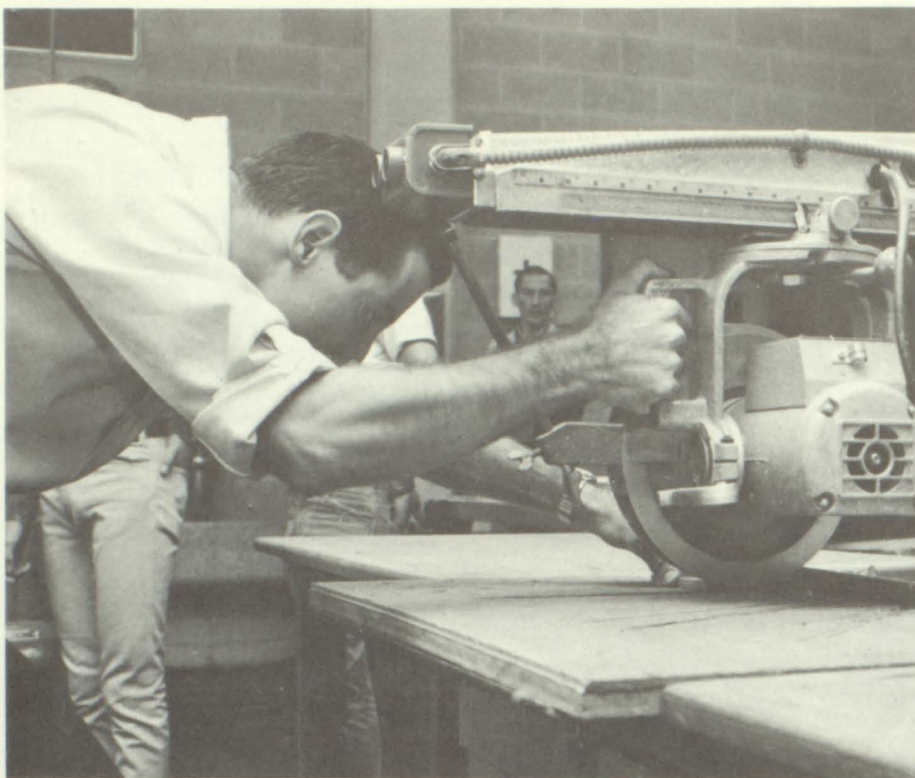

The student learns about people. He comes to understand their values and how they live. Only through understanding can the peoples of the world become closer.

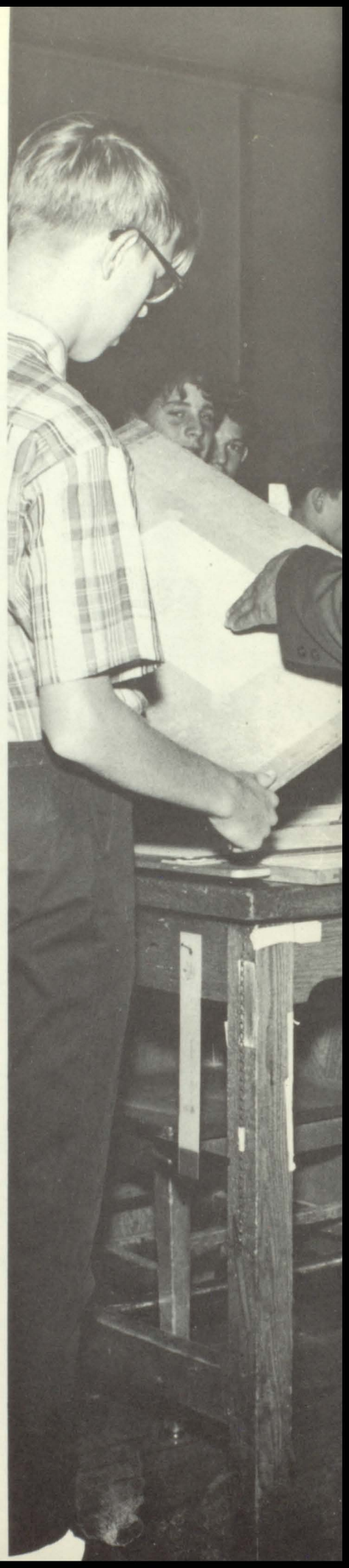

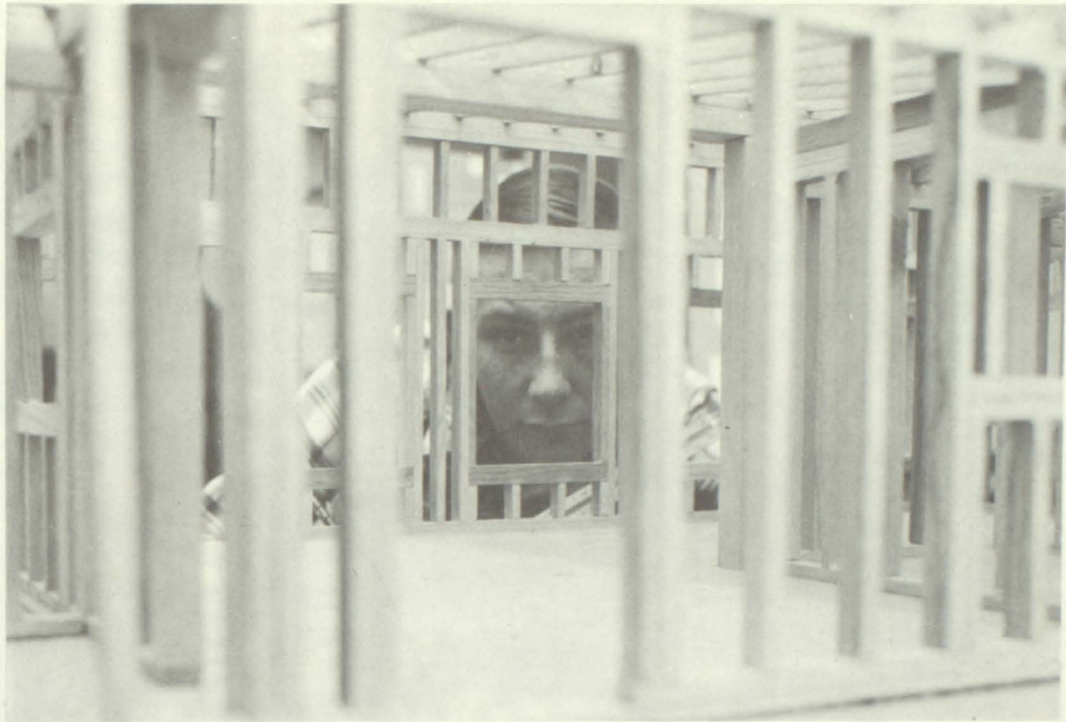

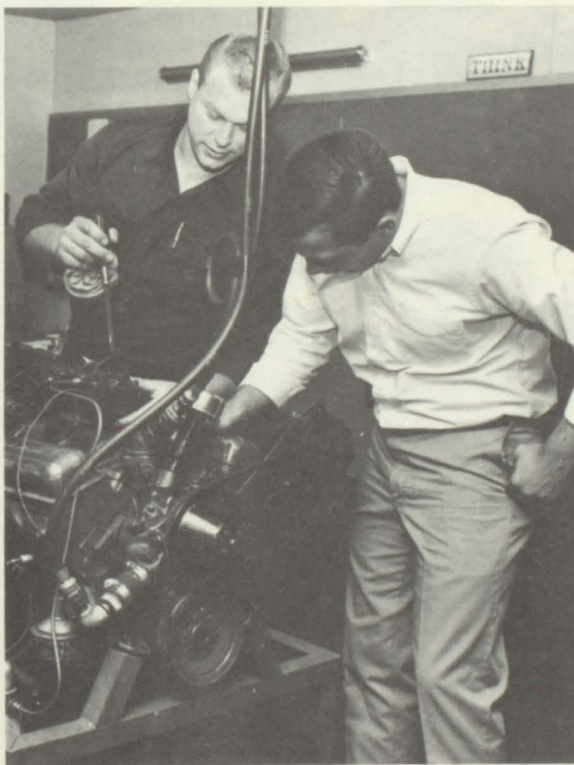


Leonard Hammermaster, directly below, peers through the structural design of a model house in his archite-

Training Now For Future Work



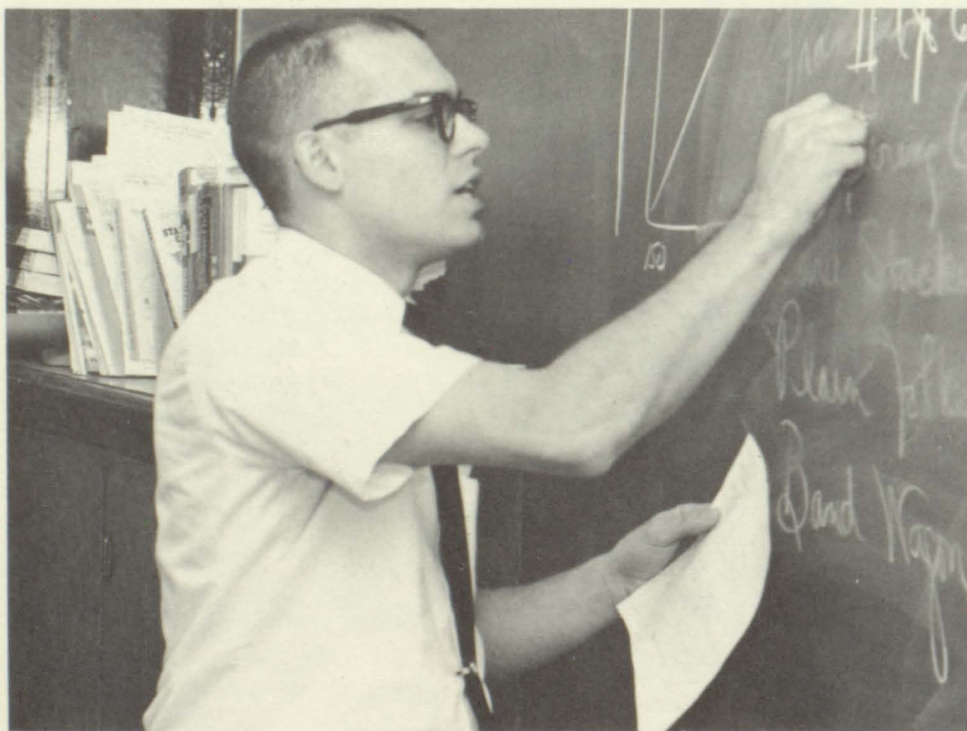

It gives the boys who participate, a chance to express themselves in wood, metal, and intricate drawings that they can admire.

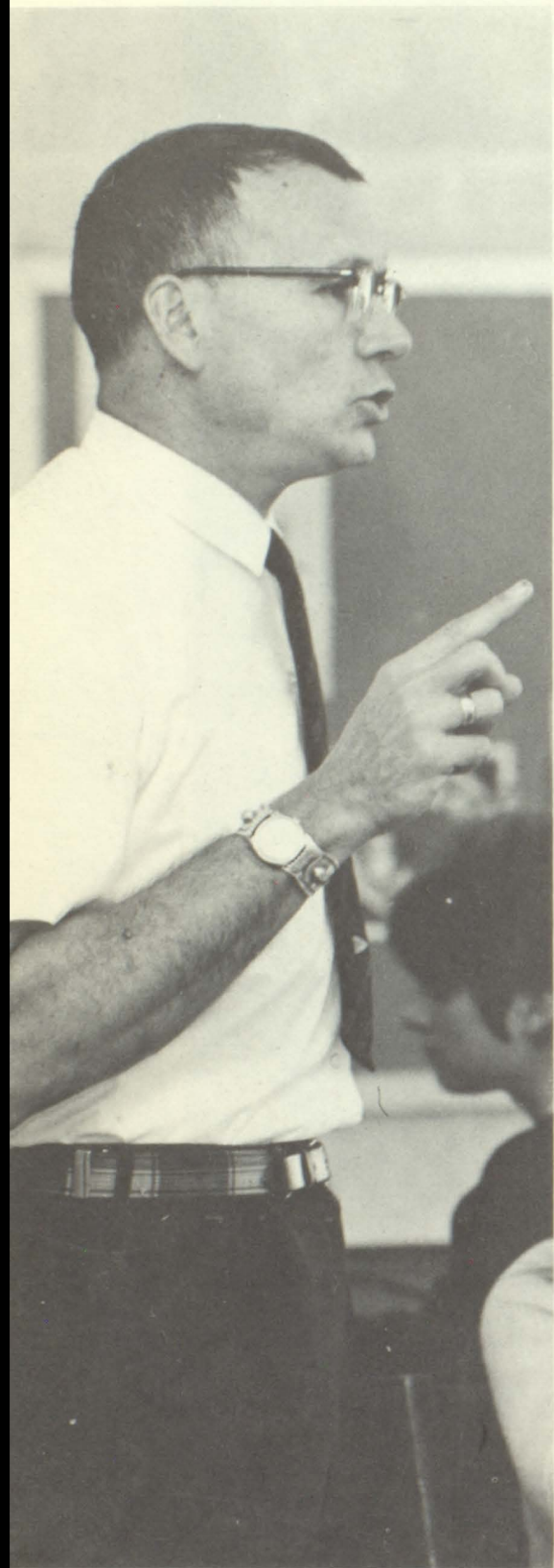

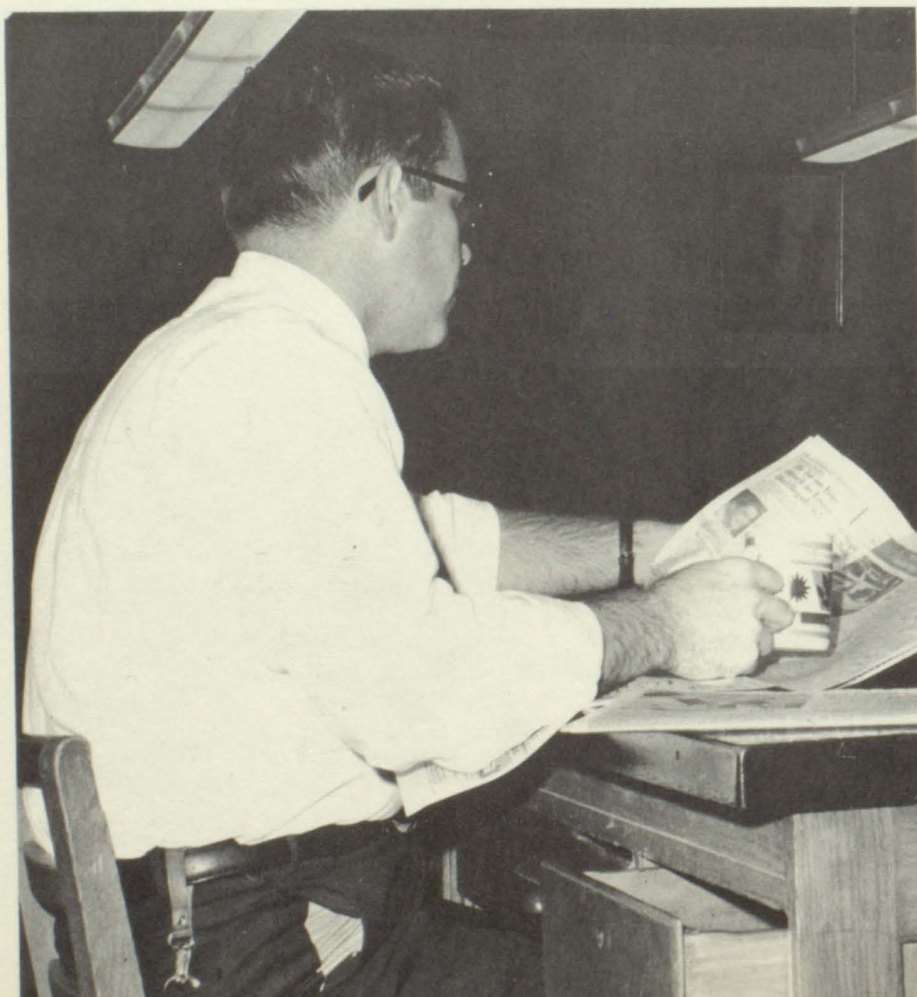

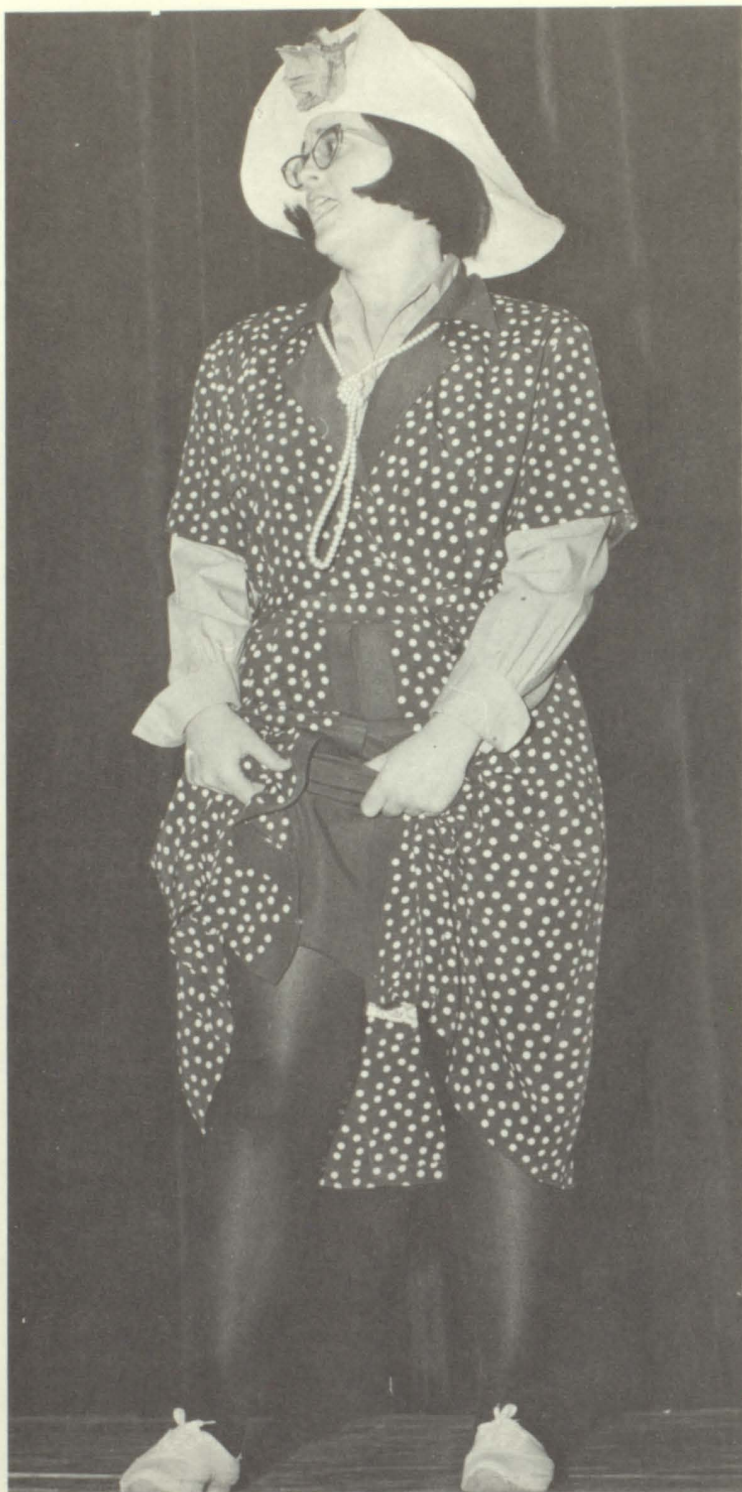


"F.O.C.U.S." Launches Faculty Variety Show

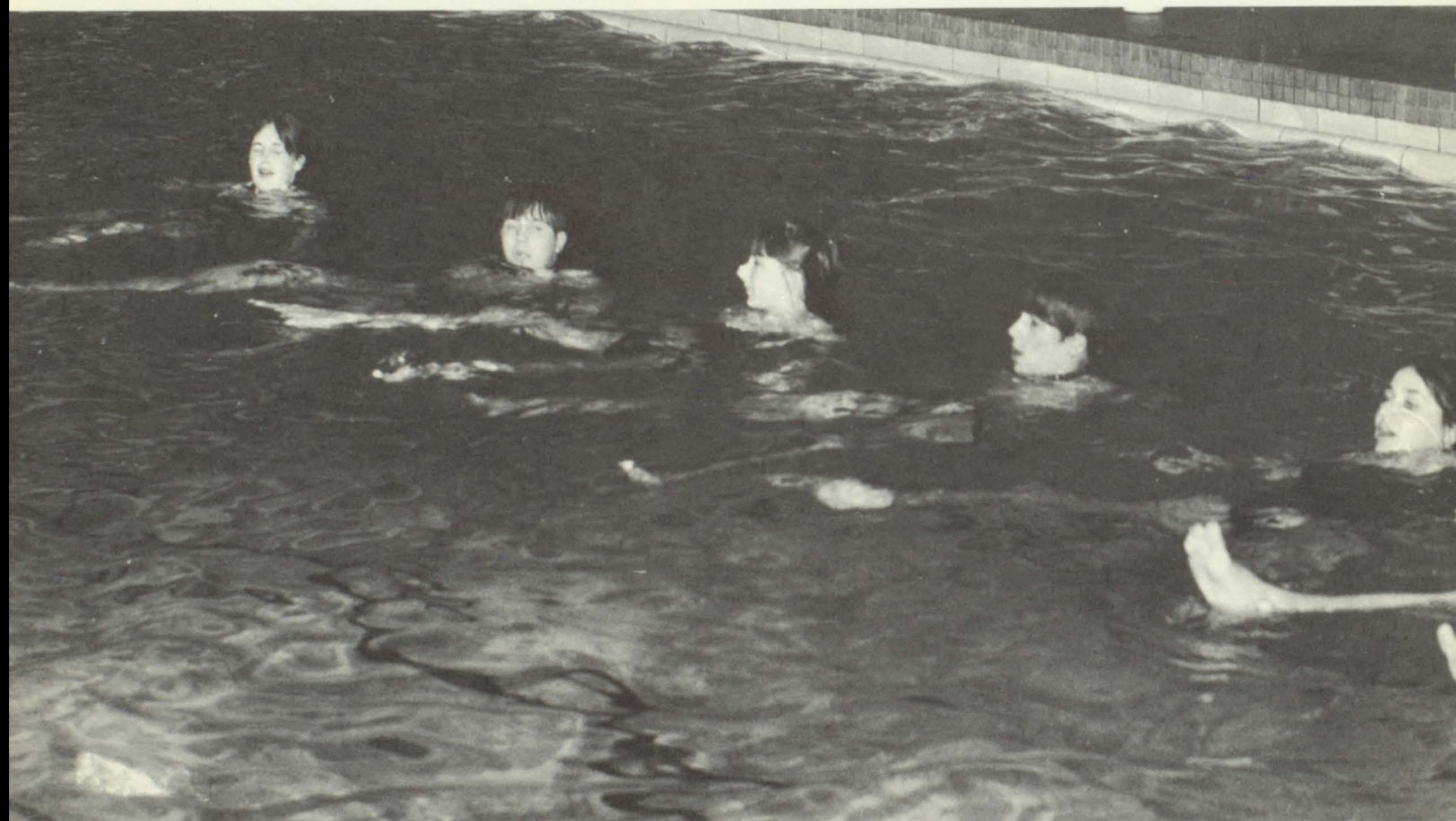
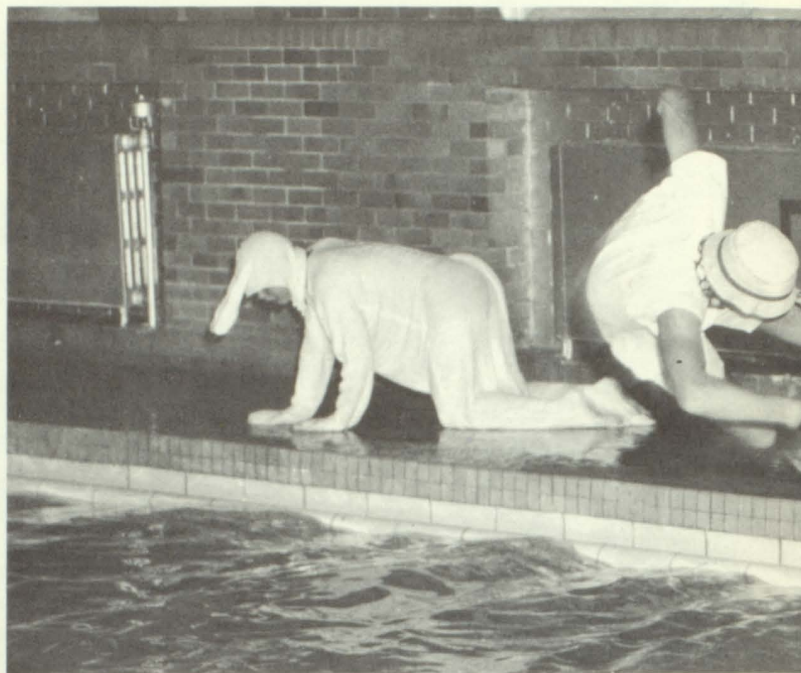


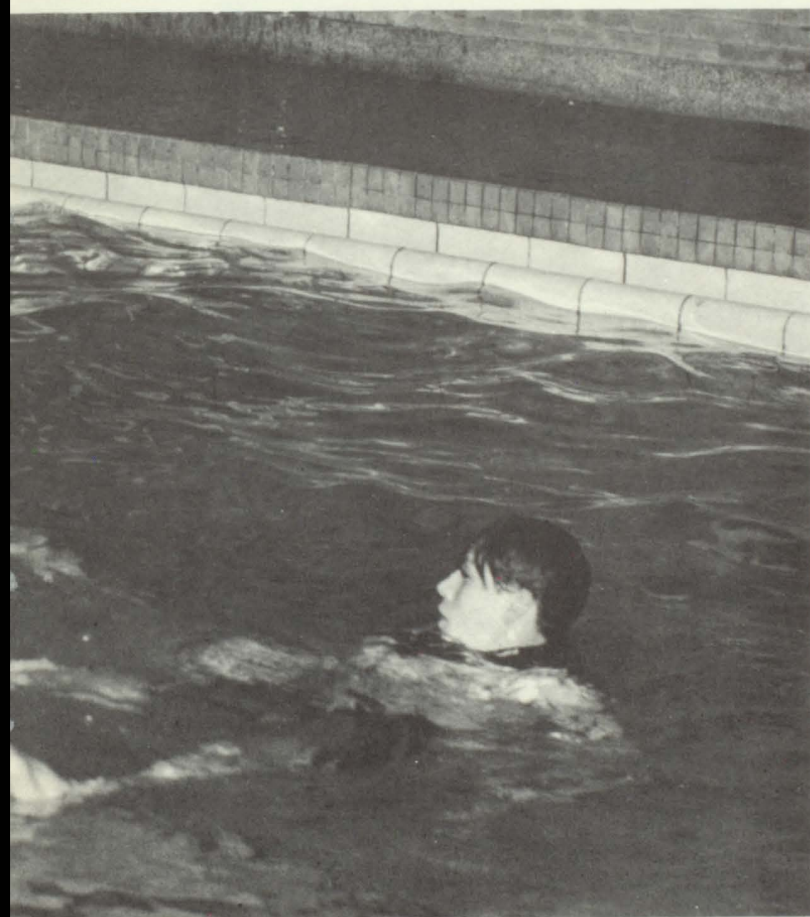
"Show Biz" Chalks Up 1966 Victory for G.A.A.

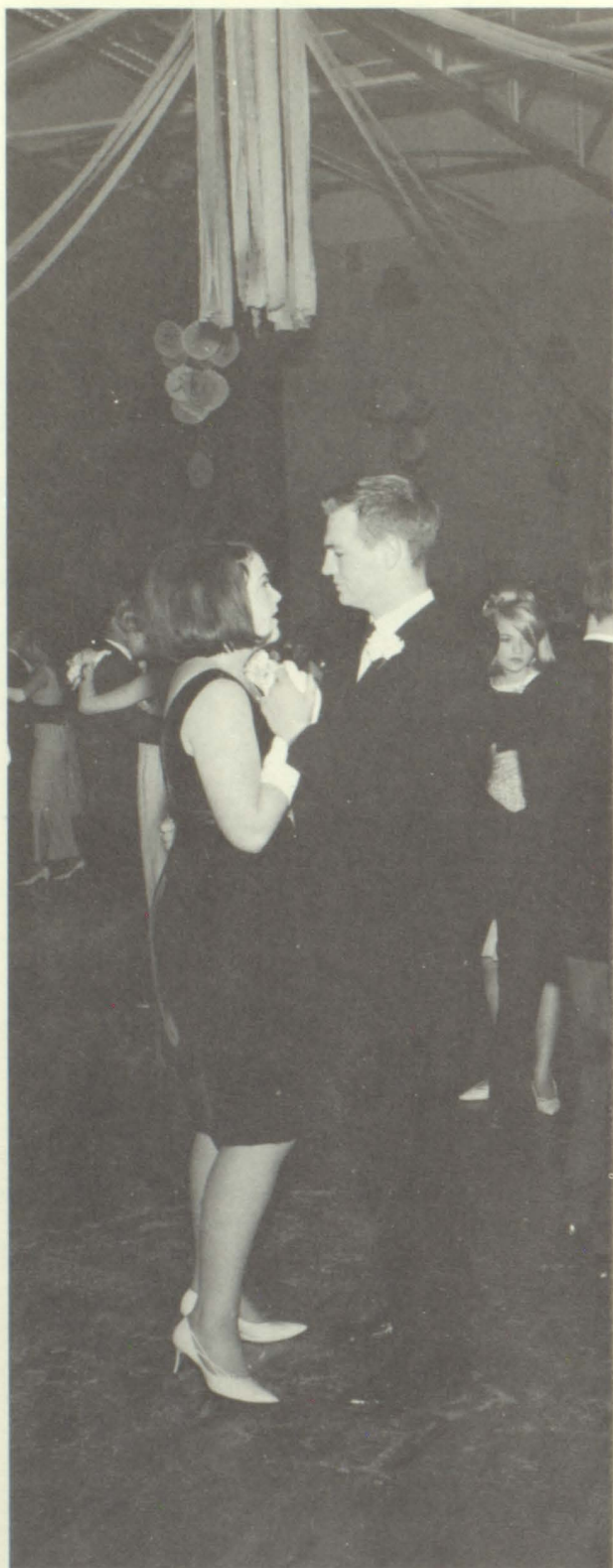

Medieval Aura Enlivens Autumn Auto Annual

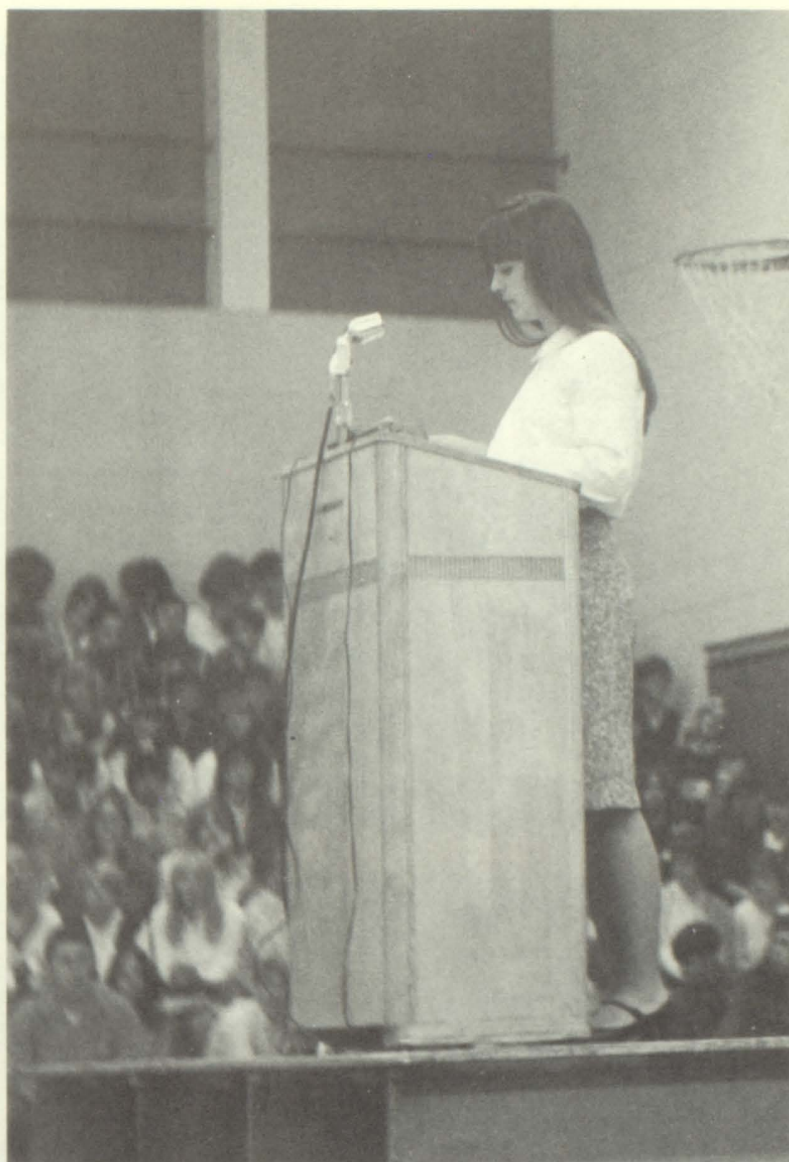

The queen and her court rode on the Student Senate float, accompanied by a dazzling array of floats representing other school clubs. Dragons,

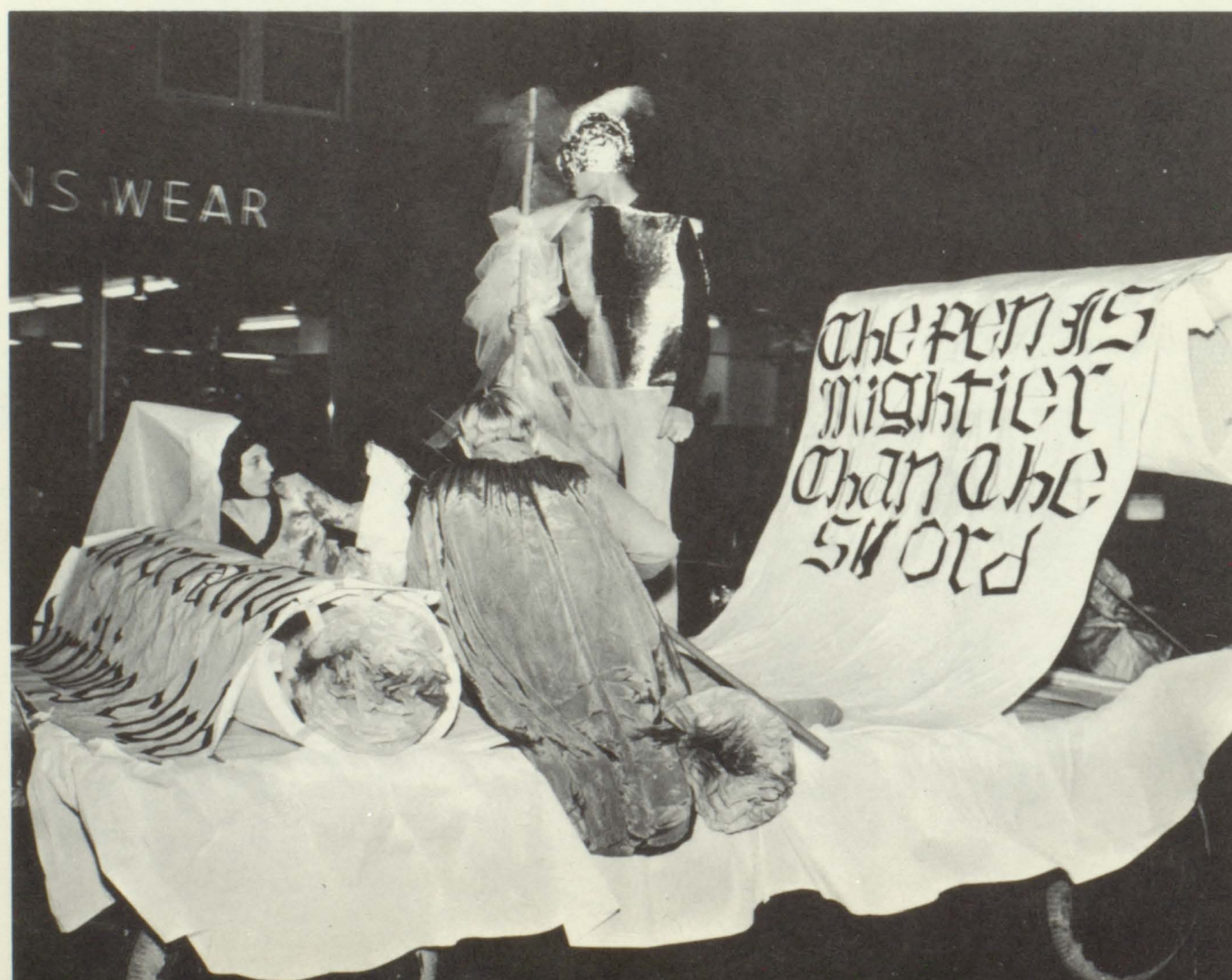

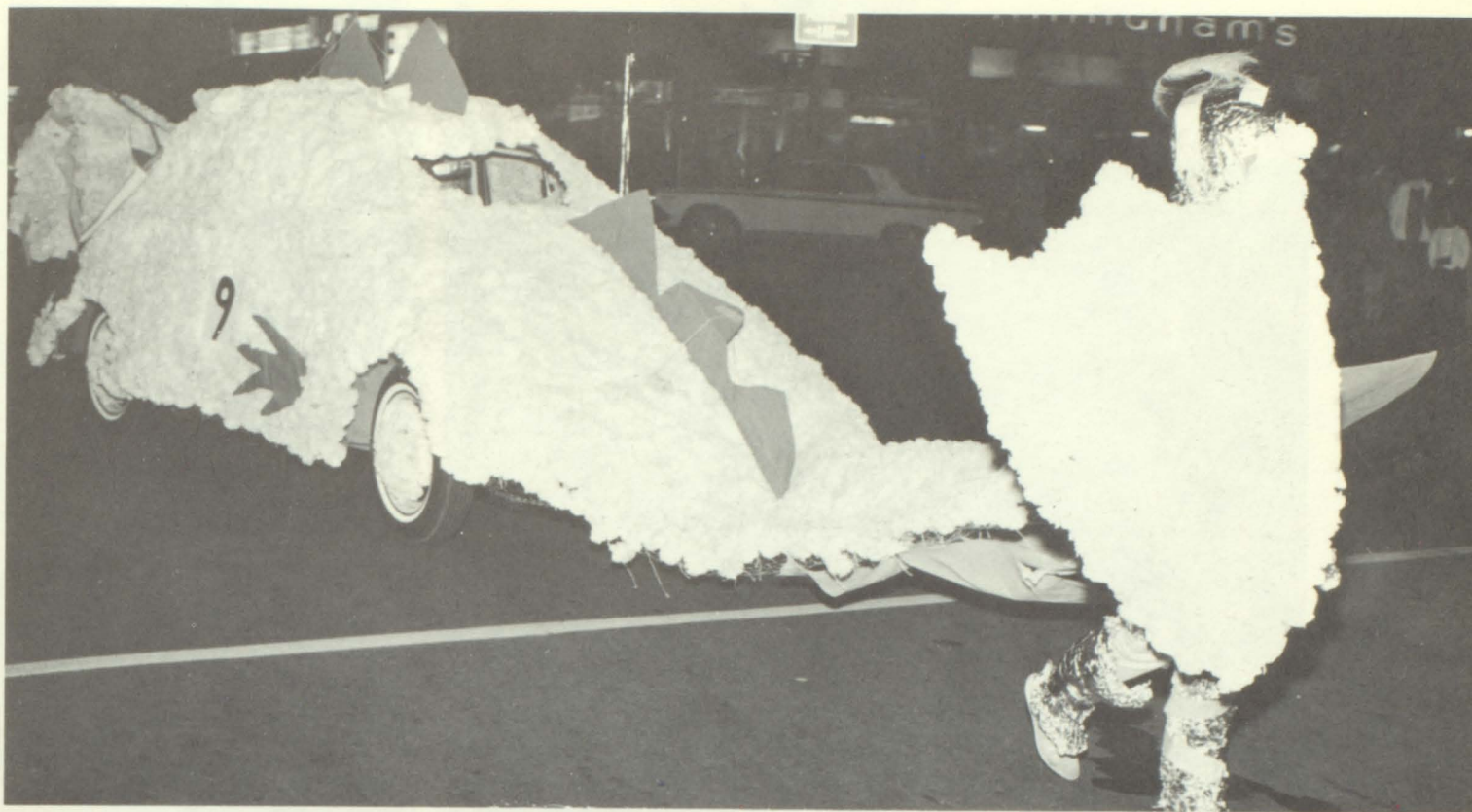




Above, the Dondero banner is carried by two marching band members, at the head of the homecoming parade. Below, is pictured the second

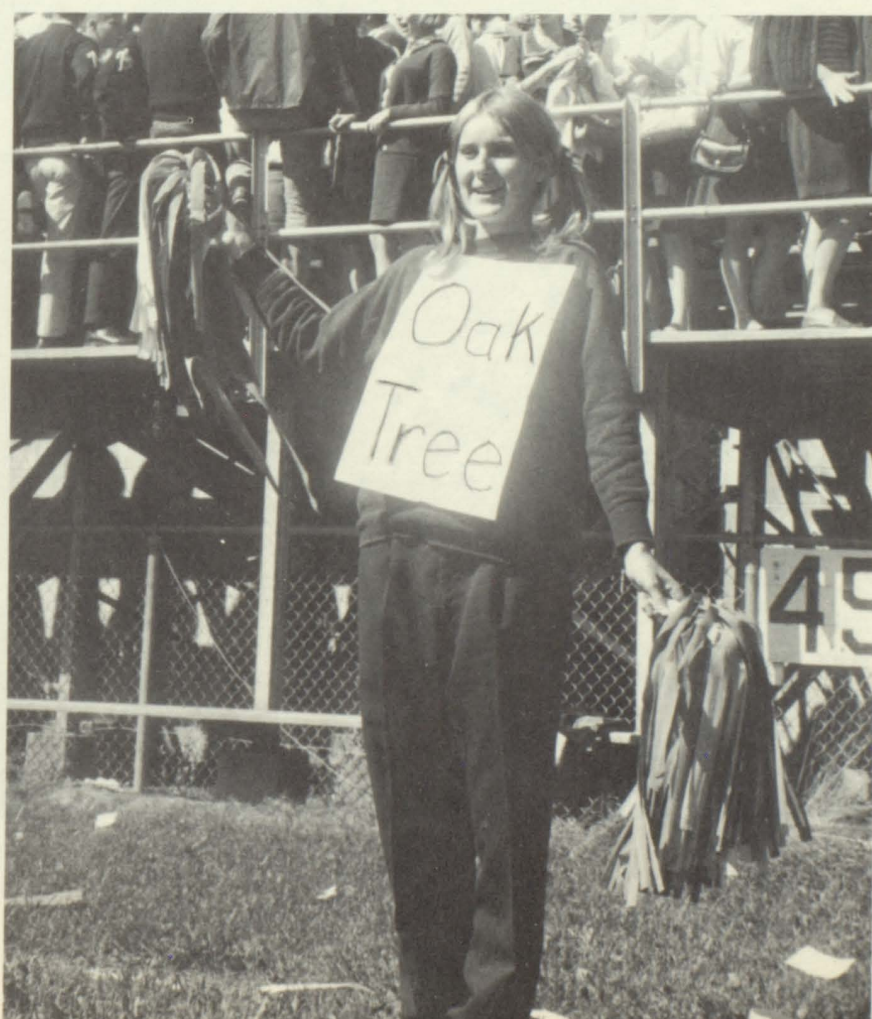

Autumn Spotlight Shines on Marching Band



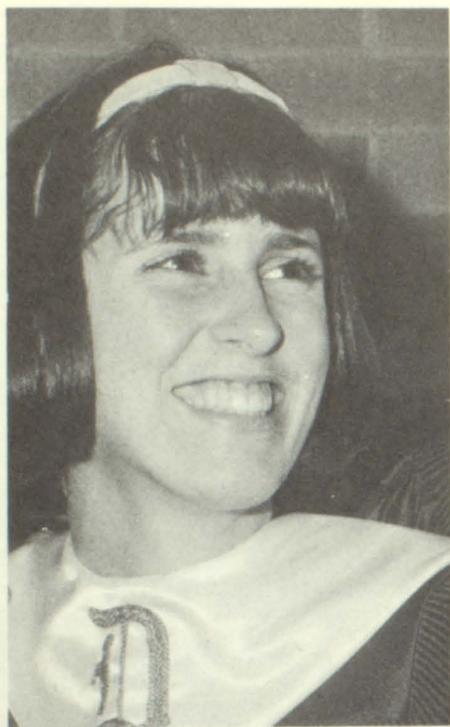

All of these undertakings achieved success under the veteran direction of Mr. Joseph Parker.





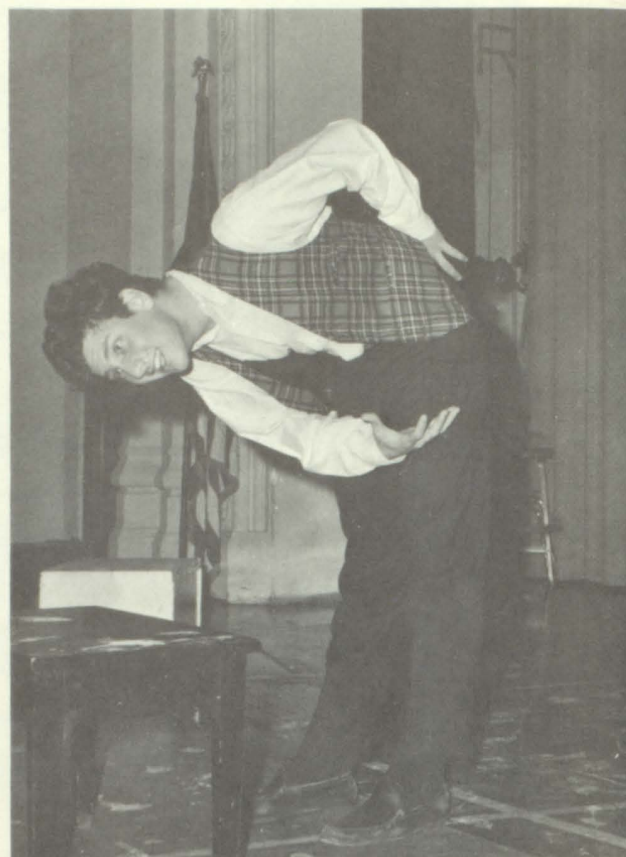

"Mississippi Moonlight" *Shines On Dondero*

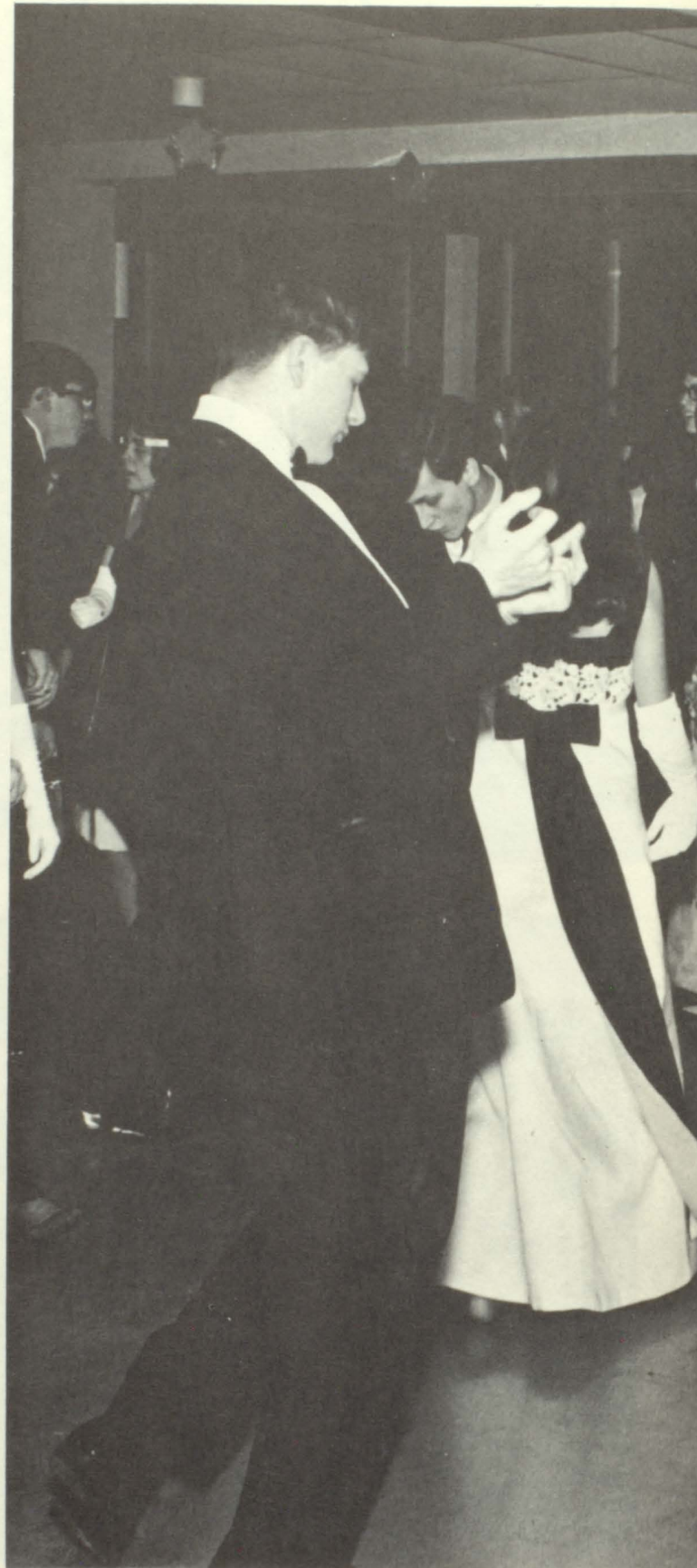

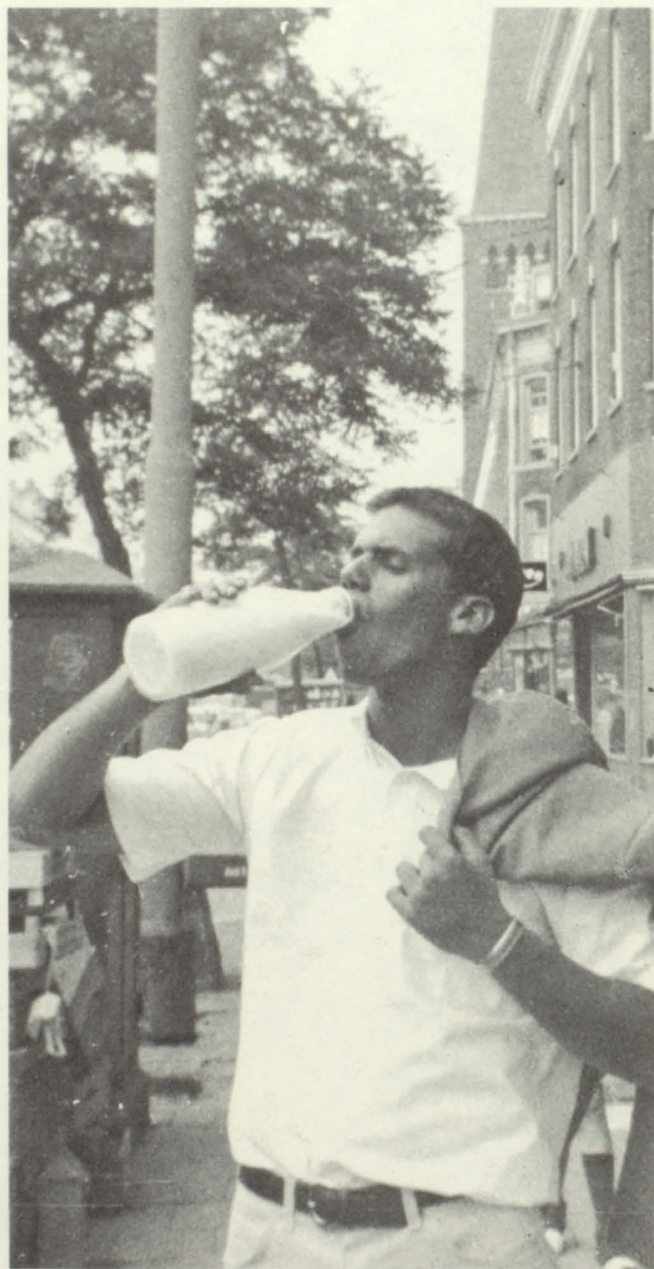
Many do not travel quite so far. A group of

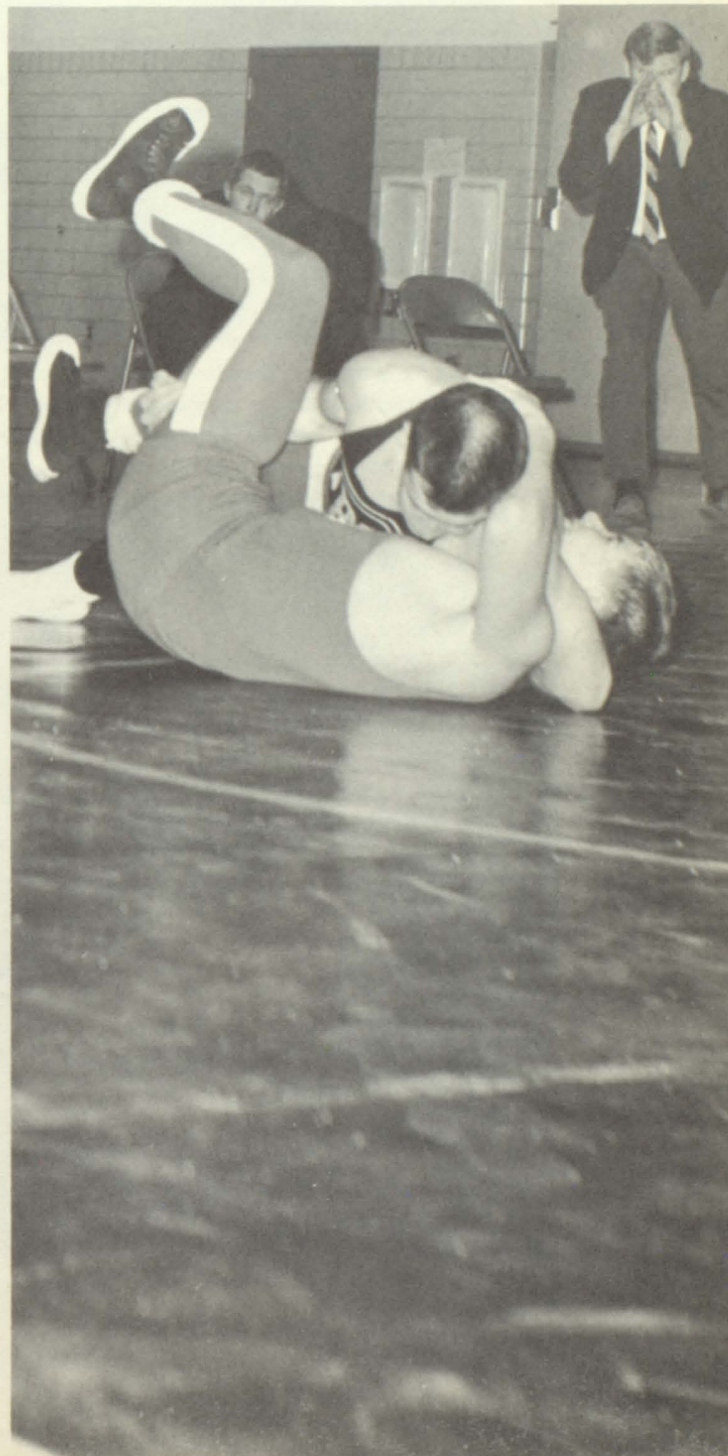
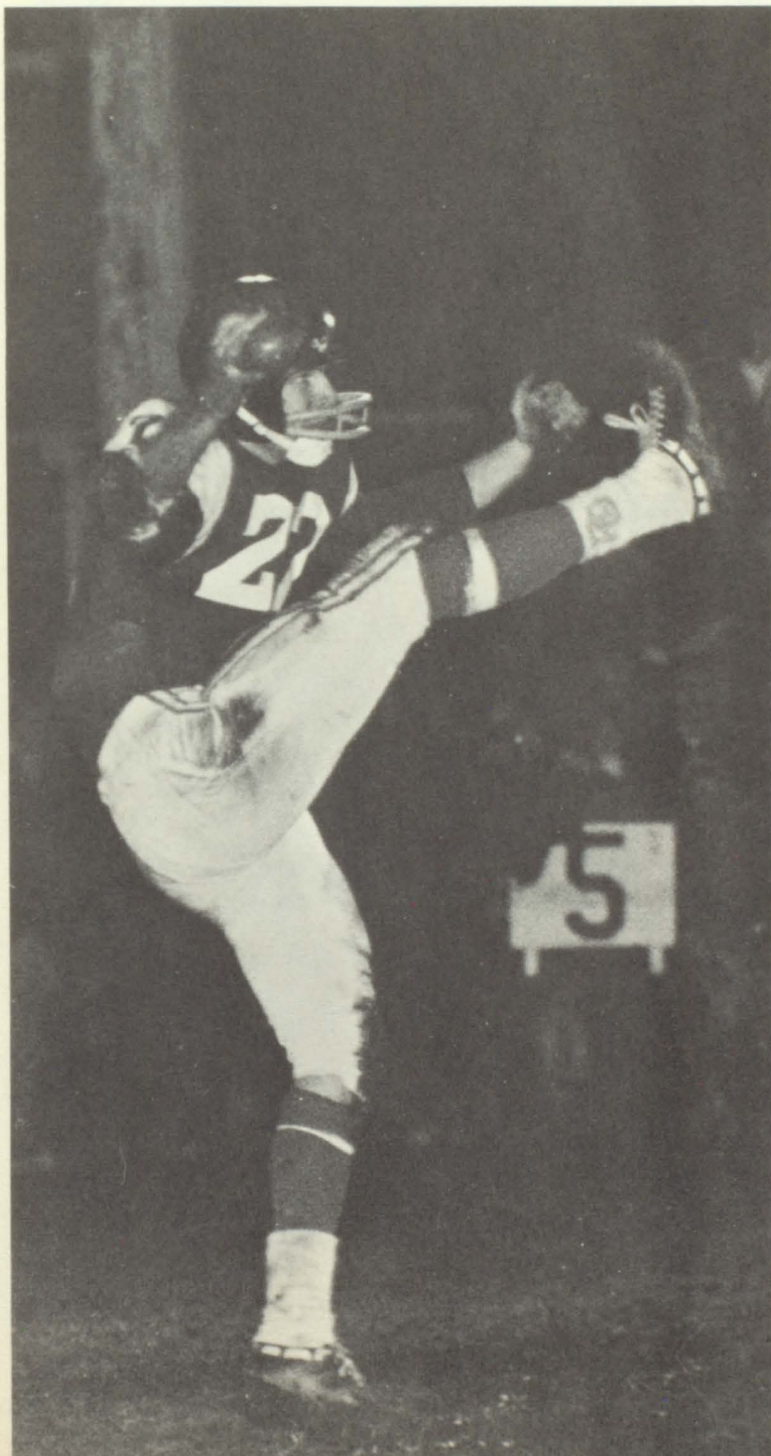

Dondero High School Just Can't Be Beaten With All-Stater Shepler Leading Downfield

By whipping all but one of the opponents this year, the OAKS of Dondero tallied their first undefeated season since 1935. In doing so the football team won outright their first BCL title in over eight years. Sparked by the powerful running of their entire back-field, the OAKS ended up the season ranked sixth among the state's class A football powers. Coach Ivy Loftin remarked, "The team was the finest one that I've ever coached!"

The OAKS opened their season with two high scoring victories before crushing Wyandotte in their first league meet on a murky night. They then whipped Highland Park before a large crowd in a game plagued by injuries. All stater Al Shepler and Co. then went to work in the next two games to grind out hard victories over Fordson and Grosse Pointe.

Then on a cool, crisp, tension-filled night in November, Monroe invaded Royal Oak on Dondero's homecoming day evening, knowing they must win to keep their title hopes alive. Dondero came out on top of the game when Al Shepler raced 43 yards through a maze of tacklers, for a touchdown and the BCL title.

Warming up for the big game one week in the future, the OAKS beat Seaholm on a snow covered field. The team now owned an 8 and 0 record with four shutouts to its credit. Only a tie with S.M.A. Champ Kimball marred R.O.D.'s perfect season.

The football team was strong both defensively and offensively, due to the great abilities of both the players and coaches this year. Dondero's first string defense allowed a meager average of 2.33 points per game, while their total offensive machine averaged 25.6 points per game.

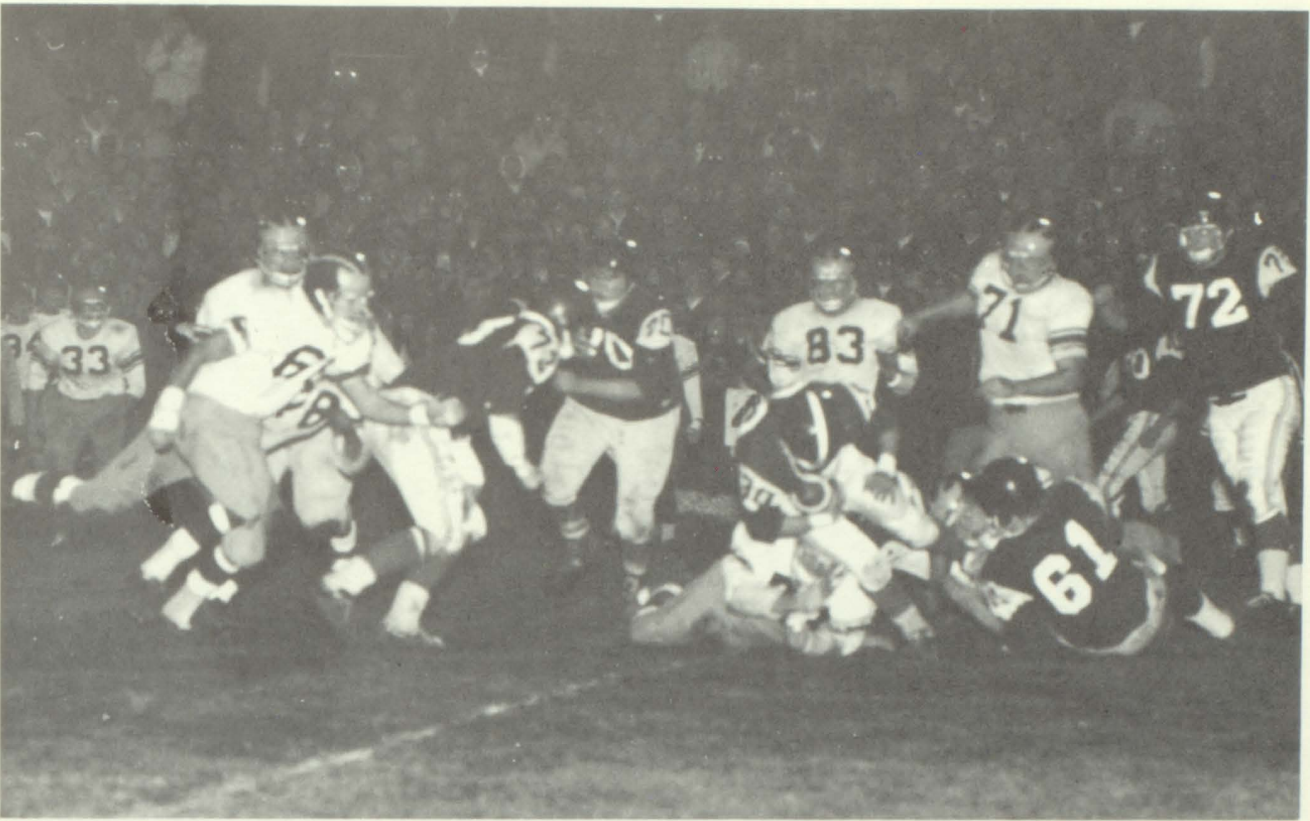

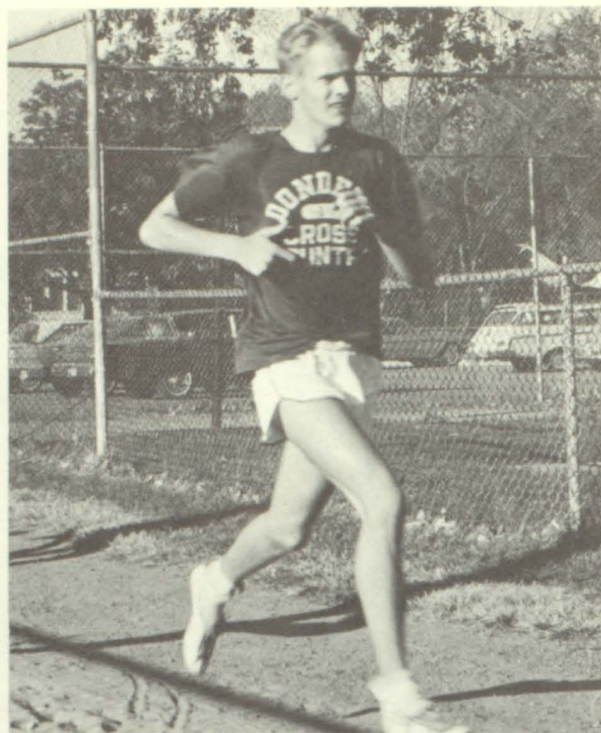
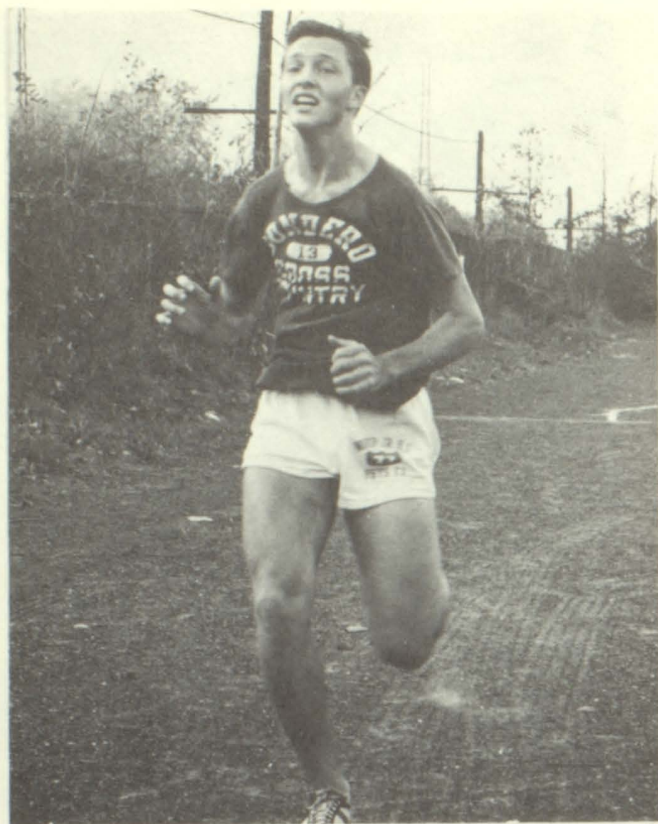

Harriers Are Third In BCL Competition

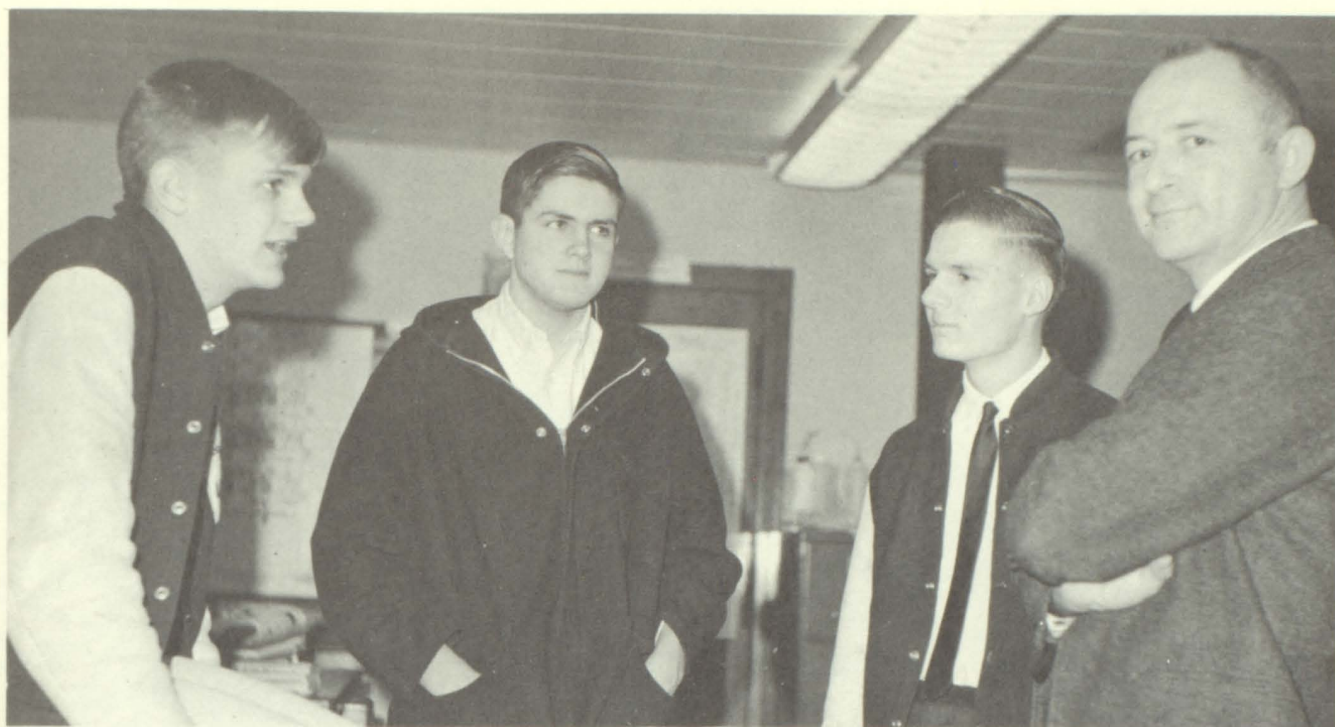

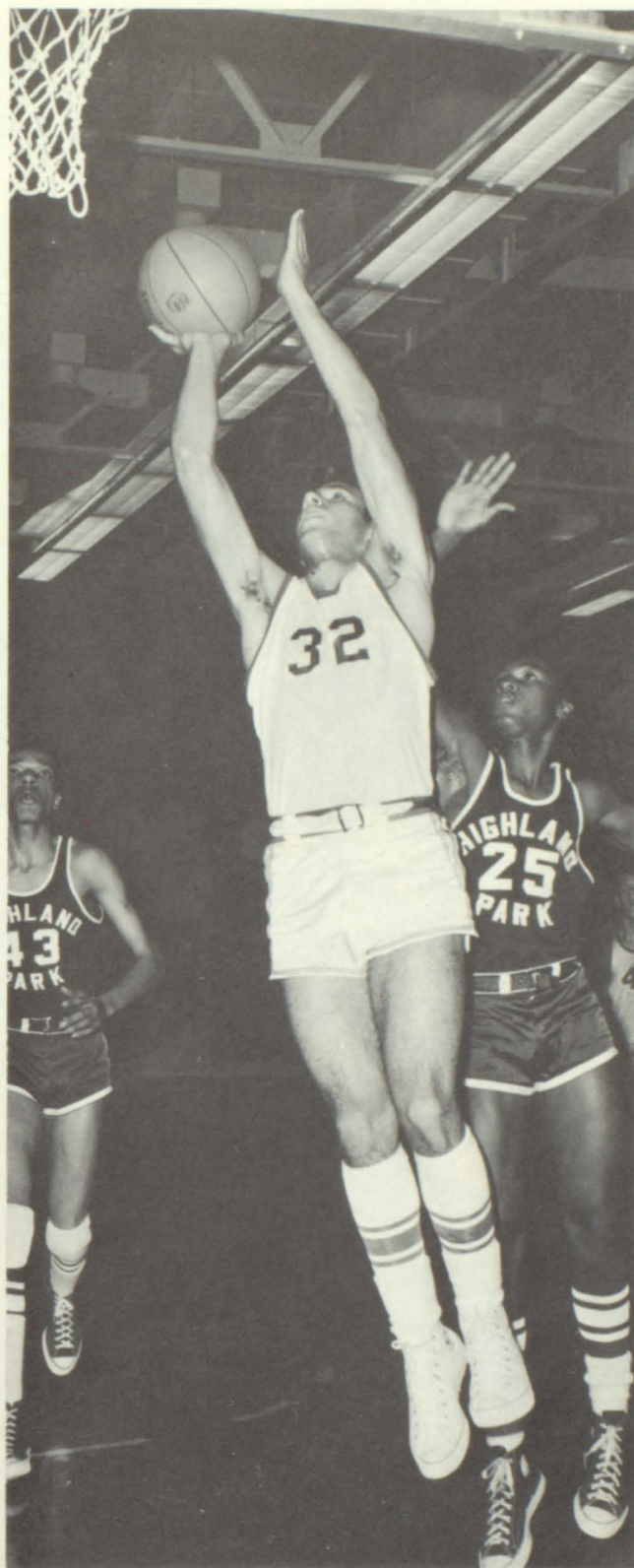
Mott Mars Winless Season for Hoopers

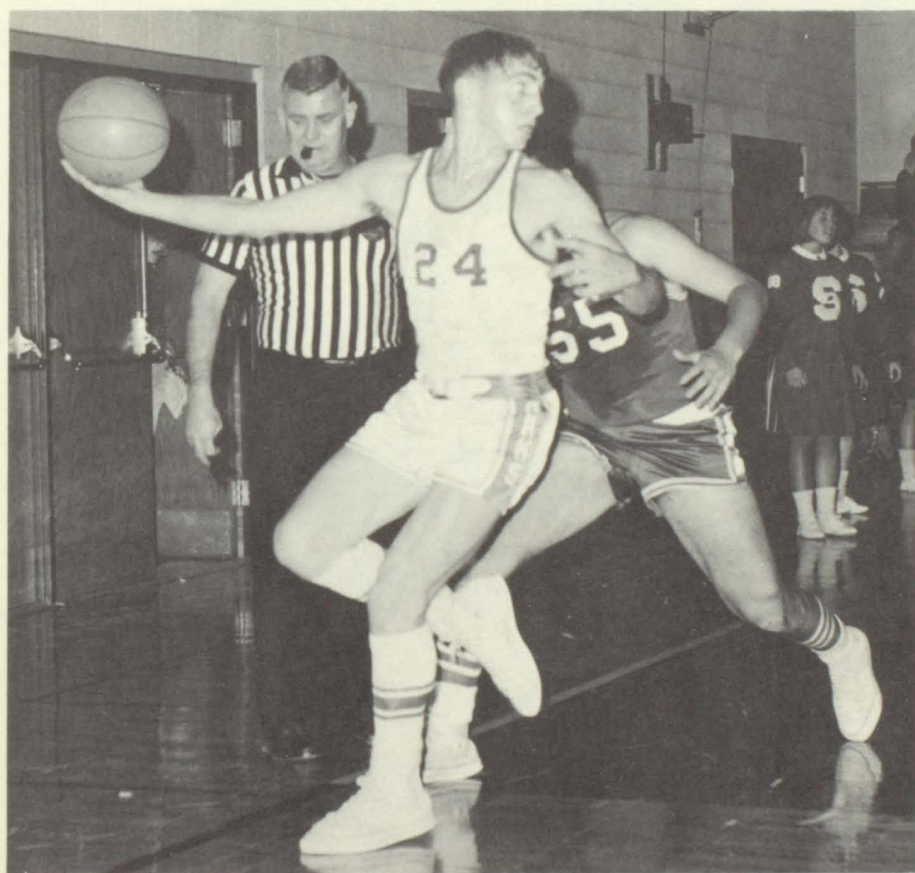



Dondero finished with a seven win, ten loss season, placing fourth in the BCL League meet.

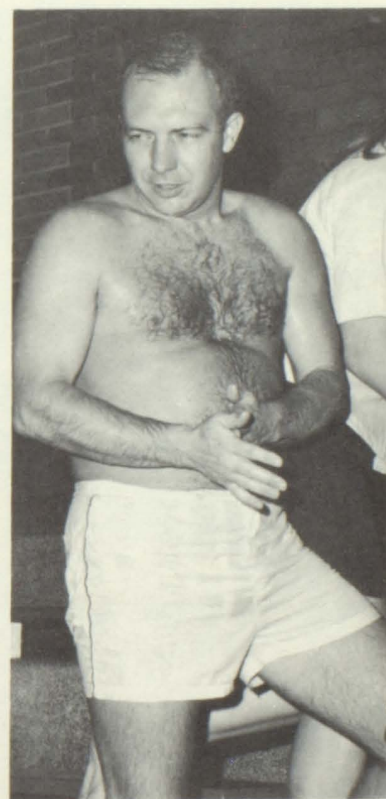

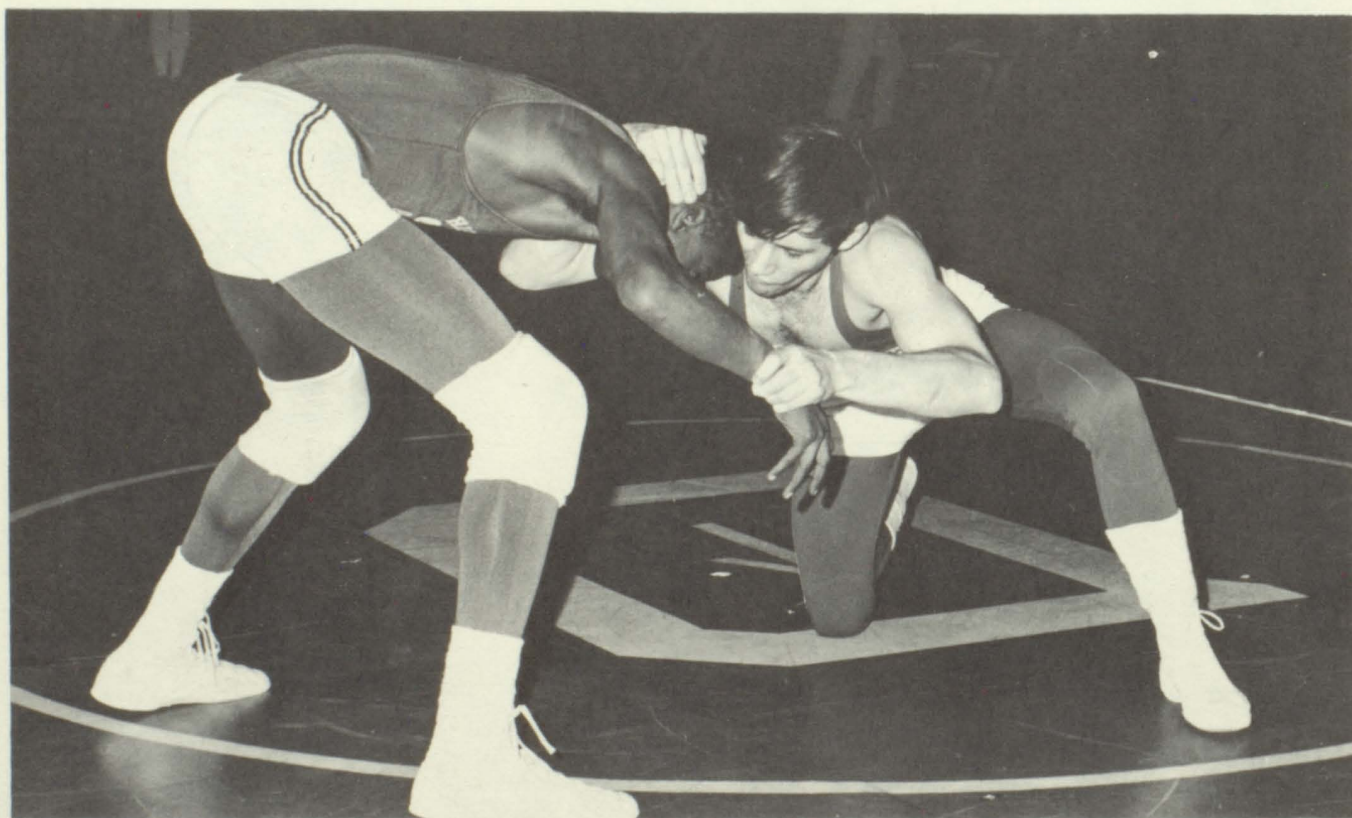
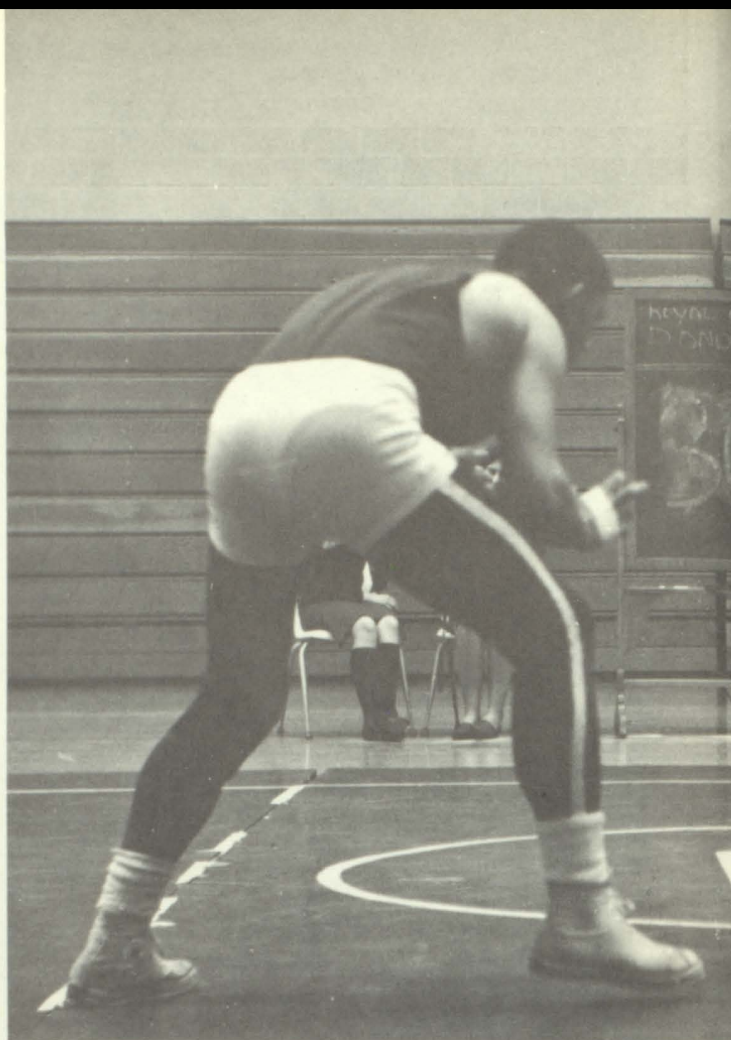
RO Wrestlers Hailed Best Team in History

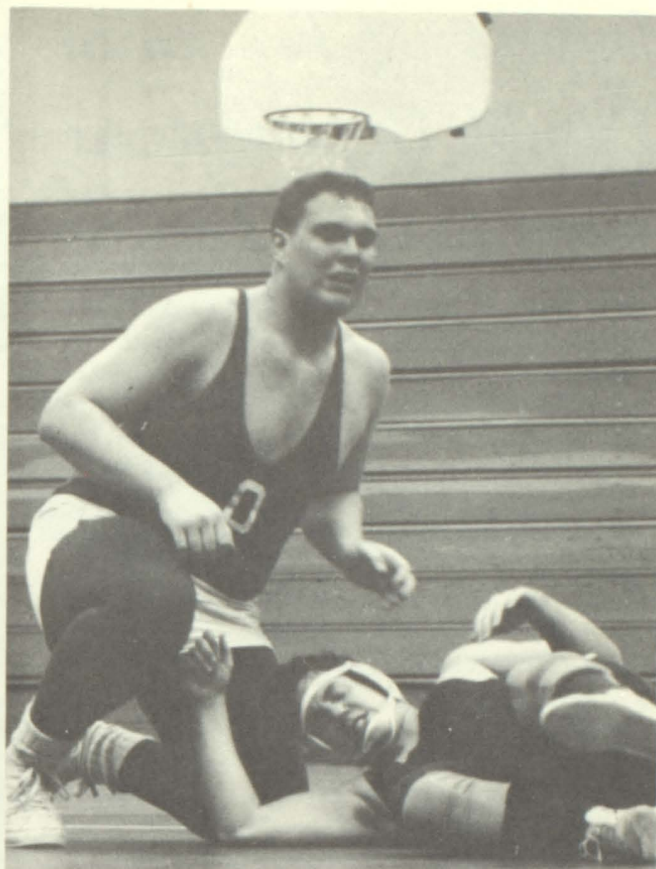
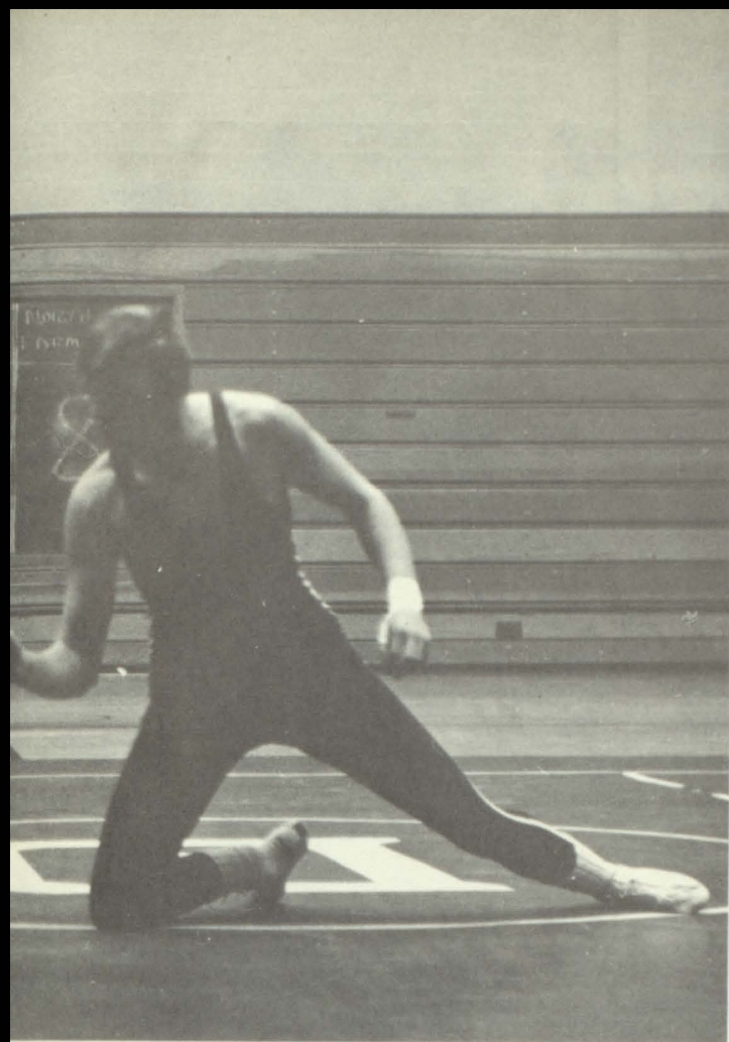

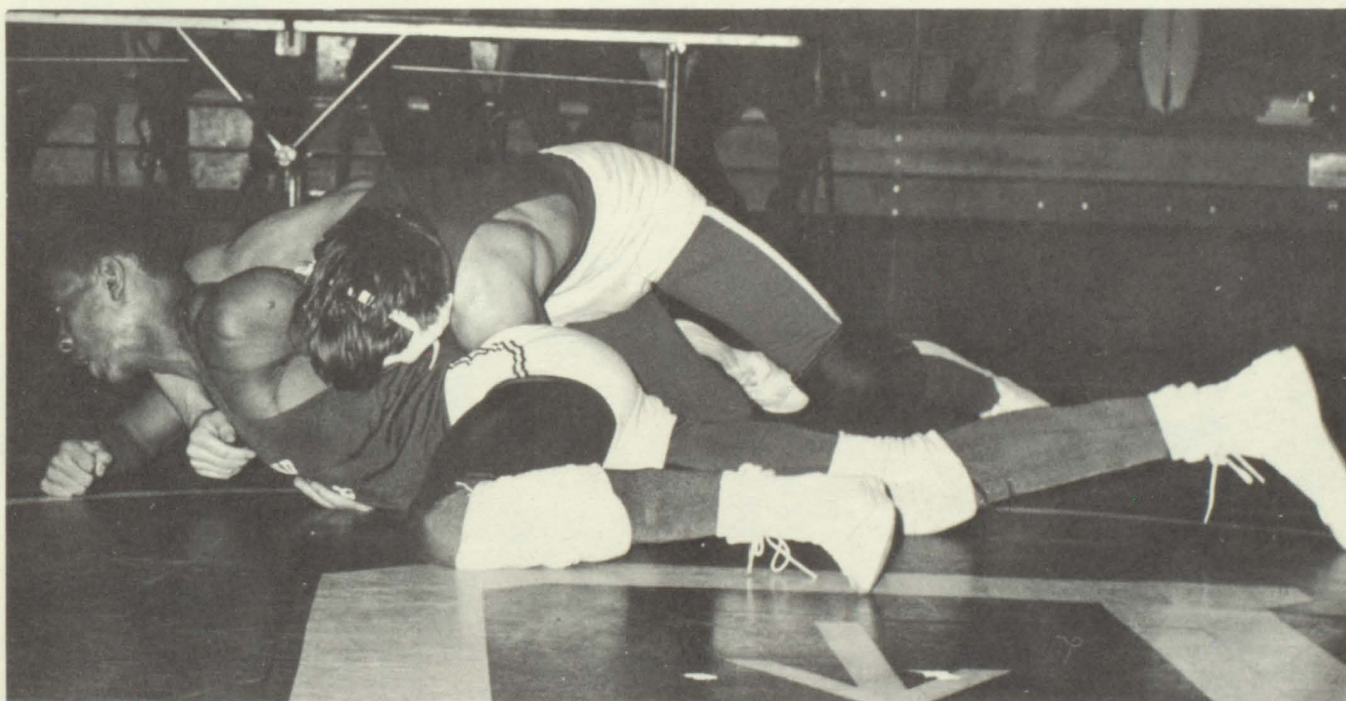

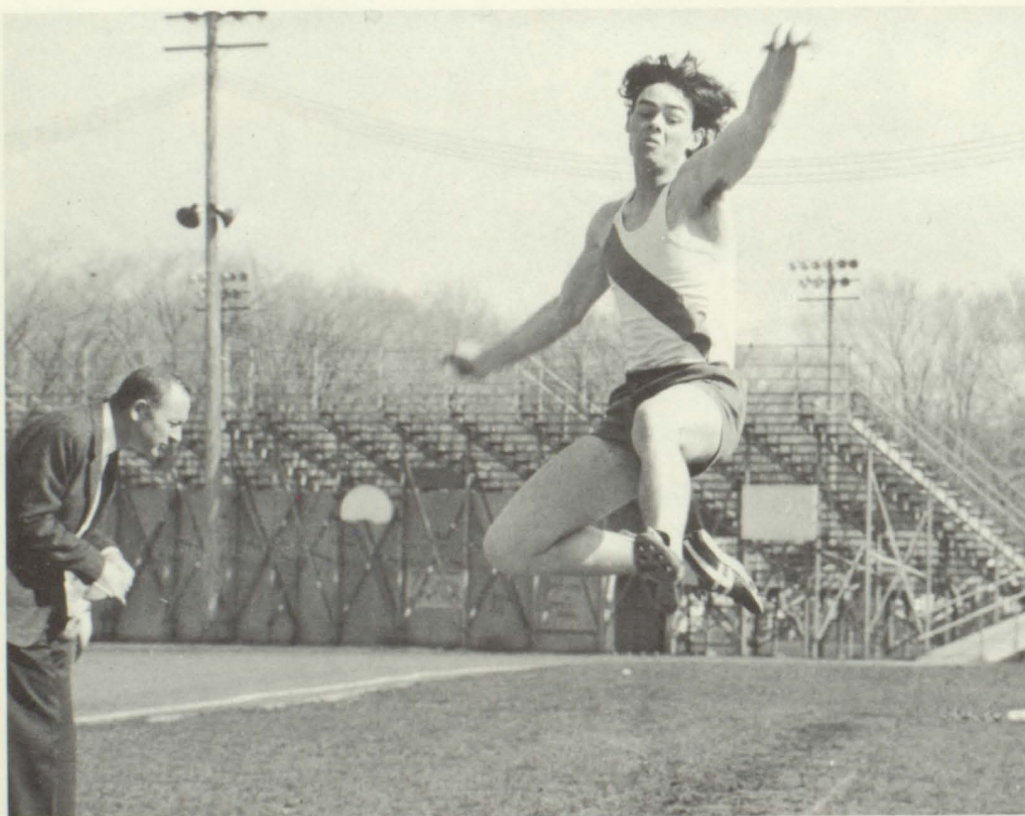


Improving Trackmen Tumble Opponents As Records Are Broken

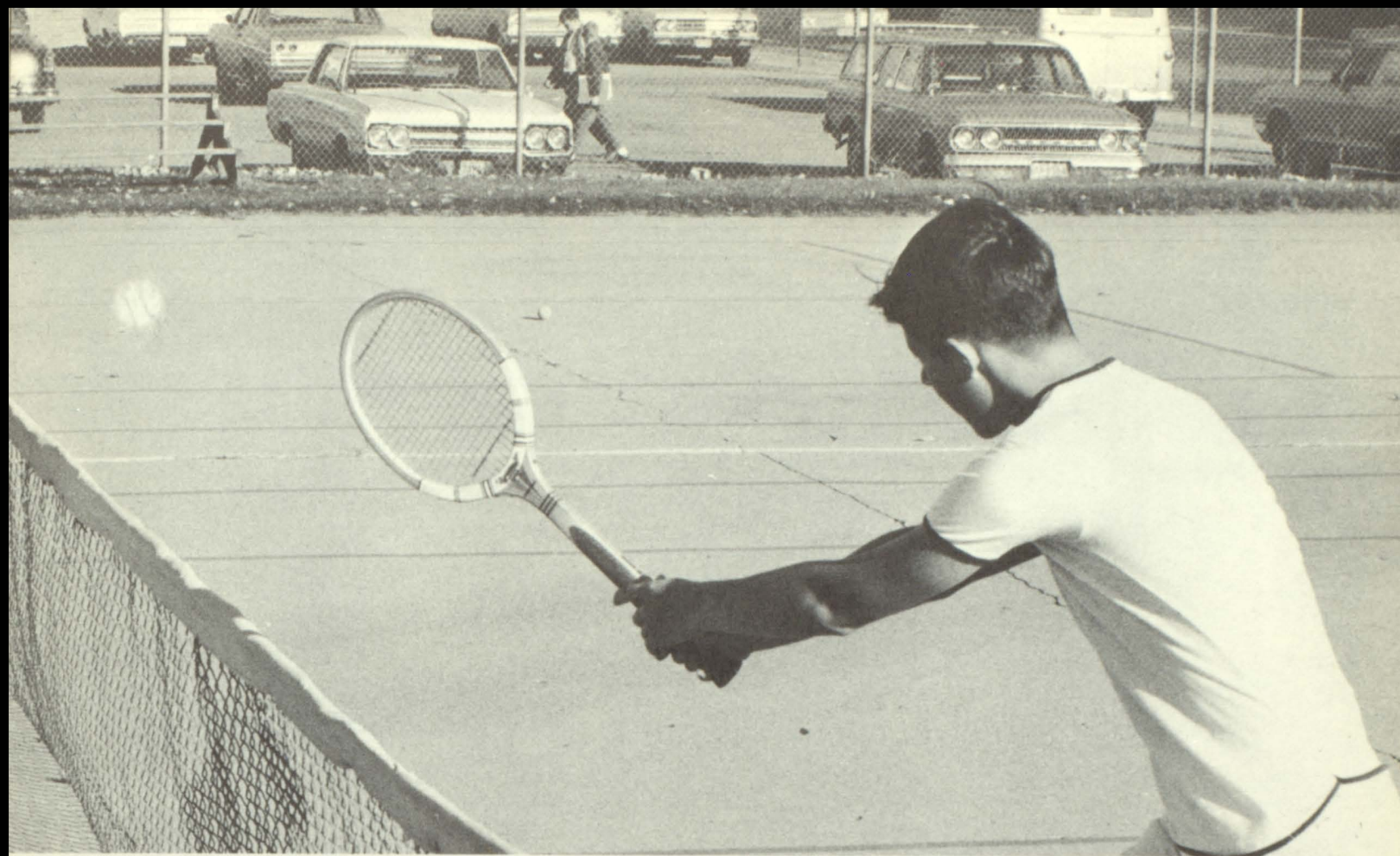

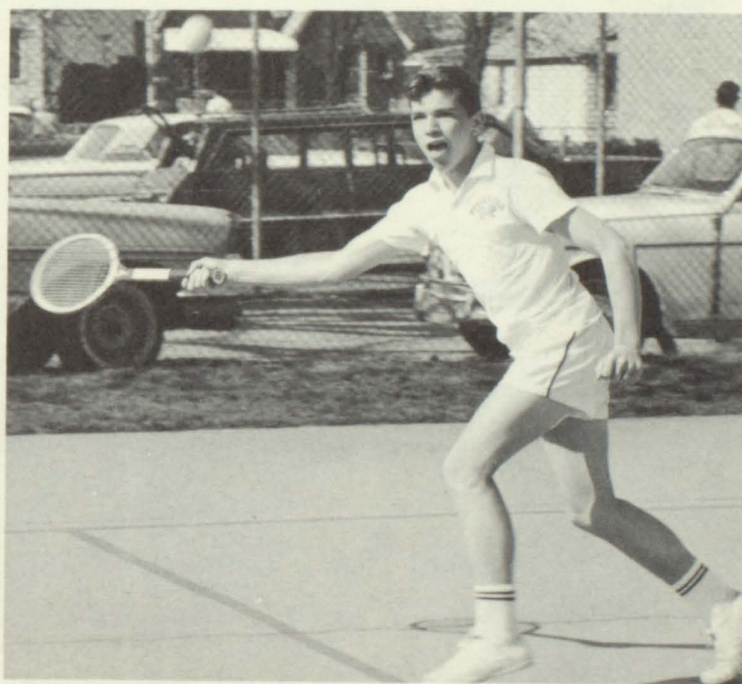

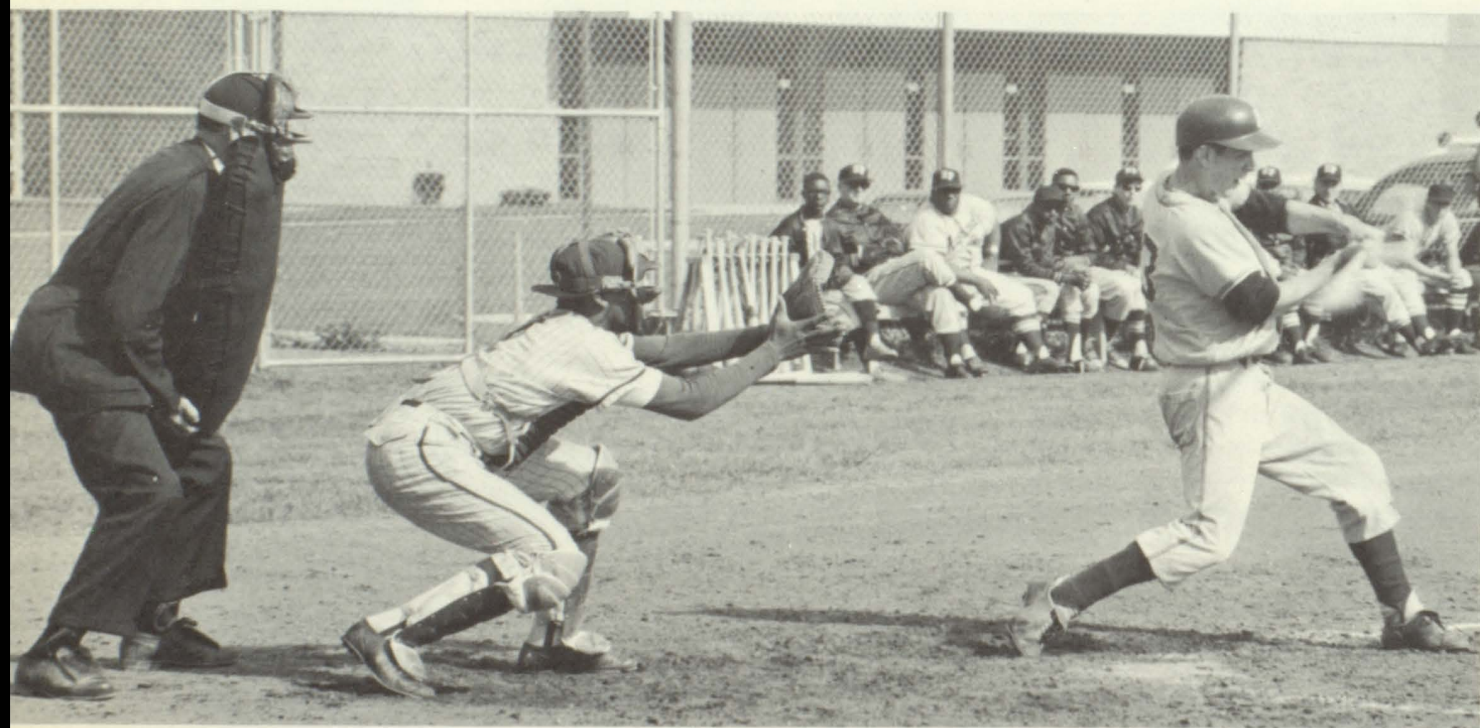


Dondero Racket Squad Swings Good Season

Coach John Duncan, an avid golfer himself, was partly responsible for the team's strong finish, since he helped the new team discover and correct its own weaknesses.

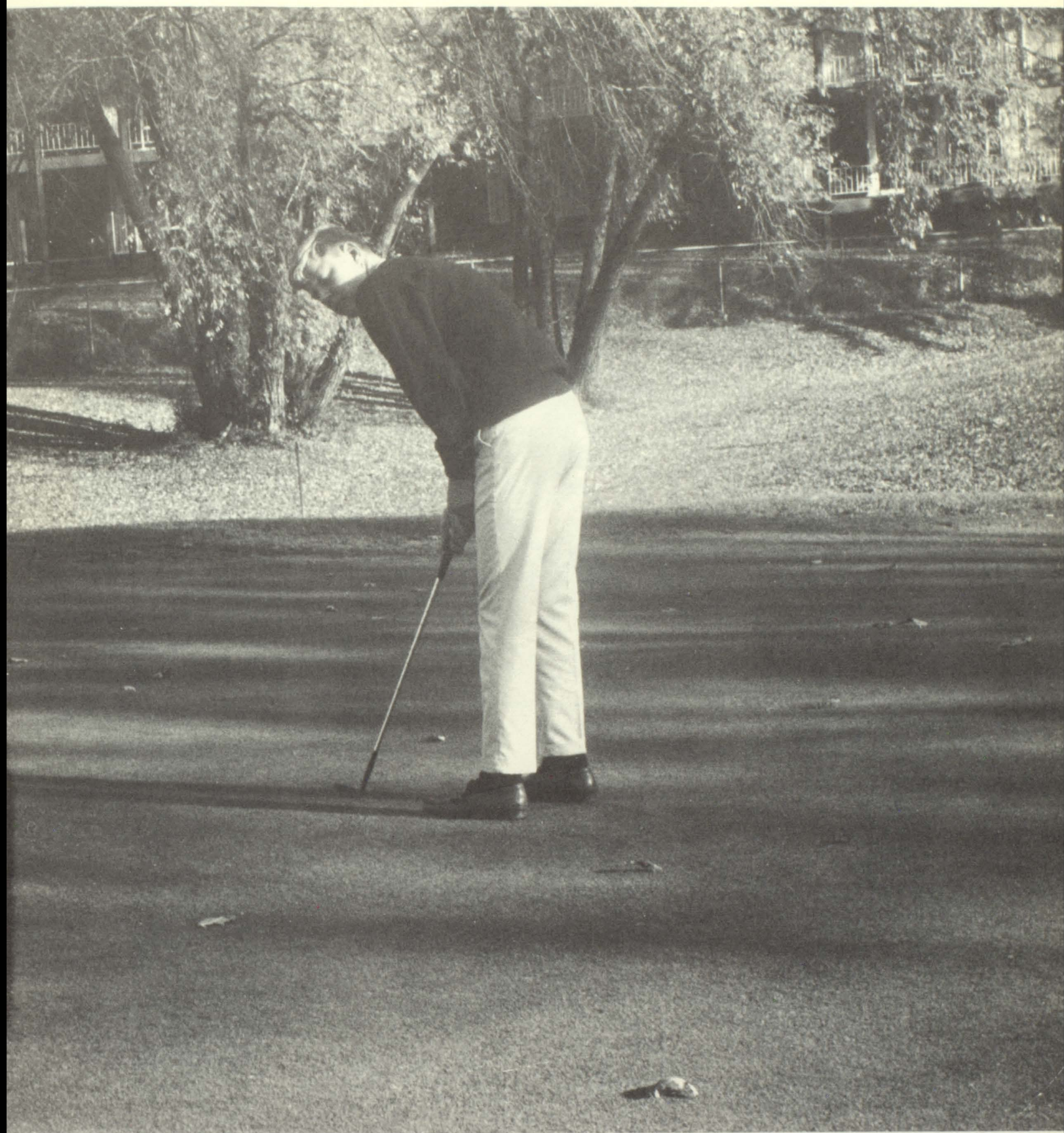

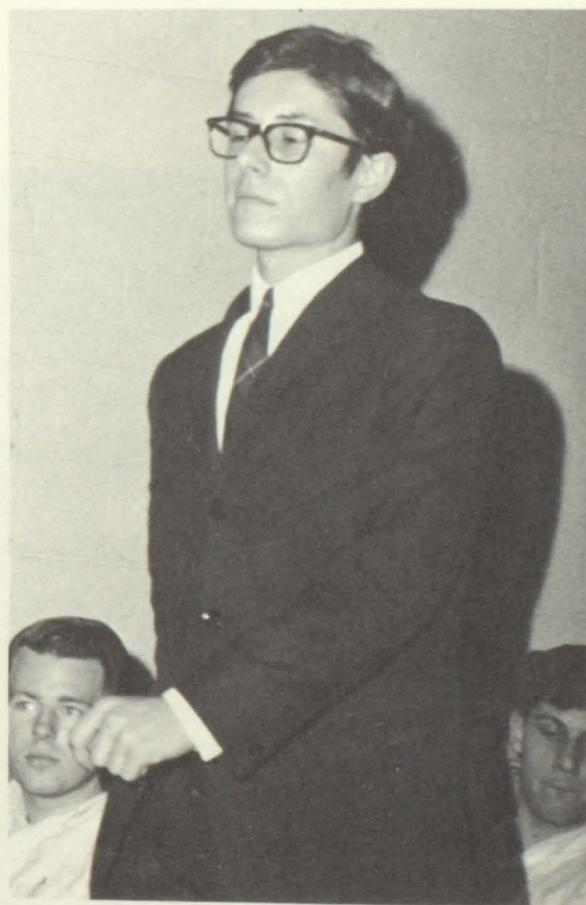

These dances gave everyone a chance to participate in the fun. Dancing with one and all was a large part of the evening.

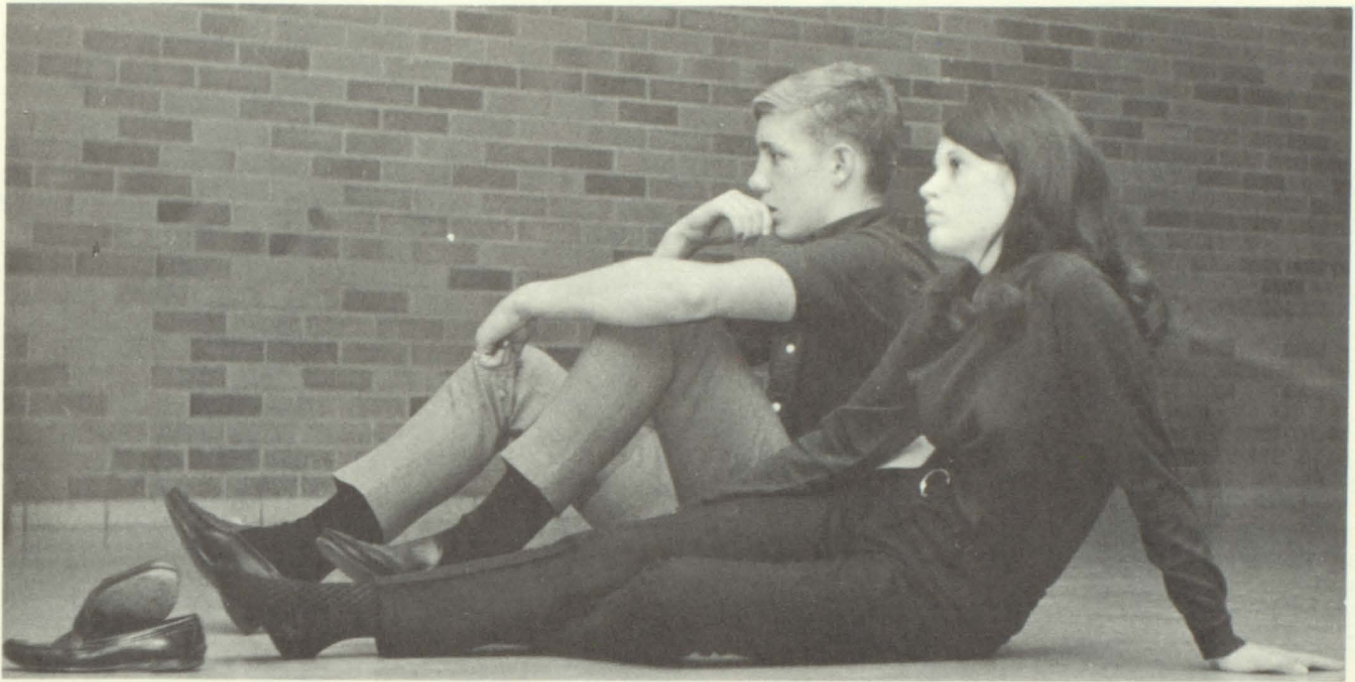
A variety of entertainment was provided at the Senior Mixers. Included were the more popular bands around school, old records which brought back memories, and a few brave souls who brought guitars and sang.

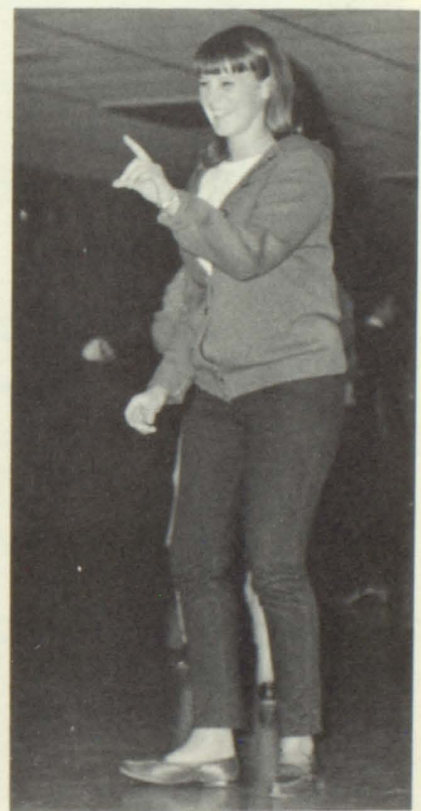
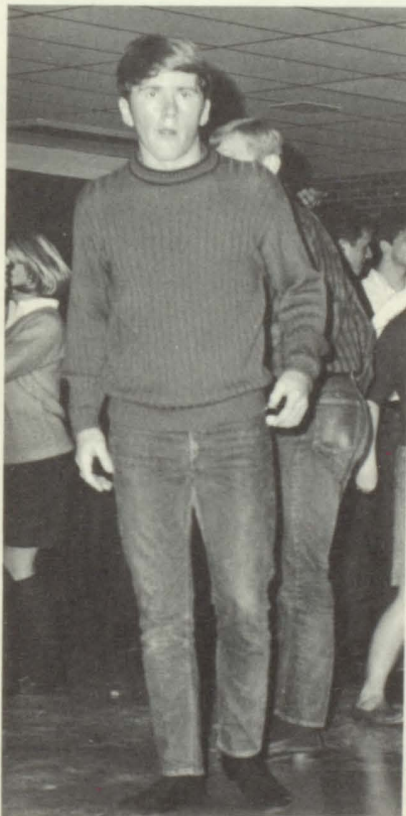

School Honors Sr. Scholars in Many Ways



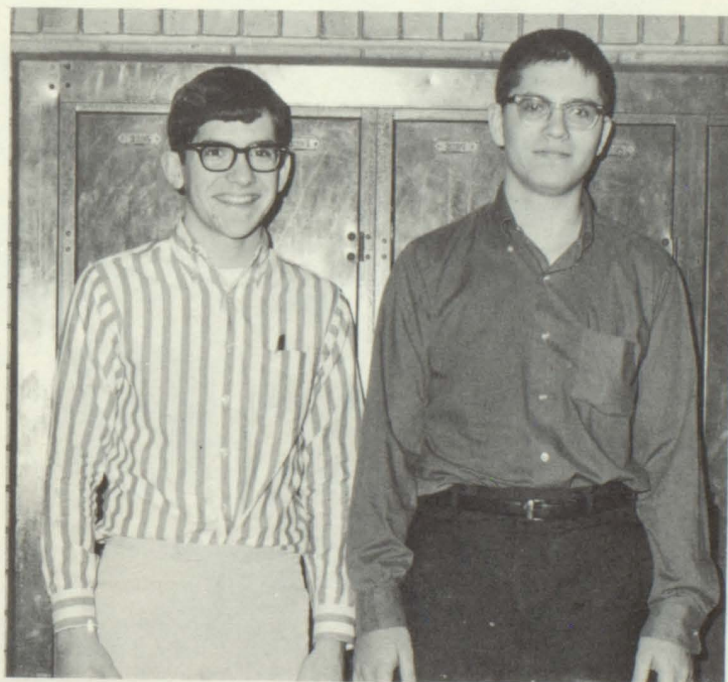

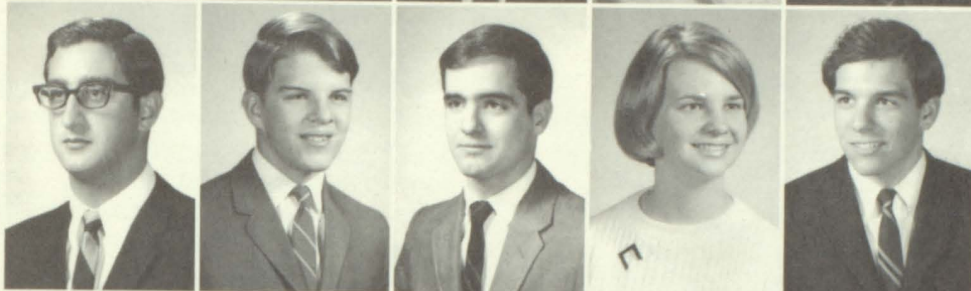

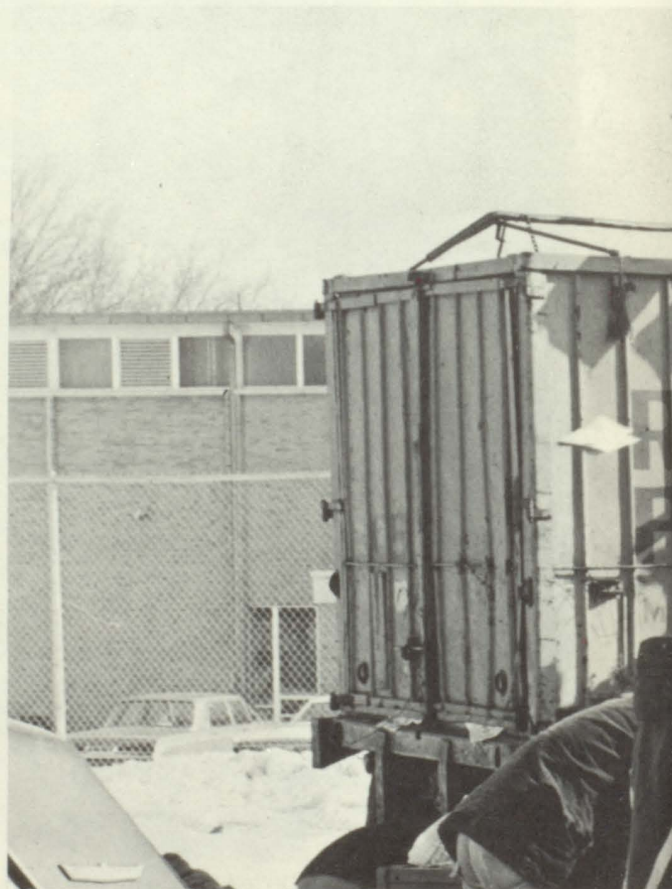

This day resulted in a lot of laughs for everyone and will surely go down in Dondero's history.



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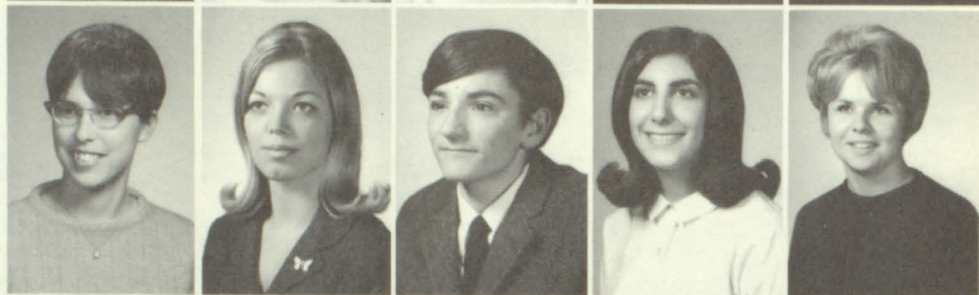

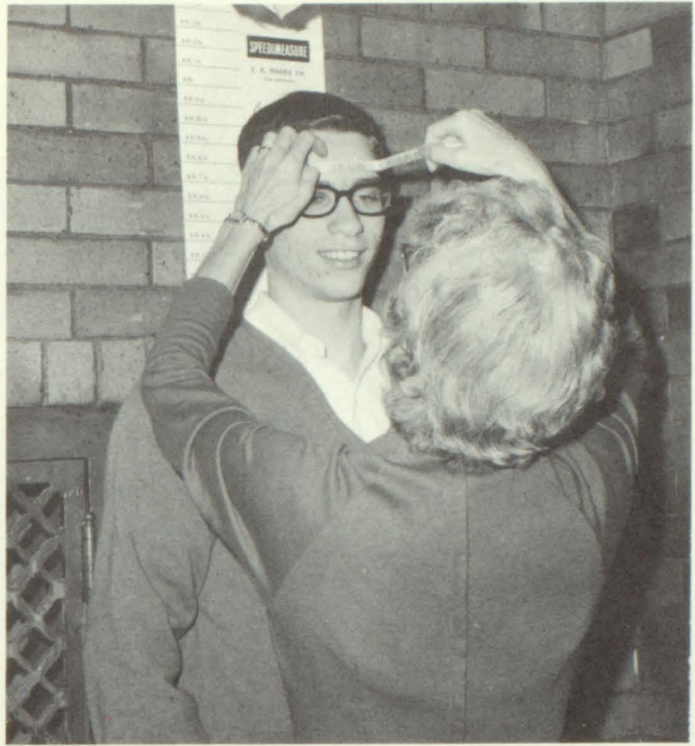
Caps, Gowns ... First Step

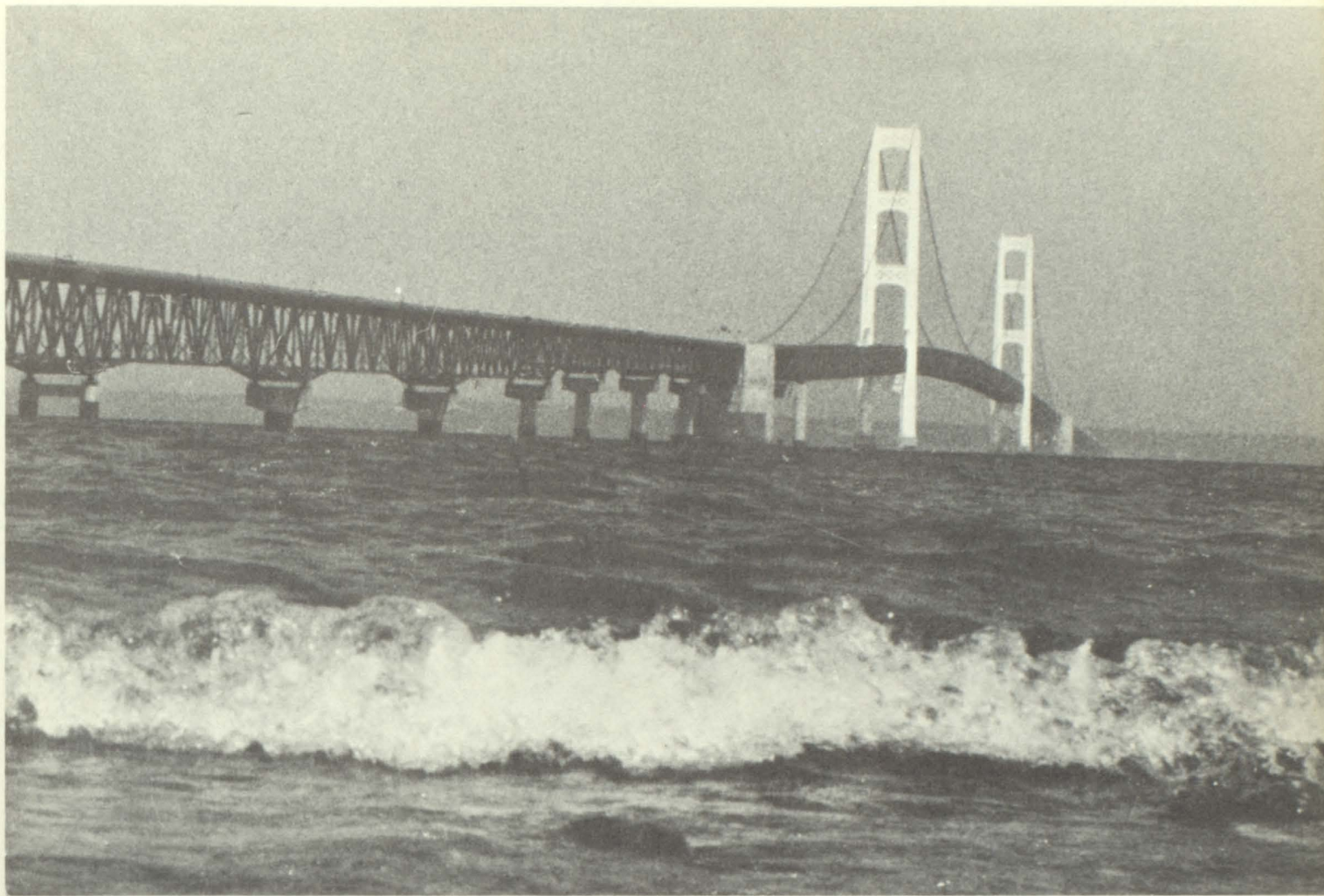
Once back in Detroit, the seniors are filled with fond memories of the trip and maybe some not so fond. Then comes graduation — the last time the seniors are seen as a group.

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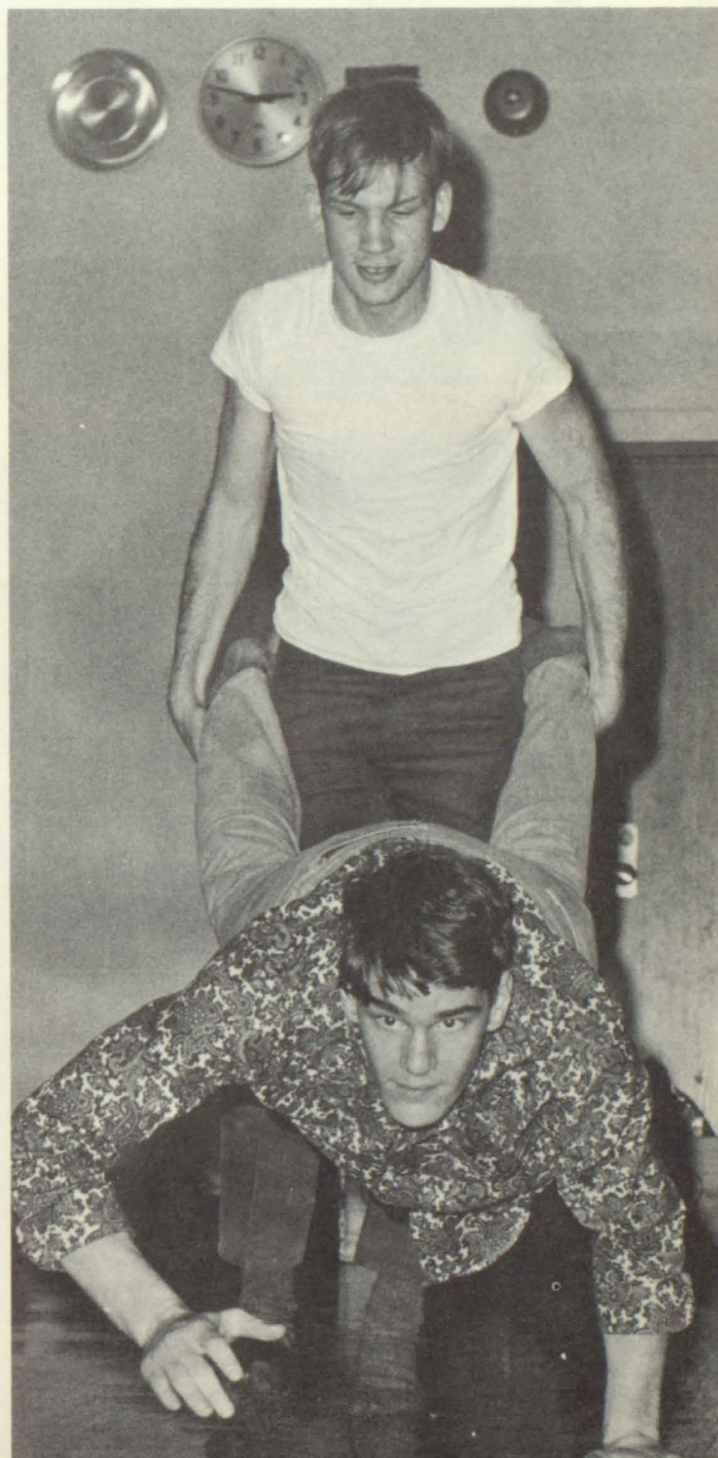

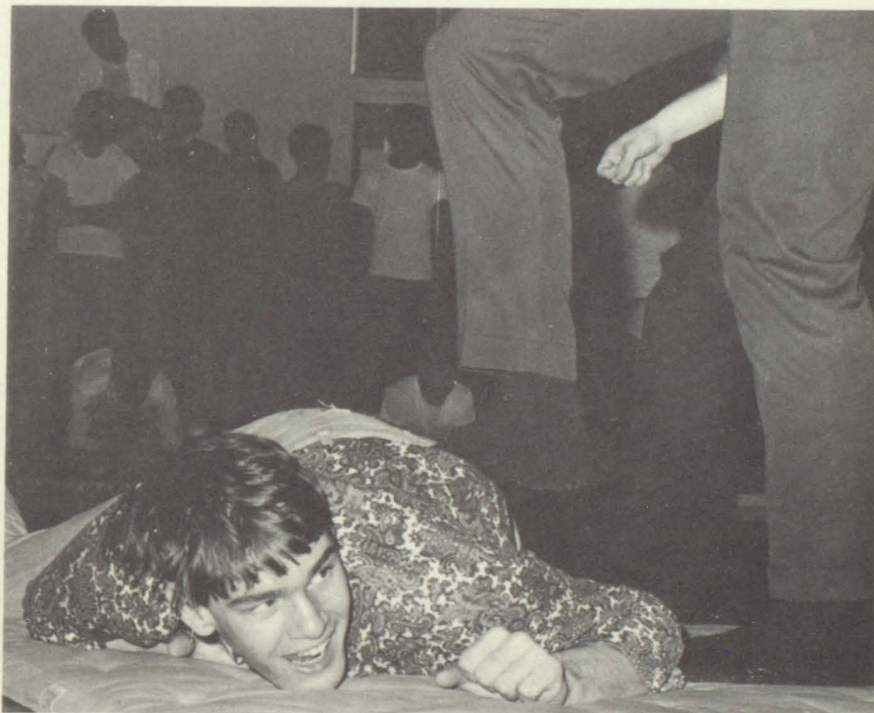
R.O. Serves Forty Years

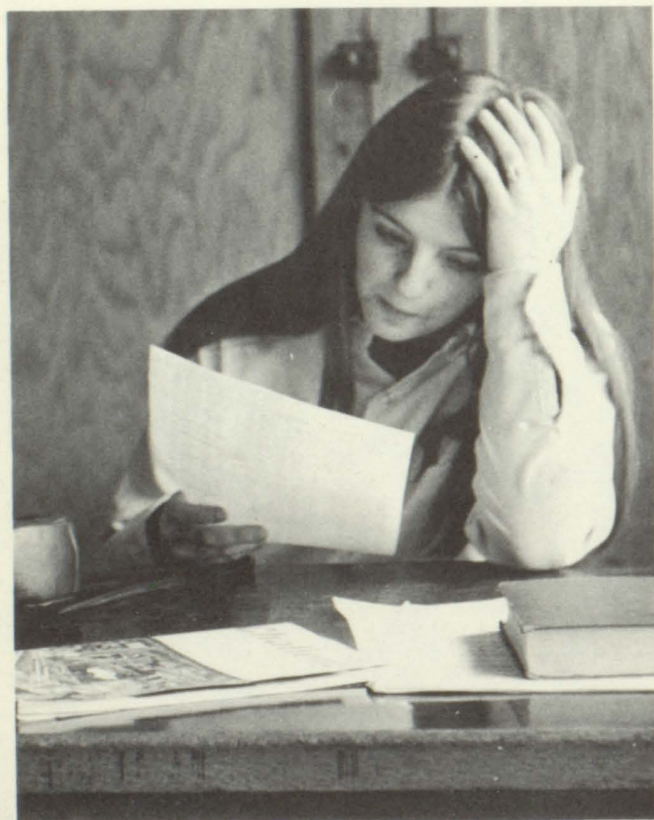
In the Roaring Twenties, our blue sweater with the white RO came into existence. The Dondero Varsity Club was organized as a service to the school, as well as to the entire community.

Snow Lifts Skiers Spirits in Great Season



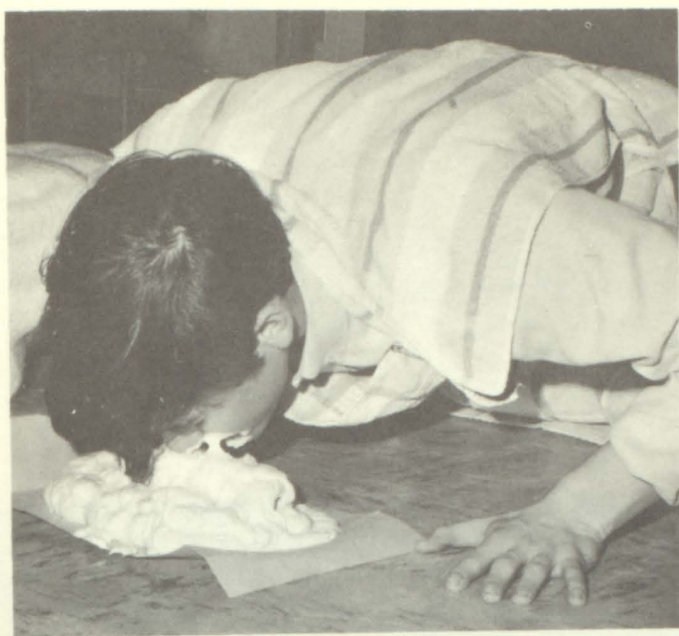

Latin Club also participates in several school activities. They enter a float in the Homecoming parade, and sponsor a booth at the school carnival.

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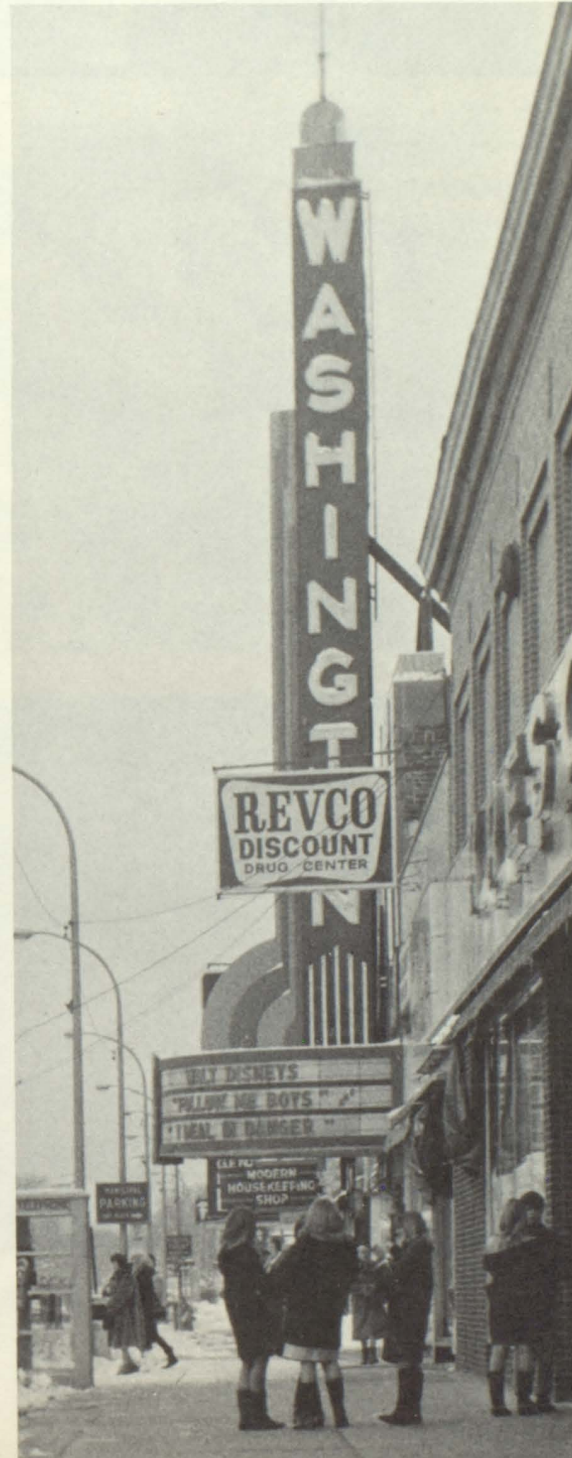


Upper left, two unidentified Latin Club initiates struggle to regain vision through a maze of thick, whipped cream. The initiation of new members has

become a tradition within the Latin Club. Above, club members gather around to admire relics of Rome.



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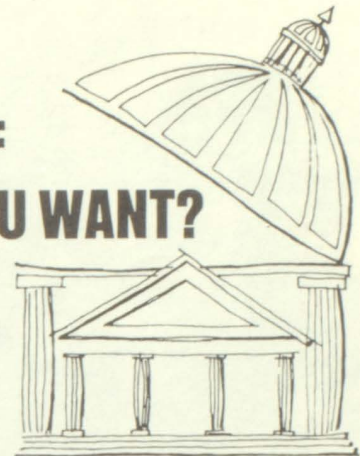


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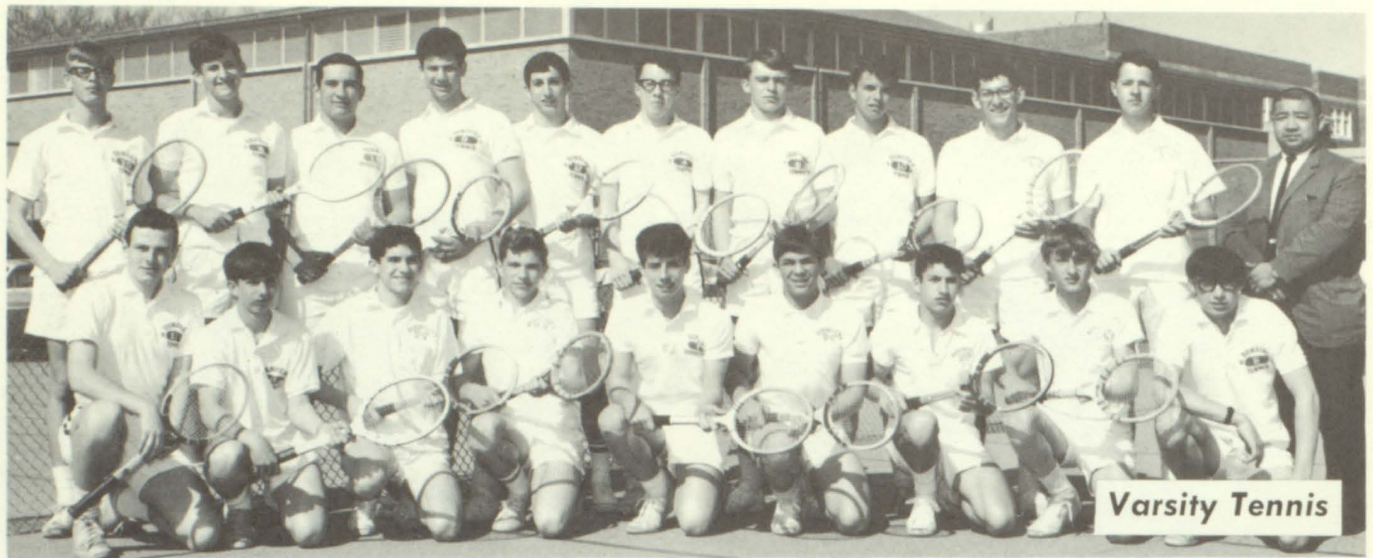
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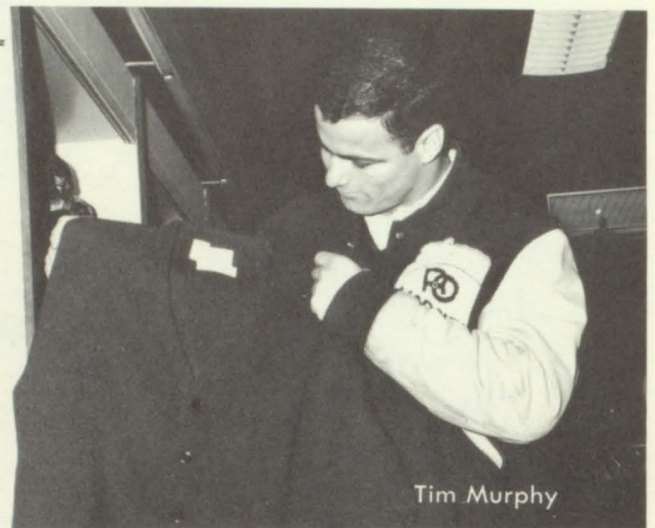
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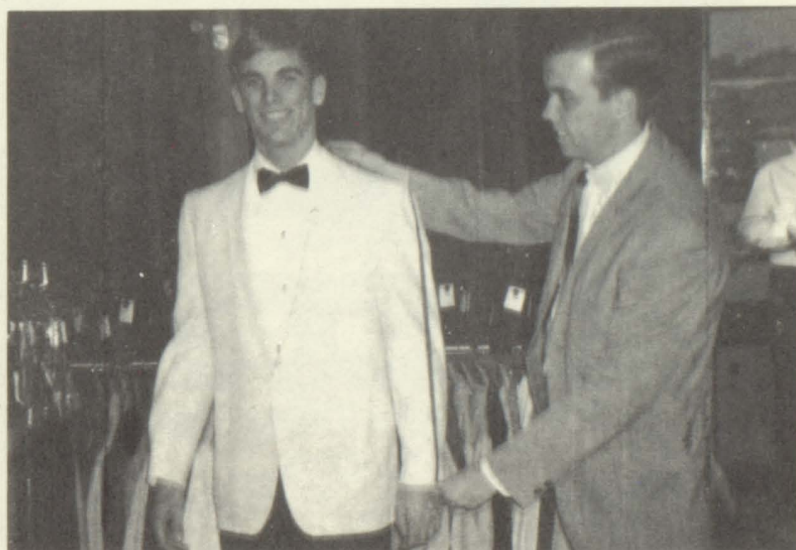
