There are many enjoyable activities to participate in; concerts, plays, sports, clubs, or class activities. Even doing homework can combine work and play.






# A Time To Win And A Time To Lose

So, in the long run, anyone who asserts himself to his utmost, whether he wins or loses, comes out on top.









# A Time To Seek and A Time To Gain

Each year is filled with many long hours of hard work and study. As one looks back, though, the memories most vivid are those of the fun and friends of the past year.





Even though school is a place to work and study, there is always a time to laugh and a time to have fun if one looks for it.









## A Time To Speak a Time To Be Silent

This year, students at Dondero have been fortunate enough to hear distinguished speakers talk on subjects relevant to society today.






# A Time To Be Proud of Our Talents


A large part of education is learning to develop one's talents. Dondero's programs, have this as their main objective. Any student is allowed to express his talents.





# A Small World Demands Language Knowledge










## Math Students Are Thinking People

The Mathematics department at Royal Oak Dondero, headed by Mr. Richard Hemmila, is designed to encompass many areas. General Math presents the fundamental concepts and applications of the subject. Geometry and trigonometry are introduced. Algebra students learn to solve simple algebraic equations. Plane and space figures are

covered in Geometry. Advanced Algebra expands the knowledge gained in the first course leading to Senior Math which covers trigonometry and is a pre-calculus course. Whether a student is in General Math or Senior Math, he finds Math is a time to think.

Business Education classes at Dondero are a time to prepare for the future. This department seeks to provide at least one marketable skill for students with interest and aptitude in business, to provide these students with a good general education, and to offer beneficial business courses to the student body in general. Above all, the department wishes to encourage students to be intelligent consumers as well as efficient employees. These goals are realized through courses which begin with General Business and work up through Typing, Office Procedures (Filing), Bookkeeping, and Retailing. The courses are climaxed by Office Machines, which provides opportunity to acquire skills on six common office machines, and Model Office, which offers practical office experience, in addition to the Co-op programs.






# A Time To Build — Industrial Arts

One of the most diversified departments at Dondero is the Industrial Arts category. Drawing courses begin with Mechanical Drawing which covers drafting basics. Machine Drawing students examine the mechanisms of power and motion eventually developing projects of their own. Architectural Drawing introduces any interested students to various techniques, styles, and methods. Various shop classes are also available. Auto Shop is a comprehensive course dealing with repair and maintenance. Metal Shop, offering two years, includes exposure to hot metals, welding, sheet metal, and machine metalworking, and construction of personal projects. The first Wood Shop course introduces tools and methods with basic projects; the second year has advanced projects. Print Shop classes study visual communication.





## Physical Education Promotes Fitness Fun

Dondero's Physical Education Department stresses the importance of being physically fit. Various activities for both girls and guys are planned. These sports include football, soccer, basketball, baseball, gymnastics, apparatus, fencing, volleyball, tennis, badminton, and swimming. Folk and modern dance are offered too for both freshmen and sophomore girls. Added to these, health class is emphasized, particularly in the student's freshmen year. # Co-op's Earn Credit, Money, Experience


More and more students are enjoying the opportunities the recently developed co-op programs provide. Meaningful paying employment in such places as Beaumont Hospital, Hudson's, various offices, Keller Junior High School, and Dondero is combined with job-related classes so to provide the student with credit, money, and experience. The combination of school and work not only trains the student in the field of his choice while exposing him to regular academic courses but it teaches him responsibility. The programs in vocational printing and auto, commercial foods, nursing aid, retailing, and office training give the student a chance for a good summer job, an opportunity for admission to many trade or technical schools, or experience for future full-time work. Underclassmen are encouraged to examine the possibilities of the co-op program whether or not they intend to pursue such an occupation. The co-op program is one of Dondero's most beneficial.

## Oak and Acorn Recall Then and Now






# A Time To Become Involved Through School Activities





Tom Suda was student director under Miss Levi. Technical director was Mr. Karl Klapthor of Groves High School.










## 'Anything Goes' A Big Hit!









The coaches of each of the sports play a major role in developing all the talents of the participants. Most of all, they plant into the minds of the athletes the major goal. And that goal? TO WIN.


## A Matter of Pride








# Tankers Set New Records



The Golf team this year will once again have a new coach. This year's coach will be Mr. Bill Gappy. Mr. Gappy and the team hope to set an even better record this year.




# Racketeers Post Mixed Season, Seven Wins




## Leaders of Tomorrow




# The End of The Beginning








# Freshmen Expand Their Horizons
