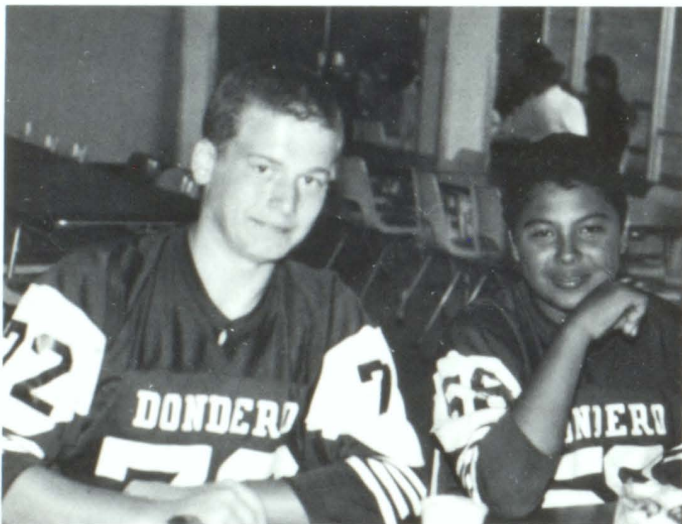
Food Fight!!!

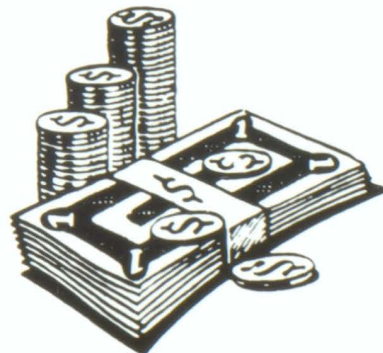

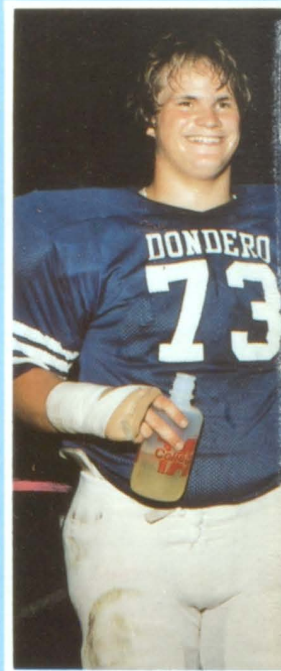
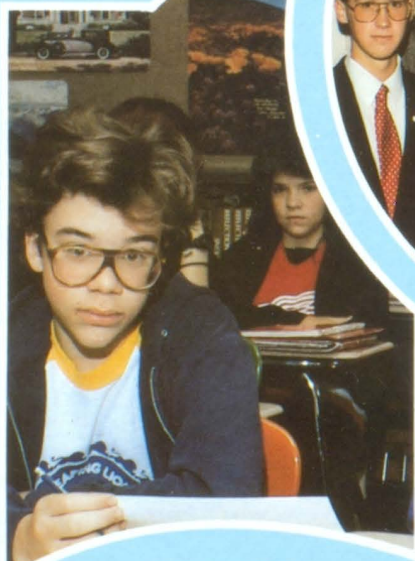

Everyone in this world knows that if you want to do things, you've got to have money. That goes in this school, too.

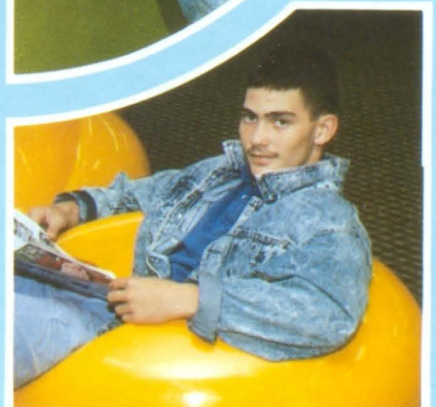
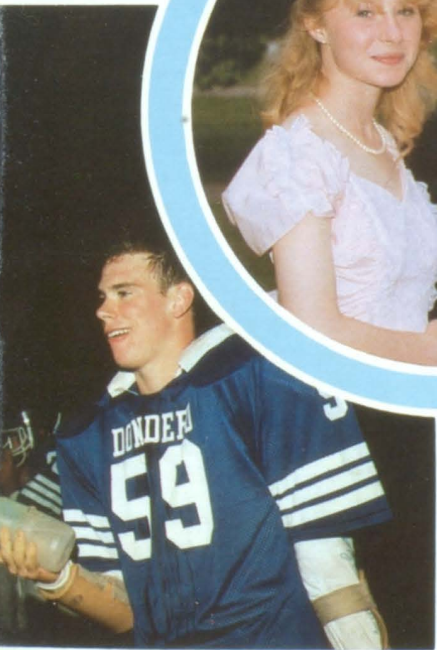
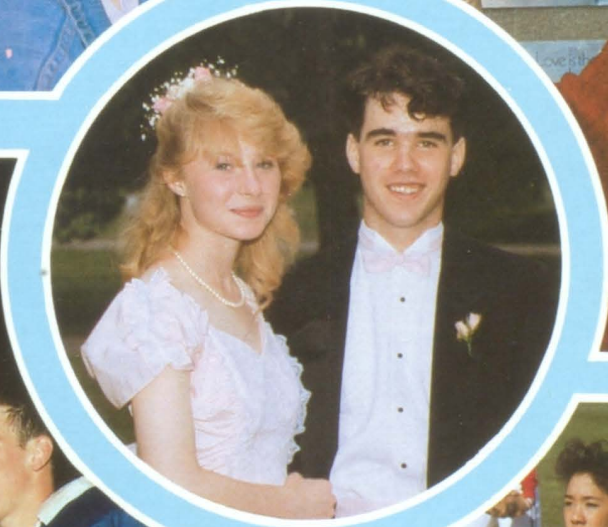
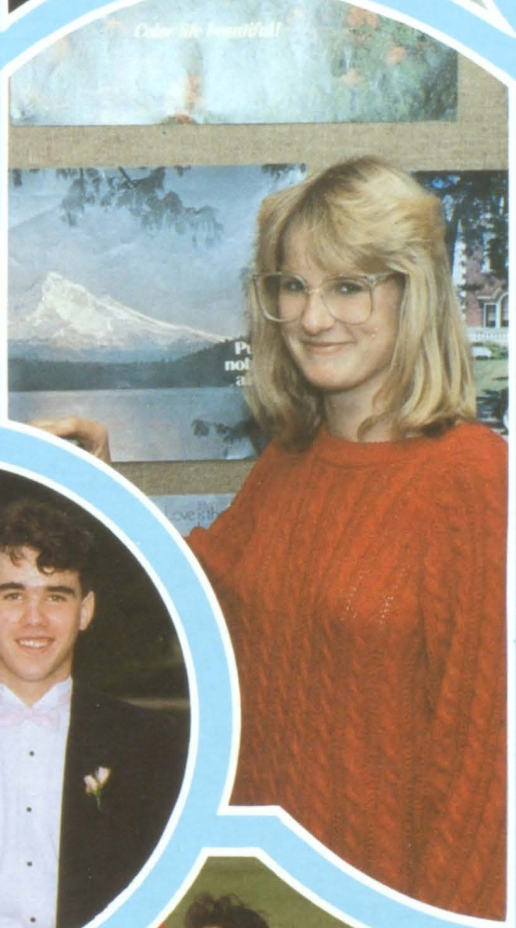

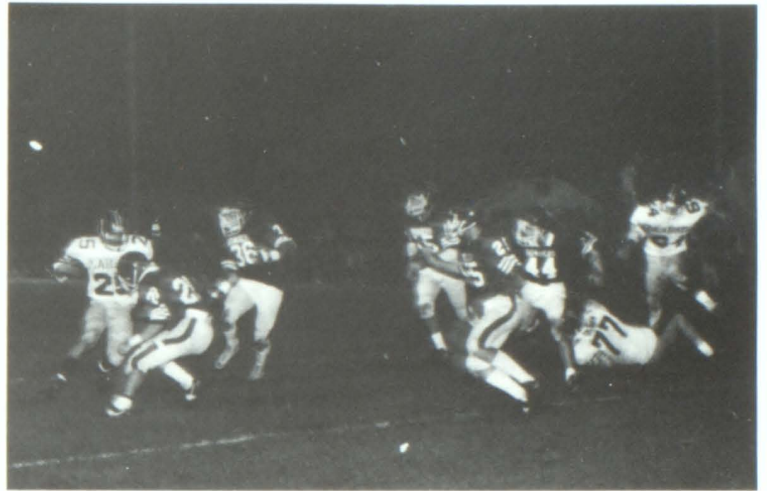

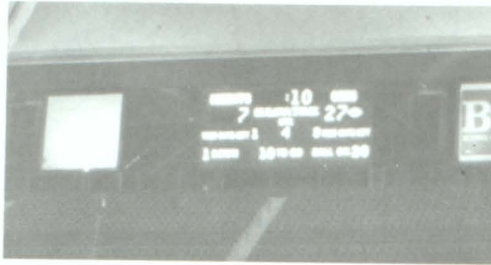

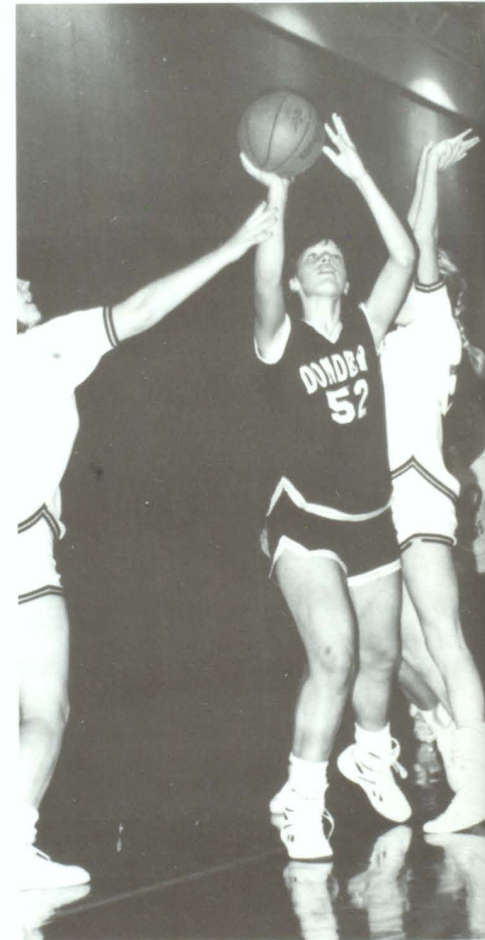



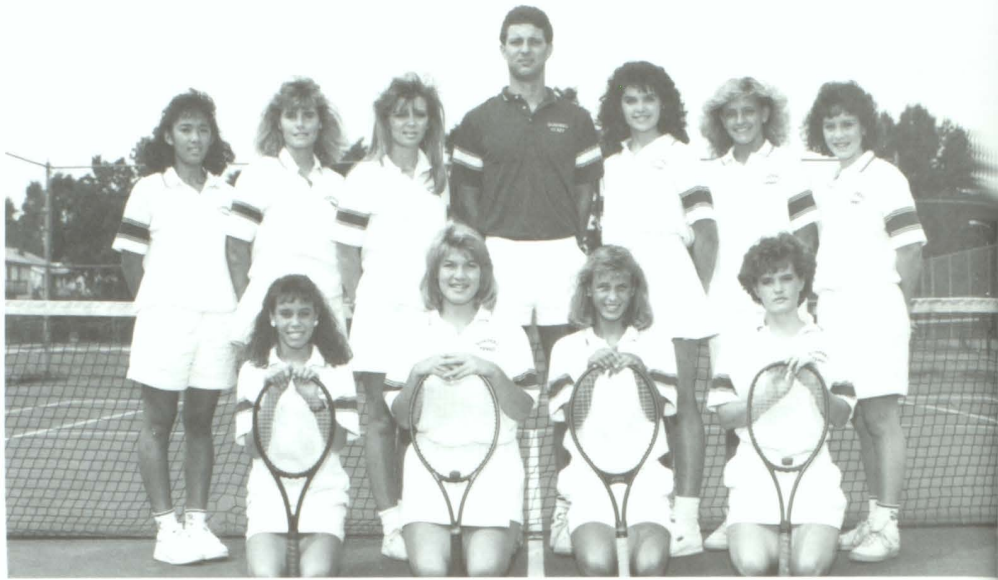
Girls Tennis Has An Enjoyable Season

Liza Elicanal was also voted MVP for the team and with good cause. Liza is an all around good athlete. Her sportsmanship and determination is unbeatable.

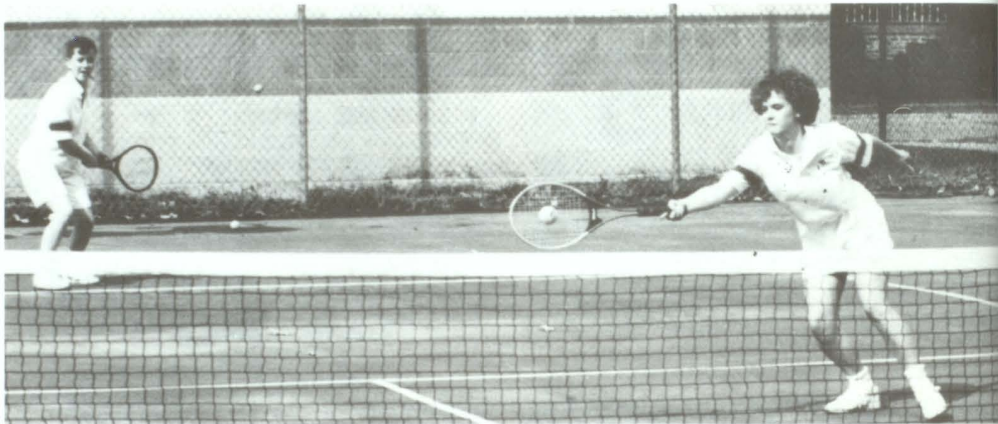

Varsity Basketball Rises Above

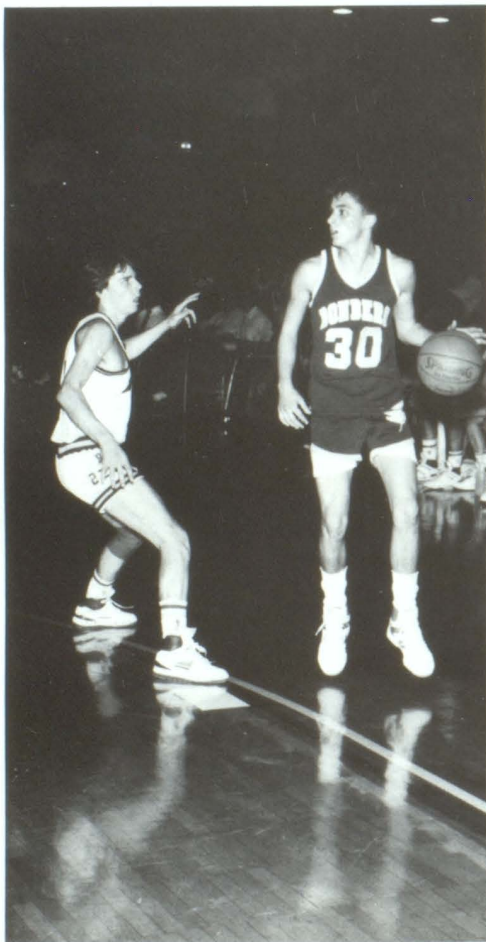

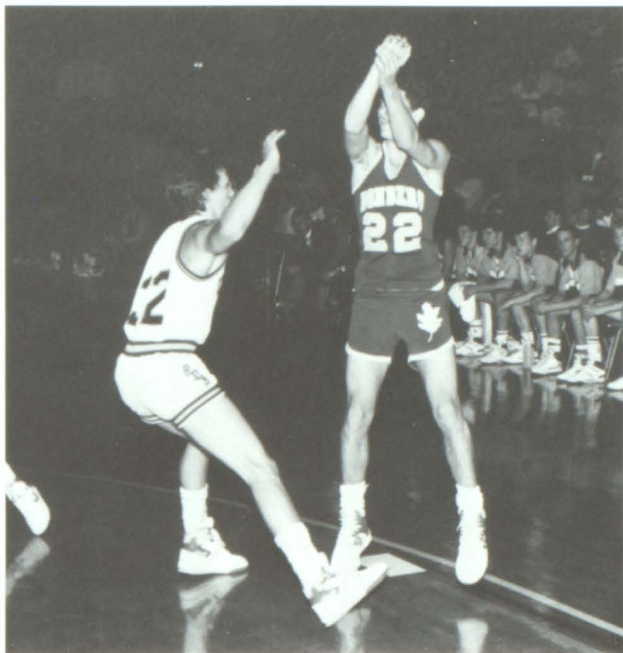

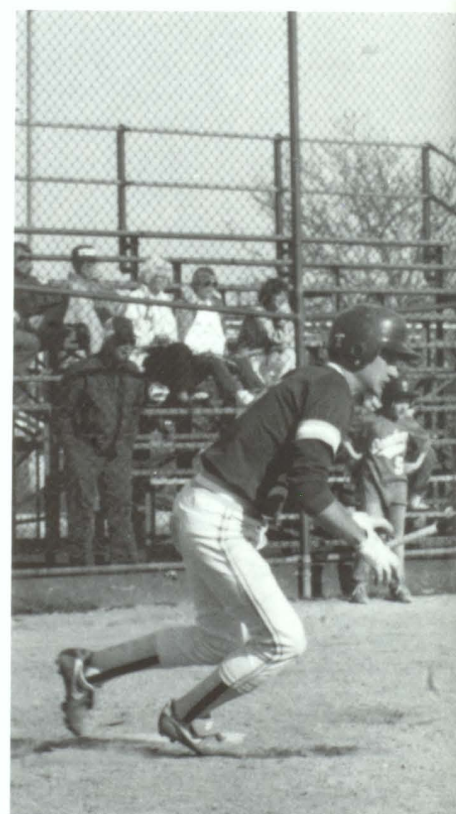

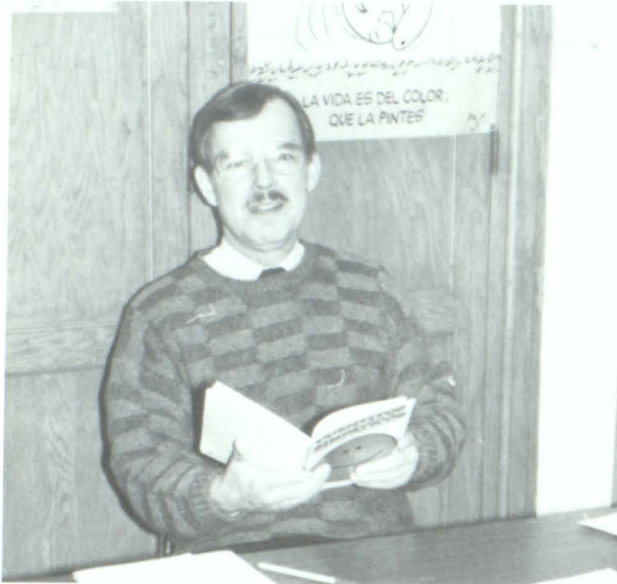


German Club is off to a good start this year. It consists of approximately 40 members and is probably one of the larger clubs in the school.

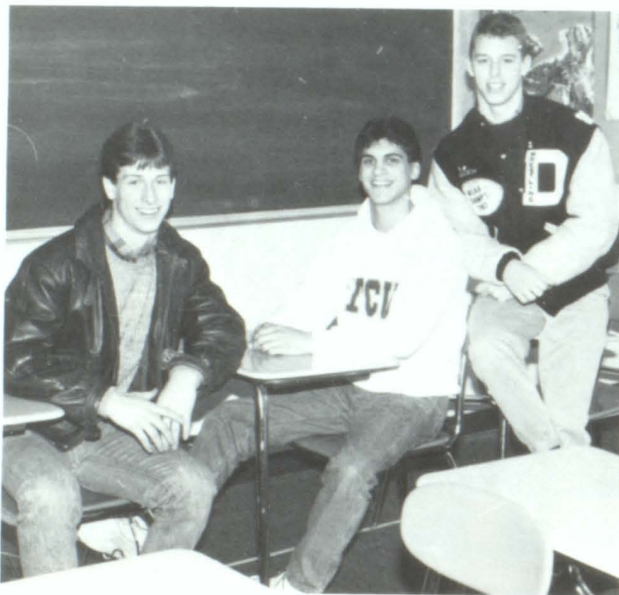

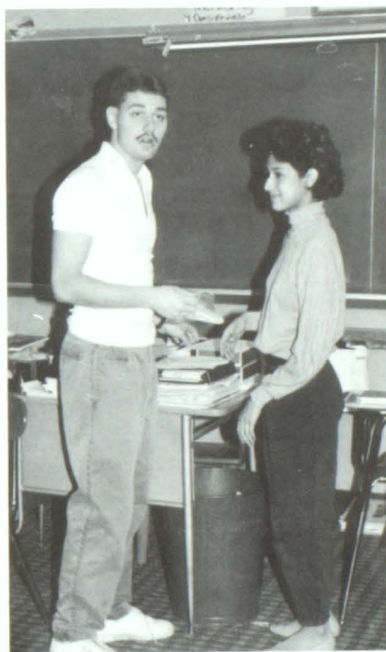
Every year each class elects four people they think would make good representatives in student senate. Such people go around to assigned homerooms and make announcements to keep the rest of us informed about what's going on.

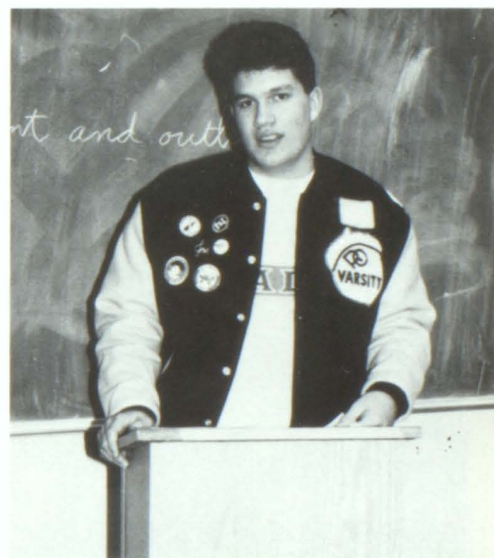

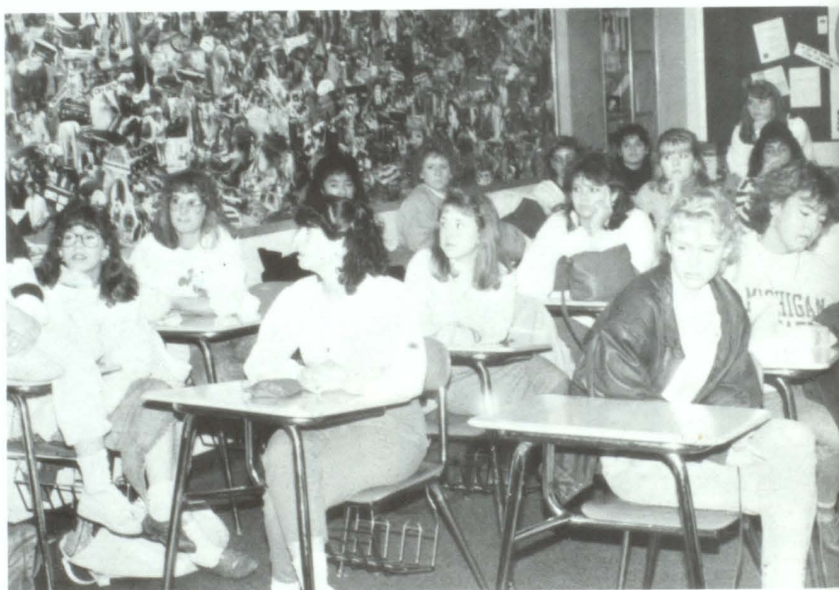

Science Club meets every other Friday at 7:45 and is open to any student, from freshmen to senior. Remember, Don't be a geek, join the Science Club this week!!!



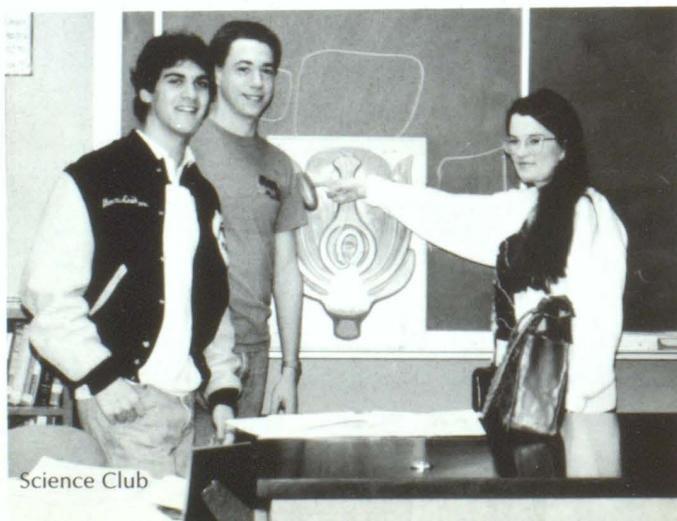

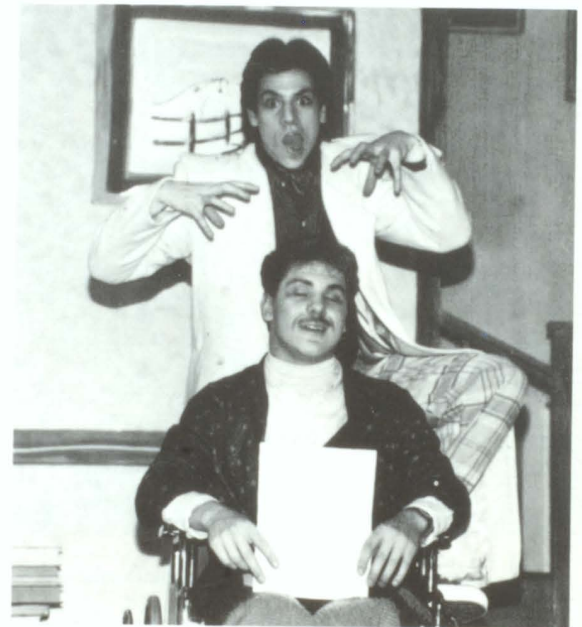

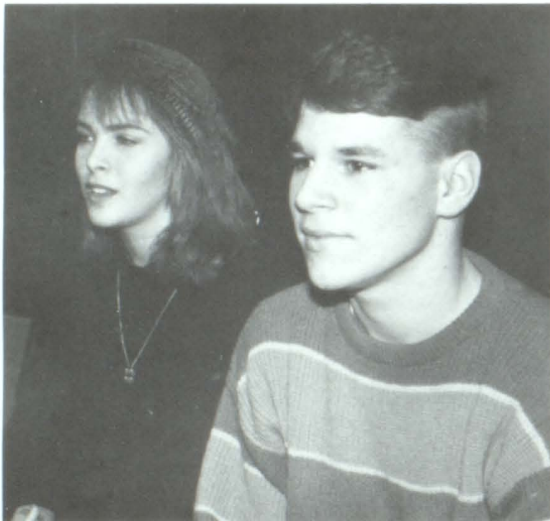

Next we have P.E. (physical education) again you must have at least one year to graduate. You can also take weight and Body or Aerobics to also count as a gym credit.

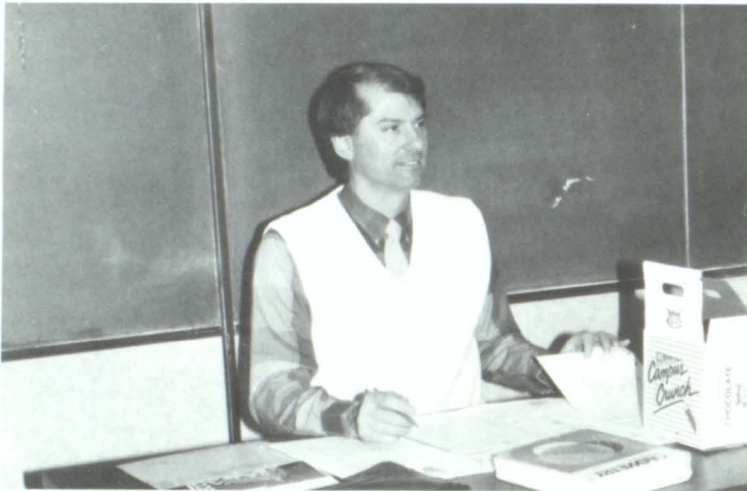

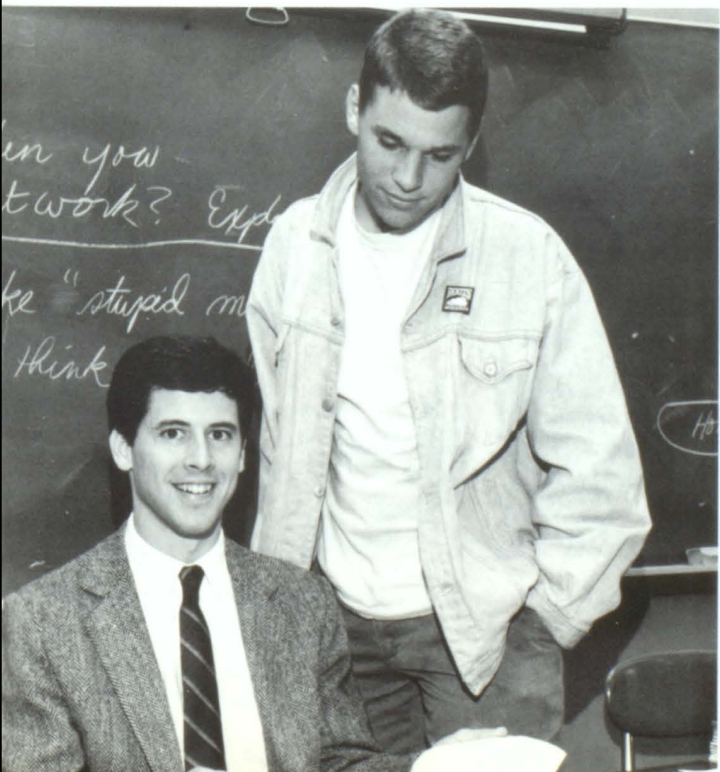
