
INTENSITY HOLDS A TOUGH SEASON TOGETHER










FLIP FOR IT!





GIRLS VARSITY BASKETBALL



An exciting season is expected next year and we wish the OAKS good luck.





Coach Barich and Coach Boyd are looking forward to a more prosperous season next year, with the upcoming JV team.















German classes at Dondero are taught by Herr Price. Students may take up to four years of German. They learn about geography, culture, and the German way of life.




In the springtime the students travel to Oakland University for the annual foreign language festival. Dondero's Spanish classes are interesting and educational. One class you don't want to miss.






HOLA! SPANISH CLUB


THE BOYS' FORESTRY CLUB STANDS PROUD








THE 1989 OAK STAFF






THE 1988-89 GENESIS STAFF

Drama Club





FRESHMAN CHOIR




MINI POP '88

MECHANICAL DRAWING


