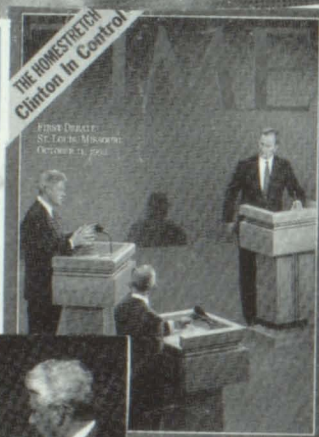
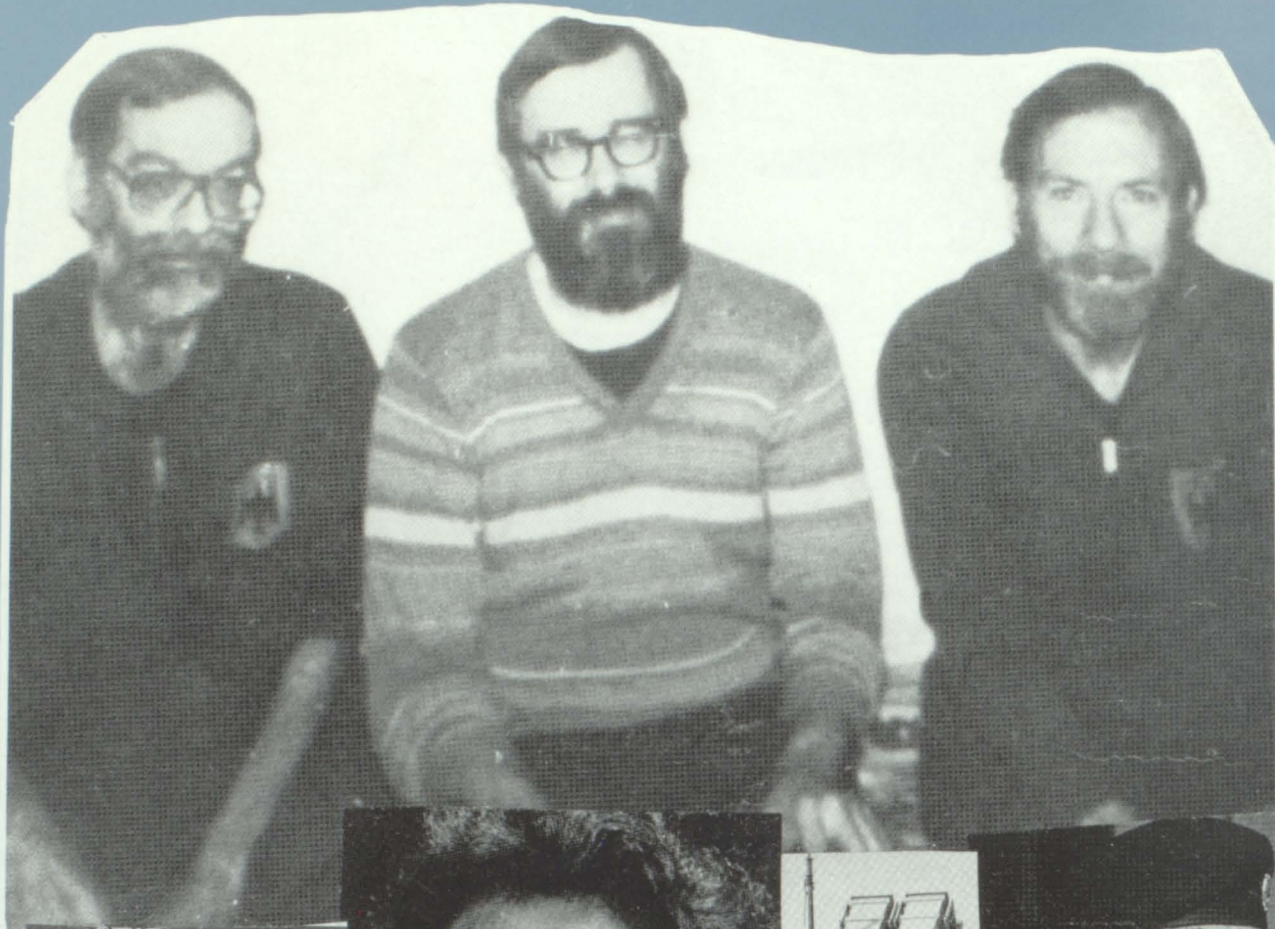
These past four years have been a memorable experience, learning about life's tasks and how to grow within ourselves.



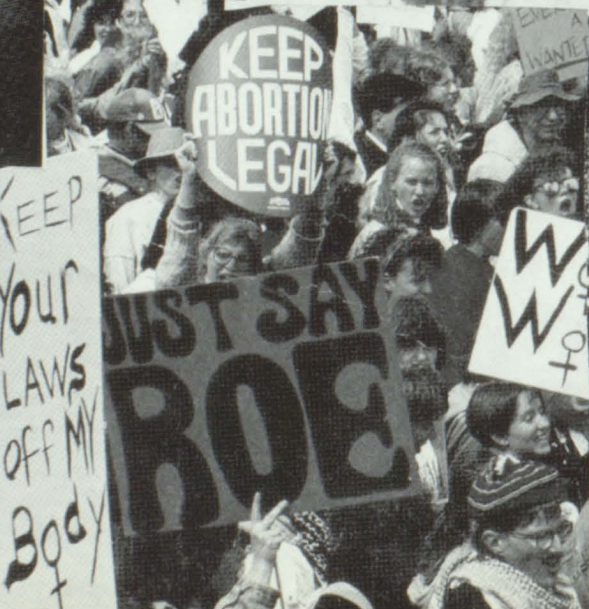

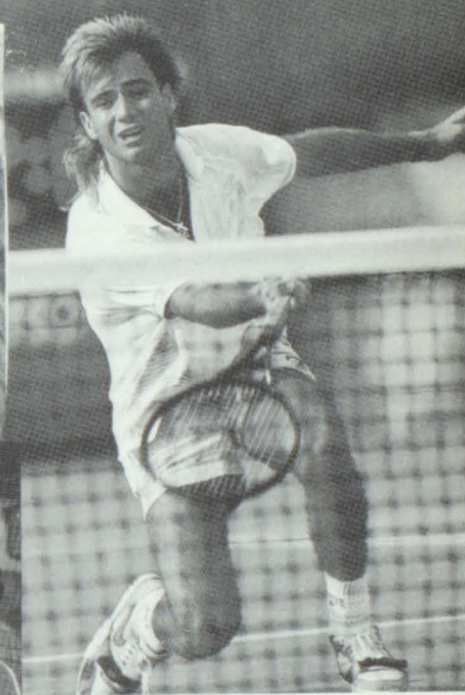
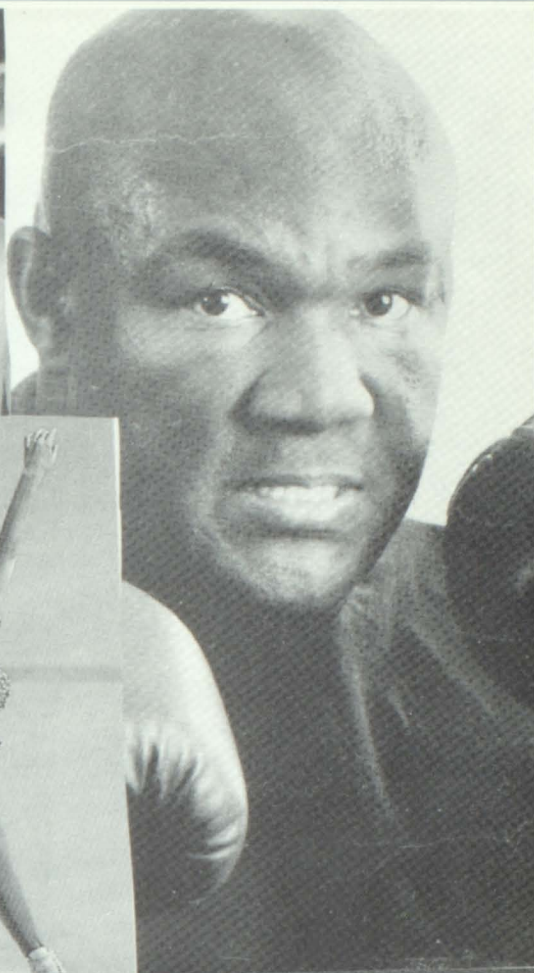
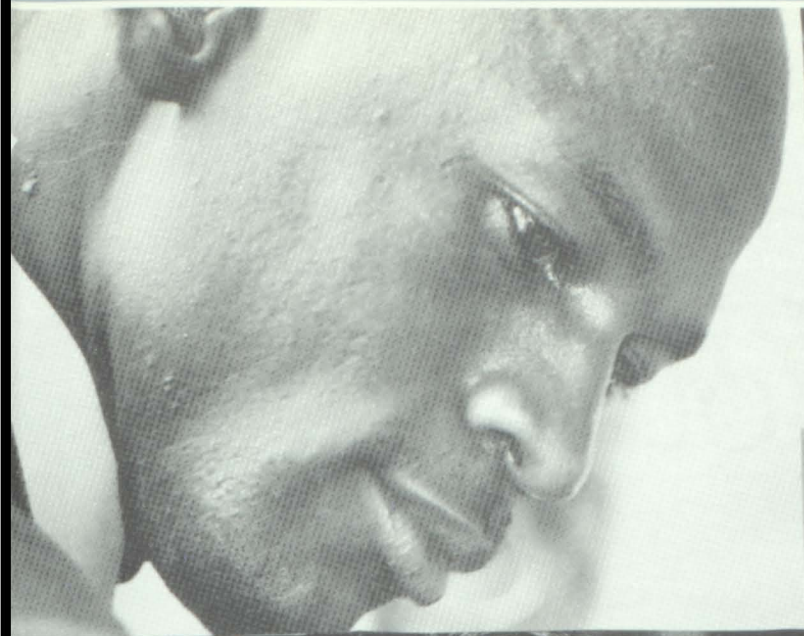
# A BATTLE JUST BEGUN

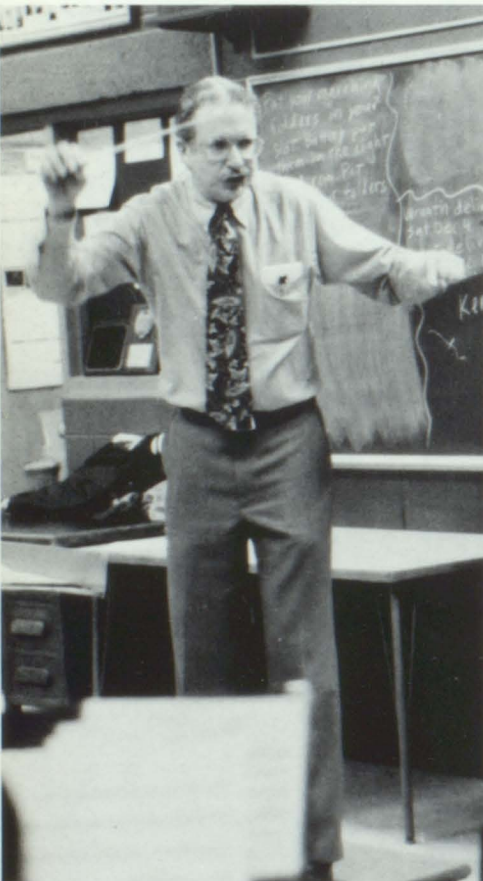
# Remembering the Sounds of Symphony Band

The symphony consisted of about fifty students. It is a variety of students, some are in marching band. They meet everyday in first hour. The symphony band is conducted by Mr. Perkins.

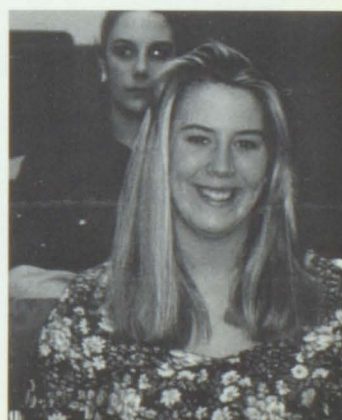
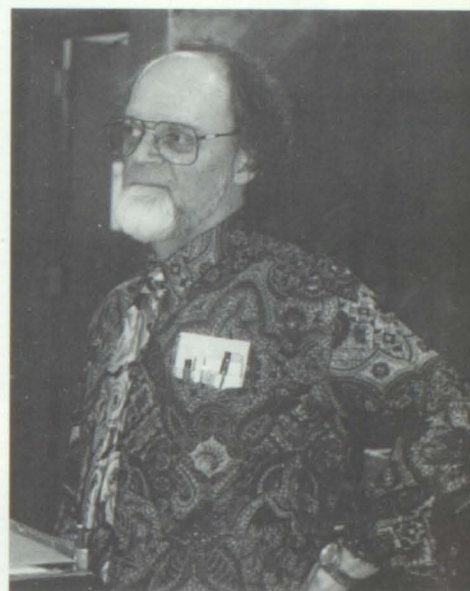
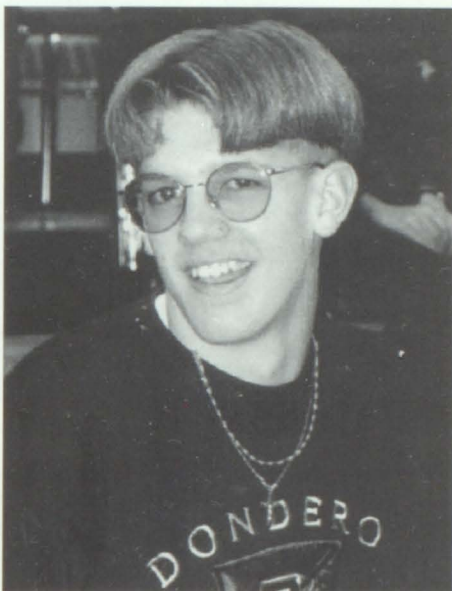
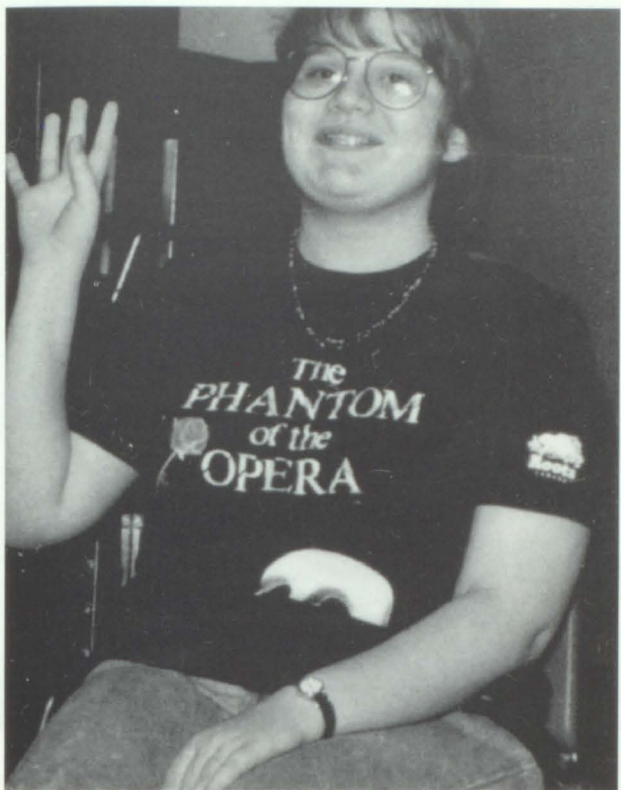

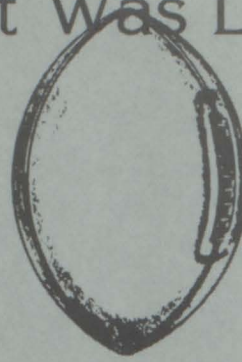


# That's The Way It Was Done

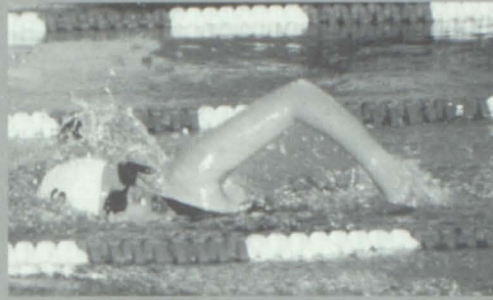


# This Is How We Splash

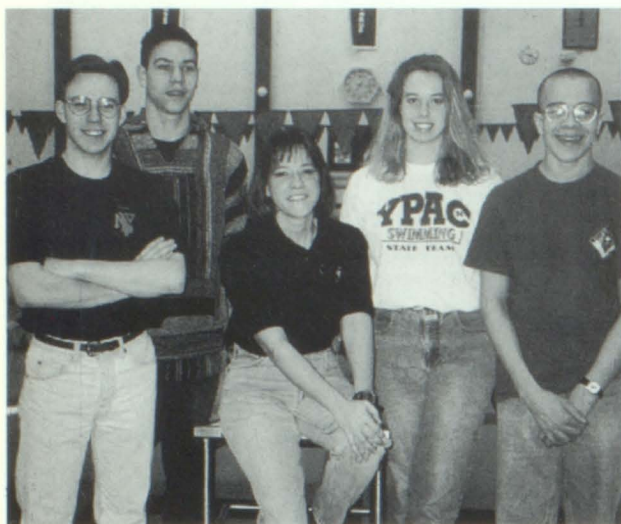








# Teacher's Have Another Life.

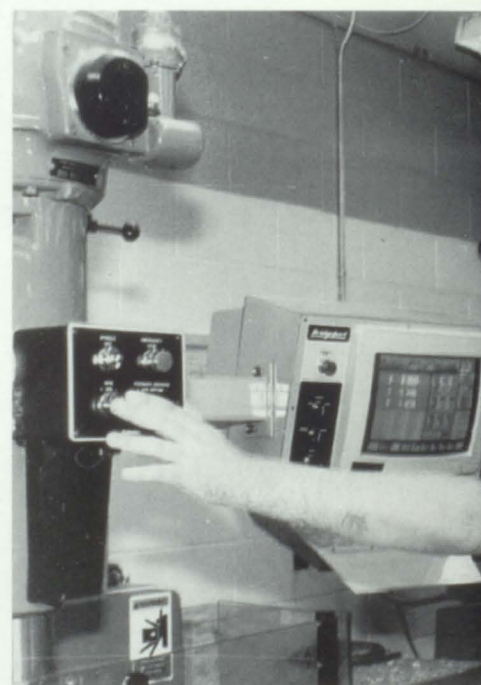

Andy Chapman is an "Outstanding Senior" in Business. Andy has outstanding people skills and marketing skills in a people oriented field.

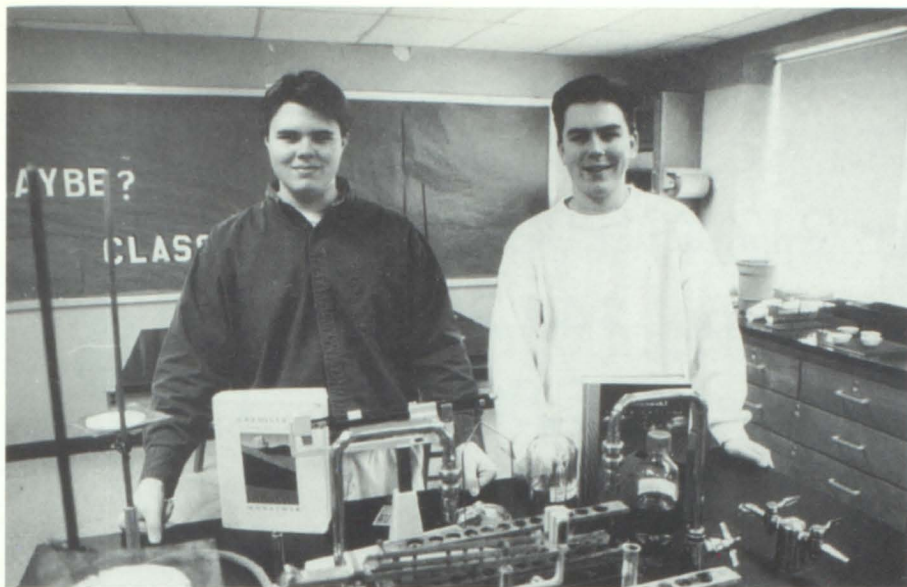
