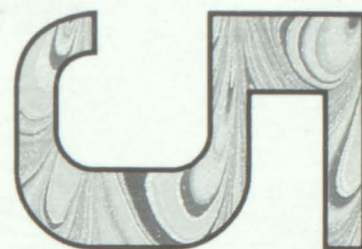

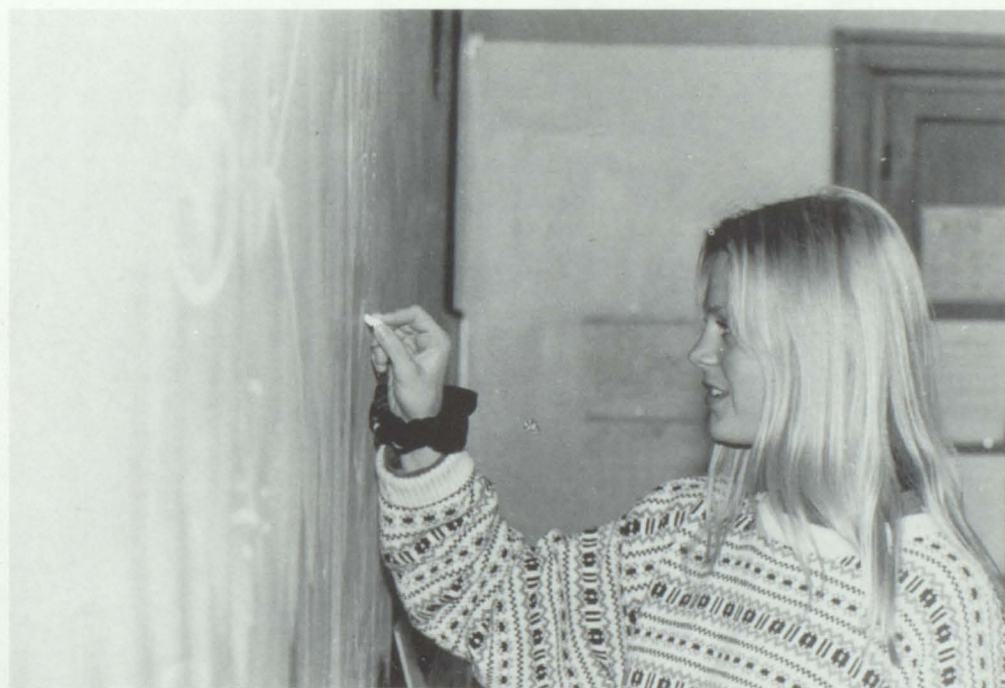

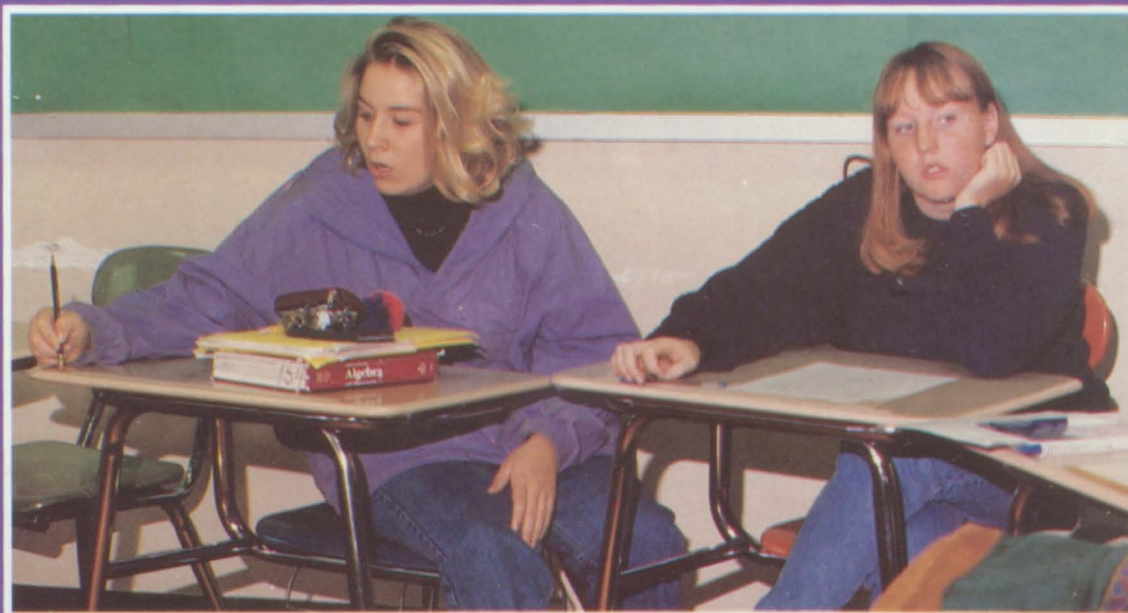

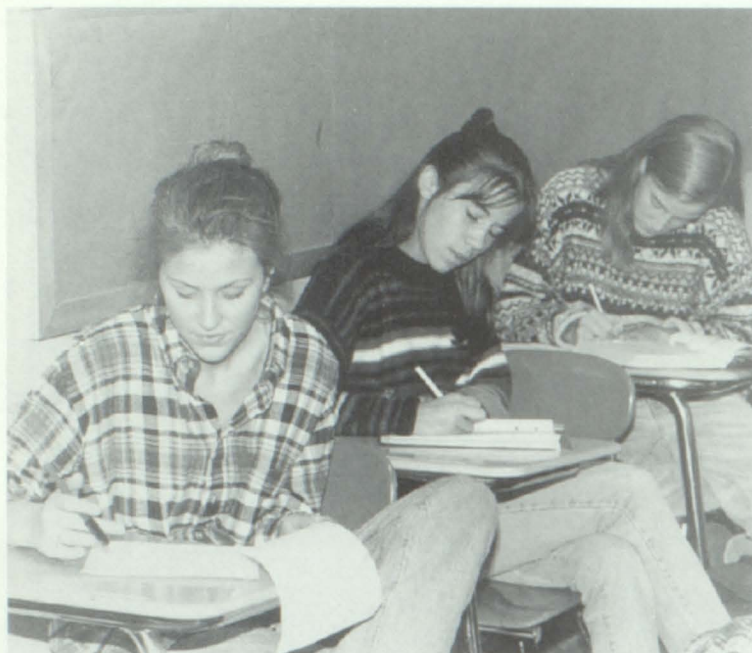

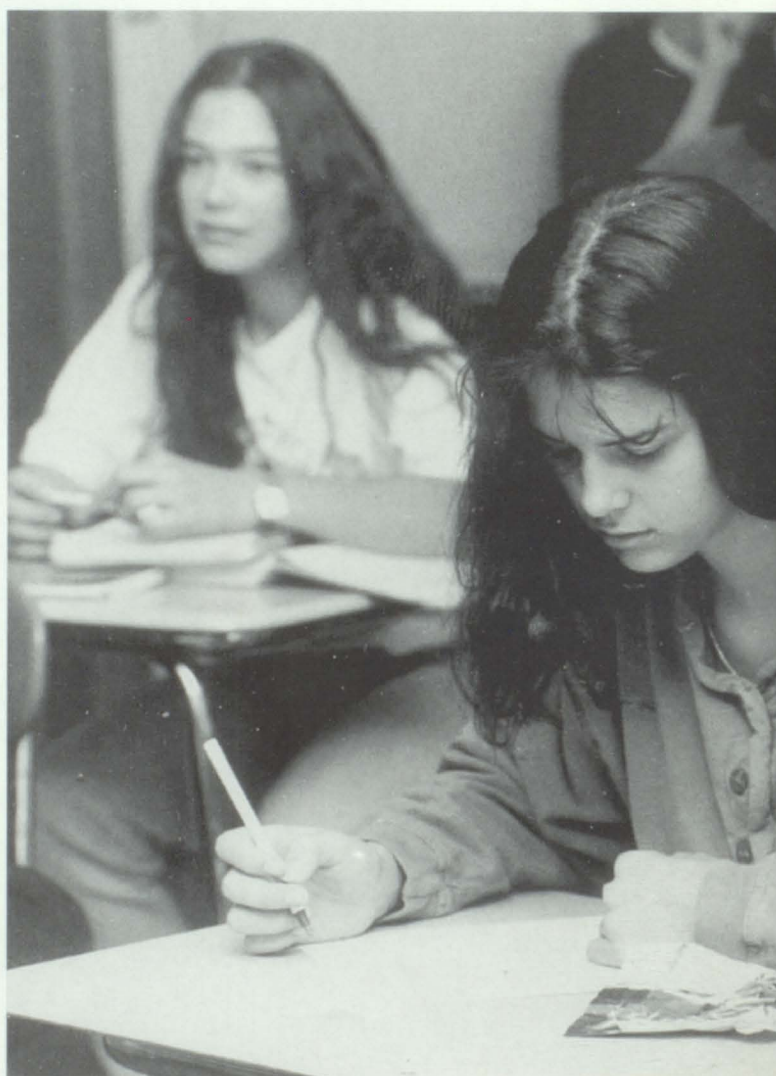

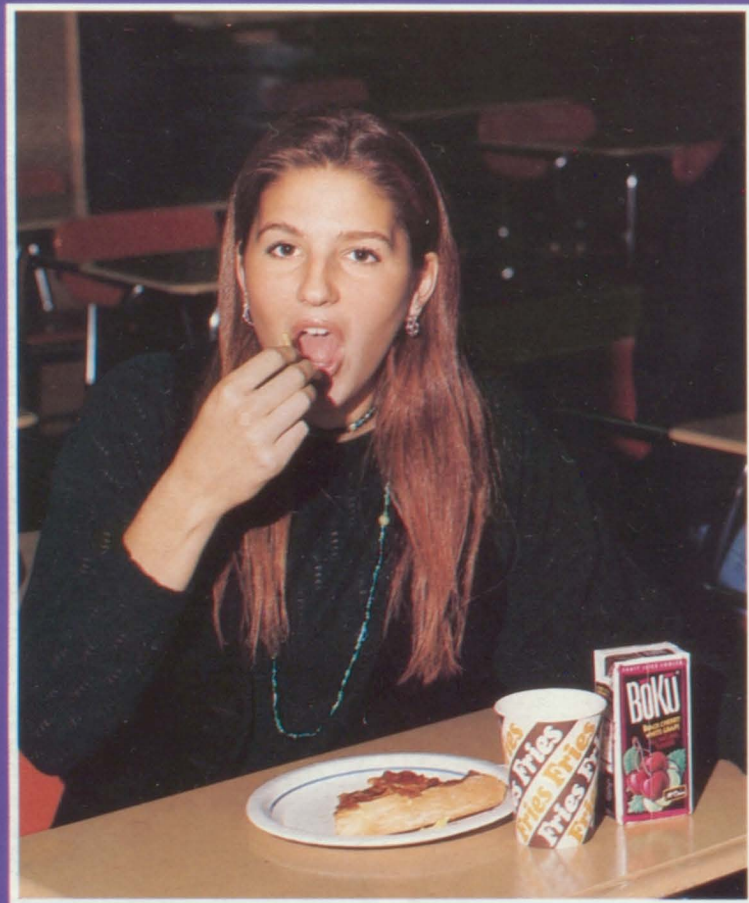

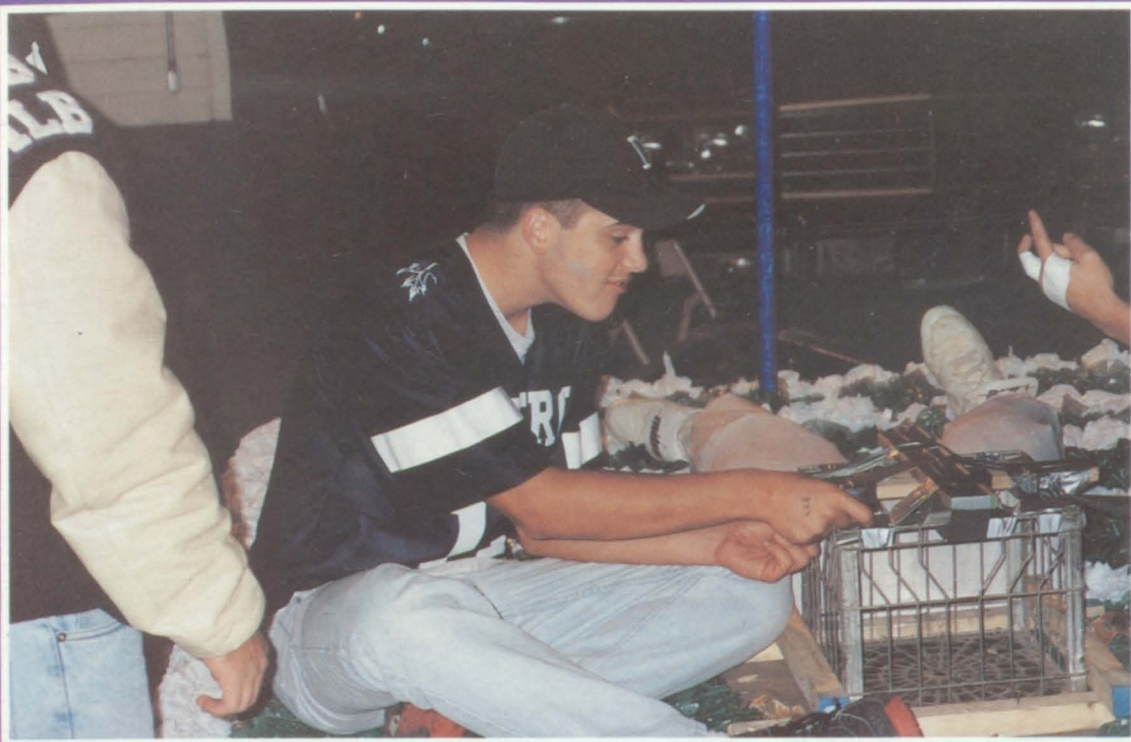

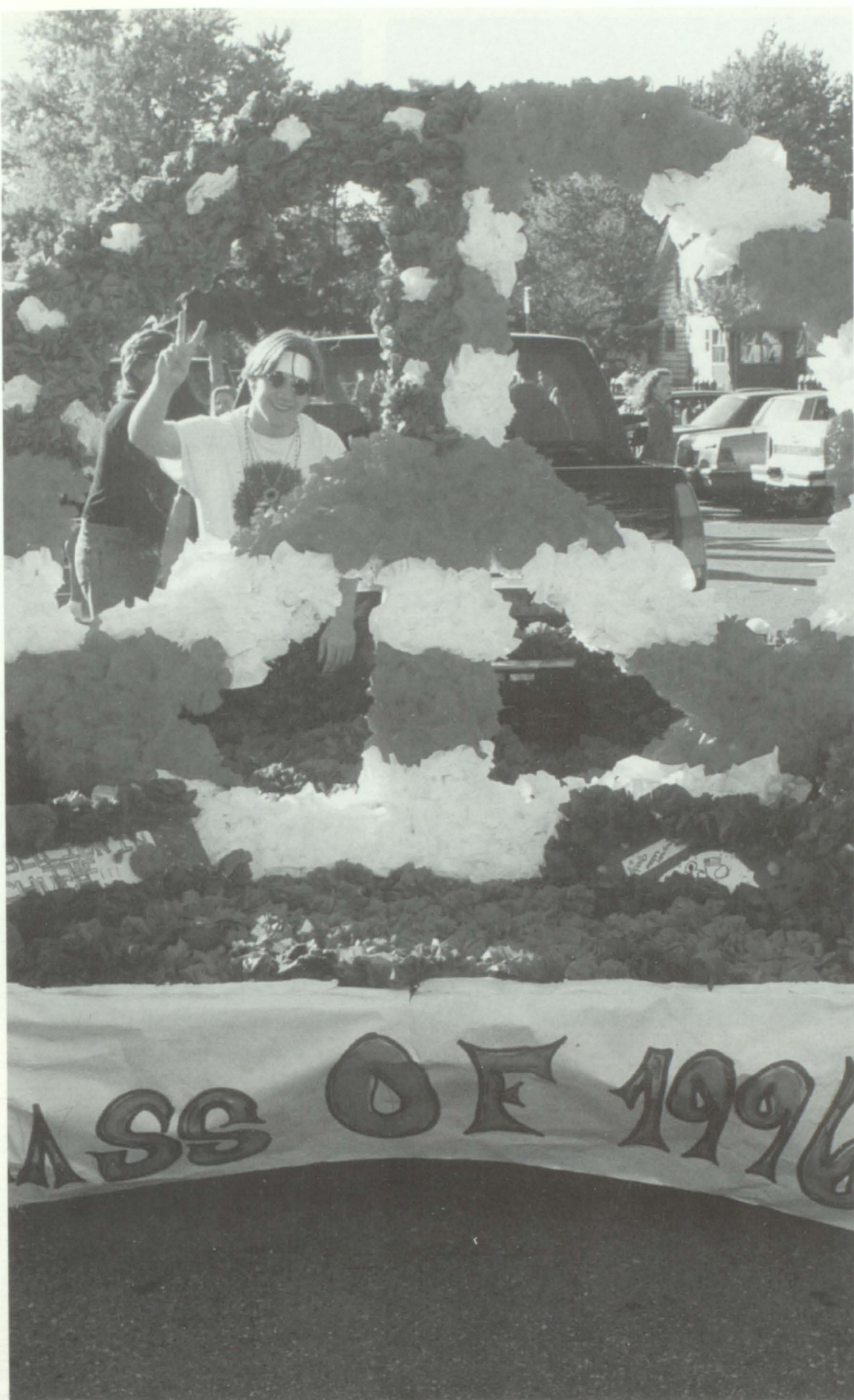

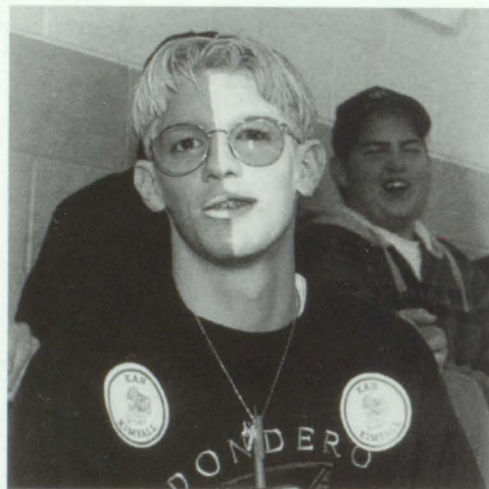

Ahead of our TIME

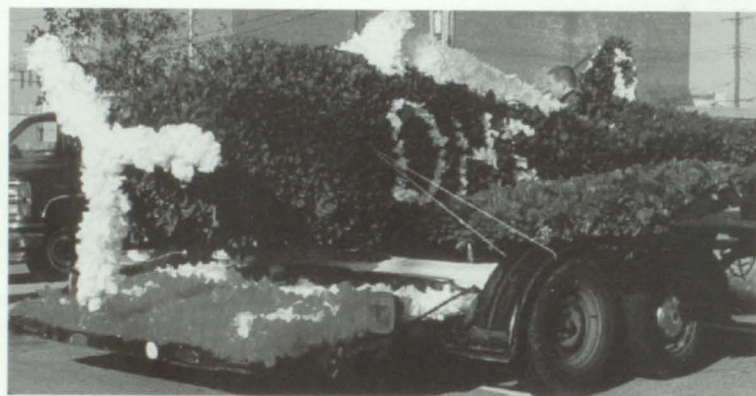

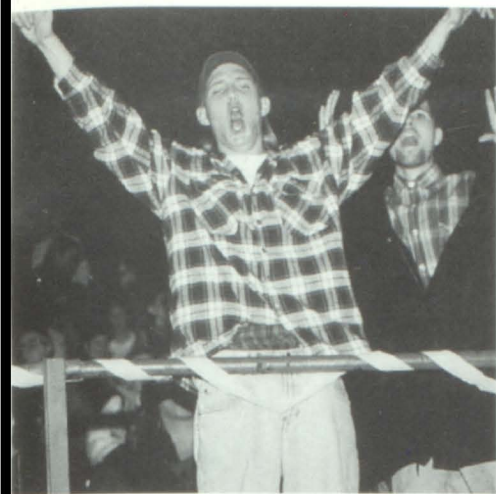

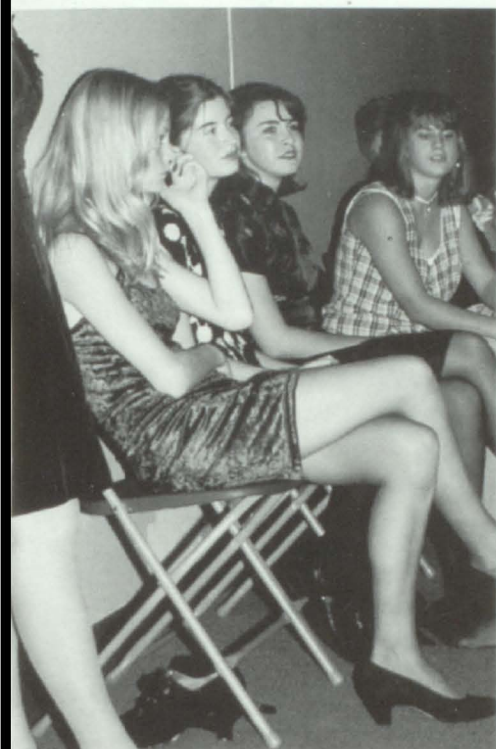

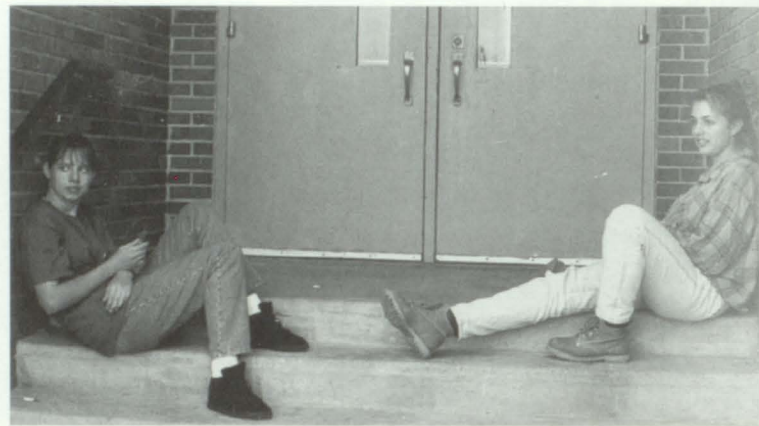


Naked Lunch

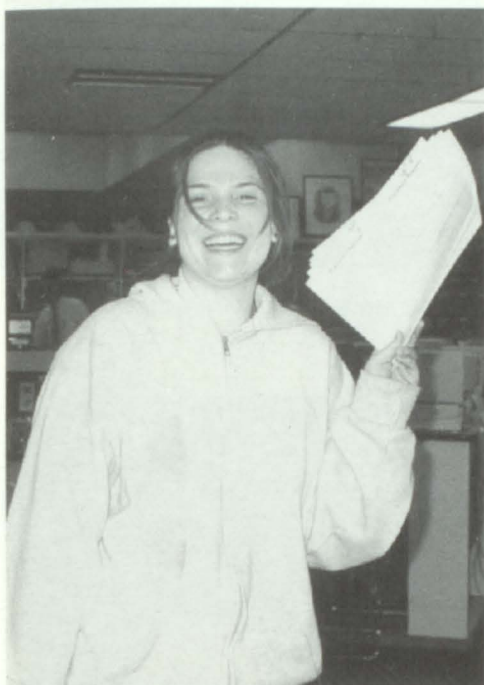

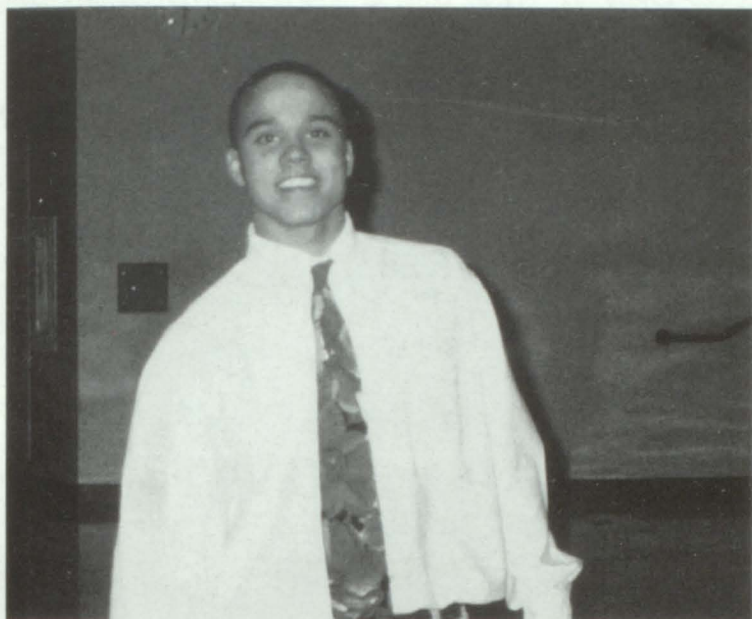

Dance Fever

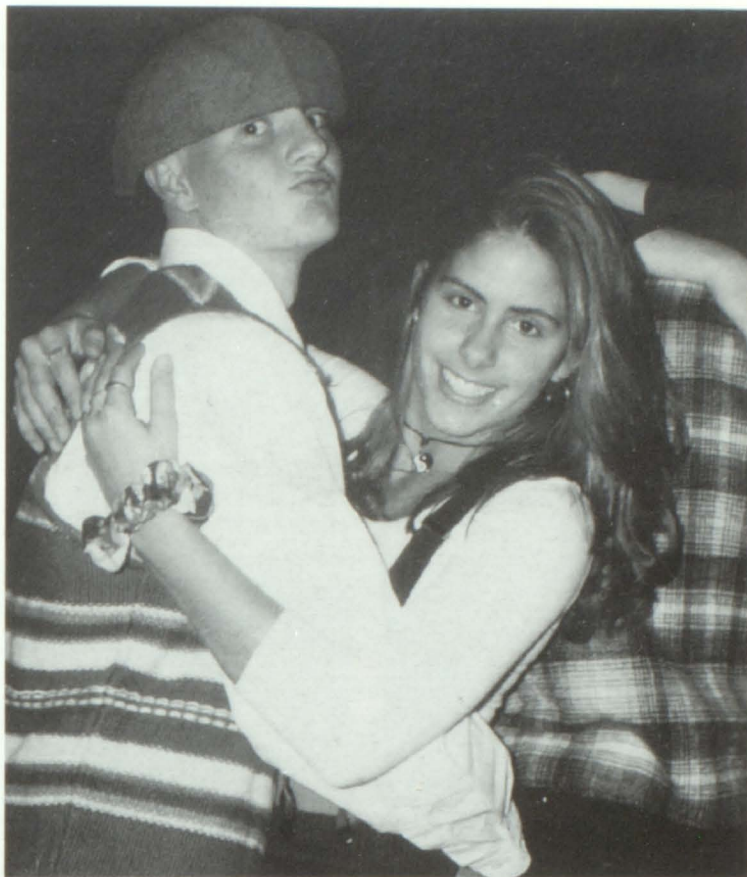

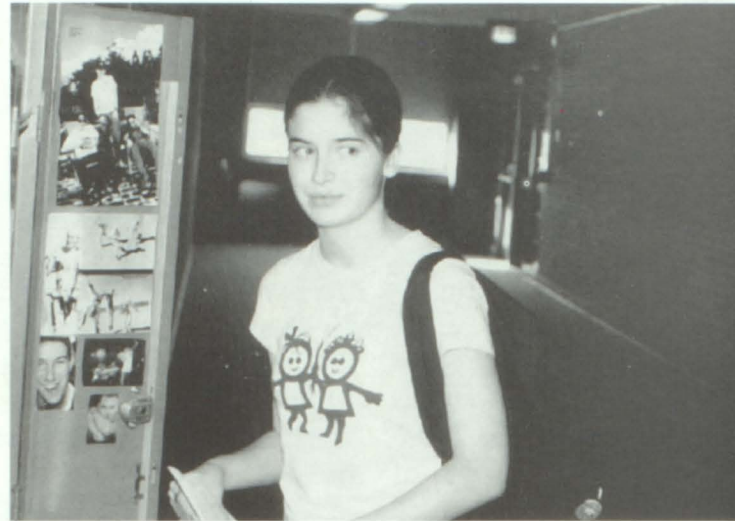
Pret a Porter

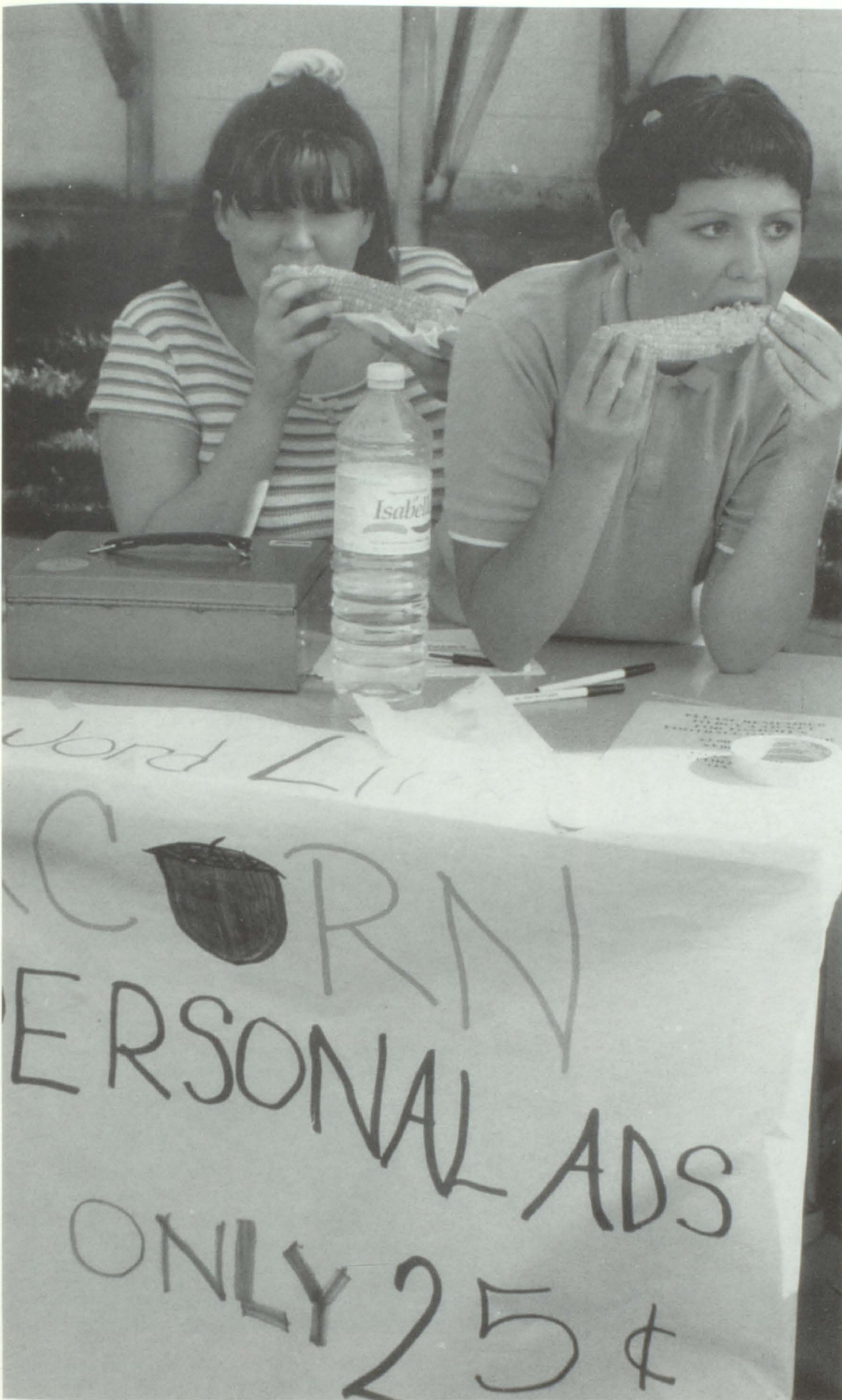

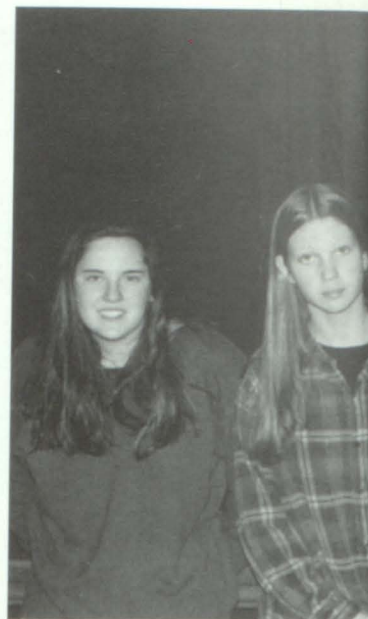

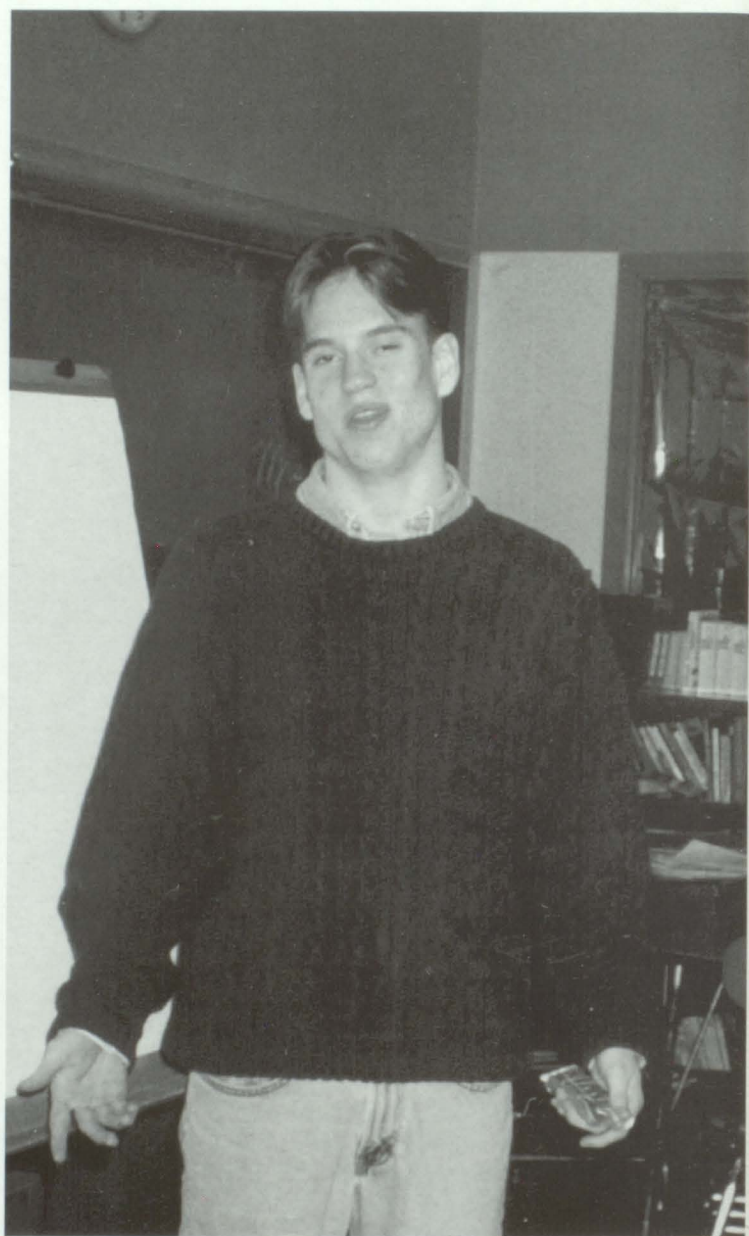

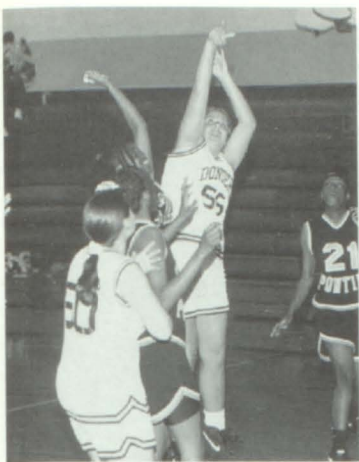

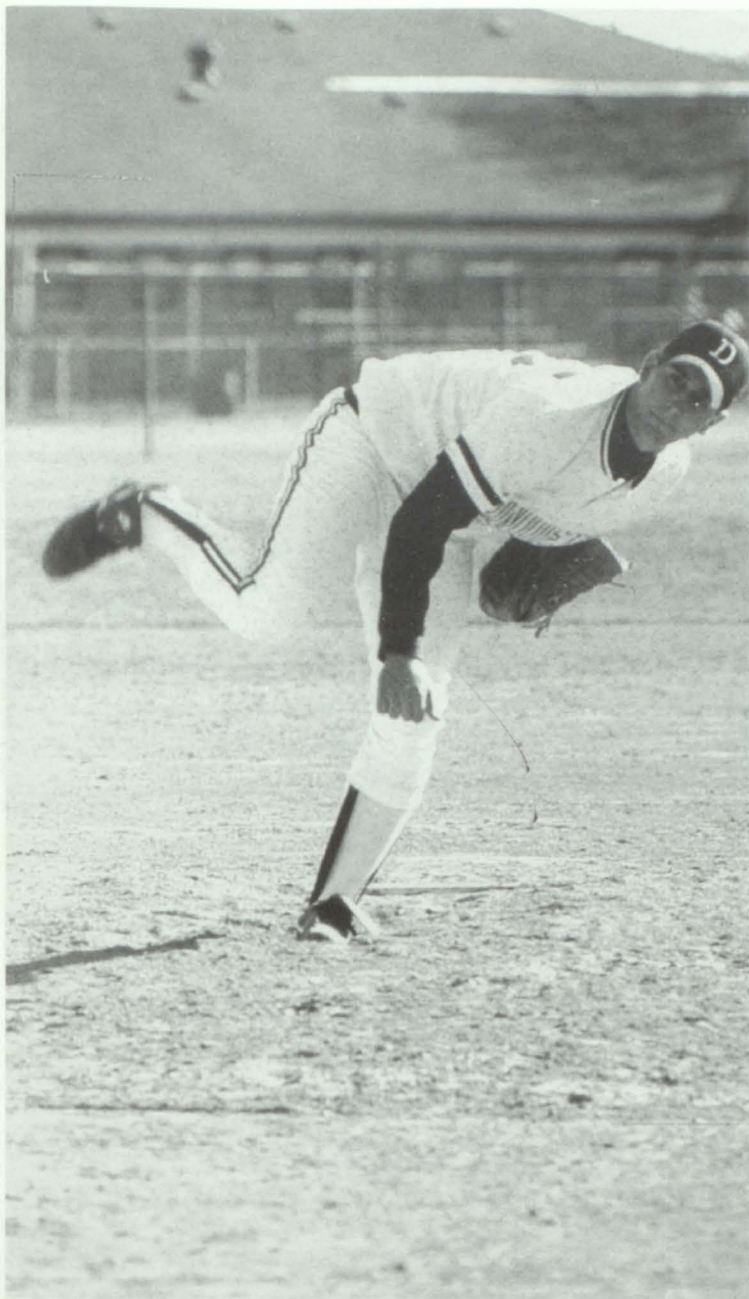

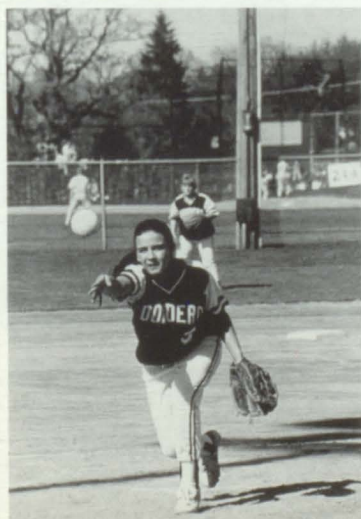

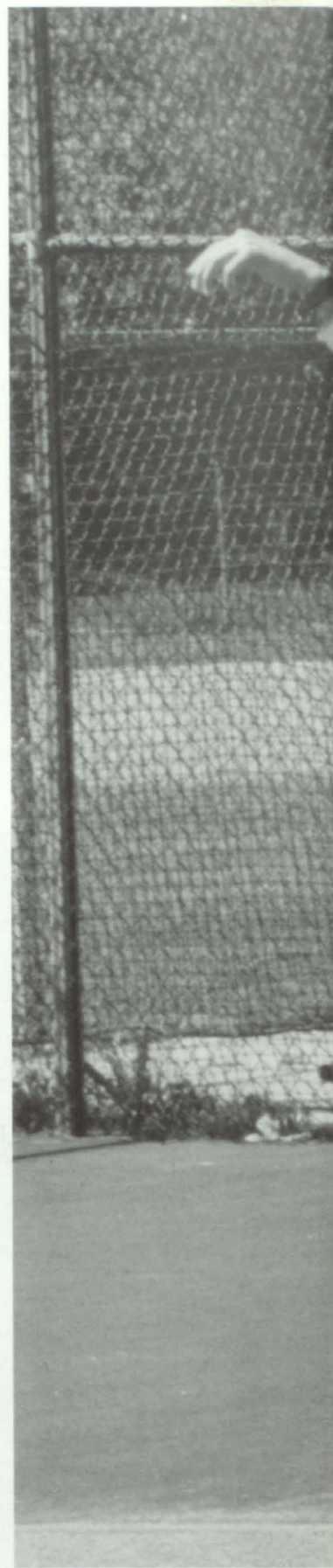

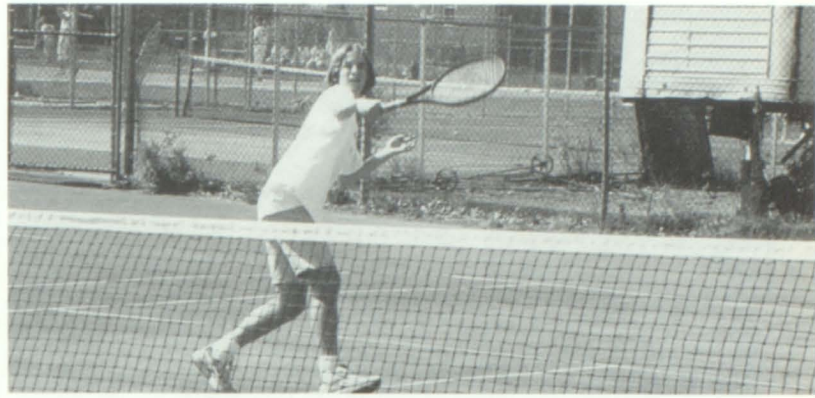

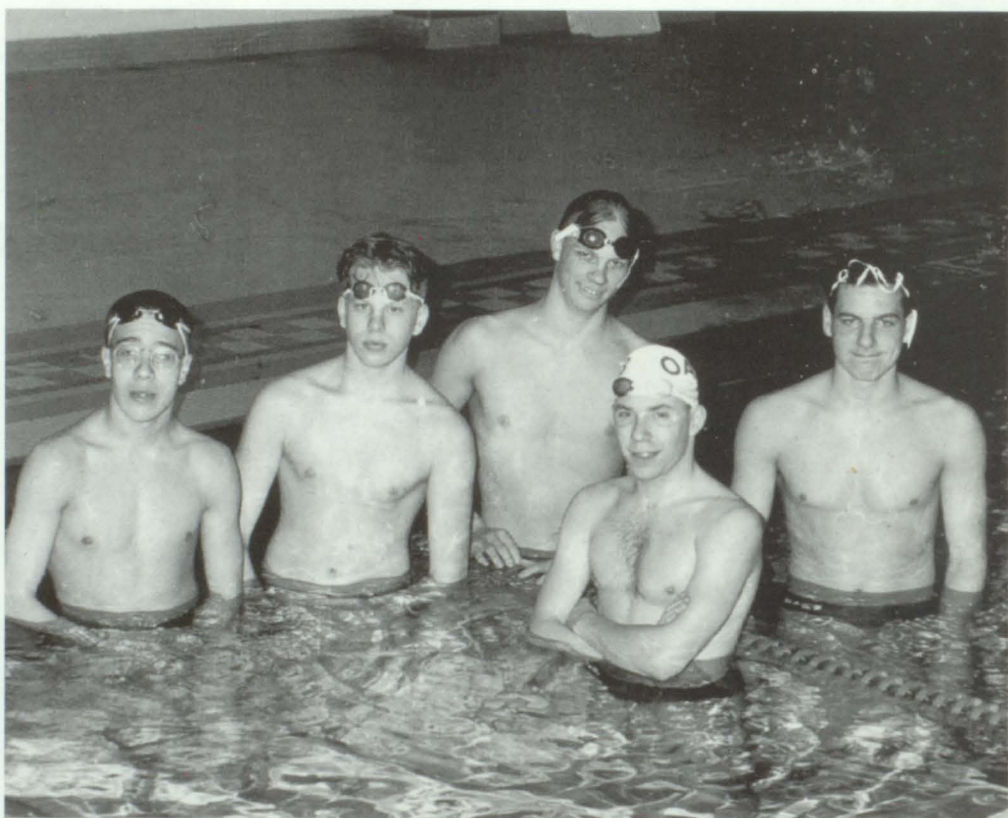

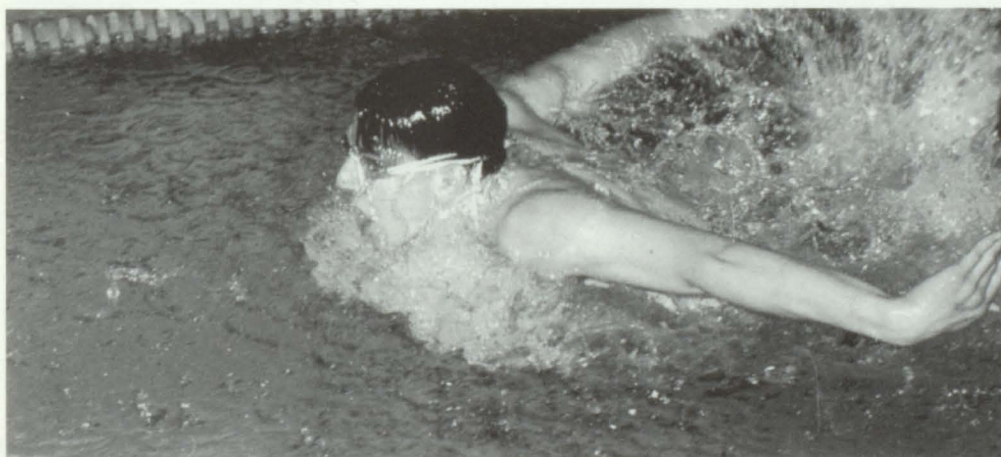

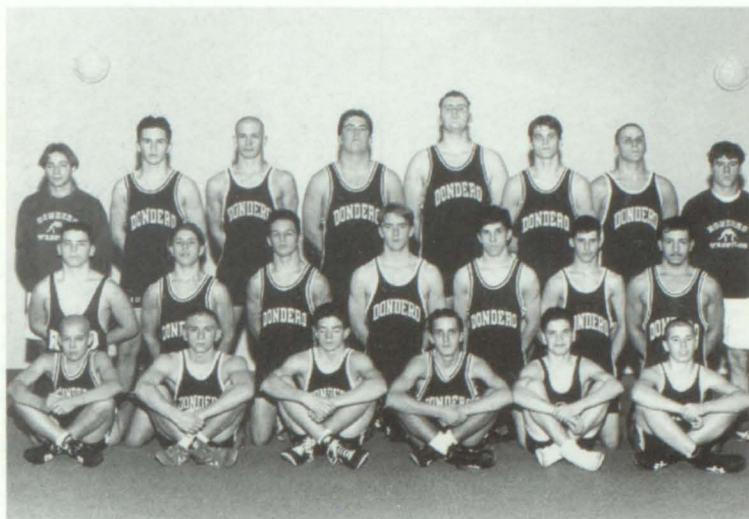

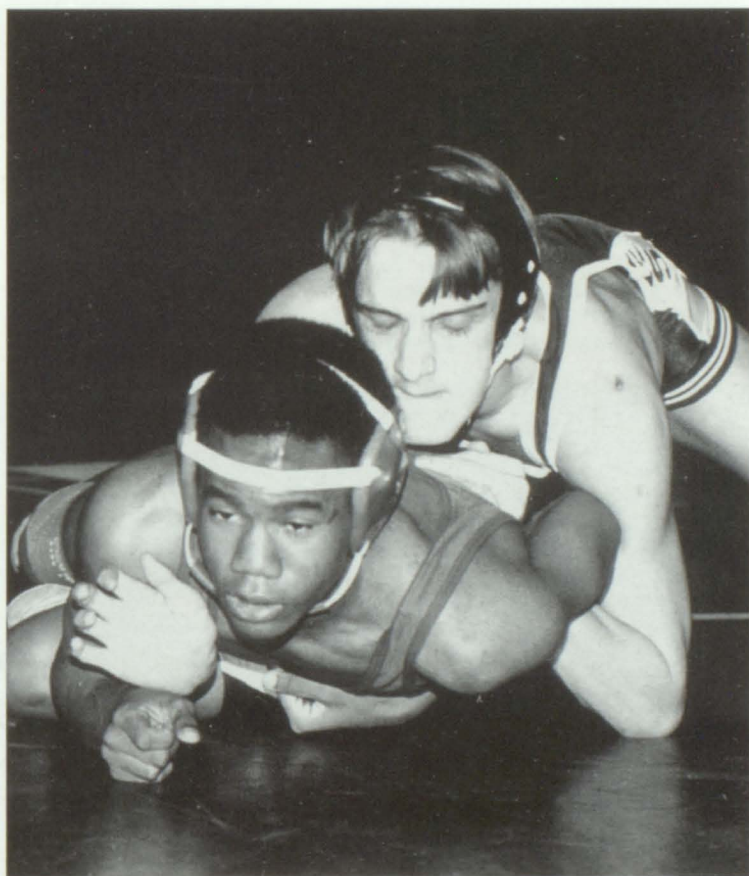

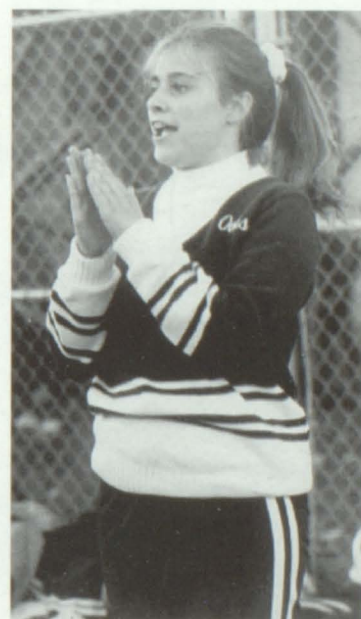

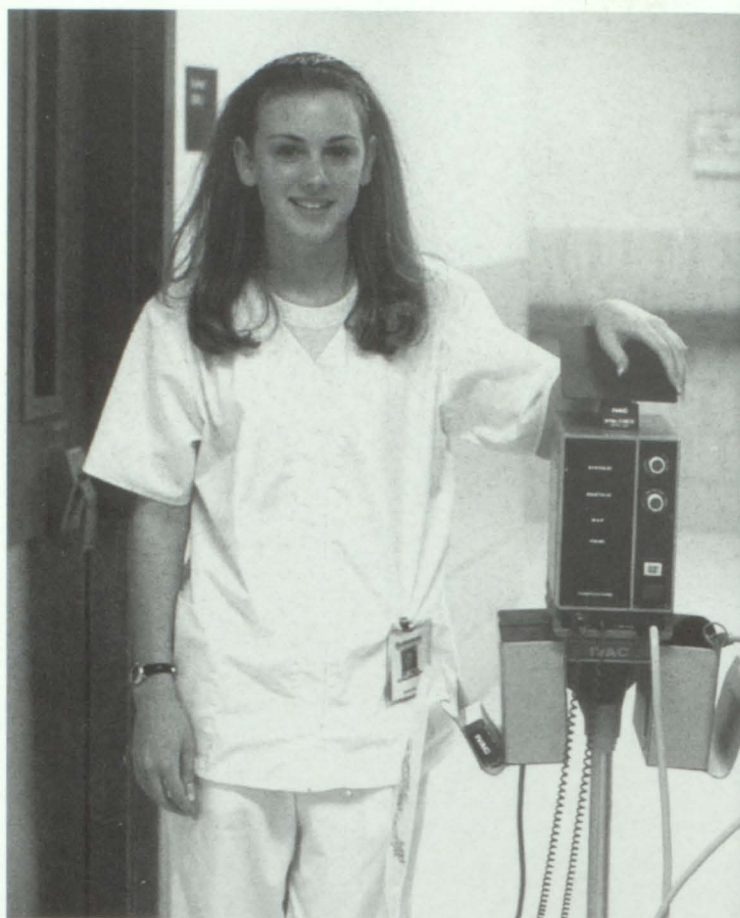

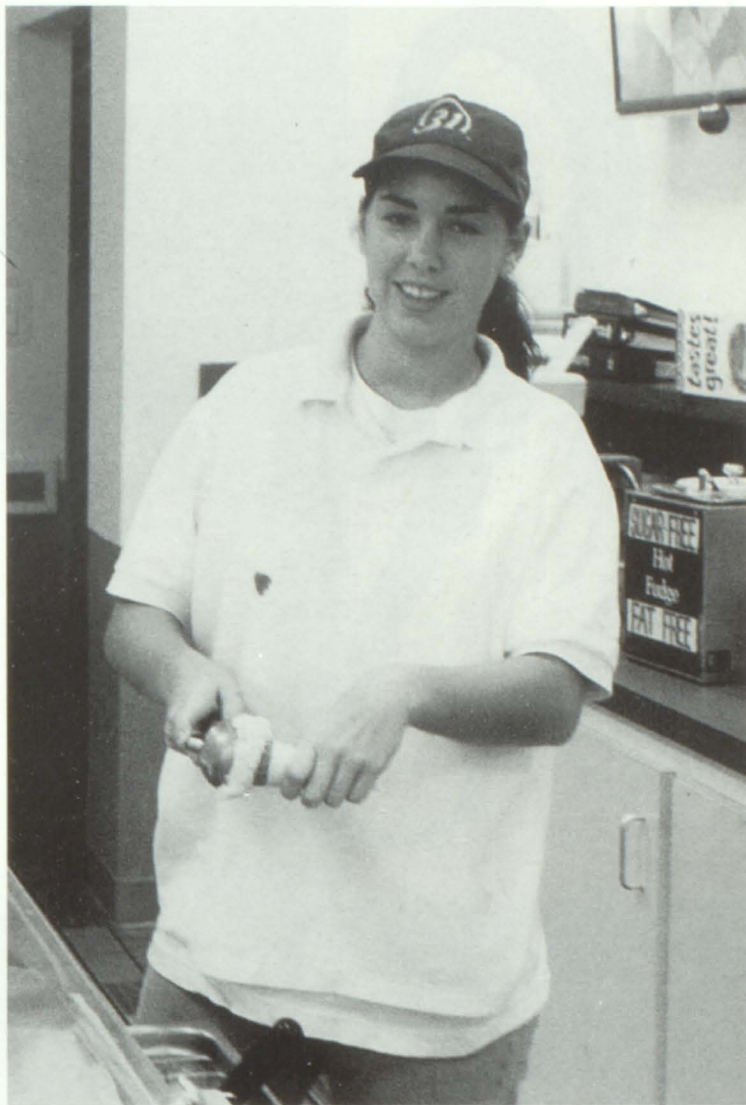

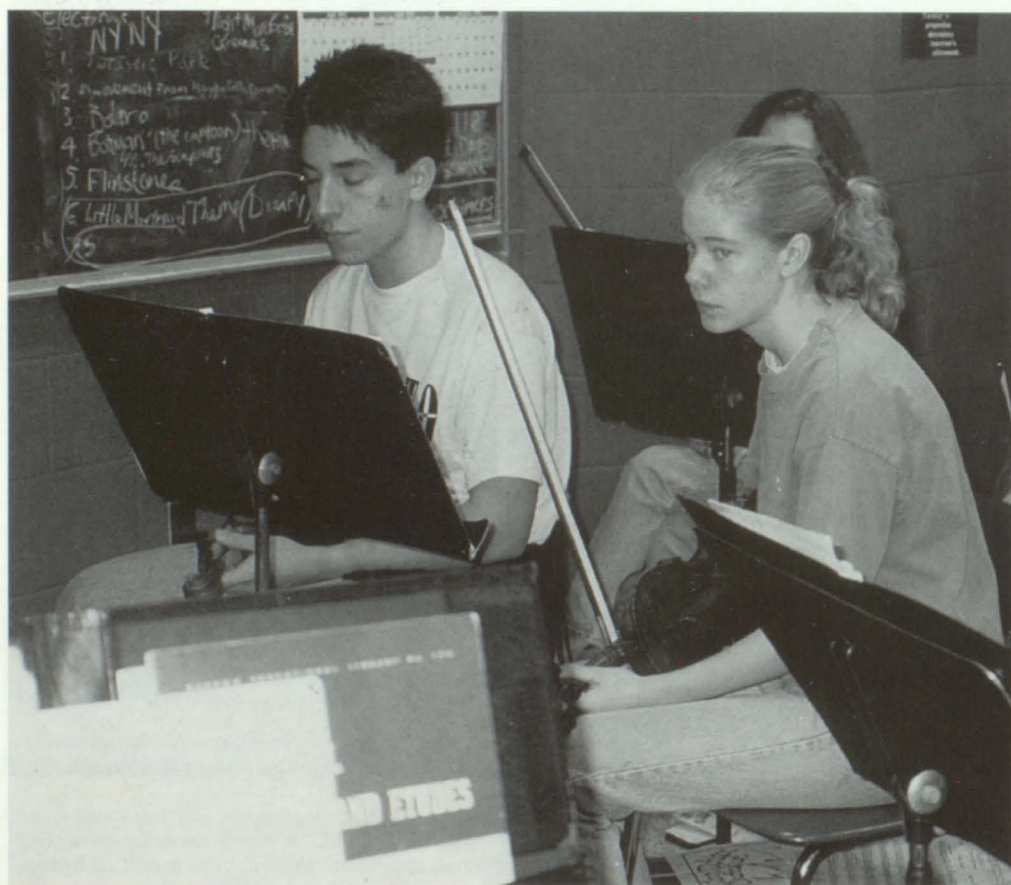
A Night at the Symphony

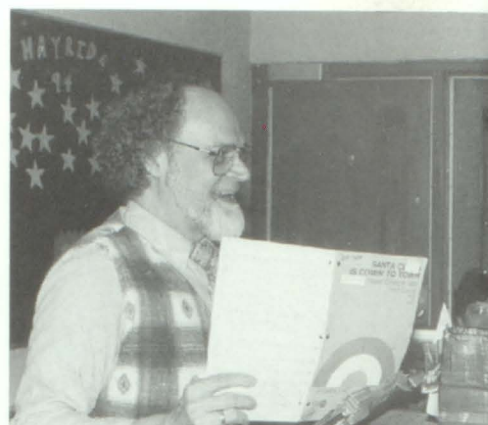

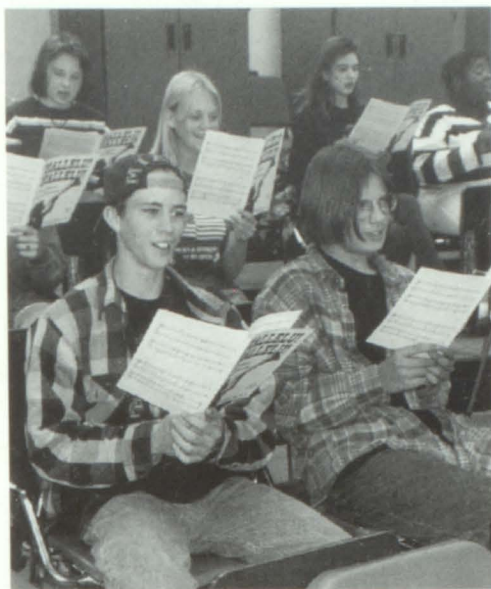

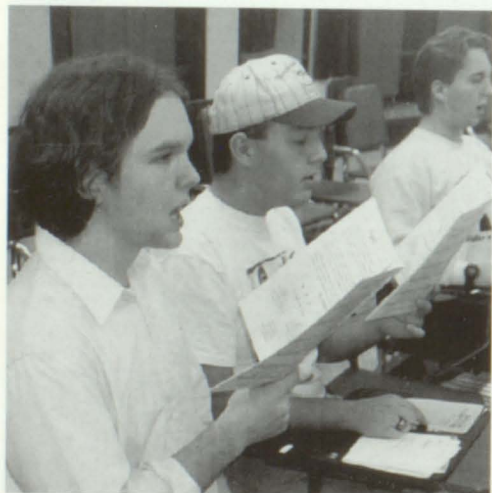

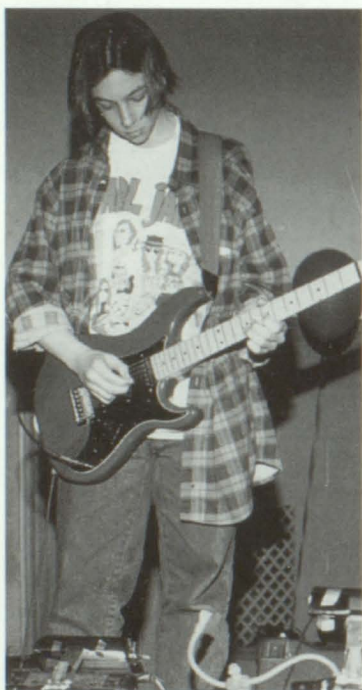
An Evening With The Stars

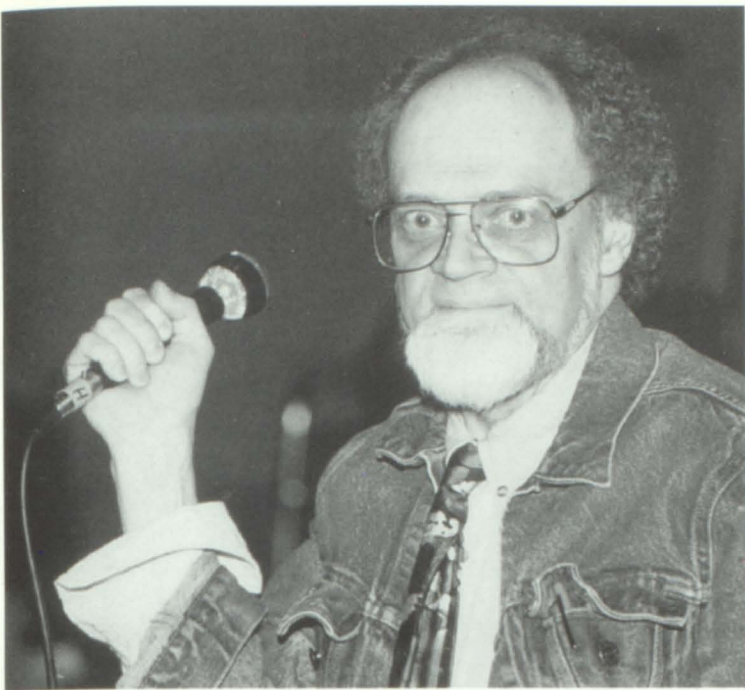

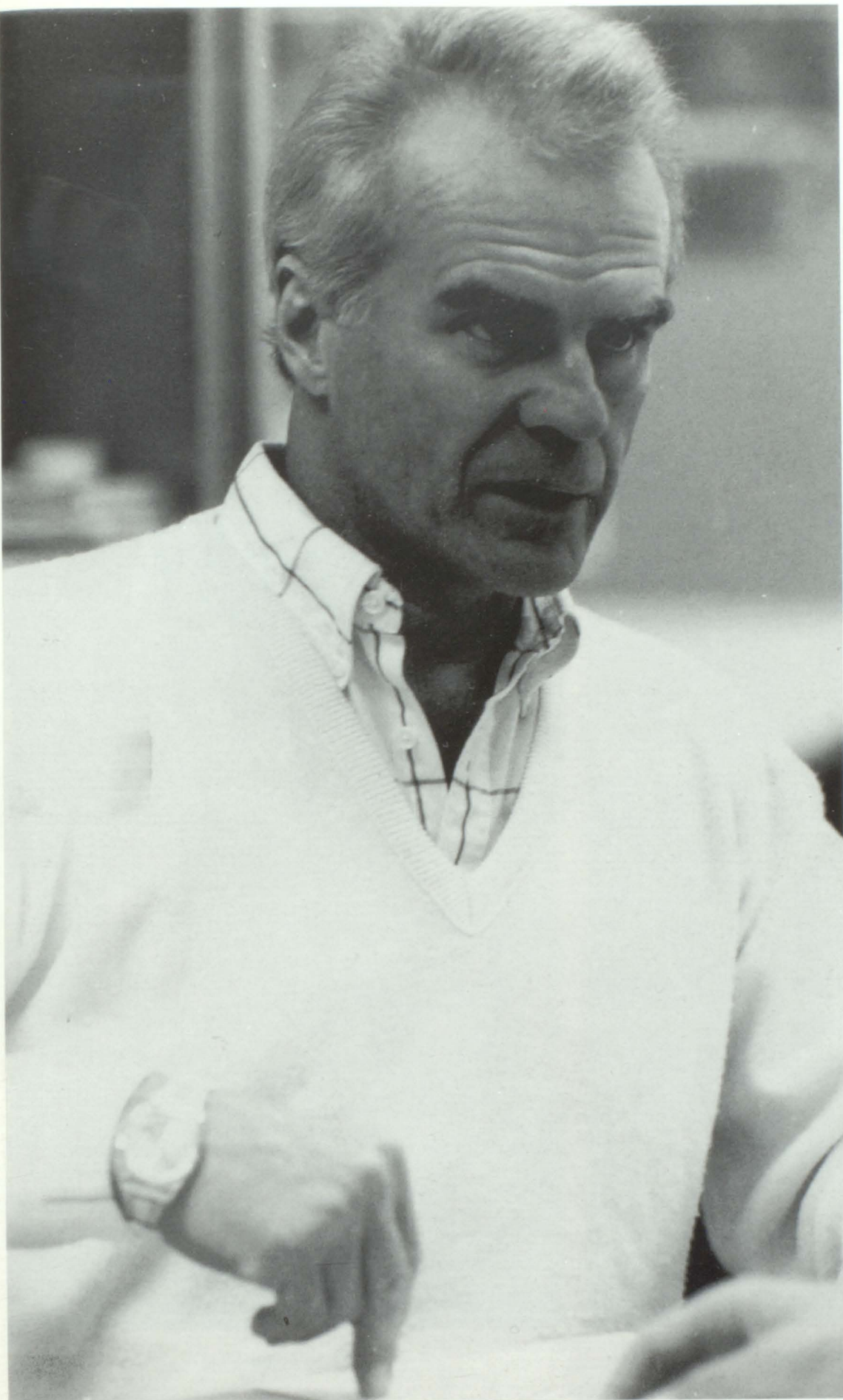

The Fashion Evolution

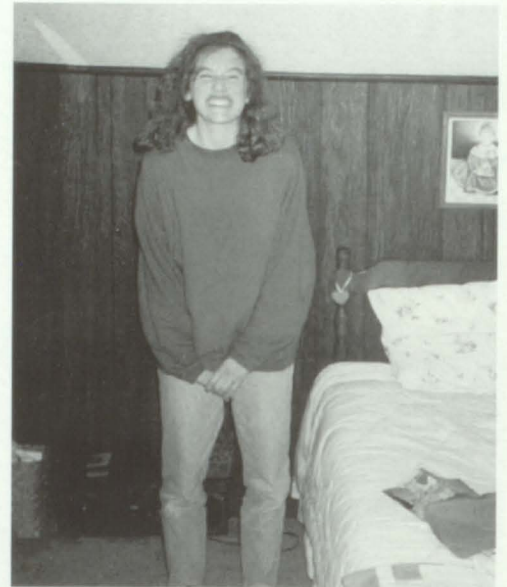
