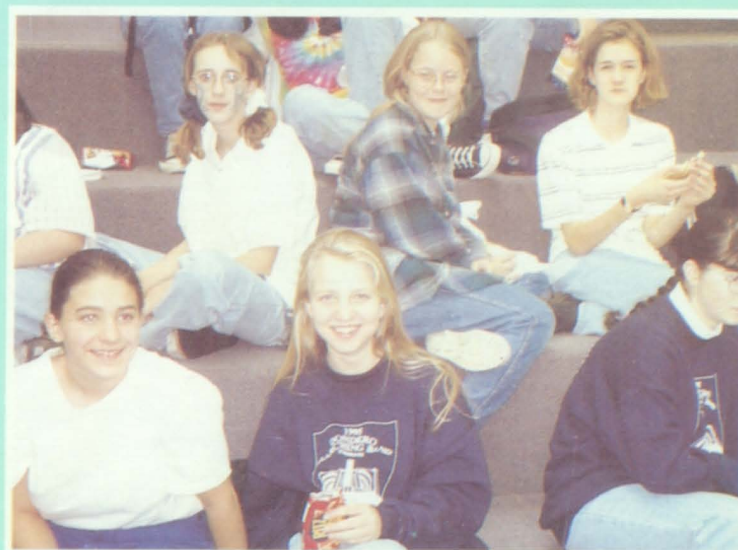

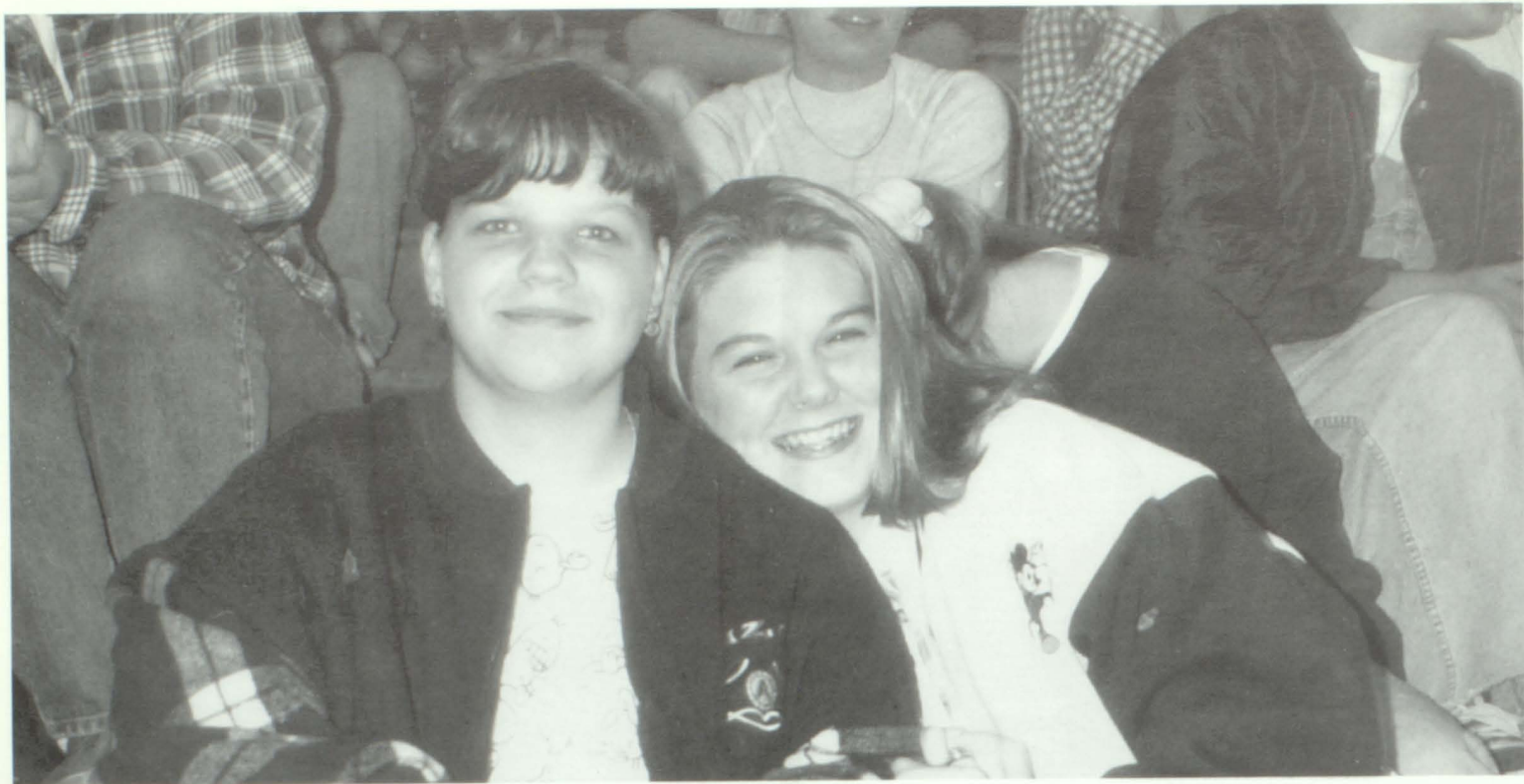

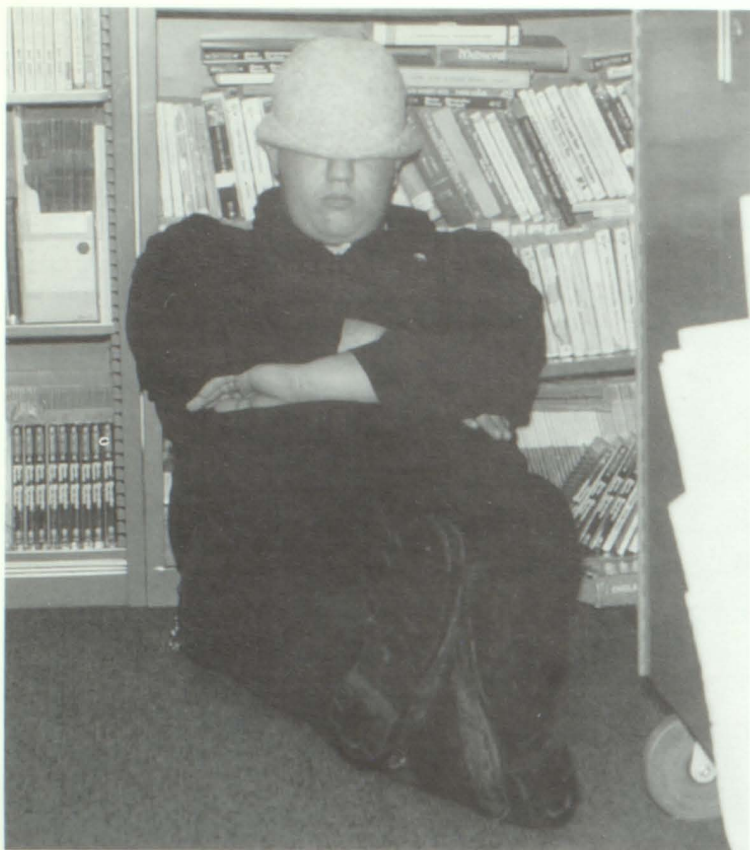

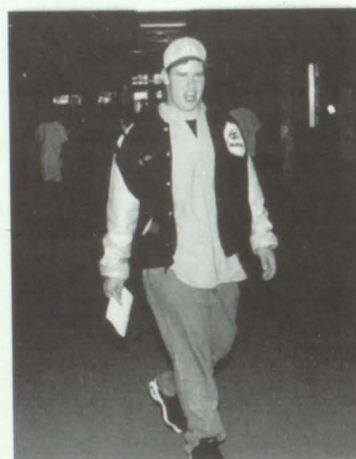

not enjoy some of the privileges that others have shared for years. However, it will be no time before the Freshmen will be Juniors and able to go out to lunch.



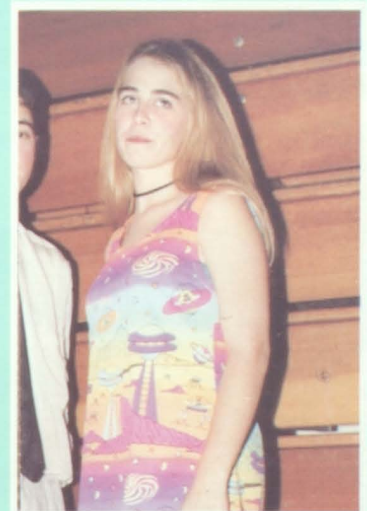

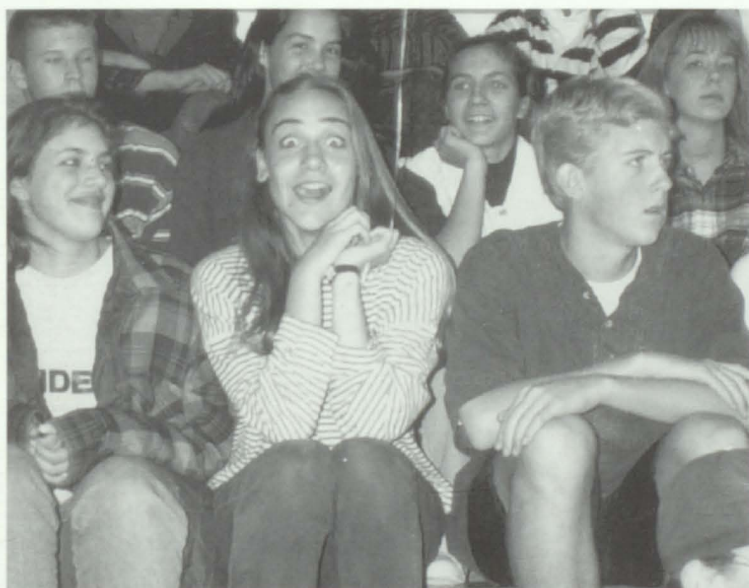

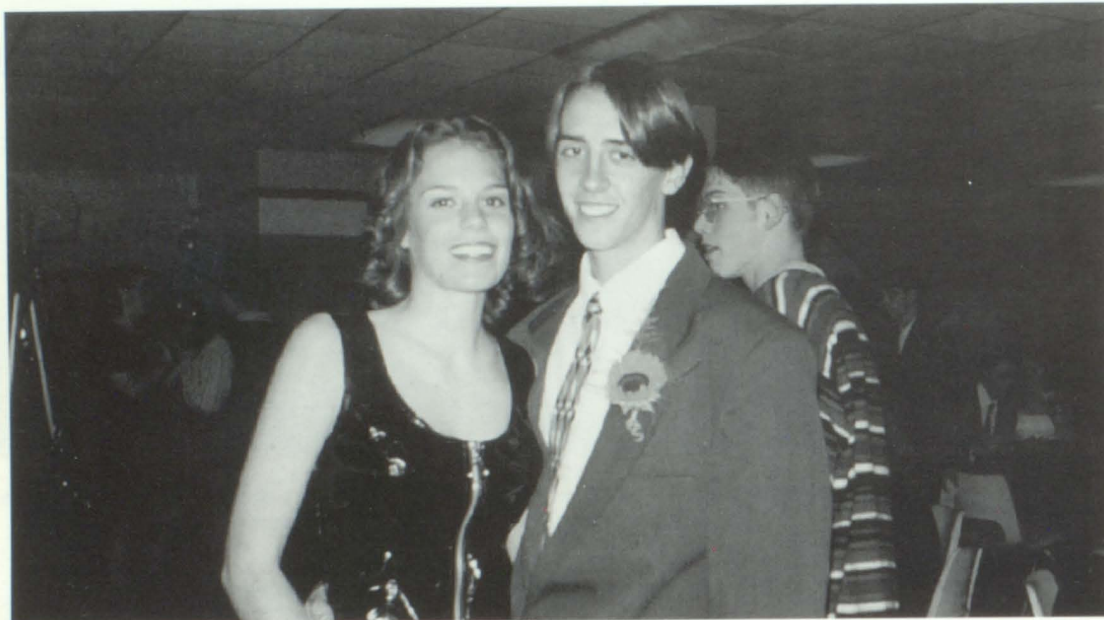

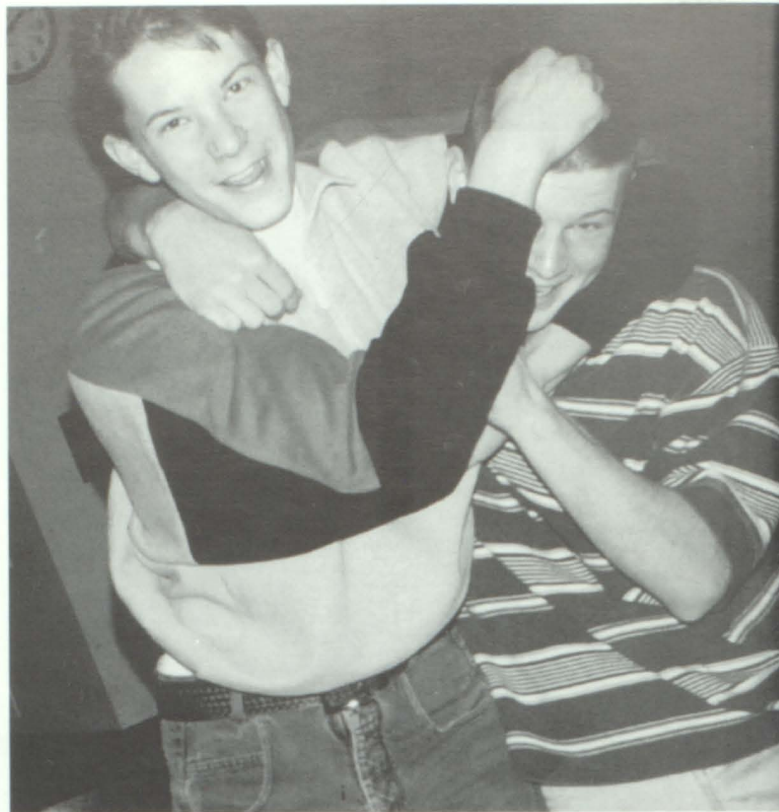
Sibling Rivalry

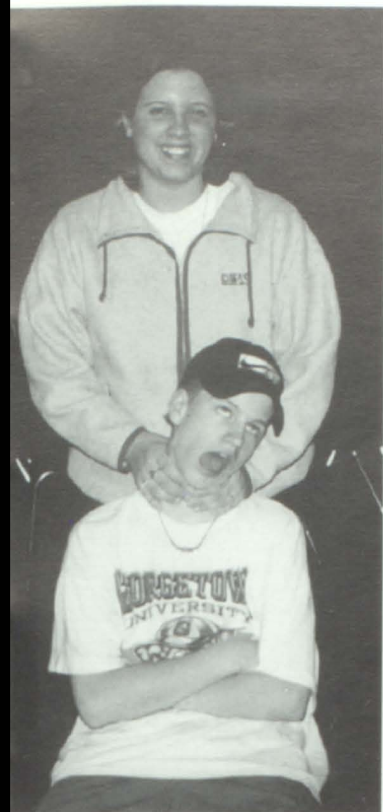

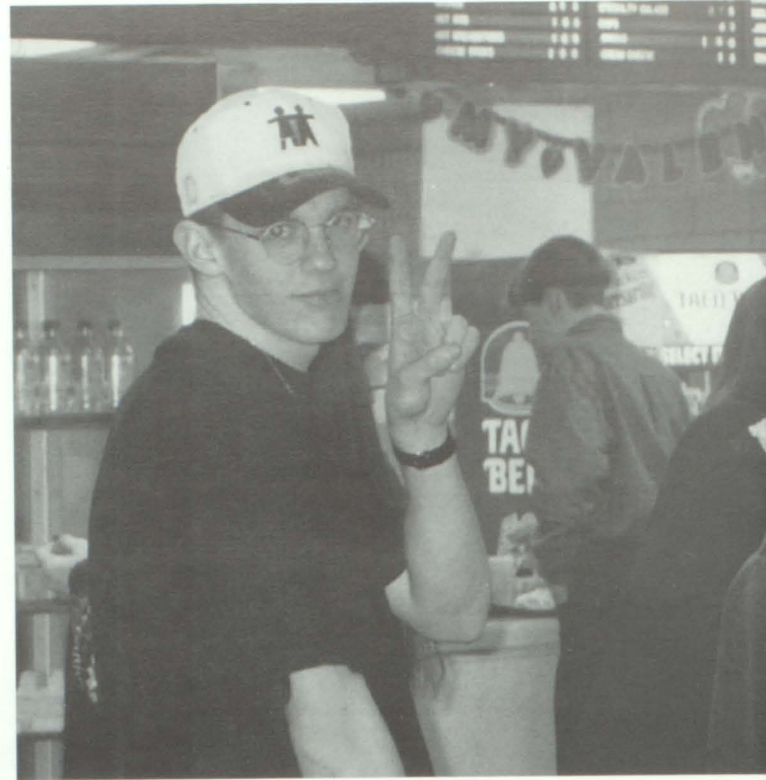




Munchin' Down In OAKTOWN!

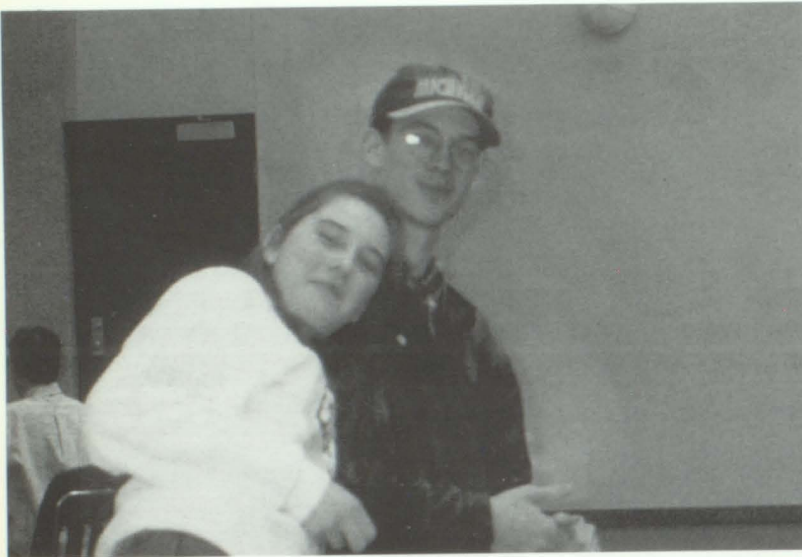

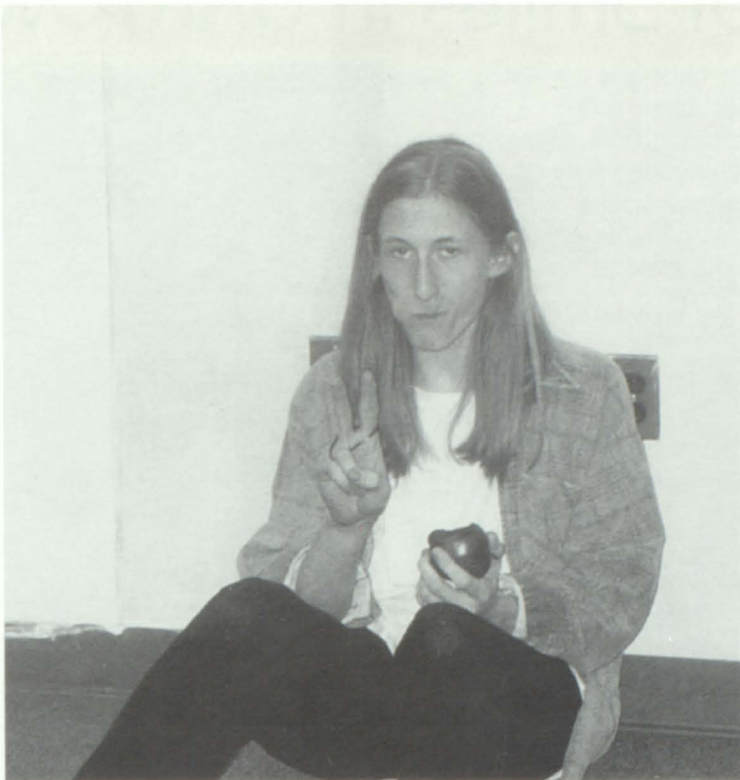

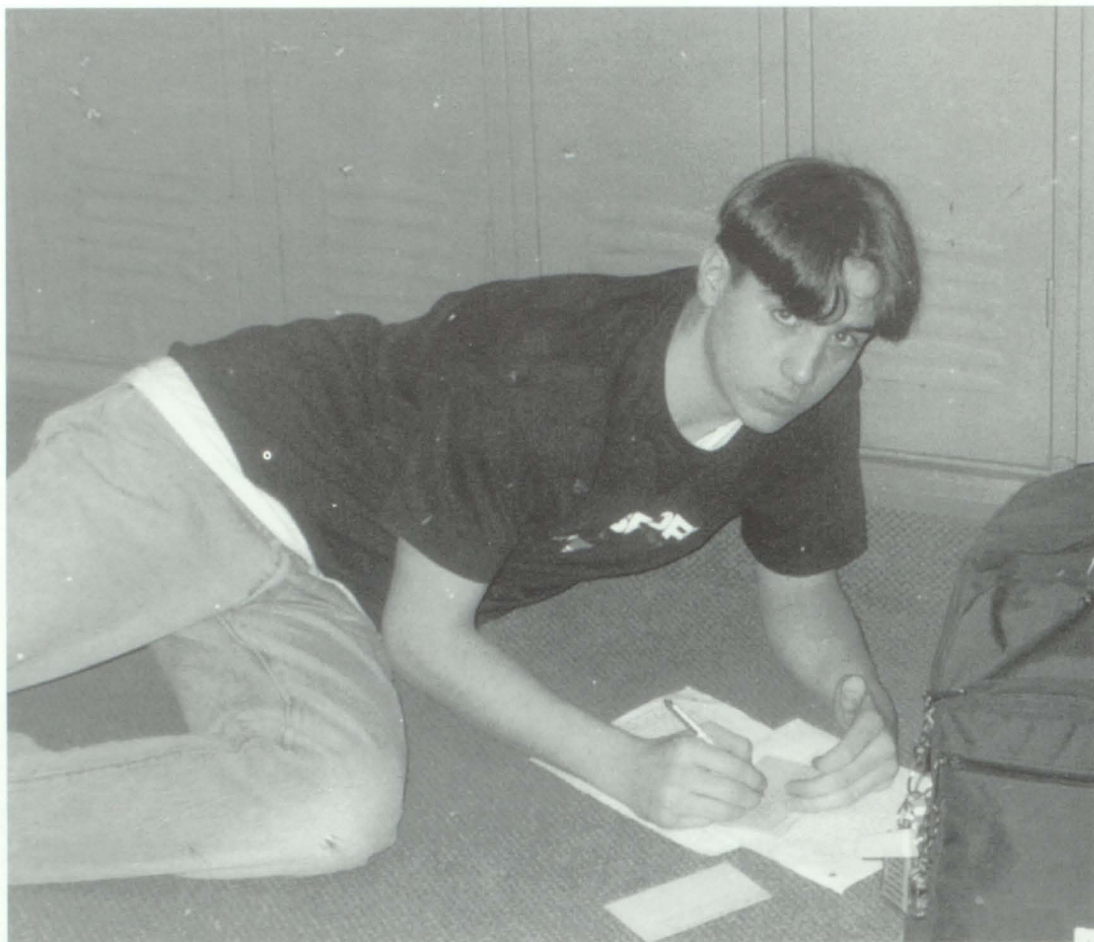

Learning a foreign language is a great experience and gives you a widespread advantage to your future. Each club has a variety of activities and goals.

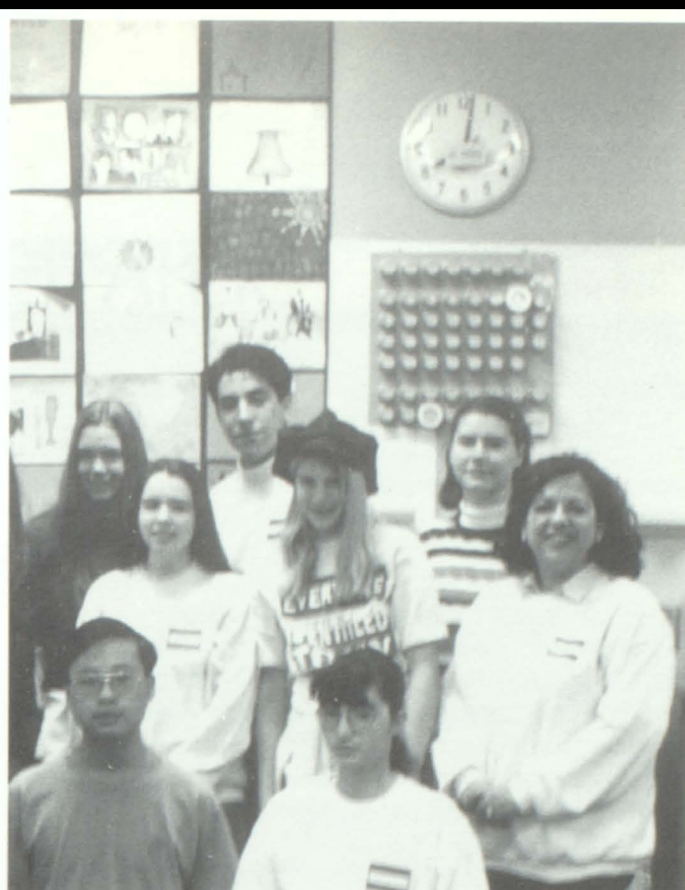

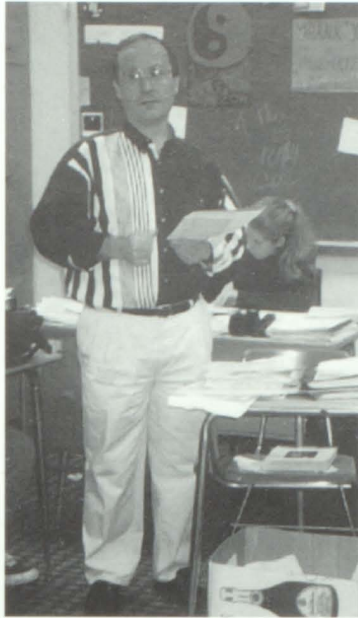

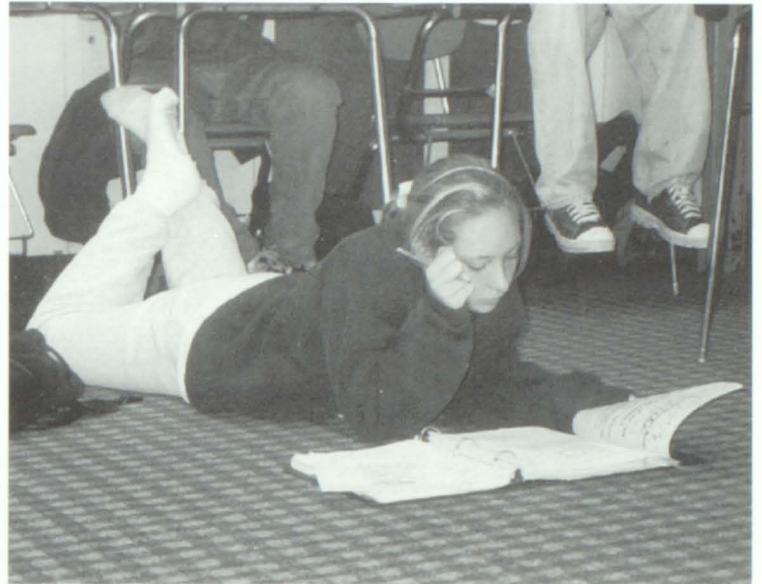

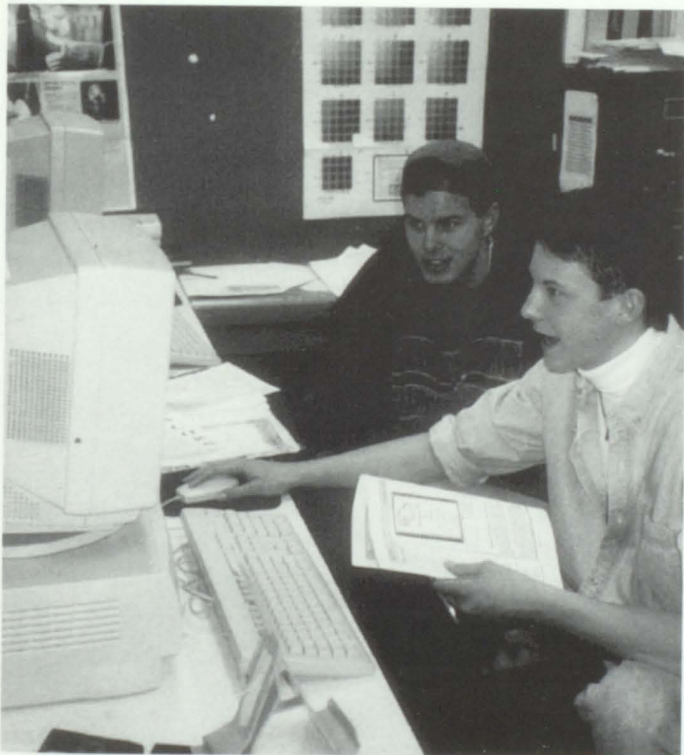

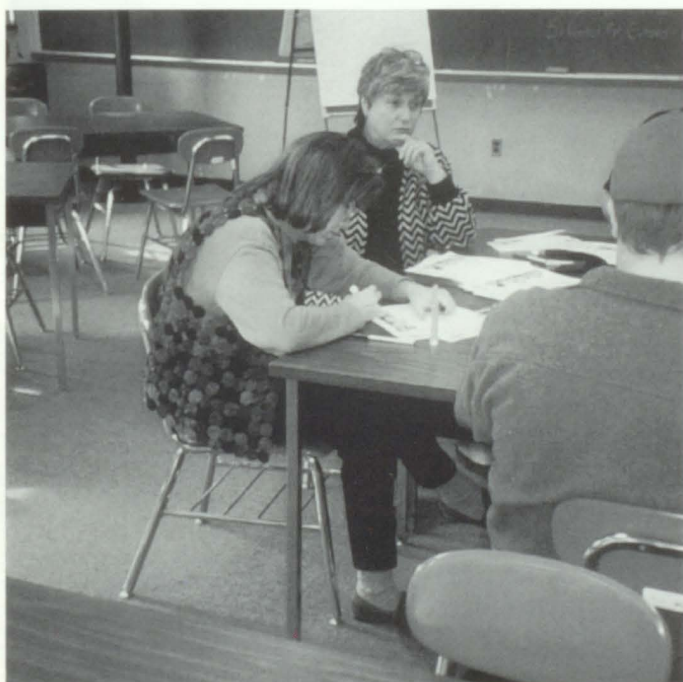

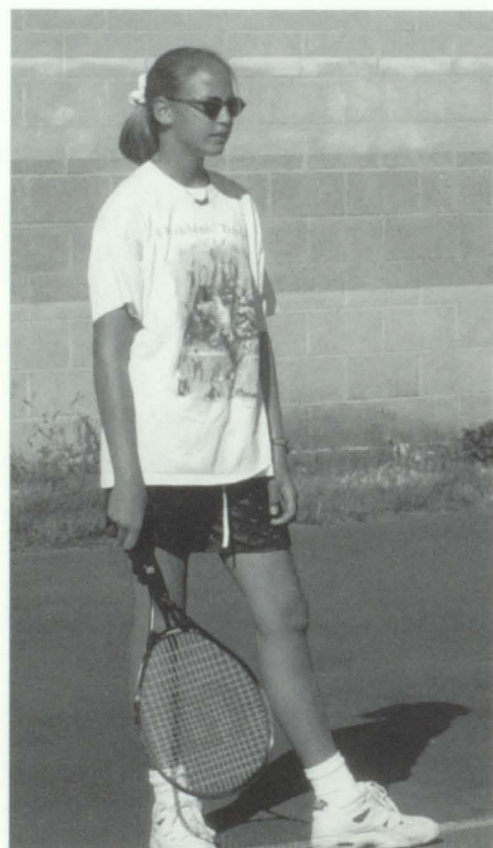

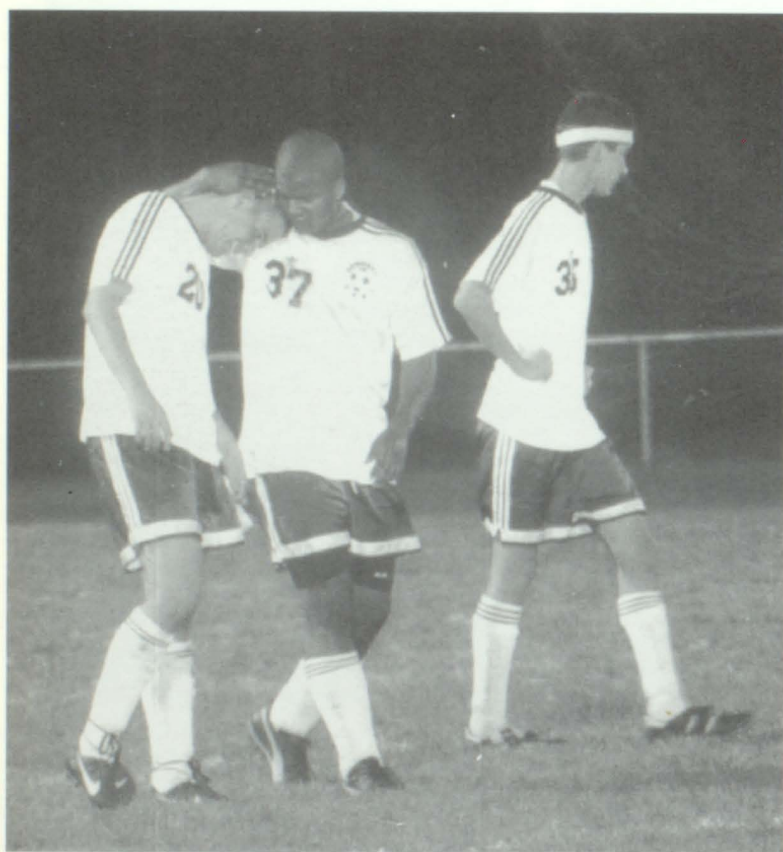

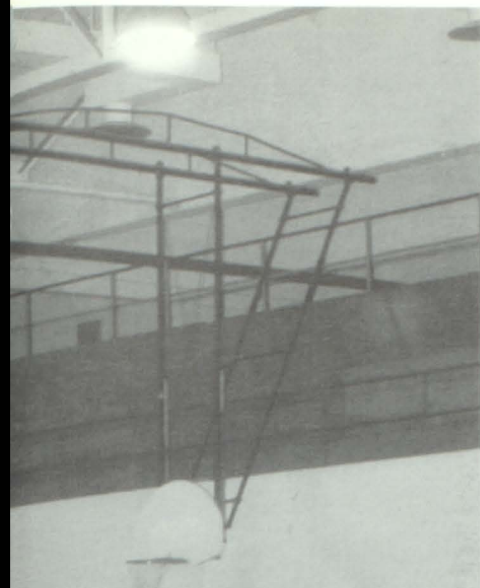

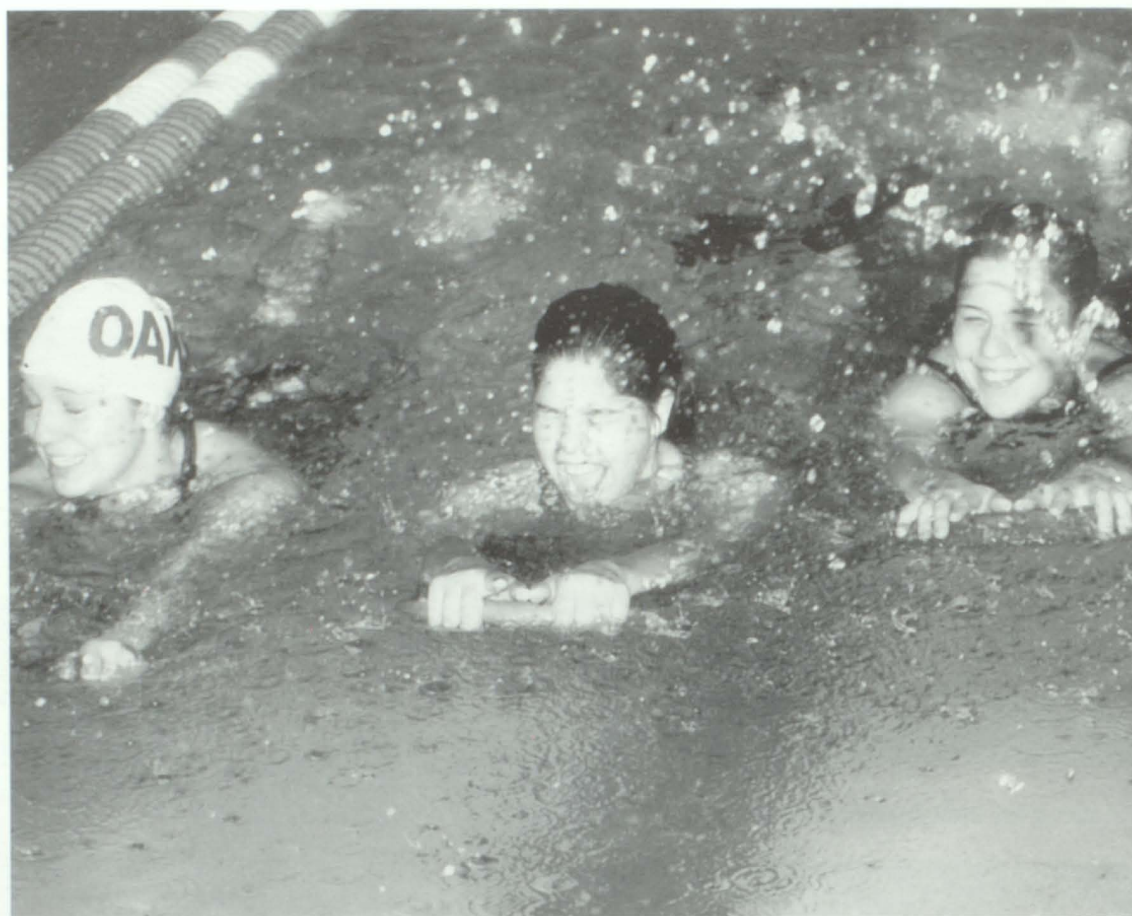


Lady Oaks Swim To Success

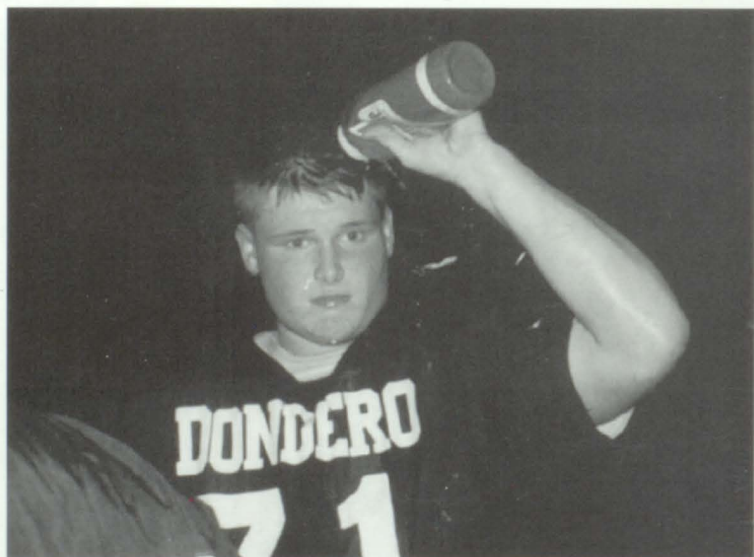

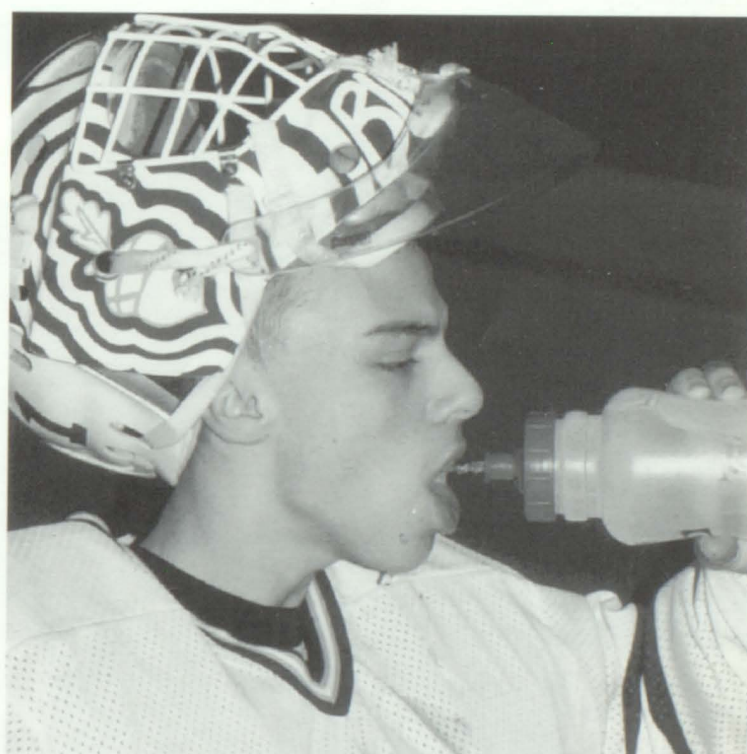

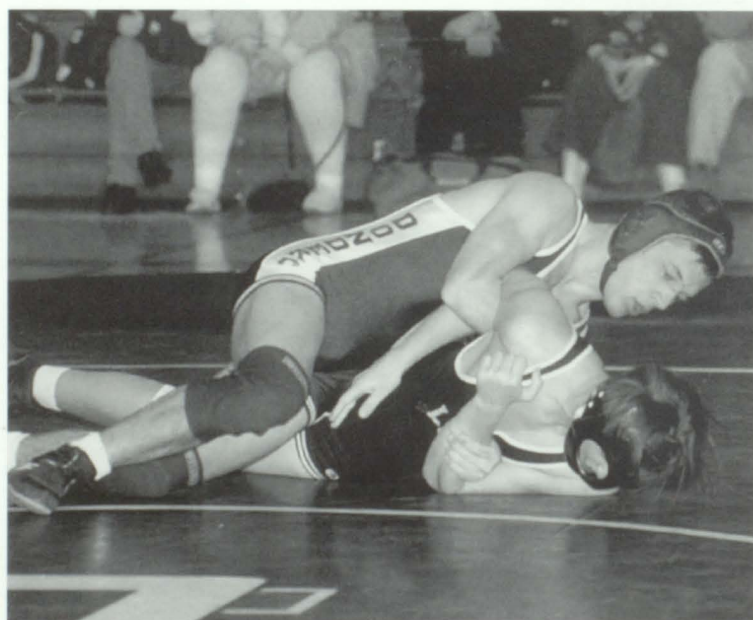

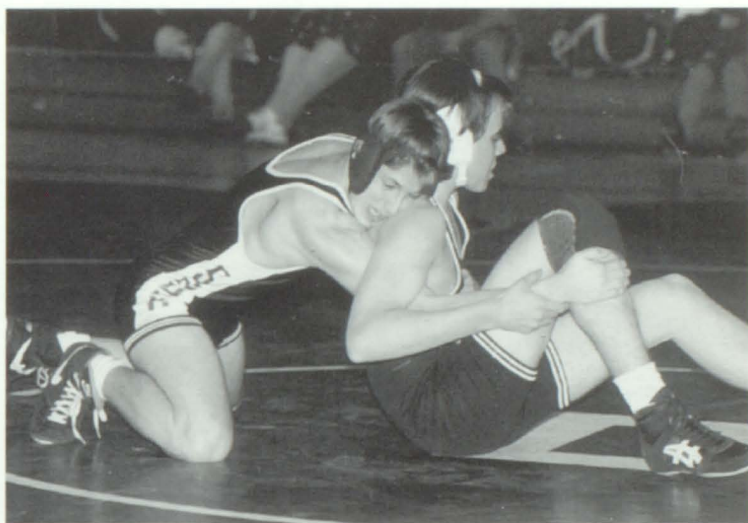

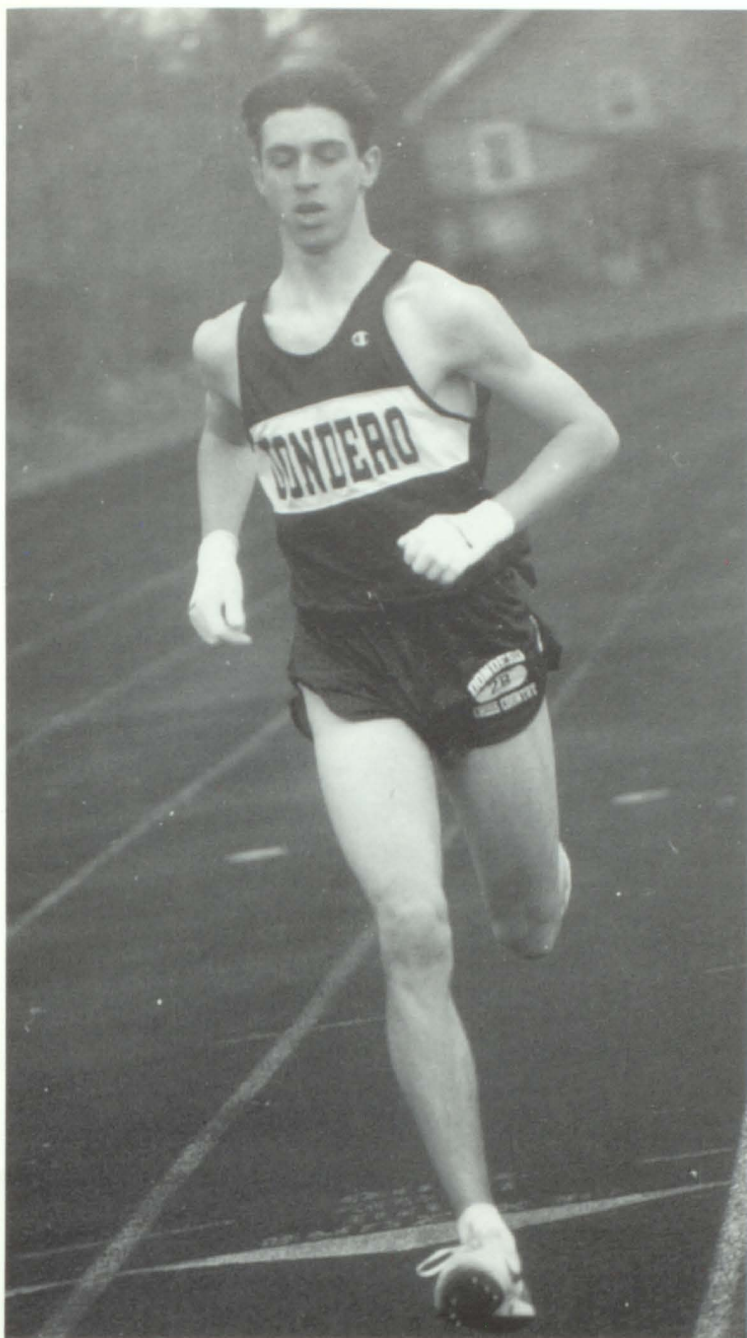

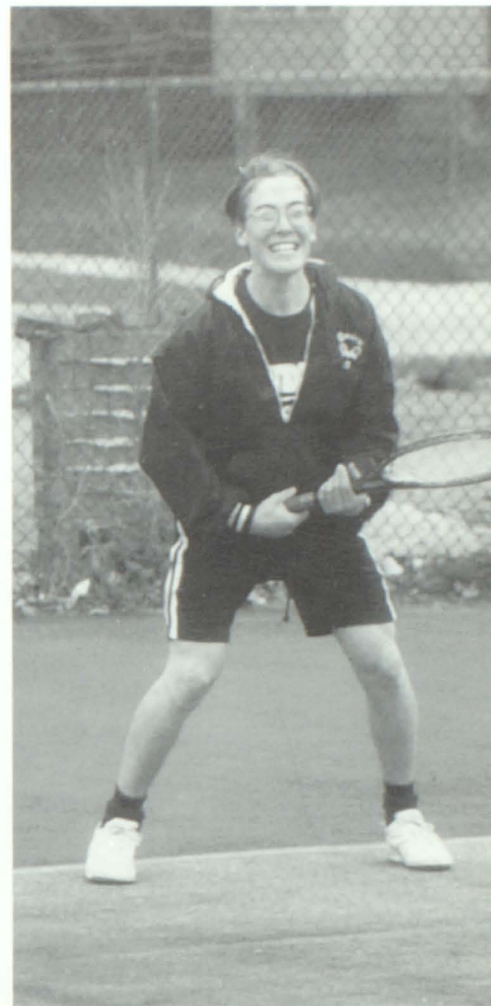

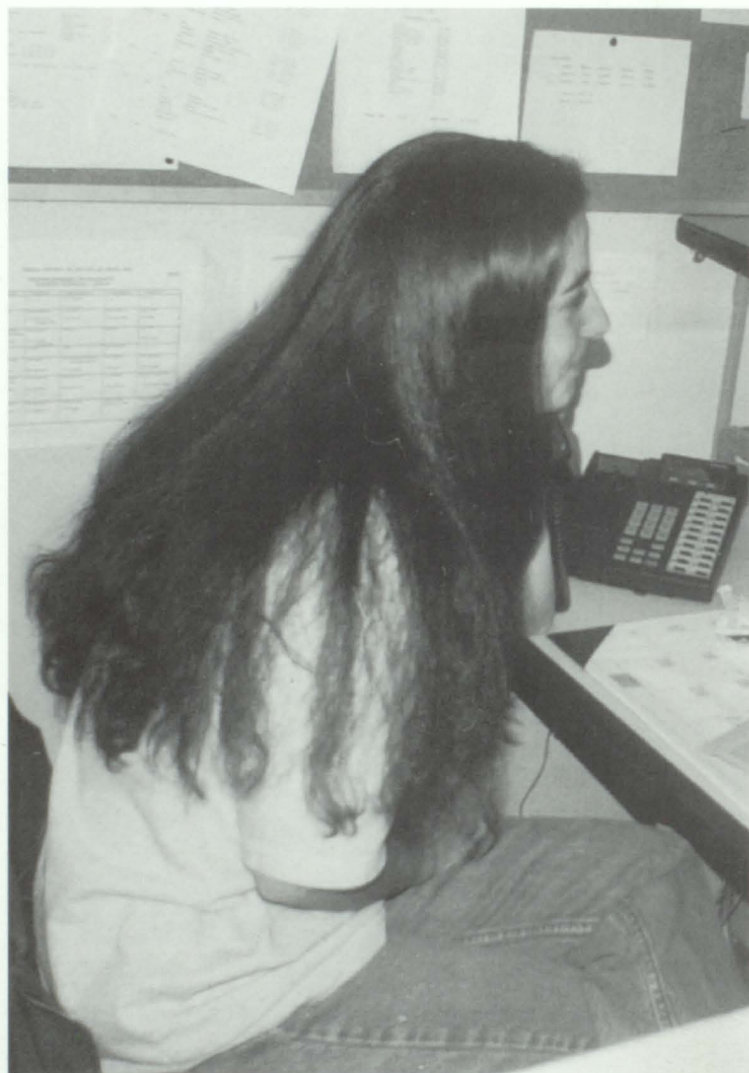

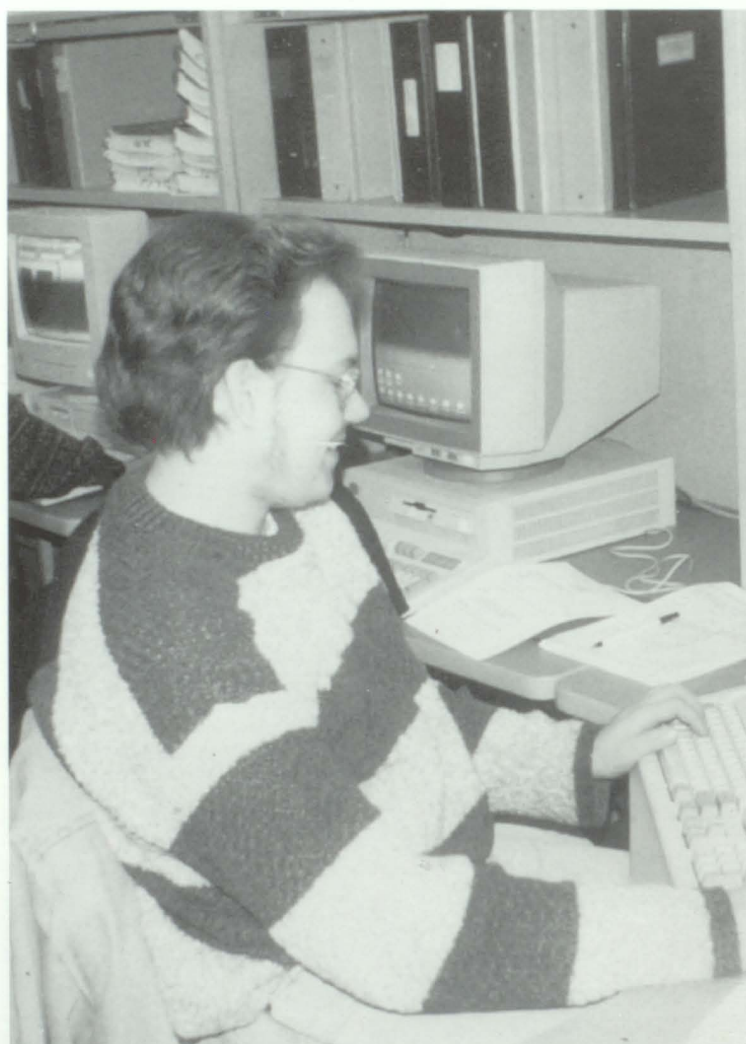
A.M. O.T.C.

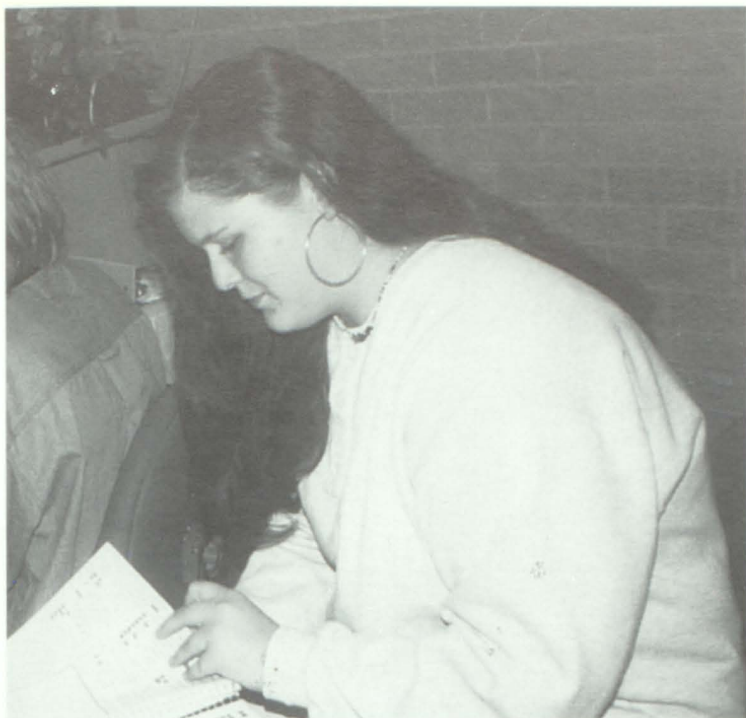

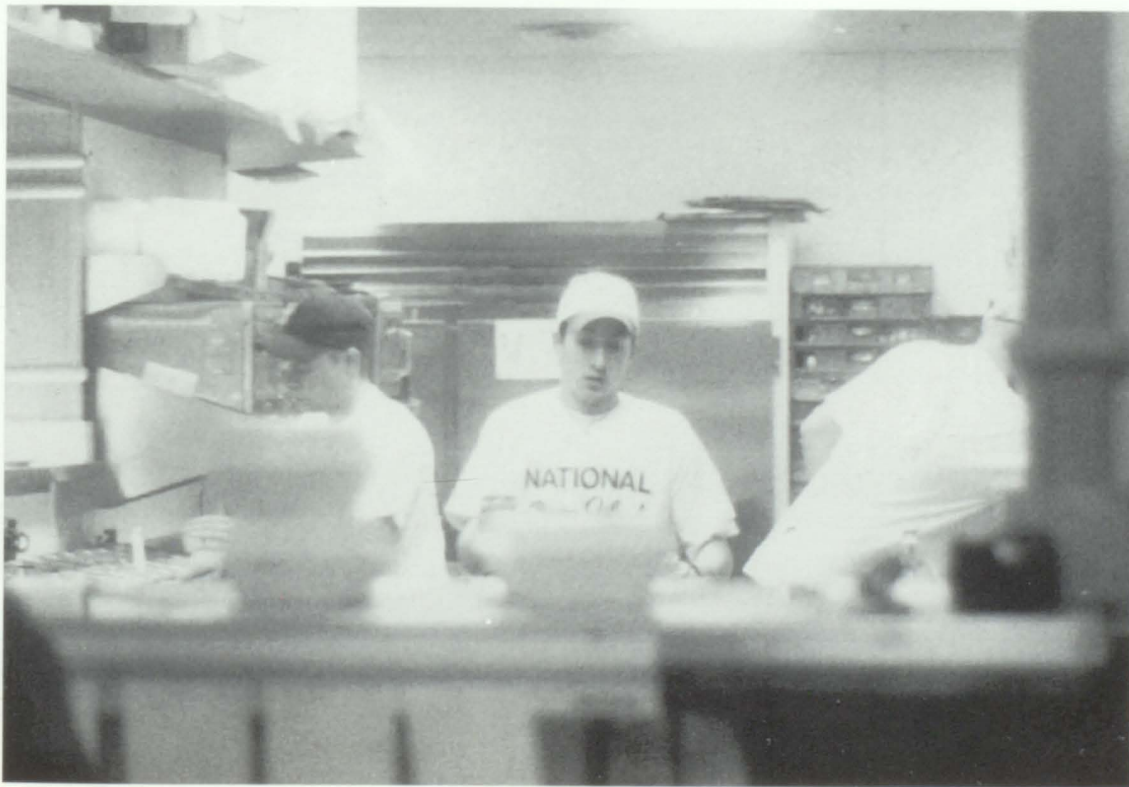

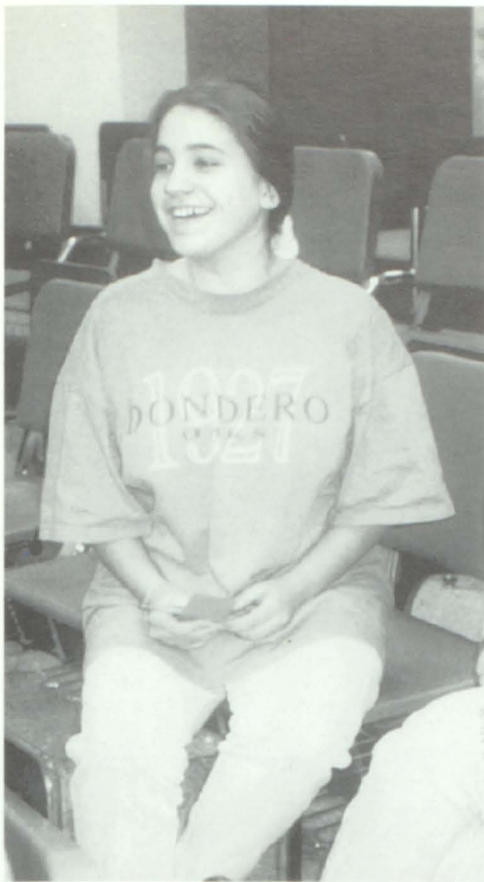

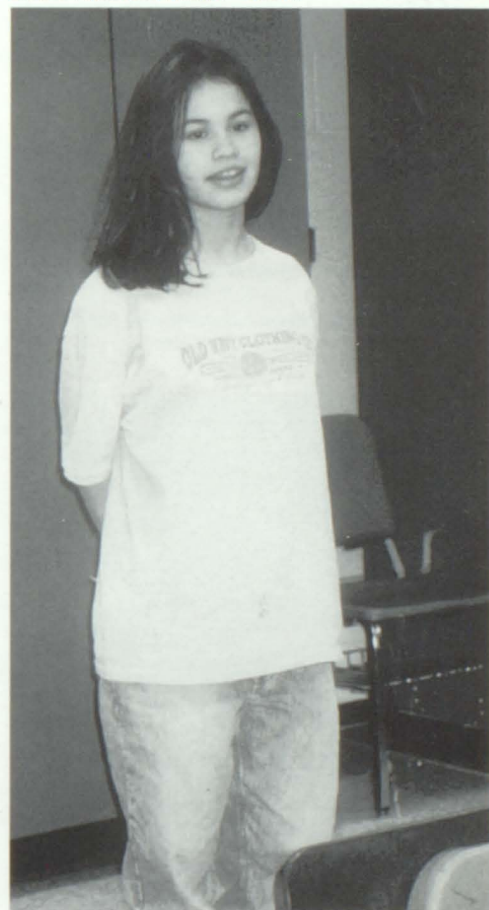

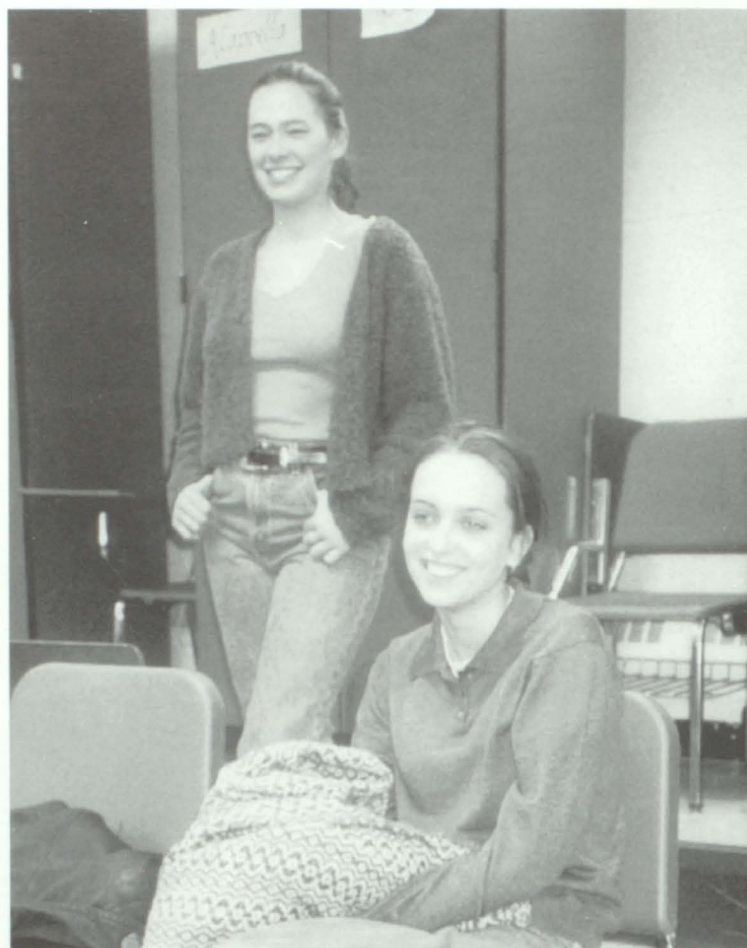
A Cappella Choir and Mixed Choir

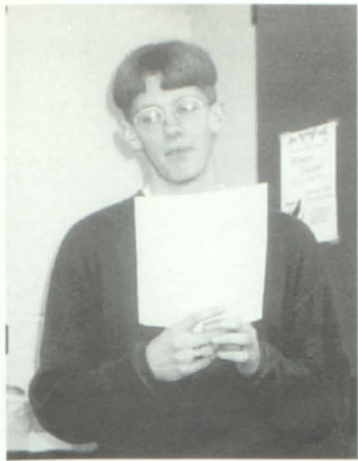

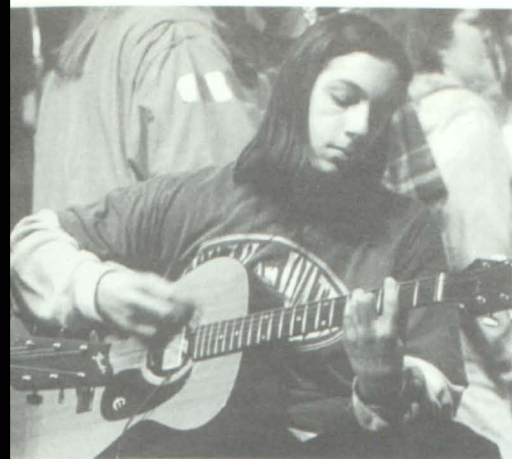

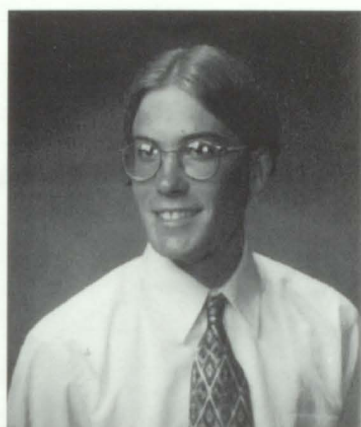


Why The Arts?

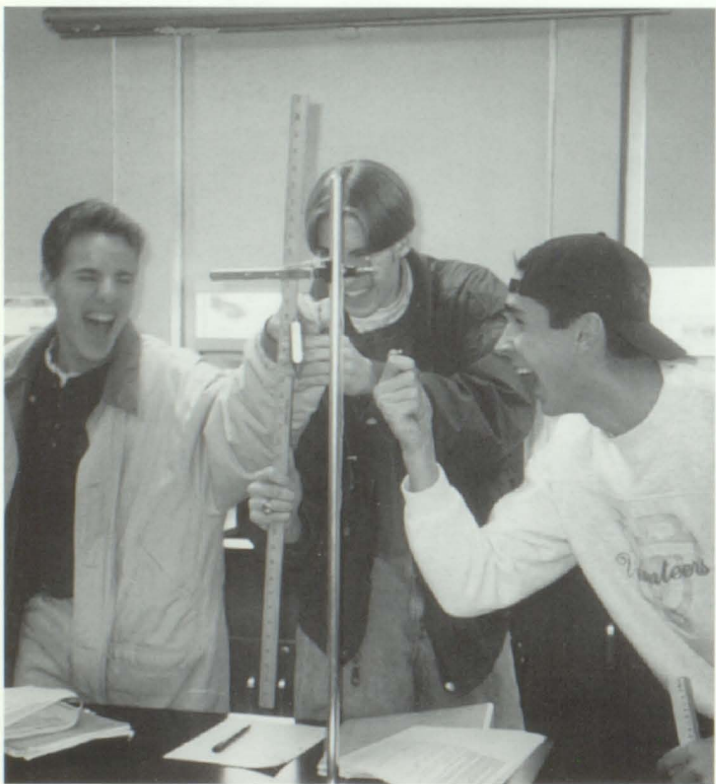

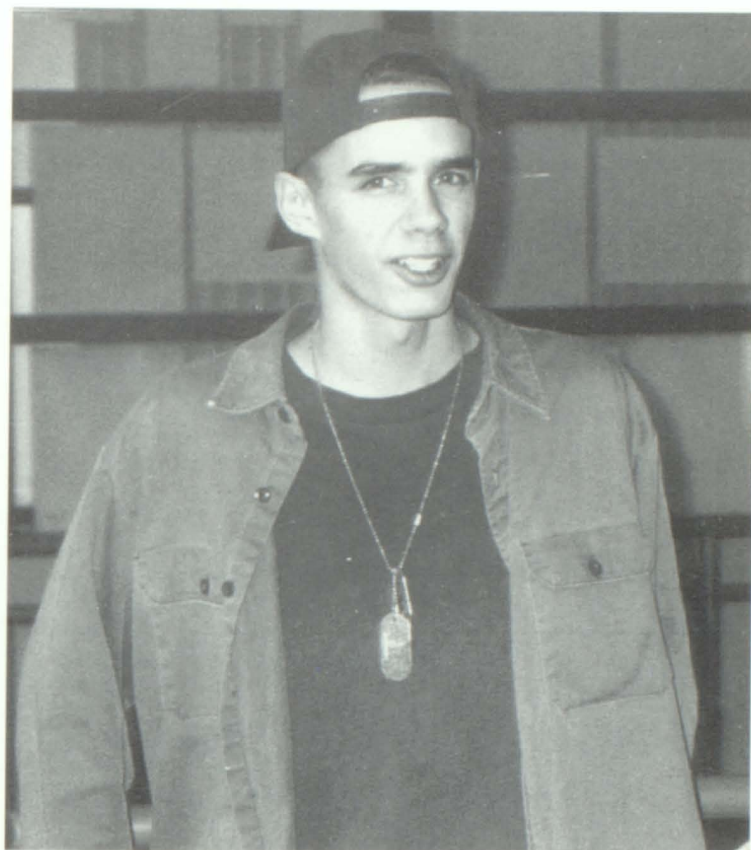

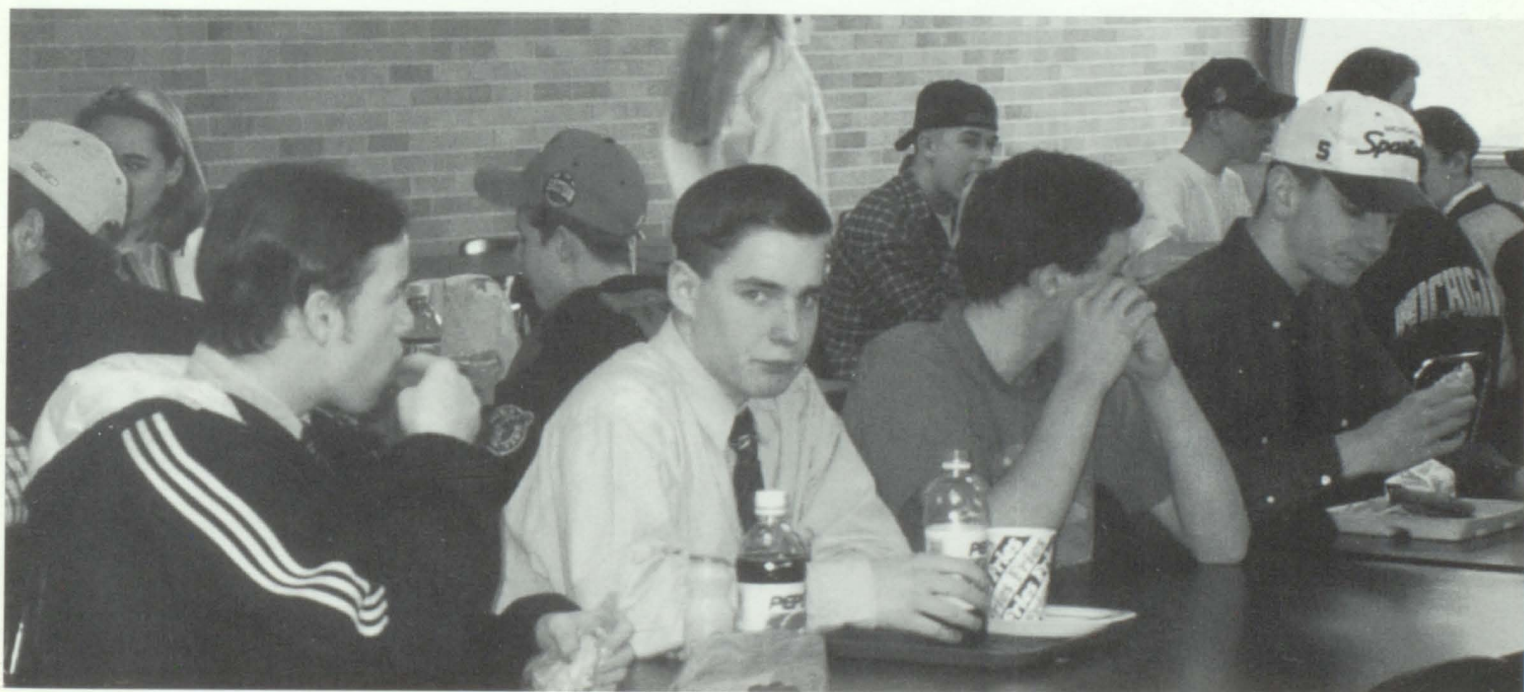

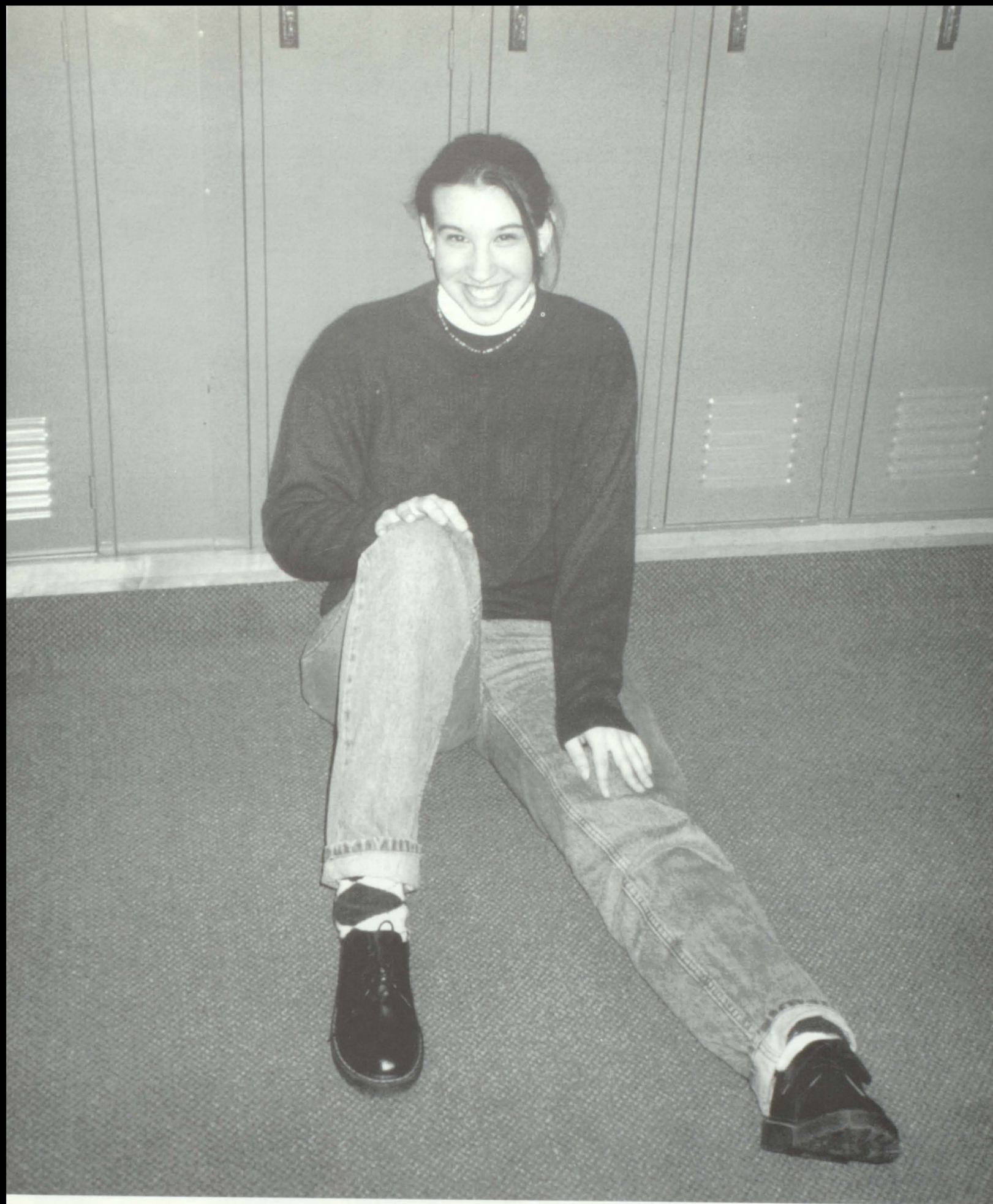
