Turkey Tail: The velvety surface, the rosette form, the color zones (Look closely!) and the small pores underneath give it away.



This is Artist Conk, a common fungus in our woods. This one is unusual because at first glance it appears to be growing on the ground, which these don't do. If you look closely, you will see that it is growing on another Artist Conk, which is firmly attached to the log.



This was very impressive, 4 to 5 inches across. My best identification for this is *Hericium ramosum* var. *rosea*. I have only found it in one guidebook so far. A common name for the white variety is Comb Tooth, so I guess we could call it Pink Comb Tooth. I've only seen it in Tenhave.
